## CITY DESTROYED!

### Chinese Burn the City of Tien Tsin.

### American Loss in Skirmish With Chinese.

### International Force in China Closely Beset on all Sides.

### FOREIGN MINISTERS SAFE AT PEKIN.

Chen Foo, June 25.—Chinese bombardment of Tien Tsin set fire to mission buildings first. The fire spread to the native city and the Chinese army, with modern artillery, has been pressing the small allied force very hard. Already the dead number 100. Relief is being rushed from Taku but the column have to fight their way through a big Chinese army. The governor of Shan Tung province, in which the Foo is situated, after conferring with subordinate mandarins, decided not to join the rebels, and issued a proclamation decreeing that all Europeans and Americans should be protected. Admiral Kempf held a conference on Sunday at the American consulate with Consul Fowler and the captains of the Nashville and Yorktown. The local governor of Chen Foo was present and promised there should be no uprising here against the foreigners and gave other assurances. Captain Edward Bayly, of the British armored cruiser at Taku signalled the American captains yesterday. "Thank God our plans are here against the foreigners and we have been murdered."

### SERIOUS SITUATION.

### Small International Force in Great Danger in Peking.

London, June 25.—Although the powers at last seem conscious of the magnitude of the Chinese peril and are consequently hurrying forward troops, the international force available to overcome immediate perils of the situation are apparently totally inadequate. Admiral Seymour and party, who are not mentioned in any dispatches purporting to come from Peking but also for his base at Tien Tsin remains unrelieved. The admiral received the following dispatch from Rear Admiral Bruce, dated Taku, via Chen Foo, June 24: "The total force which left Tien Tsin with the commander-in-chief for Peking was about 2,000, composed of detachments from the allied ships. No action could possibly be taken to relieve the commander-in-chief, because it was only known that he was cut off by Tien Tsin being invested. Tien Tsin has been fighting for its life ever since. It was on receipt of information that the Chinese army had ordered trains for attacking Tien Tsin; that they were ravaging Tong Ku and reinforcing Taku as well as mining mouth of the Pei Ho, that it was promptly determined to enter Taku. Since then every effort has been made to relieve Tien Tsin. I command a small coasting steamer for taking troops and sick and wounded across the bay to Wei-Hai-Wei, where I intend making a temporary base hospital and asylum for refugees. India is sending Chinese regiment of infantry, cavalry regiment of artillery and engineers as a fighting force, besides two battalions to guard communications." The Official Gazette at St. Petersburg to-day contains an order of the czar as follows: "As we consider it necessary to raise troops in the Amur military district to a war footing, we direct our war minister to take requisite measures. At the same time we direct the necessary number of reservists belonging to the Siberian Amur military district shall be called out for active service."

### Exciting Oklahoma Incidents.

Wichita, Kas., June 25.—Sheriff Neal Morris was wounded and two of his deputies were killed near Cloud Chief, Okla., while pursuing George Casey and a man named McKee, who broke jail at Arapahoe.

At Granite, the new town in Greer county, cattle inspector Jeff Gilmore, Bill Anderson, another man and woman, engaged in a game of cards and quarreled. Gilmore shot and killed the other three.

### Americans Fighting in China.

Washington, June 25.—A telegram from Admiral Kempf, dated Che Foo, June 24, says: "In the ambulance near Tien Tsin on June 24 four of Waller's command were killed and seven wounded. A force of two thousand started to relieve Tien Tsin to-day. The secretary of the navy ordered Admiral Hensley with the Brooklyn to go to Taku and assist the army with what troops the Brooklyn can carry."

### Chinese Minister Wants Armistice.

Washington, June 25.—The Chinese minister has asked an armistice in sending American troops to China, based on assurances that the Chinese vicecons can maintain order. President McKinley while acknowledging gratification at these assurances, made it known to the Chinese minister that the United States cannot relax efforts to get troops to points where its officials are considered in danger.

### Embassy of Empress Assassinated.

Chicago, June 25.—A special to the Tribune from Yokohama, B. C., says: The steamship Tatar from the Orient brings the following mail advices: Liu Hsu Shun, the empress dowager's secret emissary to Japan was shot in the abdomen as he stepped ashore at Canton. The assassin and friends escaped.

### A PERILOUS JOURNEY.

### Killed One of his Horses and Drank Its Blood to Save Their Lives.

A few days ago three young men—two from Salida, Colorado, and the third from New Jersey—called at W. L. Trimble & Co.'s Second street livery stables and inquired of John S. Trimble the overland route to Gallup and Fort Defiance. Mr. Trimble pointed out the route as best he knew how, but the young men suggested that it would be a shorter route to go by way of the sand hills on the west of the city. Mr. Trimble cautioned them, stating that no one has yet made that route, but that they had to return to the city or would get lost for a few days.

However, on Friday morning last, bright and early the young men started on their journey across the western sandhills, taking along with them a five gallon can of water. They were told they would reach water twelve miles from the city, but they never did and they were about twenty-two miles from the city when they had reached no water. Their supply of water was exhausted and they wandered hopelessly all that night and Saturday in quest of water. Late Saturday afternoon one of the men mounted one of the horses and rode off to find water if possible. As he did not return, the other two killed the remaining horse and drank its blood. After becoming revived and somewhat strengthened, the two men started to walk back to the city and en route one of the men fell by the roadside fatigued and no longer able to travel. The other kept on and reached the city Sunday morning at 10:30 o'clock. He told his tale, and with Sheriff Hubbell and City Marshal McMillin, he started back to find the companion he had left by the wayside. He was found leisurely walking toward town, and he stated that the Rio Puerco mail carrier saved his life by giving him a small can of water. The man, who left the camp on horseback, went back to his companions sometime Saturday night and not finding them rode into the city, arriving here yesterday afternoon. The three young men are in camp near the Barabara bridge, and it is dollars to doughnuts that if they persist in going to Gallup or Fort Defiance they will not again venture across the black sands west of this city.

London, June 25.—The following dispatches have been received at the war office from Pretoria, B. C.: "Pretoria, June 25.—Clements successfully engaged a body of Boers yesterday near Wynburg, where he had gone to pick up supplies and some heavy guns preparatory to acting in combination with the columns from Lindley, Heilbron and Heidelberg. He drove the enemy north of Sand Spruit with loss. No casualties reported." "Jan Hancock reported that Heidelberg the most English town he has yet seen and the inhabitants gave him a great reception."

### Prohibition Convention.

### The Cold Water People Will Nominate Presidential Candidates.

Chicago, June 25.—The sentiment among the delegates to the prohibition national convention who arrived here to-day apparently favored the nomination for president of John G. Woolley, Chicago. The fight this year, it was stated, would be made on a strict prohibition platform, even perhaps to the exclusion of all other national questions. Woolley is the chief advocate of this plan of campaign. Fane Johnson, of Newton, Illinois and Dr. C. Swallow, Pennsylvania, have many friends and a brisk contest is expected. Should a western candidate for the presidency be selected, the vice presidential nomination, it is stated, will probably go to an eastern man, W. W. Smith, of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., being most prominently mentioned in that connection. If an eastern man is nominated, Dr. E. L. Eaton, of Des Moines or Professor F. T. McWhirter, of Indianapolis, may be nominated for vice president.

### Injunction Granted.

St. Louis, June 25.—Judge Elmer B. Adams, of the United States district court, to-day granted a temporary injunction in the case of W. D. Mahon and all members of Division No. 121, Amalgamated Association of Street Railway employees of America, restraining them from interfering in any way with running of mail cars over the lines of the St. Louis Transit company.

### Partition of China.

Lord Salisbury Opposed to Dismembering the Celestial Empire.

London, June 25.—The Associated Press learns that Lord Salisbury is still hopeful that the Chinese crisis will be solved without war against that country as a whole. In spite of the alarming reports he inclines to the belief that the government of China in some satisfactory form will shortly be able to reassert itself. Without committing himself to a definite view of the future, he appears averse to any scheme of territorial indemnity which when order is restored, might be suggested by the powers who suffered defeat in the uprising. Salisbury believes the diplomats at Peking are not masquerading. At an interview with Ambassador Choate on Saturday, Salisbury did not discuss the eventual settlement, the likelihood of the partition of China, and it may be reiterated that this phase of the situation has not yet been made a subject of exchange of views between any of the nations. If Russia, Japan or any other power has ulterior object in making capital out of the trouble in China, Salisbury does not appear to be aware of it.

### SUNDAY BASE BALL GAMES.

Phoenix, Ariz., June 25.—H. F. Gill, Philadelphia, who is here from a prospecting trip in Mexico, says that the Yaqui Indians have nearly all abandoned the war path. Several hundred are still holding the mountains and make an occasional descent on isolated ranches. Near Tomachi, on Friday night, a large party raided a ranch, killed two cowboys and wounded several others and one woman. They were driven off after a hard fight.

### Will Not Go to Chicago.

Chicago, June 25.—Under present circumstances I would not accept the nomination for governor nor the election if assured of it.

These were Mayor Harrison's emphatic words last night, when told that it was believed that the democratic state convention which meets in Springfield on Tuesday was likely to nominate him regardless of his wishes.

### Train Destroyed.

Atlanta, Ga., June 25.—A passenger train on the Macon branch of the Southern railway ran into a washout near McDonough, Ga., Saturday night, and the wreck caught fire and the entire train with exception of a sleeper was destroyed. Every person on the train except the occupants of the Pullman car, perished. Thirty-five people were killed.

Excursion Train Derailed.

Green Bay, Wis., June 25.—The northbound passenger train on the Northwestern road, loaded with excursionists, bound for a saengerfest in this city, collided on Sunday morning with a freight train at Depere. Six persons were killed, one missing and thirty-four injured.

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


