TAKU TAKEN!

Allied Forces Silence Chinese Batteries.

Chinese Opened Fire on the Fleet.

Report that Legations at Peking Were Taken is Confirmed.

DESTITUTE ARIZONA INDIANS.

London, June 18.—According to a Chefoo special of the 17th, the Taku forts opened fire upon the warships, whereupon the fleet replied and silenced the Chinese guns. International forces subsequently landed and seized the forts. The news of this engagement is stated to have been brought to Chefoo by a Chinese warship. According to the dispatch the Chinese bombardment followed an ultimatum sent by the commanders of the fleet. An official dispatch from the German consuls at Chefoo, received at Berlin, confirms the arrival of a Japanese torpedo boat with the following message: "Japanese torpedo boat reports legations at Peking have been taken." Whether taken by Boxers or Chinese troops or mob is apparently not stated.

Going to China.

Manila, June 18.—The Ninth regiment has been ordered to China. Washington, June 18.—The war department has received the following cablegram from General MacArthur, dated yesterday at Manila: "Ninth infantry, Col. Liscum, ordered to Taku on the Legation; transportation to Port Albert; probably start on 24th. Typhoon may delay movement."

SITUATION IN CHINA.

Admiral Kempf Closely Guarding the Interests of the United States. Washington, June 18.—Actual news of the situation in China was received by the navy department in two cablegrams, the contents of which were made known as follows: The department has received a cablegram from Admiral Remy at Cavite, dated the 18th, which informs the department that the commander of the *Thetis* cables that the Taku forts at the mouth of the river Pei Ho, fired on the allied forces on the morning of the 17th. The department instructed Admiral Kempf to confer with the other powers in taking all steps necessary to protect all American interests. A dispatch from Tientsin, dated Chefoo, June 17, says that the Taku forts fired on the foreign war vessels, at 12:45 this morning and reports the British admiral at Tien Tsin.

Report Confirmed.

Washington, June 18.—The war department confirms the report that the Ninth infantry has been ordered from Manila to China. Col. Liscum commands the regiment.

Taku Forts Surrendered.

Washington, June 18.—The navy department has been informed by Admiral Kempf that the Taku forts fired on foreign warships and after a brief engagement, surrendered.

Ordered to China.

Simla, June 18.—In consequence of the gravity of the Chinese situation, the Seventh Bengal infantry has been ordered to Hong Kong.

Russian Demand.

London, June 18.—A dispatch from Shanghai says that Russia has demanded fifty million taels indemnity for damage done Chinese railroads in which Russians are interested.

New Cabinet.

Cape Town, June 18.—A new cabinet has been officially announced. Sir J. Gordon Spragg is premier.

Destitute Indians.

Phoenix, Ariz., June 18.—Eight thousand Pima Indians on the Gila reservation, 30 miles from Phoenix, are destitute, and a like number of Papagos on the Yuma reservation, 80 miles from Phoenix, are in a similar state. The superintendent of the Phoenix Indian industrial school, has been directed to Hong Kong.

WANT ROOSEVELT!

Delegates Demand Him for Vice President.

Roosevelt Will Decide This Afternoon.

Quarantine Order Against San Francisco Rescinded by Officials.

DENVER TIMES CHANGES HANDS.

Philadelphia, June 18.—Unless the consensus of opinion of the most experienced political observers is awry, the selection of a candidate for vice president virtually will have been made before today closes. The key to the situation is held by Governor Theodore Roosevelt of New York. It seems certain at this writing that McKinley and Roosevelt will be the ticket. Roosevelt will have to decide. Thus far he has not said the decisive word. He does not desire personally, the nomination of vice president, yet in the face of that fact, in face of the desire of a few well known administration leaders to nominate somebody else, the nomination seems forcing itself, by a curious combination of circumstances upon the New York governor. The running of the tide towards Roosevelt can be stemmed only by one man, President McKinley.

Acting Mayor Leonard has received the following letter from Superintendent Hurley regarding the result of the late special city election for the insurance of viaduct bonds:

"But I never asserted," answered Roosevelt, "that I would decline if nominated. I do not want the office, but I am not sure I can refuse if the convention fails to listen to my protest."

"You had better take a razor and cut your throat," suggested Senator Lodge. "To decline the nomination would be equally as fatal."

After finding he was about equally advised on both sides of the controversy by his close personal friends, Roosevelt announced that he would come to a decision by 4 o'clock this afternoon.

The delegation from South Dakota, which called upon Governor Roosevelt about noon, and perhaps the clearest statement from him yet made. He said, in response to a query from the head of the delegation, Emil Branch, "Gentlemen, I am placed in a great and serious quandary. I am not unmindful of the honor you all want to confer upon me. I do not scorn it or scoff at it, but I believe it would be better to serve my party in New York state than in the nation, and I am still of the mind that I should not be nominated for vice president, but for governor of New York."

Roosevelt flushed and then said slowly: "I don't see how I could, but I have not yet entirely made up my mind."

Another Candidate. Philadelphia, June 18.—The latest candidate for vice president is Senator N. B. Scott of West Virginia. The Virginia delegation has decided to give him their entire support.

Arizona Delegation. Philadelphia, June 18.—The Arizona delegation caucused today. Charles H. Akers was elected chairman. A poll on the vice president showed the delegates a unit for any man acceptable to the administration. If the latter has no candidate then the delegates will vote solidly for Roosevelt. But in the event of the New York governor declining to let his name go before the convention the Arizona men will throw their support to Dooliver.

Senator Mason Talks. Philadelphia, June 18.—Senator Mason of Illinois, was among the early arrivals today. He lost no time in taking positive position against Governor Roosevelt. "I am for one of the candidates for vice president," he said, "it matters not which, who want the office and are willing to say they want it. I do not believe that Roosevelt can in honor accept it, if tendered him."

CLARK CONTROLS MONTANA.

Times Changes Hands. Denver, June 18.—The Times changed hands today, the controlling interest having been purchased by Charles E. Hasbrouck and associates. Plans for a new Times building, to be erected by W. R. Stratton on Stout street, near 16th have been made. The paper will be equipped with new presses, etc. The management announces that the Times will be a republican newspaper.

ROOSEVELT DECLINES. He Wants to be the Governor of the State of New York. Philadelphia, June 18.—Gov. Roosevelt gave out this statement:

"In view of the revival of the talk of myself as a vice presidential candidate, I have this to say: It is impossible to express how deeply touched I am by the attitude of those delegates who wish me to take this nomination. Moreover, I very earnestly understand the high honor and dignity of the office, an office so high and so honorable that it is well worth the ambition of any man in the United States. But while I appreciate all this to the fullest extent, nevertheless I feel most deeply that the field of my best usefulness to the public and to the party, is in New York state, and if the party should see fit to re-nominate me for governor I can in that position, help the national ticket as in no other way. I very earnestly ask every friend of mine in the convention to respect my wish and my judgment in this matter."

Deserted His Family. The Benevolent society has again had to handle one of those ever occurring cases that show man's inhumanity and incidentally used up the society's funds on cases from abroad to the possible neglect of local deserving cases from lack of funds. About two weeks ago J. L. Nutter, with his wife, arrived here overland from Oklahoma. They took possession of a shanty on the mountain road near Second street and after a few days the man sold his outfit and shipped out, leaving his wife sick and with a two week old baby.

As the woman was destitute the society had to do all it could, and in addition has procured transportation for the woman and child to Hutchinson, Kansas, at which place she has friends. They will leave tonight.

Clark Controls Montana. Helena, Mont., June 18.—Clark's friends carried nineteen counties, and will control the democratic state convention. Clark will head the Montana delegation to Kansas City.

COCHITI MINING NEWS.

The Great Gold Camp Making Steady Progress.

From the Bland Herald.
Fred Goodwin, of Philadelphia, who arrived a couple of weeks ago, is doing some extensive development work on the King Solomon. He is driving a cross-cut tunnel to tap the main lead. The property is located a short distance south of the Washington mine.
For the past week W. M. Greenfield, the old reliable ore hauler of the Cochiti, has been engaged building new wagons and repairing his old ones preparatory to fulfilling his contract with the Cochiti Reduction and Improvement company. He has entered upon a contract with the company to haul all the ore from the Iron King mine to their mill in Woodbury, and he expects to commence work as soon as certain repairs in the mill are made.
W. S. Sandon and W. D. McCoy have just returned from a trip through the Los Cerillos mining district, where they have located a claim which carries lead, gold and silver. The claim was opened by the Mexicans years ago and was used for lead to make bullets. There are five shafts on the claim and they will average from twenty to twenty-five feet in depth, exposing about fifteen inches of lead ore and twenty inches of silver ore. The gentlemen did the assessment work and had the claims surveyed while there.
Last Monday morning a second Sulphur machine drill was placed in the Star tunnel and the work is proceeding good progress was made under the able superintendency of Mr. Williams and Foreman E. T. Wash. The working force in the tunnel was increased by the addition of six men this week and the rock is now being broken at the rate of about seven feet every twenty-four hours. As the tunnel has been driven 800 feet, it is expected only 120 feet more of work will be required to tap the big ore body.

While admiring the mountain scenery they left the trail to gather some beautiful wild flowers that grew on the mountain side, and upon returning to where they thought they had left the trail it was nowhere to be seen. There being no other course left to them they took to the brush and wandered over hill and down dale until they at last found themselves in sight of Hank Woodard's ranch. At this point they struck the trail leading from Peralta to Bland, and thinking their troubles all over they began the descent to the ranch. The descent was a very steep one and they were startled by a violent rustling of the underbrush and in a moment a large black bear made his appearance.
