Washington, Dec. 6.—The ways and means committee of the house met this morning to consider a bill reducing the war revenue taxes about \$40,000,000. When the beer section was reached, fixing a rebate of 20 per cent instead of 15 per cent, which makes the rate \$1.00 per barrel, Representative Richardson, ranking member of the minority, moved a further reduction of all increases made by the revenue act. The effect of this motion if carried would have been to make the rate \$1 a barrel. The motion was defeated by a party vote.

INDIANS GRABED BY A WOMAN.
While Prophetess Demoralized Entry
Papago Tribe.

A special dispatch to the San Francisco Chronicle from Phoenix, Arizona, under date of Dec. 3, says: "Jim Trainor," the only notable Indian of the Papago reservation, located a short distance from Tucson, arrived in that town yesterday morning, and urged the authorities to rescue his nation from religious fanaticism, brought about by a strange woman, who he declares is inspired by the devil and is a false prophet.

The only thing known of the identity of the woman is that she is from the Salt River valley, near Phoenix. She recently appeared among the Indians and preached a new doctrine, which produced a craze that has reached the form of insanity. She commenced by telling the Indians that they must believe by the apparent teachings of the dream, and that they must acquire glimpses into the future. She declared the world would soon cease to exist or would be reduced to an unlimited space, when the Indians would take up their bows and arrows in happy hunting grounds many miles from the devil and the Apaches, the deadly enemies of the Papagos.

The strange woman's teachings have had a powerful effect on the Indians. Some of them are morose on account of unpleasant dreams and contemplation of the future, and others are patiently awaiting the happiness indicated in their visions.

J. Herndon of the Tucson Mission School went to the reservation on Sunday afternoon and placed the confidence in her. She is hailed as a deliverer and several bucks have announced that they will raise the war cry and fight to defend her from the papagos. The authorities are looking into the situation and will use every effort to correct the bad effects of her teachings.

EUROPEAN PLUMS.
Interesting Bulletin About the Growing of These Fruits.

"The time of blooming is the key-note to the selection of varieties for this climate." No matter how good and profitable a variety may be of little or no value here. Such is the case with many well-known European plums, of which we have already spoken in a previous bulletin. However, the European plums are better adapted to high altitudes and dry climate. They are generally late bloomers, thus insuring good crops. Different varieties of this type are being grown with satisfactory results throughout the territory. The varieties of the European type are very numerous and cover a long period in ripening. There is also such a wide range in sizes and colors that a selection of varieties can be made for nearly any purpose for which plums are used.

Twenty varieties of the European plums have been tested in the experimental station orchard at Mesilla Park, and during the last six years a record of the blooming and ripening periods of these plums has been kept; also descriptions of each variety have been made. All are good, and with two exceptions, late bloomers, blooming after danger of frost is over. General recommendation of varieties of any fruit. The value of a variety lies not only in its intrinsic merits, but in its adaptations to the personal likes of the growers, the markets and other external conditions. However, the following are a few of the varieties which now seem to be valuable for general use. The size, color and date of ripening at Mesilla Park is given with each variety. Clytemnestra, large, purple, ripens July 1st. Royale Hative, medium, purple, ripens July 12th. Jefferson, large, golden yellow, ripens August 12th. Yellow Egg, large, yellow, ripens August 25th. Pond's Seedling, large, purple, ripens August 26th.

The prunes do admirably. The French, German and Silver are perhaps the best, the Silver prune being the largest. The French the smallest and most prolific.
