THE GRAND ARMY!

Big Parade by Union Veterans.

Knights of Pythias Meet at Detroit.

Li Hung Chang Held as Hostage by the Powers.

GENERAL MILES AT CHICAGO.

Chicago, Aug. 28.—The grand parade of veterans of the civil war occurred this morning. Streets and buildings were resplendent with decorations and the line of march was crowded with thousands upon thousands of cheering people. Notwithstanding the members of the Grand Army of the Republic and the more of the members of the organization announced their intention in joining the line than was expected by the most sanguine veterans. Old soldiers from every state in the union were in march and throughout the length of the parade 7,000 posts of the Grand Army had representation. The parade which started at the intersection of Randolph street and Michigan avenue, was about five hours in passing a given point. The line of march was short, from the start to the south end of the court of honor, where it was disbanded, after passing in review before Commander-in-Chief Shaw, it comprised twenty-seven city squares. Even though the majority of the marchers were men advanced in years, the parade moved swiftly and without break or disorder. The columns came twelve abreast, well closed, solid and complete, the compact formations almost invariably well kept. The marching columns were headed by a detachment of city police. Behind came a band of seventy pieces and then Chief Marshal J. H. Wood with his immediate staff, a regiment of assistant marshals and aides, and then behind the great band of the Second Infantry of Illinois, and the infantry guard of Commander-in-Chief Shaw and staff.

Ahead of the carriers containing Acting Governor Warden, in place of Governor Tanner, Mayor Harrison and Executive Director Harper, who with Commander-in-Chief Shaw occupied the reviewing stand during the parade, marched Lafayette Post No. 11, New York, commanded by Allan C. Blackwell.

Cheer after cheer went up as Gen. Daniel E. Sickles, accompanied by his aides rode past the reviewing stand. Along the line of march the general was given the most flattering greeting. Fifty members of Columbia post of Chicago formed a hollow square center, which bore fifty battle flags carried by New York regiments during the war. The spectacle of the worn and tattered flags were greeted at times with cheers and at times with deep silence more expressive than applause. All hats were off as the flags went by. A long line of carriages followed the battle flags, each containing ladies, officials of the various organizations affiliated with the Grand Army. Close behind the carriages came three platoons of members of Columbia post, acting as rear guard, while a score of veterans, a special escort, marched beside the vehicles.

Bliss Wilkerson post of Buffalo, had the largest number of men in the ranks of any organization outside of Chicago.

NEWS FROM PEKIN!

Delay in the Receipt of Dispatches.

Rioting in Progress at Amoy, China.

Emperor of China and Officials Arrive at Tai Yuan Fu.

ARREST OF ANARCHIST SUSPECT.

Washington, Aug. 28.—Adjutant General Corbin has received a dispatch from Gen. Chaffee saying that he (Chaffee) had received no dispatches from Gen. Corbin since August 14. This was the date on which the allied army attacked and entered Pekin. Many dispatches have been sent by General Corbin since that date and the delay of their delivery is astonishing, even with the strange conditions which have existed in China. Like the Gouger dispatches, one from Gen. Chaffee is undated. The only explanation that can be made of this lack of dates is that the dispatches have been butchered en route, probably on their way through China.

Rioting at Amoy.
Washington, Aug. 28.—A cablegram has been received at the state department from United States Consul Johnson at Amoy, China, relative to the rioting in progress in that city. Reports are that many of the richer Chinese and Europeans are leaving the place. A cablegram received at the navy department announces that the Chinese sailed to-day from Shanghai for Amoy, in accordance with department's orders, and should arrive on Thursday of this week.

The Cowardly Emperor.
London, Aug. 28.—A special from Shanghai says that Chinese officials have informed the foreign consuls that the emperor, dowager empress and Prince Tuan have arrived in the neighborhood of Tai Yuan Fu.

Tai Yuan Fu is the capital of the province of Shan Si, adjoining the province of Chi Li, and 240 miles southwest of Pekin.

Arrest of Anarchist.
Paris, Aug. 28.—A dispatch to Petit Bleu from Rome says that an anarchist has been arrested at Carrara, on suspicion of having conspired to assassinate King Victor Emmanuel III.

Kentucky Legislature.
Frankfort, Ky., Aug. 28.—The extra session of the legislature called by Gov. Beckham convened at noon. The governor's message was brief and in general terms recommended the passage of an election law which will be satisfactory to the people of the state. A large portion of whom, he conceded, were displeased with the present law.

London, Aug. 28.—A special from Pretoria, dated August 27, says: "It is stated that fighting with Botha's commandos was resumed this morning. The Boer lines were broken and the enemy is falling back. British casualties are reported considerable."

Lorenzo Marques, Aug. 28.—Heavy fighting is reported to have occurred at Machedorp. The Boers are said to have been defeated with loss, leaving their guns and ammunition in the hands of the British.
