New Mexico will be a republican state.

Who was running against Alex. Bowie?

The whole geography has gone republican.

Colorado will hereafter be a republican state.

Gov. Otero will succeed himself by a large majority.

McKinley carried everything from Maine to California.

The legislature will be republican by a two-thirds majority.

Delegate Rodey will be a credit to this territory at the national capital.

Santa Fe will join the prosperity column by building an electric railway.

There is little left of my lord Field except a plug hat and that turkey strut.

Four years more of republican rule will put New Mexico in prosperous circumstances.

Every political prediction made by The Citizen during the campaign was absolutely carried.

Boss Pera found that he could not control all the republican votes in Bernalillo yesterday.

After the 4th of next March Don Pedro Pera will retire to his sheep ranch. His political career is ended.

The republican committee will hire Field and Ferguson to denounce the republican ticket in the next campaign.

The democrats made a big mistake when they fused with Pedro Pera.

This city cast nearly fifteen hundred votes yesterday.

In the future the kids of Albuquerque instead of saying "Go chase yourself," and such classic slang, will say, "Go write a circular letter."

There is no race issue in New Mexico. The native people pay no attention to demagogues of the Ferguson stripe, who try to get votes on that issue.

The editor of this paper is under lasting obligations to the Typographical union, and other labor unions of this city for their splendid work yesterday in his behalf.

McKinley county covered itself with credit yesterday, giving the republican ticket a good majority. McKinley county can get more territory, that hospital, or any other old thing, from the republican party of New Mexico.

The colored republican club of this city did splendid work for the republican ticket, and the party is under deep obligations to President Griffin and his able workers. Only one colored man in this city voted the fusion ticket. The Citizen tips its hat to its colored friends.

Imports of woolen manufactures into the United States are less than one-third in value what they were in 1895, while during the decade 1890-1900 exports of woolen manufactures have more than trebled. During the eight months ending August 31, 1900, the imports of woolen manufactures amounted to \$12,084,928, against \$40,667,444 in eight months of 1895, and \$20,544,094 in the corresponding eight months of 1896.

The fine growth of the southern states during the last ten years is one of the things brought out by the census announcement. From the fact that so few large cities are in the south it was natural to suppose that the rate of increase there would not come up to that in the north. The cities above 25,000 inhabitants have advanced 32.5 per cent during the last decade, while the country, as a whole, has gained only 21 per cent. Only twenty-nine of the 129 cities with a population of more than 25,000 are located in the southern states. The growth of these states must, accordingly, be largely rural or in the smaller towns.

While Uncle Sam is doing everything in his power to collect from Turkey his bill for damages done to the property of American missionaries, no move has yet been made to send a fleet of warships to Constantinople for the purpose of collecting these claims at the muzzle of the guns of the navy. Furthermore, it is not believed that such vigorous measures will be necessary, but that the sultan can be prevailed upon by pacific means to pay. That dignity will not be permitted to forget that these claims are due and payable. He will be dunned on the first and fifteenth of each month until he gets tired out and pays up.

If Germany is really trying to secure a coaling station off the coast of Venezuela, as she is stated to be, she will find herself firmly opposed by the United States and the Monroe doctrine. It is well known that Germany is anxious to acquire sites for coaling commenced in the western hemisphere. At the time this government commenced negotiations for the acquisition of the Danish West Indies, Germany was anxious to obtain control of them, and it was only the determined attitude of the president that forced her to relinquish her designs. Many naval officers

believe that Germany intends to go to war with the United States sooner or later and that she is preparing for it.

THE MAN BEHIND THE GUN.

In our rejoicing over the results of the big political gun which the republicans of New Mexico discharged yesterday, we must not fail to give proper credit to the man behind the gun.

Frank A. Hubbell, who has been better abused by the democrats than any other republican in the territory, has shown himself to be the best committee chairman the republicans of New Mexico ever had.

He has been at the head of both the territorial and the county committees throughout the campaign, and the successful character of his work needs nothing to prove it but the magnificent majorities which have been rolled up for the ticket, both in the territory and in the county.

The burden of the campaign has rested upon his shoulders from the start. He has managed and directed the whole contest, both local and general, and the result shows that he has proved himself to be an organizer of victory, who is fully worthy to rank with any of the famous political managers of the eastern states. Though the shrewdest workers of the democratic party put forth their best efforts against him, in every part of the territory, he has out-generalized the whole of them, and has brought about a victory which, for its completeness and magnitude far exceeds in many respects the result of any other contest in New Mexico.

Let the credit be put where it belongs, and when the republicans meet to rejoice and exchange congratulations over the magnificent manner in which the hosts of the enemy have been routed, let them not forget in enumerating the names of those who are entitled to the credit of the victory that the first name on the roll should be that of Hon. Frank A. Hubbell, chairman of the republican territorial committee, and of the republican committee of Bernalillo county.

Bernalillo county stands at the head of the republican column. Of the counties of the territory she stands first in alphabetical order.

First in wealth and population.

First in education, and therefore first in the size of her republican vote.

Valencia county has always been the banner republican county of the territory, but the result of yesterday's contest shows that she has lost that proud position, and Hon. Sol Luna is now making a forced march from Los Lunas to Albuquerque, bringing the old republican banner, for the purpose of surrendering it to the republicans of Bernalillo county.

Felix Lester, who made the race on the fusion ticket for member of the council from this county, conducted a gentlemanly campaign and is a gentleman whom The Citizen respects.

It is hoped that a merciful Providence kindly wipes off the record the many falsehoods told in a political campaign.

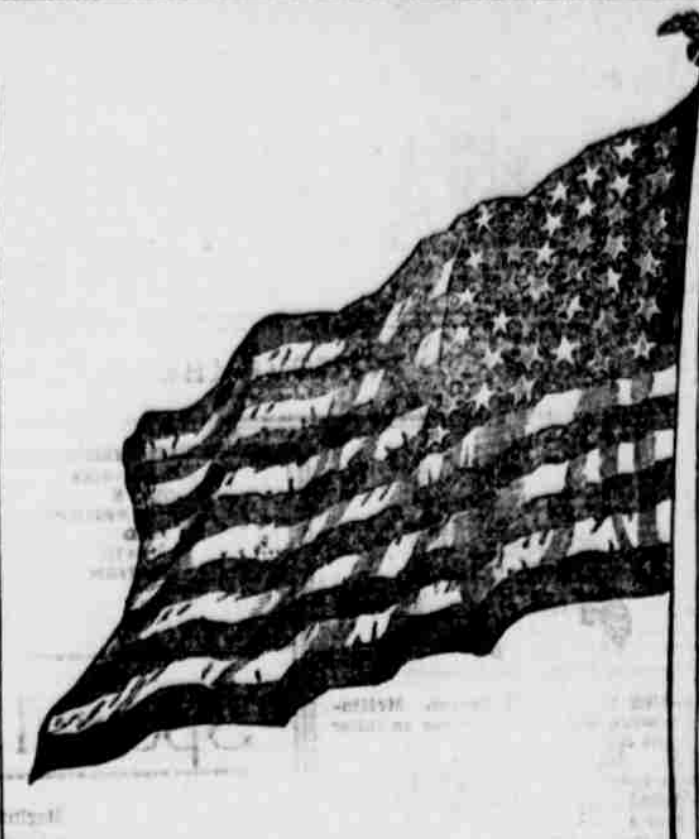
