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FULL DINNER PAIRS

Immense Prosperity Parade in Chicago.

Roosevelt Making Short Addresses in New York.

Bryan Has Left New Jersey and Is Now in Connecticut.

STEEL WORKS WILL CLOSE.

Chicago, Oct. 27.—Business was generally suspended in Chicago to-day on account of the "Prosperity" parade. Every industry was represented in floats that interspersed the procession, and each marcher wore a badge containing the words "McKinley was Right." All along the route business houses and office buildings were profusely decorated with the national colors together with representations of the "Full Dinner Pail." At the head of the parade walked two elephants, bearing banners inscribed "G. O. P.—The Real Thing." Behind these followed a donkey bedecked with bolls and clover, a cap. In the parade were regiments of men of uniform carrying "Full Dinner Pails," and banners.

The numerical strength of the parade was variously estimated. It was apparently greater than the "Sound Money" parade in 1898, which was regarded then as a record breaker.

ROOSEVELT IN NEW YORK.

New York, Oct. 27.—Governor Roosevelt early to-day crossed to Jersey City to board his special train to travel toward Birmingham, where he is scheduled to arrive at 4:40 p. m. Short speeches will be delivered at Suffern, Hillburg, Middletown, Port Jervis, Shohola, Lackawanna, Cohocton, Callcott, Long, Elddy, Deposit, Susquehanna, and Great Bend.

Middletown, N. Y., Oct. 27.—Governor Roosevelt spoke here to an audience which completely filled the opera house. He repeated in brief the questions asked by Bryan whether, if elected, he will pay outstanding obligations in gold or silver; that is, whether it is the secretary of the treasury or the creditors who have the right to choose the coin which is to be paid.

STEVENSON IN CHICAGO.

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 27.—A. E. Stevenson arrived in Chicago this morning to make five speeches during the day and night. He will spend next week touring Indiana.

BRYAN AT NEW HAVEN.

New York, Oct. 27.—Bryan left this morning for New Haven, where he will speak at noon. Mrs. Bryan remained at Dr. Olden's home, but will join Mr. Bryan on his return to New York this afternoon.

New Haven, Oct. 27.—Bryan arrived at 11 o'clock and was escorted directly to the second regiment armory, a large hall in which the meeting was held. Many students had gathered. He was greeted as he entered with general cheers. There were cries, "What's the matter with Bryan?" and the response "he's all right." When Bryan began to speak there was general silence in the auditorium, and while there were afterwards slight interruptions, it seemed evident from the beginning that there was no intention to make unfriendly demonstrations such as rendered Bryan's visit to New Haven remarkable four years ago, when Yale students literally broke up a vast open air meeting on the green.

Before dismissing the "trusts" Bryan said: "Last night at a banquet in New York to the republican candidate for vice president, Senator Scott, of West Virginia, made a statement I am going to read to you. He said: 'Right here I want to say I believe in trusts, they are a good thing; and then recognizing he had said a dangerous thing for a republican to say in the campaign, he turned and said: 'If that newspaper man puts that down, I will make trouble for him.' " Bryan then reiterated his former promises to suppress the "trusts" in the event of his election. Bryan was on the point of closing his speech when someone asked inquiry about free silver. Bryan replied: "If

the gentleman can read, he can read the platform that states the party's position that even a republican can understand, and if he has not the time to read the platform and knows anything of me he knows where I stand, whether there is a platform or not."

MONTANA POLITICS.

Helena, Mont., Oct. 27.—The central committee of the union labor party filed with the secretary of state the resigning of the candidates for the state ticket together with nominations on the fusion democratic and populist tickets to fill the vacancy. The union labor party now has ex-Governor James K. Toole, fusion candidate for governor at the head of its ticket. The fusion ticket is the W. A. Clark ticket against which are now opposed the independent daily democrats and the republicans.

MALONEY WINS.

Denver, Colo., Oct. 27.—The supreme court to-day decided the Arapahoe county democratic contest, declaring Maloney to be chairman of the county committee, and ordering his ticket and no other placed on the ballot as democratic.

Will Cease Indefinitely.

Joliet, Ill., Oct. 27.—It is announced practically that the Illinois company's steel works here will close to-night for an indefinite period. Over 2,000 men will be affected. Officials of the company refuse to discuss the situation.

MAN WOUNDED.

Accidental Discharge of a Gun While Out Hunting.

The Needles Eye, under date of October 26, gives a column article to an accident which occurred near that place on Thursday. W. M. Keese, who having been in the employ of Joseph Routledge at his saw mill in Bland last spring, will be remembered by a number of our citizens of that town, and his son Charles, were the victims. They were out hunting and while riding along in a wagon one of the shotguns was accidentally discharged, the contents of the load penetrating the left arm at the elbow of the elder Keese and the right arm of his son. The young man, who was not so badly injured, hastened for medical aid for his father and upon examination of the wound it was found necessary to amputate the arm. The old gentleman is 64 years of age, and owing to his present condition and advanced years the chances for his recovery are not very strong. Mr. Keese is a member of the Cochiti Tribe of Red Men, he having joined the order at Bland early in the present year.

British and Boers Are Still at War.

Arrest of a Thief Revealed a Conspiracy to Assassinate.

WEEKLY BANK STATEMENT.

New York, Oct. 27.—Magistrate Brann announced his decision to-day in the case of Albert T. Patrick and Charles F. Jones, counsel and private secretary respectively for the late Wm. M. Rice, holding them for the action of the grand jury. Bail was fixed at \$10,000 each. The prisoners are charged with having forged the signature of Rice, who died in his apartment at Madison street, under strange circumstances, to a check for \$25,000, drawn on the banking firm of Swenson & Sons. The check was made payable to Patrick, was presented at the bank for certification, and owing to error in the spelling of Patrick's name, was held by the bank employees. Inquiry at the home of Mr. Rice by telephone disclosed the fact that Mr. Rice had died the day before the check was presented.

RICE WAS POISONED.

New York, Oct. 27.—Professor Witthaus in a chemical analysis of the stomach of William Marsh Rice reports that he found mercury and arsenic.

PARTICULARS OF THE BATTLE.

British and Boers Fight a Bloody Engagement.

London, Oct. 27.—A dispatch received at the war office from Lord Roberts dated Pretoria, October 26, referring to the fighting General Buller's column had with General Dewet's forces on October 25, says: "British losses were heavier than first reported. An additional officer and twelve men were killed and twenty-five men wounded. The Boers left twenty-four dead, nineteen wounded on the field and twenty-six Boers made prisoners. Three Boers, who held up hands in token of surrender, and then fired on the British, were court-martialed, convicted and sentenced to death. I confirmed sentence."

The dispatch also refers to minor affairs in which the troops of General Kitchener and General Methuen were engaged, and the serious incident being Orange River colony, where fifty cavalrymen were ambushed and captured by the Boers, only seven escaping.

DEWEET ATTACKED.

London, Oct. 27.—Another dispatch from Lord Roberts says: "Baron de tacked the obnoxious Dewet near Pretoria. The Boers were scattered in all directions."

A THIEVING ANARCHIST ARRESTED.

Documents Found on Him Showing Plot to Kill President Loubet.

Lyons, Oct. 27.—The Nouvellette de Lyons says that a working electrician named Couturier entered the electric company's premises at Simex, stealing 2,000 francs. He was arrested. Documents found on him revealed, the paper says, an anarchist conspiracy to assassinate President Loubet on his coming visit to Lyons to unveil a monument erected to the memory of President Carnot. Couturier is said to have committed burglary in order to obtain funds to carry out his project. He has, it is added, confessed to the police, who are now tracking his accomplices.

WIRTOUT FOUNDATION.

Officials of prefecture of police say they have investigated the Couturier story published by Nouvellette de Lyons, and find it without foundation.

RESUMING WORK!

Miners Preparing For Work on Monday.

Pennsylvania Company Will Give the Increase.

American Horse Defeated by English Horse in Match Race.

BRITISH SOLDIERS GOING HOME.

Hazleton, Penn., Oct. 27.—Preparations are being made for the resumption of work on Monday at all the collieries in the Hazleton district. No notices have yet been posted by G. B. Torble & Co., and Cox & Co., offering men the ten percent granted by the other companies, neither has the Lehigh and Wilkes-Barre Coal company agreed to abolish the shilling scale. Strikers have been requested not to return to work in the collieries operated by these three companies, but it is their intention to start up without granting concessions demanded by the Scranton convention.

GRANTED THE INCREASE.

Shamokin, Pa., Oct. 27.—Secretary George Hartline, of the Ninth district, received word from the strike leaders of the Lehigh and Wilkes-Barre districts that the Pennsylvania company had granted ten per cent increase and agreed to arbitrate the differences in addition to reducing powder from 1350 to 1550 per keg.

MINERS GET INCREASE.

Scranton, Penn., Oct. 27.—The Pennsylvania Coal company this afternoon posted notice granting 10 per cent increase to its 8,500 mine employees.

Soldiers at Home.
