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A.f.l.-c.i.o. Denounces Arrest Of Mexican Union Leader

In a Feb. 19 press statement, the AFL-CIO denounced the "illegal detention" of Agapito Gonzalez Cavazos, maguiladora union leader in Matamoros, Tamaulipas state. Gonzalez was detained by Federal Judicial Police on Jan. 31. (See SourceMex 02/05/92 and 02/19/92 for previous coverage.) The AFL-CIO accused US investors and maguiladora owners of intervention to have Gonzalez removed from annual contract negotiations taking place at the time. Gonzalez was charged with tax evasion. The AFL-CIO also called on the Bush administration to include guarantees for the rights of all workers under the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), and especially prohibition of US plant owner intervention in Mexican unions' collective bargaining processes. Next, in Matamoros, the Tamaulipas Workers Federation (Federacion de Trabajadores de Tamaulipas-FTT) demanded the immediate release of Gonzalez, and called for dismissal of Edmundo Castro Medina, president of the state conciliation and arbitration council. In a deposition submitted to the government's National Human Rights Commission, Gonzalez said that after being arrested in Matamoros and taken to Mexico City, he was held incommunicado while being interrogated by magistrates on tax evasion charges. According to Gonzalez, no judge ever issued a warrant for his arrest. Matamoros is the most highly unionized maguiladora town along the border. The 36,000 members of Gonzalez's union are the best paid in the region, earning an average daily wage of US \$11.50. (Sources: La Jornada, El Financiero, 02/20/92; Washington Post, 02/28/92)

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
