SHIP SUBSIDIES!

Senator Hanna Speaks in Favor of Bill.

Federation of Labor Favors Eight Hour Day.

Congress Will Adjourn for Holidays on December 21.

PHILIPPINE POLICE ESTABLISHED.

Washington, Dec. 12.—By a special order, the senate convened to-day at 11 o'clock to enable Hanna to speak on the ship subsidy bill before taking up the special order of further consideration in executive session of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty.

Hanna's speech was in a sense a reply to that delivered a few days ago by Clay of Georgia.

Hanna said the remarks of Clay brought into question the motives of those who assisted in the preparation of the pending measure. As a member of the maritime committee as well as the committee of commerce, Hanna said he felt it his right and duty to explain the work of those committees.

"For myself," he declared, "I resent the imputation of any other motive than those of interest in our country and good of the public actuated the committees."

Clay interrupted Hanna to disclaim any such imputation.

Discussing the rise and fall of the American merchant marine, Hanna declared that the decline began in 1855. In response to Clay's challenge, Hanna reviewed the history of the American merchant marine, maintaining that its decadence began in 1850.

Hanna declared that the ships of the American line, which he said had not made a net dollar since they came under the American flag, would receive less than \$200,000 a year each if the bill became a law.

Hanna said the pending measure was believed to be the most practical legislation that could be enacted upon the subject. He sketched the rise of the shipping industry on the great lakes, fostered and protected by salutary and wise navigation laws.

Hanna maintained that in order to build up the American merchant marine it was necessary to have not only the capital and experience, but to "afford our foreign carrying trade protection, some kind of an inducement by law."

At 2 o'clock Hanna concluded his speech on the ship subsidy bill and the senate then went into executive session to consider the Hay-Pauncefote treaty.

Yerkes Appointed.

Washington, Dec. 12.—The president today nominated John W. Yerkes, of Kentucky, to be commissioner of internal revenue.

Favor Eight Hour Day.

Louisville, Dec. 12.—The American Federation of Labor convention to-day adopted a resolution directing the executive council to take such action as is necessary to have an eight hour bill introduced in the legislatures of the states where the eight hour law does not prevail.

THE STRIKE!

Telegraph Operators Offer to Arbitrate.

Arbitration Is Urged by Gov- ernor of Colorado.

Ohio Bank Blown Open and Robbed by Determined Burglars.

PRESIDENT OF SWITZERLAND.

Topeka, Kas., Dec. 12.—While President Ripley, of the Santa Fe railway system and President M. M. Dolphin, of the Order of Railway Telegraphers, are not in Topeka, no conference on the strike question will transpire.

"Arbitration of all differences that have arisen in the Santa Fe strike will be accepted by the telegraphers," said President Dolphin to-day. "We are willing to submit these questions to disinterested persons. We will accept the governor of Colorado, governor of Kansas or governor of Texas as arbitrator, or we will refer the dispute with schedule asked by the Gulf operators to General Manager Van Vleck of the Southern Pacific."

Denver, Col., Dec. 13.—Acting Governor Carney has wired President Ripley of the Santa Fe, suggesting settlement of differences between the company and telegraphers by arbitration.

President Ripley said to-day that he had not yet received Lieut. Gov. Carney's dispatch. "General arbitration with the telegraphers, as far as the Santa Fe strike is concerned, is a closed incident. The time for argument or arbitration has passed. Not more than 40 per cent of the operators went on a strike. The places of the strikers will all be filled and the strike has ceased to give the officers of the road any serious concern."

Adair P. Walker, chairman of the board of directors, said: "What is there to arbitrate? The strikers broke their contract with the company. Further consideration cannot be expected."

Later in the day President Ripley received a message sent by Acting-Governor Carney, Colorado, to which he sent the following reply: "The striking telegraphers hitherto employed on our lines in Colorado did not strike because of any grievance against the company. On the contrary by the course they pursued they violated their obligations technical and moral, obligations which on our part, have been fully lived up to in every respect. Under all circumstances it is manifest that the time for arbitration has passed."

WK-chita, Kas., Dec. 12.—J. H. Bolander, representing J. A. Newman, chairman, received a dispatch from Needles, Cal., announcing that two train dispatchers had quit on the ground that the substitute operators were incompetent, endangering life and property. Thirteen operators on the west end of the Chicago division quit today and eight on the cut-off branch of the eastern division.

Bank Robbery.
Canal Dover, Ohio, Dec. 12.—Four masked men blew open the safe in the private bank of John Deerechuck at Shawville this morning. Citizens were held off by the determined burglars until the wrecked safe was looted. Then amid a fusillade of bullets the four escaped on a hand car, carrying about \$1000.

President of Switzerland.
Berne, Dec. 12.—The vice president of the federal council, Ernest Brinner of Basle, has been elected president of Switzerland for 1901, in succession of Walter Hauser. Dr. J. Zemp, of the department post railroad, was elected vice president.

MEXICO MINE DIFFICULTY SETTLED.

San Francisco, Dec. 12.—Careful approximation of the total yield of gold from the Klondike and Alaska for the present year aggregates \$26,724,225, divided as follows: Klondike, \$21,368,329; Nome, \$4,355,896.

Burlington Railroad Wreck.
Burlington, Iowa, Dec. 12.—The Burlington fast mail which left Chicago last evening, was wrecked near Kirkwood, Illinois. The train was wrecked and Engineer Samuel Dove badly hurt. The engine jumped the track, and the contents were burned.

Guest Train Accident.
Helena, Mont., Dec. 12.—The guest train westbound on the Great Northern railway was wrecked at Brookton, 238 miles east of Havre, early to-day. Mrs. Watson, residence unknown, her aged mother, and an unknown Russian child, were killed. The accident was caused by the breaking of a truck.

Opposed to Foreigners.
Hong Kong, Dec. 12.—The city was placarded to-day with statements inciting the people to unite and rise during January and drive out all foreigners. Reports have been received from Canton that young Sun Yat, reformer, has been horribly tortured. Though strung up by the thumbs and toes, he would confess nothing.

Phoenix, Ariz., Dec. 12.—Two factions of the Cobre Grande Mining company ended a conference here yesterday by complete adjustment of the difficulty which for two years has occupied the supreme and lower courts of Arizona, Mexico and Texas. The faction headed by W. G. Greene will take up all stock at par value, \$2.50 a share. The strained situation at the mines located in Cananea, Mexico, has for some time required Mexican troops to prevent bloodshed between the disputants.

No law for the regulation of the liquor traffic has ever been entirely satisfactory to the public. The state dispensary plan adopted by North Dakota a few years ago, and thought to be a success, was repealed at the last election.

One of the Indian riders was trampled upon by the horses and killed during the opening festivities, but the joy was unconfined.

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LAND COURT.

Several Important Grants Confirmed
—Others Rejected.

COURT ADJOURNED YESTERDAY.

In the court of private land claims Tuesday the objections of the government to the San Mateo Spring grant survey were overruled and the grant was approved. The grant is situated in Bernalillo county, and was claimed by Roman A. Baca, et al., for 324.46 acres.

In the Santa Cruz grant case a formal decree of confirmation was entered, pursuant to a decision of the court as a former term, giving to claimants valley lands on the eastern side of the Santa Clara river, and also valley lands along the Santa Cruz from Santa Clara patented lands east to the junction of the Quemada and Santa Cruz rivers. This grant is claimed by Frank Becker et al., for 4,999 acres, and is situated in the northern part of this county.

The Santa Domingo de Cunduy grant in Santa Fe county, claimed by Jose Antonio Vigil et al., was confirmed with boundaries as stipulated upon by the counsel.

In the matter of the San Miguel del Rio grant, Clayton G. Coleman was appointed court commissioner to take testimony on the ground as to the extent of allotted lands. The grant is situated in San Miguel county, and is claimed by Julian Sandoval et al., by Levi P. Morton, and by Juan Marquez, et al., for 215,300.3 acres.

In the Canon de Chama grant case, a decree was entered defining the extent of the allotted lands heretofore confirmed on the Chama river. The grant is claimed by the Rio Arriba Land and Cattle company (limited) for 472,726.95 acres, and is situated in Rio Arriba county.

The Francisco Xavier Romero grant was rejected and dismissed, being entirely within the Santa Cruz grant in this county. It was claimed by Francisco A. Romero, as being located in Rio Arriba county.
