DEWET IN DANGER

Gallant General Almost Surrounded.

American Warships Going to Panama.

Republicans of Nebraska Meet in Washington and Rejoice.

ILLNESS OF QUEEN VICTORIA.

At New North Cape Colony, Dec. 7.—Gen. Dewet appears to be in a most dangerous position. With strong British columns on three sides and two swollen rivers barring his front, the British commanders begin to be hopeful that the great chase by four columns, which has been one of the most exciting operations of the war, will result in the capture of Dewet.

London, Dec. 8.—The war office has received the following dispatch from Kitchener at Bloemfontein, dated Dec. 8:

"Have just received news from Knox at Rouville that Dewet's force, having failed to force the Komaggas bridge, which we held, trekked north-east, abandoning 500 horses and many carts. His attempt on Cape Colony, therefore, has failed. He is being pressed on all sides."

Johnsbury, Dec. 8.—Boers captured 17,000 sheep from a small detachment of British troops in the vicinity of Krugersdorp.

WARSHIPS.

Going to Panama to Protect American Interests From Revolutionists.

Chicago, Dec. 8.—A special to the Record from Washington says: The immediate movement of the warships Philadelphia and Iowa from San Diego, Cal., to South American waters, is an indirect result of the rebellion in Colombia. According to officials of the navy, Admiral Kautz is going there with his ships to police the isthmus of Panama and see that there is free communication across the strip of land connecting the two continents of the western hemisphere.

REPUBLICANS REJOICE.

Nebraskans in Washington Hold Meeting and Hear Hanna.

Washington, Dec. 8.—The Nebraska republican club celebrated the victory in that state last night. Many prominent republicans were present. Senator Hanna said in his speech: "She has broken up noticeably since she was informed that the Emperor Frederick was suffering from cancer of the throat and cannot live many months."

St. Louis, Dec. 8.—The strike of the members of the railroad telegraphers, which began several days ago on the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe branch of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railway in Texas, has spread west. At the headquarters of the Order Railway Telegraphers of this city, it was learned to-day that all operators on the Santa Fe Pacific and Southern California, San Francisco & San Joaquin Valley division of the Santa Fe, extending from Albuquerque, N. Company Has Purchased the White Oaks Road.

Another Rebellion in the Turbulent Republic of Columbia.

NURSE KILLS A CHILD.

Austin, Texas, Dec. 8.—An important step toward building a new transcontinental railroad line was taken to-day in the presentation to the attorney general of Texas for his approval of a charter for the Chicago, Rock Island & Mexico railroad company, which is to be a part of the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific system.

The charter provides for the extension of the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific from its present southwestern terminus at Liberal, Kan., to White Oaks, N. M., where it will connect with the El Paso & Northern railroad running from White Oaks to El Paso, Texas, 141 miles.

The deal will be formally ratified by the directors of the former company at their meeting in New York city, Dec. 15.

FIRED ON STEAMER.

Columbian Ship Steamer by Cannon Shot and Make It Unsafe.

San Diego, Cal., Dec. 8.—The steamer Hathor, which arrived here was threatened with bombardment in Colombian waters, if the captain persisted in making for Buena Ventura, for which port the steamer had freight. One cannon ball was shot across the bow. The Hathor put about and discharged her freight at Carmito. The report was heard at Apurucopa that 700 government troops were killed at Panama by revolutionists.

Killed a Child.

New York, Dec. 8.—Alice O'Donnell, 25 years of age, a trained nurse, while visiting Mr. and Mrs. James Jones, of Brooklyn, last night, killed their 15-months old child, Arthur Jones, cutting his throat with a razor. She escaped. Her motive is not known.

Chicago Has Sore Eyes.

Chicago, Dec. 8.—A new disease which attacks the eyes and in many respects resembles "pink eye" is epidemic in this city. One explanation offered for the origin of the malady is that it is due to clouds of dust.

Won the Wager.

San Francisco, Dec. 8.—Harry West, known as "Kid" West, who on August 1st, left New York on a wager that he would walk to San Francisco in 125 days, arrived here six days ahead of time.

Railroad Accident.

Philadelphia, Dec. 8.—The first passenger train which left Washington at 11 o'clock this morning for the Philadelphia, Wilmington & Baltimore railroad, due to arrive here at 2:10 o'clock, ran into a freight train at Grayferry station, West Philadelphia. Seven persons were injured, and one probably was killed.

Federation of Labor.

Louisville, Ky., Dec. 8.—At to-day's session of the American Federation of Labor convention the report of the executive council reviewing the action of the national and international unions the past year was received. The report criticized the treatment of the railway employees of St. Louis during the strike and reaffirmed the right of American citizens to work without hindrance.

Galveston, Dec. 8.—Gen. Supt. Nixon, of the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe railway, to-day wired from Cleburne, to General Manager Peck, that the shops there which closed on Thursday night, on account of the operators'

WEEKLY BANK STATEMENT.

Washington, Dec. 8.—Under special order adopted last session the house devoted the day after 1 o'clock to paying tribute to the memory of the late Representative A. C. Harman, of Pennsylvania.

Big Fire.

Baltimore, Md., Dec. 8.—The stores and stock of the Baltimore bargain house were totally destroyed by fire to-day. The building of Grotjan, Leob & Co., which adjoins, was considerably damaged. The fire was discovered at 3 o'clock this morning and burned fiercely far into the morning. The total loss is estimated at \$500,000.

Tendered the Nomination.

Washington, Dec. 8.—Jos. Manly, (Maine) who was offered the office of commissioner of internal revenue, made vacant by the death of George W. Wilson, called on the president to-day and arranged another audience on Monday. Manly has been elected speaker of the house of the Maine legislature, and feels it incumbent upon him to serve only the term which runs until next April. It is said that he probably will accept the office if the offer can be held open until that date.

A meeting of the public library commissioners, recently appointed by Mayor Marron, will be held at the office of the mayor for the purpose of organizing this afternoon.
Edna Garcia, a shrewd and careful sheep and wool buyer, returned to the city this morning, after purchasing several thousand pounds of wool, which will be stored for the time being in this city.

A Mistake.
Mr. Alexander received a telegram from Delegate Perea, stating that no charges of any kind had been made against him, but that his name had been sent to the senate by the president through a mistake and was withdrawn. Mr. Alexander has insisted that there was no territorial opposition to him for the position.

The Bazaar Closed.
The Presbyterian ladies' bazaar closed last evening after two nights of great success, both evenings showing a large attendance and a most liberal pocket-book among those who were present. The supper yesterday afternoon and evening was more liberally patronized than the night before, and the bazaar will realize at least \$450 all told. Mesdames Dobson and Crumpacker were callers at the City office this morning and asked that notice be given to the effect that the persons who attended the bazaar and purchased a slip of paper with the name of "Barbara" thereon, call at Mrs. Crumpacker's and secure the big doll. Those ladies, with others who were interested, secured the prize.

LIBRARY MANDAMUS CASE.
Being heard by Judge Parker, at the Court House, To-day.
The case of the Albuquerque Public Library association, et al vs the City of Albuquerque and O. N. Marron, mandamus proceedings, came up before Judge P. W. Parker, sitting for Judge Crumpacker at the court house this morning, and as the case is very important, involving the right of the defendants to remove certain property claimed by the said association, there was present quite a large crowd, many of whom are ladies who are members of the association.
The plaintiffs are being represented by W. B. Childers and F. W. Clancy, while the defendants are represented by Horton Moore, who is the city attorney, assisted by O. W. Johnston, A. B. McMillen and E. W. Dobson.
The hearing will be continued during the afternoon, and if the court overrules the demurrer, the defendants will at once go into the merits of the case.

CANT VOTE LAND.
Judge Crumpacker's Decision in Acquiescence.
This morning Judge Crumpacker heard the mandamus case of Modesto Ortiz vs. John Mann et al, requiring the defendants to accept certain votes counted and commissioners of the old town acquiesce, and in consequence a big crowd was present. The Leonardo Hunnicke faction, receiving the largest number of legal votes, was represented by Attorney Burkhardt, while the other side was looked after by Attorney Ortiz. Judge Crumpacker refused to issue a mandamus compelling the election board to count the contested ballots, meaning that the number of acres of lands not used for irrigation and possessing no interest whatever in the election, which had been voted by the Duran faction, could not legally be counted. The Hunnicke candidates will now receive their certificates of election.
