## NARROW ESCAPE!

Allies Had Close Call at Tien Tsin.

Details of the Battle of the Nations.

The Gallant Ninth Infantry Made a Historic Fight.

HOW COL. LISCUM WAS KILLED.

New York, July 21.—The Evening World publishes from its Tien Tsin correspondent, under date of Che Foo, via Shanghai, July 21:

The attack on the native city of Tien Tsin, July 19, resulted in the narrow escape from what seemed up to midnight would be a terrible disaster for the allies. The Russians swinging north and the other allies south at day-break the Russians were to take the fight near the native city wall, and the other allies the city itself. General Fukushima, the Japanese commander, promised that the Japanese engineers, after three hours' shell fire from all the guns, would cross the bridge over the wall, and blowing up the great south gate, make a breach for the infantry to enter. Upon this depended everything. General Fukushima had not scouted the bridge and in twenty-four hours had not scouted the ground over which the charge on the bridge had to be made. The Chinese destroyed the bridge and flooded the land around it. The allies shot fire in no way subdued the Chinese rifle fire from the loopholed wall, which was 20 feet high, with a moat 20 feet in depth around it.

The outer wall of mud made it impossible for the infantry and marines coming on the field to reply to the Chinese fire. They lost 50 men in ten minutes, and rushed back from the mud wall, which they had reached. General Doreward, the British commander, hastened forward with a fragmentary instead of an integral, skirmish line. The American marines and Welsh Fusiliers, together under command of Waller, were on the extreme left. Then the British marines and French advanced with the Japanese along the road toward the gate in the mud wall. Doreward's plan for the Americans to support the Japanese was not made clear to Colonel Liscum, of the Ninth United States Infantry. Doreward lays the blame for the blunder and sacrifice of life on Liscum, but Doreward's chief of staff was heard to say, when Liscum moved, "Get in down the road anywhere, quickly." Liscum hurriedly led his men through the gate in an open order as possible. They were immediately under fire. The staff saw them pass over the bridge leading to a field, which proved to be a cut de sac. Before the two battalions of Americans, number 426 men, could extend themselves, they were subjected, besides fire from the loopholes in the forts, to a fierce fire from the embankment. The bank and areal were heavy sufferers.

The advance movement on Pekin is not contemplated soon.

The American wounded crowd the hospital, but all are doing well. The flag of the allied armies are all at half mast. Colonel Liscum was buried at Tongkuk.

## BIG BATTLE!

Now in Progress in South Africa.

Reign of Terror Now in Progress in Pekin.

France Asked by China to Mediate With the Powers.

WEEKLY BANK STATEMENT.

London, July 21.—A dispatch from Cape Town, dated to-day, says: "Lord Roberts attacked Middelburg in force and a big battle is in progress. President Kruger is with the burghers, directing the defense."

**Bank Statement.**  
New York, July 21.—Surplus reserve, increased, \$1,121,775; loans, decreased, \$2,381,100; specie, increased, \$1,681,100; legal tenders, increased, \$2,111,900; deposits, decreased, \$1,215,100; circulation, increased, \$147,100. The banks now hold \$2,081,900 in excess of requirements.

**REIGN OF TERROR.**  
A Squadron of This Famous Cavalry Pass Through the City This Morning.  
A squadron of the Fifth Cavalry, United States army, consisting of four troops and 400 men, with officers, came in from Jefferson barracks this morning, and after resting up and exercising their horses here, left a few hours later for the west.

The first section arrived at about 1 o'clock a. m. and contained Troop A, under Captain McComb and Lieutenant Valentine. They will be stationed at Port Huachuca.

Lieutenant McClure, in command of Troop C, came in on the second section, and proceeded to Fort Wingate, where they will be stationed.

The third and fourth sections contained Troops B and D, with the following officers: Major Cooper, Lieutenants Jenkins, Kornbrook, Fleming and Foythie, and Dr. W. R. Van Tuij. These troops are assigned to Fort Grant.

While the trains remained at the depot Dr. Van Tuij met old friends in Dr. and Mrs. P. G. Cornish, and the time was pleasantly passed in conversation. The doctor belongs to Troop A and will accompany Major Cooper to Fort Grant after which he will return to Jefferson barracks.

The president of the Territorial fair association was notified mingling with the soldiers, doing commendatory work for the forthcoming fair. He interviewed Lieutenant McClure and several of the Troop C soldiers, who will be stationed at Fort Wingate, and found out that they would like to make a march from the fort to this city for the purpose of attending the fair. The lieutenant stated that a first-class horse team belongs to his troop, and they would like to enter the tournament.

The Fifth Cavalry—the squadron mentioned above—was service in Porto Rico, and have been almost continually on the move since leaving that island a few months ago.

Troop L, under Captain Day, and Troop H, under Captain Fuller, of the Ninth Cavalry, stationed at Fort Wingate, will be leaving that fort to-day and to-morrow. Troop L will go to Fort Apache, while Troop H, here at last year's fair, and under Captain Fuller, will go to Presidio barracks, California, and will sail shortly for China.

## CHINESE DEFEATED

Russians Kill 2,000 in a Fight.

Boxer Rebellion Spreading in Chinese Provinces.

British Cruiser Ordered to Arrest Li Hung Chang.

LEGATIONS STILL HOLDING OUT.

St. Petersburg, July 21.—The Chinese, who attacked Hingwen-chow, concentrated on the right bank of the Amur river. They have been severely routed at the village of Sushim, which was burned by shells from the Russian guns. The Chinese town of Aigun has been partly destroyed. The Russian boats, all of which were present in the post at important defensive positions on the right bank of the river, driving the Chinese out. It appears that the Chinese were quite taken by surprise. They considered themselves masters of Hingwen-chow and never expected an attack from the Russians in both the rear and front, but the czar's troops carried out operations with great brilliancy, killing 2,000 Chinese and capturing seventeen guns. At the same time their own losses were inconsiderable.

**Rebellion Spreading.**  
Shanghai, July 21.—The Boxer rebellion is spreading northwest to Shanai, Shenai and Kansu provinces and south west to the province of Hanan.

**Li Hung Chang to be Arrested.**  
Shanghai, July 21.—The British cruiser Bonaventure left Woo Sung this morning. It is reported, to seize the Au Ping, with Li Hung Chang on board. The triumphal arch erected in Li Hung's honor has been ordered by the council to be removed.

**Legations Holding Out.**  
Washington, July 21.—The navy department has received the following cablegram from Admiral Remy, dated Taku, July 20:

"Tien Tsin is quiet. The latest report from Hsin sources, July 18, is that the legations in Pekin are still holding out. The reliability of this information is uncertain. Major Regan, Captain Noyes and Bookmiller, First Lieutenants Lawton and Schofield, wounded, Ninth Infantry officers, and Second Lieutenant Jolly, marine corps, sick, now aboard the Solace. Expect about thirty wounded men. Will send all to Yokohama hospital."
