BATTLE IN CHINA!

Gen. Chaffee's Report of the Fight.

All the American Troops in the Battle.

Chinese Driven from their Trenches with Heavy Loss.

RUSSIANS DEFEAT THE CHINESE.

Washington, Aug. 7.—The war department has received the following cablegram from General Chaffee: "Tien Tsin, Aug. 7, via Chefoo, Aug. 7. The conference today decided to fight on Sunday. The Chinese are entrenched east and west through Pei Tsang. The rest of the Chinese are reported to be in the rear of the main line. The other forces, Russian and French, about 4,000 strong, are on the opposite side, between the river and railroad. The Chinese position is apparently strong. An army of 20,000 is reported to be in the rear of the main line. The Chinese are in the process of crossing the river to Pei Ho. Yang Tsun is the objective. Our forces are 20,000 and battery. Come, enough has arrived. Sixth cavalry left at Tien Tsin for guard of city and awaiting orders. Ministers safe on 28th of July. CHAFFEE."

Gen. Chaffee's Dispatch. Washington, Aug. 7.—The dispatch from General Chaffee, written before the battle on Sunday, confirms the dispatches received at the navy department yesterday, also the Associated Press dispatches received today concerning the attack on the Chinese at Pei Tsang. General Chaffee's dispatch was dated Friday, but it was not sent from Chefoo until today. The most interesting feature of the dispatch is the information regarding the positions of the Chinese army and the fact that the advance upon Peking is made by the columns, one on each side of the Pei Ho river.

Americans in the Battle. Tien Tsin, Sunday, Aug. 5, via Shanghai, Aug. 7.—(Copyrighted, 1900, by Associated Press.)—This morning at daylight 15,000 allies attacked the Chinese at Pei Tsang and forced the enemy from their trenches. The Americans who participated were the Ninth and Fourteenth regiments, Kelly's battery and the marines. A heavy battle is still in progress.

Will Stop Work. Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 7.—At a meeting today it was decided that all the Bessemer iron blast furnaces in the country, with the exception of the Brown-Hill and Andrews-Hitchcock furnaces will go out of blast Sept. 1. The drop in the price of the product is the cause of the action. About 4,000 men will be affected.

Rubber Monopoly. New York, Aug. 7.—The directors of the Standard Oil company of New Jersey declared a dividend of \$4 a share, payable Sept. 15. In June 10 per cent was distributed and in March 20 per cent.

No Answer. London, Aug. 7.—Answering a question in the house of commons, Mr. Broderick said that her majesty's government had no confirmation of the statement attributed to Li Hung Chang to the effect that the foreigners had left Peking for Tien Tsin under escort.

Destructive Fire. Helena, Mont., Aug. 7.—Fire in Yellowstone Park is being fought by every soldier in the park and all the men engaged in road construction work. Deputy United States Marshal Jackson, who returned from there, and who reported the fire, said that when he left it was reported that the fire extended a distance of ten miles and was still spreading. Men, who have been in the

park for years, said it was the worst they had ever seen. Deer and elk were driven out of the fire area by the flames. Buildings in the upper geyser basin are in danger. In the dense timber region everything is unusually dry and the winds are carrying the flames with great rapidity. In Marshal Jackson's opinion it will be impossible for the force engaged to make any headway against the fire.

Held Personally Responsible. London, Aug. 7.—Parliamentary secretary of the foreign office, Broderick, in the house of commons today, answering a question, said that her majesty's government had informed the Chinese government that its members will be held personally responsible if the members of the foreign legations or other foreigners suffer injuries. Broderick added that her majesty's government did not think any useful purpose would be served by further communications.

To be Annexed. London, Aug. 7.—Secretary of state for colonies, Chamberlain, in reply to a question in the house of commons today, said he had already made himself acquainted with the views of Canada and Australia in regard to the main points in the South African settlement. He admitted that they were in accord with his majesty as to the necessity for the annexation of the Orange Free State and the Transvaal to the empire and supported by a military force, with ultimate extension to representative self government.

Gold Going to London. New York, Aug. 7.—Baring, Magoun & Co. have arranged to ship \$2,000,000 in gold to London to-morrow.

RUSSIANS DEFEAT THE CHINESE.

Chinese Lose 3,000 Killed at Tien Chow Fight. London, Aug. 7.—A dispatch to the Associated Press from Tien Tsin, dated Aug. 5, is the only press message which got through from Tien Tsin since the battle of Pei Tsang. Various Tien Tsin dispatches of earlier dates allude to reconnoitering encounters with the Chinese preparatory to the general attack on the Chinese positions, which are five miles long. The reconnaissance developed that the Chinese are in greater strength than was expected. The Russians, who have been fighting around Tien Chow, are reported, according to a dispatch from Shanghai, dated Aug. 6, to have killed 3,000 Chinese.

The tale of New Chwang refused the Russian demand to give up the fort there.

It is confirmed that the Fourth brigade of Indian troops has been ordered to China.

Railroad Accident.

Lafayette, Ind., Aug. 7.—Three people were killed and eleven injured in a collision on the Monon railroad this morning at South Elletts. Ten miles south of here. The passenger train collided with a freight engine and engine standing on the side track, waiting for the passenger train to pass. The passenger train, running twenty-five miles an hour, struck the engine, which was backing. The passenger train was forced to turn the switch after the freight passed into the side track. He is missing, but whether his body is under the debris, or whether he died is unknown. The dead are: Lewis Raub, engineer; Thomas Craft, fireman; Joseph Ludlow, fireman. Henry W. Whitsett, of Lafayette, engineer, is scalded fatally.

British Loan.

London, Aug. 7.—In the house of commons today, Benjamin Holt Cohen, conservative member, asked the chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, the reason for the early closing of the subscription for the exchequer bonds. The chancellor said the lists closed as soon as the bonds had been subscribed for. Half the issue was placed in America with the hope of drawing the gold to the Bank of England.

President Kruger Reported Willing to Surrender.

Troops Leave Fort Riley for China on Hasty Order.

BRYAN IN CHICAGO.

London, Aug. 7.—Lord Roberts reports to the war office under date of Pretoria, Aug. 6, as follows: "Harlemouth surrendered Aug. 4. The neighboring country seems quiet. Kitchener is with the forces south of the Vaal river. He was joined yesterday by a strong detachment of Brabant's horse and the Canadian regiment. "The Boers attacked the garrison at Elands river on the morning of August 4. Information was sent to Harrington, who was on his way to Elands river. Ian Hamilton, who reached Harrington yesterday, reported hearing heavy firing in the direction of Elands river. To-day the firing seems more distant, which looks as if the Elands river garrison had been relieved and was retiring toward Zeebrau."

Bryan in Chicago.

Chicago, Aug. 7.—William J. Bryan arrived in Chicago today, accompanied by Mrs. Bryan, his son, Governor and Mrs. Thomas, of Colorado, and Colonel John I. Martin, sergeant-at-arms of the Kansas city convention. The party was met at the union depot by the local committee, several clubs and a large number of citizens, who gave them enthusiastic greetings. The party was driven to the Sherman house, where Bryan and Stevenson held a reception. They shook hands with a great number of people.

A special train carrying the entire party departed over the Big Four at 1:30 p. m. Every inch of available space was occupied, and many disappointed democrats were left behind because they could not even find standing room.

Troops for China.

Fort Riley, Kan., Aug. 7.—Battery D, with seven-inch siege guns, the largest in the army, and 175 men started for San Francisco during the night on hurry orders from Washington to proceed to China. Two trains were necessary to carry the entire battery.

Kruger Willing to Surrender.

Pretoria, Monday, Aug. 6.—It is stated positively that President Kruger is anxious to surrender, provided satisfactory promise is given as to his ultimate destination.

Pardoned Prisoner.

Phoenix, Ariz., Aug. 7.—Acting Governor Akers granted a pardon to Charles Graf, who was serving an eight-year sentence at Yuma from Gila county, for killing his partner, Preston Ellis, at Globe, a year ago.

RICH GOLD DISCOVERY.

San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 7.—To-day a story of Russian brutality in China is told by Mrs. Edward Drew, wife of the British commissioner of customs at Tien Tsin, who arrived on the transport Logan. She says: "The Russian troops pillaged, looted, tortured and murdered right and left. Children were tossed from bayonets, points, only to be caught and again tossed time and again. The Chinese women were mistreated and murdered in house after house. It seemed as if nothing could stay the mad frenzy of the Russians. They drove the women and children into the Pei Ho and Yellow rivers, where they were drowned. "After shooting and murdering to their hearts' content, the Russians commenced at the Peking forts was murdered by Russians when in the act of surrendering his sword."

TREASURY CASE.

Sent to Las Vegas for Trial on Charge of Vandalism. In the district court this morning in the case of Jose L. Perea vs. Board of County Commissioners, the defendants filed a motion to quash the writ of certiorari, and in the case of Territory on relation of C. K. Newhall vs. J. L. Perea, the defendant Perea filed his answer denying the allegations. In the complaint, and while admitting his failure to take the oath prescribed by law until after the order of his removal by the county commissioners, avers it was by mere oversight and inadvertence and that he afterwards made the oath and the cause being at issue and coming on for hearing before the court, counsel for Perea suggested the possibility of the court being disqualified to sit in these cases; whereupon the court, on its own motion, changed the venue of both cases to San Miguel county, and ordered transcripts of the records forwarded immediately to the clerk of the fourth district.

No definite time was fixed for taking the cases up in that court, counsel for the Pereas having important legal business calling him to Arizona indefinitely. Judge Mills will hear the case on Aug. 20.

J. K. TURNER RESIGNS.

He will Remove to Denver, but will Retain Interest in New Mexico. J. K. Turner has resigned as manager of the Copper Hill Mining company, but will remain consulting engineer of the company. He has also been appointed consulting engineer of the Rio Hondo Copper company. Mr. Turner will give up his residence at Rinconado and will make his headquarters at Denver, where he will look after his Clear Creek county mining properties. Before settling down to business, however, he will make a tour of eastern summer resorts.

During the time that Mr. Turner was manager of the Copper Hill Mining company the mine was put in fine condition, and the extensive works for treating the ore were erected. The mill is running night and day, and three air drills are kept busy in the mine. Mr. Turner has great faith in the territory, and is open to any proposition that will stand examination, to take hold of it, to raise money and to make it a paying success.—New Mexican.

Amusement Company Contract Ordered Signed.

Several Propositions and Communications Received.

CASH PURSES AND MEDALS.

The executive committee of the New Mexico Territorial Fair association held a most important meeting at the city building last night and transacted a big lot of business.

The contract with the American Amusement company, of Dayton, Ohio, was ordered signed. This company, which comes west as one of the best amusement companies on the road, will furnish fourteen acts daily, including ballroom, orchestra, vaudeville, and circus, every afternoon and evening.

The plans and specifications for the grand stand were examined, and the committee instructed that bids for the building of same, together with two platform stands, be advertised for. See advertisement in another column.

Governor Otero, who opened the fair last fall, will be asked to perform the same duty at the forthcoming fair. The president announced that C. O. Cushman, who managed the bureau of information at last year's fair, could not accept a prize of \$100 for his services, but that he intended to visit the fair in September, whereupon Ralph Hunt was appointed, and he was empowered to collect the \$100 and \$50 subscriptions.

The proposition of Col. J. B. Borden, date manager of the First Regiment band, to furnish music during fair week every day from 9 a. m. to 9 p. m., was read and accepted.

A communication from the Slinger Manufacturing company was read, and on motion, no action was taken on the communication until the next meeting.

The sale of prizes was also postponed until next meeting, at which time the superintendents of base ball and other sports will be made.

The committee, after considerable discussion, finally proposed the following cash purses and medals for the events.
