The last day of the session. No tears to shed.

The extra session of the United States senate was to adjourn today. It has completed the work outlined for it and President Roosevelt can now get down to making plans for his western trip.

The Arizona legislature has passed finally the woman's suffrage bill by two-thirds majority. Another reason why Arizona and New Mexico would not make a homogeneous and harmonious state.

Germany is renewing its old threat to keep American products from German markets. Fortunately the Germans always discover that they hurt themselves considerably more than they do the United States by such a course.

The conduct of Councilman A. B. Fall during the session in which he posed on the Republican side of the chamber, is aptly and truthfully described as follows: "Like a lamb have I crept into the fold, like a ravenous wolf have I used it."

The 35th legislative assembly cannot show any of its sins of omission or commission upon the Democrats. The Republican party will have to answer for every bit of legislation enacted and for the omission of all legislation that should have been enacted.

Among the good measures passed by the assembly was one providing that county officials should have offices at the county seats and attend to their respective duties there. Such a law has been greatly needed in this territory for many years.

Not many tears of regret will be shed, except by legislative employees, that the 35th legislative assembly will pass into history by tonight. It is true that the assembly has been a very liberal one in many respects, but the tax-payers will have to pay the bills.

By a vote of 73 to 5 the United States senate has ratified the Panama canal treaty. Another obstacle to building the canal is therefore out of the way and Uncle Sam can begin the work in earnest. The sooner that this is done, the better it will please the people.

Even at the risk of being accused of seeking favors at the hands of the new public printer, Councilman James S. Duncan, the New Mexican takes pleasure in saying that his record as a member of the Legislative Council has been of the very best. He could be neither bulldozed, bought nor cajoled, but did what he thought right and for the best interest of the people.

The legislative Council on yesterday failed to confirm the nomination of James M. Hervey to be district attorney for the counties of Chaves and Eddy. There were absolutely no reasons for such action except those of personal spite and malice and getting even. The New Mexican is fully investigating this affair and will comment upon it as soon as it finds out all that is possible concerning it.

Santa Fe county should set the wheels in motion to have a bill introduced immediately upon the convening of congress in December to reimburse it for the enormous debt saddled upon it by act of congress, such debt having been both unjust and illegal and being oppressive and retarding the development and growth of this county. If the matter is presented properly, congress will undoubtedly grant the desired relief.

The appointments made by Governor Otero for the Territorial Sheep Sanitary Board, consist of citizens engaged in sheep raising and who understand the industry and its needs in all its branches thoroughly and well. The interests of the sheep raisers of the territory will be well taken care of by the members of the board. Right here, however, it ought to be said, that if these members and many other sheep growers of the territory would make closer returns of the number of sheep owned by them and the lands they hold, to the assessors for taxable purposes, there would be quite a rise in taxable values in several of the counties of the territory. It is said that there are about 3,000,000 head of sheep accounted for on the books and records of the Sheep Sanitary Commission, while several competent authorities assert that there are between five and six million sheep owned by citizens of the territory and run on its grazing lands this spring. If this is so a change for the better would be profitable all around.

Governor Otero evidently recognizes that it is a good policy to reappoint incumbents of office whenever possible. A shaking up in offices always produces more or less disturbance and strife and the 35th legislative assembly has been productive enough of that without Governor Otero raising a whirlwind by discarding present officials and trying new hands, and isn't the governor a reappointee himself in the face of vigorous opposition to his reappointment?

Council Bill No. 107, and House Bill No. 198, which have become law, are primarily intended to relieve Santa Fe county of the great burden of its still accumulating debt. Under the provisions of these laws the bondholders are to accept the compromise of 60 per cent of the face of the bonds at 2 per cent interest annually. This, if carried out, will reduce the debt from about \$1,000,000 to \$600,000, and the annual interest from about \$50,000 to \$18,000. A great boon indeed and one, if fully and efficiently carried into effect, that will redound greatly to the benefit and welfare of Santa Fe county.

All of Colorado yesterday experienced the worst blizzard of the season. According to the Journal-Democrat the sandstorm at the Duke City and south of it was so terrific that at one time pedestrians had difficulty to keep their feet on the streets. At Santa Fe there was calm and sunshine. Sooner or later the great army of lungers will discover these little differences in climate which mean so much to them and they will descend or rather ascend to Santa Fe in ever increasing numbers declaring that winter or summer, Santa Fe has the finest climate on earth for the man or woman who wants to get well.

Senator Clark has assured President Roosevelt that the administration policy of preserving the forests meets the approval of the vast majority of Wyoming people. Governor Richards to the contrary notwithstanding, Governor Richards' opposition to forest reserves is based upon the fact that he is a large sheep owner and his sheep are hungry for the pastures of the forest reserves. "It would be as easy to bottle a March blizzard on the Laramie plains as to prevent sending a Roosevelt delegation from Wyoming to the Republican national convention," is the way that National Committeeman George E. Pexton of Wyoming, puts it, after reading Governor Richards' letter that President Roosevelt will lose the Wyoming delegation on account of his forest preservation policy.

Representative H. H. Howard of Socorro county, was one of the members of the House of Representatives, who made a clean and creditable record, and one of which his constituents may well be proud. He did not flash around in the hall of representatives like a meteor, doing no good, quite the contrary, he attended carefully, efficiently and steadily to his duties and voted on the right side of questions. He was clean handed throughout the session and kept away from what was called "the boodle gang." He introduced several timely and necessary measures and managed to have part of them passed, although there was strong opposition to him and the measures introduced by him by a powerful clique. Mr. Howard did his duty well and fearlessly and certainly worked hard for his county and section.

The bill introduced by Representative Turner which passed both houses on yesterday under suspension of the rules and providing that district attorneys shall not be required to reside within the districts for which they are appointed, is a measure bad in principle and tyrannical in operation. It strikes at the idea of self government in local affairs. It means that the people of a district shall have no voice in the selection of their district attorneys and that the governor of the territory may appoint a lawyer residing in Raton to be district attorney for the district comprising Chaves and Eddy counties, or a lawyer in Grant county to be district attorney for Colfax and Union counties. It is evident that this bill was prepared and rushed through for a purpose; it is also evident that the purpose is not a good one and if carried out would prove detrimental to the people and to the Republican party. It is hoped the governor will give the bill a pocket veto.

THE PRESIDENT'S VISIT TO DENVER.
The following advice which the Denver Republican gives about the entertainment of President Roosevelt applies also to Santa Fe, except that a visit to the territorial institutions and the Indian school should take the place of the drive through the business districts, which are not as extensive as those of Denver and can be taken in at one glance:

"The announcement that President Roosevelt will spend two hours and a half in Denver, from 10:30 in the morning until 1 o'clock in the afternoon of the same day, shows that little can be done for his entertainment. "About all that can be done is to give him a drive about the city and a luncheon. It is probable that he will deliver an address from the steps of the capitol. "A route for the proposed drive through the city should be selected that would give as large a number of people as possible an opportunity to see him, and hence it should cover a considerable part of the business section. A somewhat similar program was adopted when President Harrison visited Denver, and gave general satisfaction. "The entire program should be arranged with a view to enabling the president to form as nearly correct an idea as possible of Denver and at the same time give the greatest practicable number of our people an opportunity to welcome him."

The territorial institutions fared very well at the hands of the 35th legislative assembly. In fact, some people assert, too well, in that they were permitted to attack the sinking fund and in the creation of more institutions than there was either necessity or excuse for. But these matters will right themselves with time. It will take more than small mistakes of that kind to kill off New Mexico.

Some of the legislation of the 35th legislative assembly is not out in daylight yet. There are indications that it will be scrutinized very closely and will be assailed not only in the courts but also in congress. This would be all right if it were not for the fact that uncertainty and doubt are not conducive to healthful growth and prosperity. People like to know where they are at as far as legislation is concerned.

THIRTY-FIFTH LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

Concluded from First Page.
less than 1,500 population, to transact a banking business, was passed.
House Bill No. 168, An act for the relief of the poor, which requires relatives far removed in degrees of relationship, to support poor, was taken up and tabled.
The Council then took a recess until 2:30 p. m.

THE HOUSE.
(Morning Session.)

The last day of the session in the House opened with a display of good feeling. Mr. Pedro Sanchez presented two resolutions, one expressing thanks to Governor M. A. Otero and to Secretary J. W. Reynolds and the other to Speaker Nestor Montoya and Chief Clerk C. V. Safford. Both resolutions were adopted. Speaker Montoya called Mr. Bowie to the chair and took the floor to reply. In a fine speech he expressed his appreciation of the sentiment of the resolution and his response was greeted with loud applause.

Mr. Pedro Sanchez responded for the House. House Bill No. 213, the educational bill defeated last night, was reconsidered on a motion of Mr. Bowie, and passed by 16 to 2. The House concurred in the Council amendments to House Bill No. 100, An act relating to property rights of married women. A minor amendment was made by Mr. Bacon and as amended the bill passed. Council Bill No. 131, An act to amend the trust company bill so as to elect House Bill No. 23, An act defining beneficiary societies, was tabled.

House Bill No. 182, An act to give landlords a lien against tenants and power to enforce the same, was also tabled.

The governor announced having signed the following bills: Council Bill No. 107, An act providing for the refunding of certain county indebtedness; Council substitute for House Bill No. 120, the osteopathy bill; Council Bill No. 116, An act to give county commissioners the right of condemnation; amended Council Bill No. 79, An act relating to the protection of school children; An act in relation to the mayors of cities; House Bill No. 47, An act to require officers of a corporation to disclose to a levying officer the number of shares held by each shareholder; Council substitute for House Bill 143, to authorize the board of education of Santa Fe to issue bonds for a new school house; House Bill No. 138, An act to authorize counties to compromise county indebtedness; House Bill No. 148, An act to amend Section 2, Chapter 72, Session Laws of 1901, Council substitute for House Bill No. 25, An act directed as a form of note used by an Albuquerque bank, was passed. Council Bill No. 135, An act to prevent indecent exposure and providing a maximum fine of \$25, was passed.

House Joint Resolution No. 19, appropriating \$300 of which one-half is to be used for the rent of type-writing machines used in the House and one-half for rent of those used in the Council, was favorably reported. Mr. Cristoval Sanchez moved to table the resolution and this was done. Council Bill No. 92, An act to authorize cities to provide for the sprinkling of streets, was passed. Council Bill No. 121, An act to enable villages to change their form of government was handed down and passed. This was the last bill on the speaker's table and there is not one thing pending before the House.

A recess was therefore taken until 3 o'clock this evening.

THE COUNCIL.
(Afternoon Session.)

When the Council met this afternoon, it at once went into executive session during which the following nominations were confirmed: J. M. Hervey to be district attorney for the 8th district; W. G. Sargent to be territorial auditor, Capital custodian commissioner, N. B. Laughlin of Santa Fe, A. A. Keen of Bernalillo, and E. L. Bartlett of Santa Fe. The steering committee favorably reported House Bills No. 159 and 179. The former was the irrigation bill and Mr. Fall was recognized to speak to it.

Mr. Fall reviewed the irrigation legislation of the general government. No money will come to New Mexico until data has been furnished for New Mexico. This territory has stood still while the others have gone ahead. Arizona has received a million and a half already. Mr. Fall said not an acre of land shall be leased as long as he is able to go into a court without pay and fight for what he believes to be the rights of the people. The defeat of this bill, said Mr. Fall, will cause a political revolution in New Mexico and bosses will be shaken from their thrones as Tweed and Croker have been. Money has been poured out freely and the House resisted this. Bossism will be cast out. Mr. Fall said he appealed from Pennsylvania politics to the honesty of the people of New Mexico. He appealed to the native sons to stand by the bill and help reclaim the valleys. Mr. Fall declared it a shame this land should be given to the cattle barons.

Mr. Hawkins sent to the desk to have read a number of letters and documents from the department at Washington, which substantiate the statements made by those who advocated the bill. Mr. Spless said the only question is whether permanent improvement shall be made or the land turned over to owners of herds and flocks. He urged the irrigation of lands so homesteaders may be invited in and industrial progress made. The letters sent up by Mr. Hawkins said his object in having them read was to show that since last October the department has been called for data in order to help New Mexico, but New Mexico has done nothing. Another reason for having the letters read was to

Mrs. C. A. Spless of Las Vegas, wife of Councilman Spless, is again paying the Capital City a visit.

Mrs. A. L. Kendall of Cerrillos, wife of the chairman of the board of county commissioners of this county, is visiting friends in town.

Stephen B. Davis, Jr. Esq., who has just been appointed and confirmed as district attorney for the 3d district, was among last night's arrivals in the capital.

Mrs. Thomas Brannigan of Las Cruces, wife of Captain Thomas Brannigan, sergeant-at-arms of the legislative council, arrived from the Mesilla Valley yesterday.
