WERE ASTONISHED

At Degradation of Prominent Chinese.

France Formulates Official Note on Situation.

Other Powers Asked to accept the Terms.

ROOSEVELT TOURING IOWA.

Shanghai, Oct. 4.—The astonishment of the Chinese was great when, to-day, they received official notification from the viceroy that foreign pressure had necessitated the degradation of prominent members of the court.

The German cable from Che Foo to Tien Tsin has been opened. It is reported the allies will demand an indemnity which will aggregate \$200,000,000.

HELD A CONFERENCE.

Tien Tsin, Oct. 4.—Li Hung Chang and M. DeWiers, the Russian minister, had a lengthy conference to-day after which it was announced that Li Hung Chang would depart for Peking to-morrow, accompanied by the Russian admiral, a Russian guard and his own body guard.

HUNTING FOR THE BOXERS.

Peking, Oct. 4.—A small body of imperial troops appeared at Peking to-day. They informed the British garrison that their purpose was to disperse the Boxers and they were not molested by the British.

It is announced that the Germans will winter 8,000 men in Peking. The British are reducing their force in preparation for winter.

FRANCE'S PROPOSALS.

Paris, Oct. 4.—The following official note was issued this afternoon: "The foreign minister has instructed the representatives of France to sound the powers whose troops are co-operating with ours in the extreme east regarding the adoption of a common program for negotiations with China. Our representatives acquiesced themselves of this mission and left with the various foreign ministers a copy of the following note: 'In sending their forces to China, the powers proposed, first of all, to deliver their legations. Thanks to their union and the valor of their troops, this union has been attained. It is now a question of securing from the Chinese government, which has given Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang full powers to negotiate and treat in its name, suitable guarantees for the past and serious guarantees for the future. Penetrated with the spirit which inspired previous declarations of different governments, the government of this republic believes it sums up their real sentiments in the following points which it submits as a basis for negotiations to be entered upon immediately after the usual verification by the powers: 'First—Punishment of the principal culprits, who will be designated by representatives of the powers in Peking. Second—Maintenance and prohibition of import of arms. Indemnities to states, societies and individuals. Third—Quarantine of the prohibition guard for Peking legations. Fifth—Disarmament of fortifications. Sixth—Military occupation of two or three points on the road from Tien Tsin to Peking, which would thus be always open to legations wishing to go to sea, or forces proceeding to Peking from the sea. Presented collectively by representatives of the powers, supported by the presence of the international troops, it appears impossible to the government of this republic that these conditions, which are so legitimate, would not be accepted by the Chinese government at an early date.'

ROOSEVELT IN IOWA.

Waterloo, Iowa, Oct. 5.—A great demonstration was held here to-day in honor of Governor Roosevelt, who arrived on a special train from his trip through Nebraska.

A two hour stop was made which gave the governor time before speaking to drive through the city and make a luncheon with General David H. Henderson, speaker of the national house of representatives. Governor Shaw joined the party at Fort Dodge. Speaking occurred this afternoon at the city park. A large crowd was present.

Conservatives in the Lead.

London, Oct. 5.—Election returns now show a total of 42 as follows: Conservatives, 25; unionists, 42; liberals and laborites, 78; nationalists, 52. Timothy M. Healy retains his seat for North Louth, after a bitter fight.

AWORN DENIAL.

Lulu D. Hay Denies Story About Bryan Receiving Money.

Chicago, Oct. 5.—Lulu D. Hay, of Jacksonville, Ill., wife of Senator Hay, chairman of the democratic national committee, a sworn denial of the alleged Kingman story that she knew William J. Bryan to have been paid \$10,000 by silver mine owners to cause the silver plank to be incorporated in the Kansas City platform.

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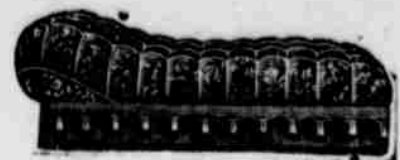
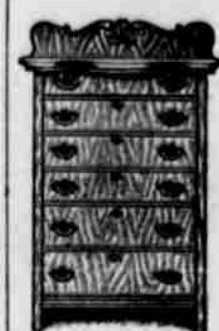
