And we want to do it!

McKinley has 306 electoral votes, a majority of 129.

Aguinaldo has girded up his loins and started again on the hike.

That flag won't be hauled down in the Philippines—not just now.

Arizona made a big political mistake defeating N. O. Murphy for delegate to congress.

The awful dread of imperialism will now go out of our minds like a puff of steam on a clear day.

Uncle Sam having brushed away these disturbing elements will now proceed to get down to business.

Everybody is invited to attend the big republican ratification meeting at the opera house to-morrow evening.

The American nation will now prepare for the brightest four years of progress and prosperity that it has ever seen.

Every nationality helped to make republican success in New Mexico, and the race question is happily buried in this territory.

The Elks parade and circus has put everybody in a good humor, and the animosities of the recent political campaign are nearly all wiped out.

The Optic was correct when it asserted that the people of this territory would never again see the like of L. A. Sandoz. No other man will probably drop with such a dull thud.

This territory is certainly capable of self-government. No disturbance of any kind occurred at any election precinct in the territory, and the people rolled up over 5,000 republican majority. Give us statehood.

The Lincoln monument at Springfield on which repairs have been made to the amount of \$100,000, will be completed by the 20th of this month. Lincoln's fame grows steadily with the years and at last Illinois is to have a monument worthy of her greatest statesman.

One of the most pleasing incidents of the election is the announcement that Dennis T. Flynn is re-elected as delegate to congress from Oklahoma. This establishes the fact beyond further doubt that Oklahoma is a republican territory and will in due time be a republican state.

From present indications an irrepressible race conflict is on in South Africa. This is a result predicted by many when the war began and makes a greater middle than ever of the situation in the entire southern part of Africa. If England holds her new colonies apparently she will have to do it by sheer force, with armaments stationed all over the country from the Cape of Good Hope to the Zambesi.

## SHEEP SHOW GRATITUDE.

The shepherds of New Mexico and Arizona have written Commissioner Hermann of the general land office at Washington to thank him for a continuance of the grazing privilege in the forest reserves of those territories. The secretary of the interior had prepared an order which provided that all sheep on the reserves of those territories should be at once excluded and their grazing strictly prohibited. Just before this order was to have gone into effect, Commissioner Hermann made a strenuous appeal to the secretary in behalf of the shepherds, and the order was modified so as to provide that temporarily no more permits for sheep grazing in these reserves shall be issued pending an investigation to determine whether or not the sheep injure the forests, but permits already issued shall remain in full force.

Meanwhile the superintendent of forest reserves for Arizona and New Mexico has been called upon for a report and largely upon his recommendation will depend whether or not further grazing will be permitted, or be discontinued altogether.

## CALIFORNIA TRAVEL.

Several of the western roads are preparing to make strong efforts to promote heavy passenger travel between Chicago and California points during the coming winter. The Rock Island has started with a semi-weekly tourist service between Chicago and Los Angeles and San Francisco, and the Burlington, Santa Fe and Northwestern will also materially increase their service between Chicago and the land of flowers.

"We expect heavy travel to California during the next three or four months," said a general passenger agent of one of the transcontinental lines. "The winter tourist business, it appears, is turning more to California every year. There are several factors in the change of travel from south to west, or rather for the increase of travel for the Florida houses also promise to be good. It appears that more people in the middle west are taking winter sojourns than formerly. One cause of the constantly increasing California travel is the improved transportation accommodations. A few years ago the service between Chicago and California, while good, was not to be compared to what it is today. Schedules are faster and better cars operated by all lines."

## WORTHLESS PAPER.

An express package supposed to contain \$25,000, which was shipped from Chicago to Burlington, Ia., some weeks ago, when opened by the consignee at the latter point was found to contain scraps of wall paper and parts of a broken catalogue and pages from the book "Black Beauty" instead of currency. Much mystery surrounded the theft. The package when received by the express company was already sealed, as are all packages. There was no delay on route, and the shipment reached destination in due time. When the package was addressed, sealed, etc., was returned to Chicago, the bank officials claimed it was not the original one, and that a dummy package had been substituted. The address was pronounced a forgery and the package was returned to the sender.

No arrests had been made at last account.

CONGRATULATED NEW MEXICO. Gov. Otero Received Dispatches From Senators and Other Prominent People.

Gov. Otero Wednesday night and yesterday received fourteen dispatches from prominent officials in Washington, D. C., and elsewhere, congratulating him and the people of New Mexico on the election of a republican to congress and the election of a republican legislative assembly. Among the senders were several senators and members of the house who are favorable to statehood, and expressed themselves of the opinion that now with proper and united action by the people of New Mexico the territory will be admitted to statehood within the next two years.
