WAR IN AFRICA!

Boers Defeated by Gen. Kitchener's Army.

Kludorp Surrenders to General Hunter.

Gen. Cronje Reported Ready to Surrender His Force.

VICE PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE.

London, June 15.—The war office issues the following dispatch from Lord Roberts:

"Pretoria, June 14.—Kludorp surrendered June 9 to an armed party sent on by Hunter.

"Kitchener reports that the Boers attacked the reconstruction train early this morning a few miles north of Rhenoster river. He sent out mounted troops and drove off the enemy before they could do damage. One man killed and eleven wounded, including two officers.

"A messenger from Kludorp reports that Cronje, who commanded there, had determined to surrender as soon as he knew for certain that Pretoria is in our possession. His example has been copied by many of his neighbors."

VICE PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE.

Philadelphia, June 15.—While there has been no startling development in the vice presidential situation, a slightly new turn has been given the discussion by an interview with Senator Platt, in which he suggests J. B. Oakes, chairman of the New York state republican committee as the candidate.

The settlement of the Delaware contest apparently is more difficult than any which the committee had to face. The sub-committee so far has failed absolutely to bring about reconciliation of the factions.

EX-MARSHAL ARRESTED.

Tucson, Ariz., June 15.—Sam Finley, a well-known politician and ex-city marshal of Tucson, was arrested last night by a special officer from Tombstone, on the charge of attempted murder. Finley claims that the arrest is due to the enmity of Wells-Fargo officers, and he absolutely denies all complicity in the jail break.

BANDMASTER STUART IN TROUBLE.

He Forged Capt. Fuller's Name to a Note and Called on Gov. Stover for Money.

Night before last a colored trooper of troop H, Ninth cavalry, and claiming to be the bandmaster, arrived in the city from Fort Wingate. He was here last year and took part in the fair festivities; he had also visited the city when the San Juan baseball club was here a few weeks ago, and he knew, of his own personal knowledge, how well the people of Albuquerque on those two occasions treated the heroes of San Juan heights—the heroes who saved the day to the "Rough Riders" in the Hispano-American war in Cuba.

This bandmaster, whose name is George A. Stuart, desired to test the treatment of the soldiers by our citizens in a different way, and this morning, dressed in his gaudy band uniform, called at the residence of Governor E. R. Stover.

"The knock at the door was answered by the governor himself, and his dusky visitor inquired: 'Is this Governor Stover?'"

"Yes," answered the governor.

"Ah, governor," politely answered back Stuart, "I have a letter to you from Captain A. M. Fuller, of the Ninth cavalry, but forgot to bring it with me. I will go back to my room and will return with the letter."

Off started Stuart, chuckling to himself, "I have found my victim."

A few minutes later Stuart put in his second appearance at the Stover mansion and presented the following letter, which The Citizen publishes verbatim:

"Fort Wingate, N. M., June 13, 1900.

"Gov. Stover,

"Dear Sir: Please let George A. Stuart have the sum of \$45 and charge same to me will be payable June 25, and bludge Cap. A. M. Fuller.

"Commander of Troop H, 9th Cavalry."

The governor read and re-read the letter, and he could not conjure up in his mind on what grounds Captain Fuller would call on him for money. He questioned the authenticity of the letter, and remarked to Stuart that Captain Fuller was a graduate of West Point and surely was capable of writing a much better letter.

"That's correct, governor," remarked Stuart, "the captain was a graduate of West Point, but he wrote that note. He came in with me from Fort Wingate, and went on to Santa Fe, and from there he was going to Kansas City."

The governor asked Stuart to take a ride with him down town. Stuart consented and the governor drove around to the City office. He knew that considerable correspondence had passed between Captain Fuller and the president of the Territorial Fair, and while Stuart sat in the buggy, the governor presented the letter at The Citizen office. It was promptly declared a forgery, and to make it doubly sure a comparison of the signature to letters written to the president of the fair and the letter presented to the governor by Stuart was made. There was no denial then that the Stuart letter was a forgery.

With Stuart still in the buggy, the governor took another drive and on meeting City Marshal McMillin the colored bandmaster and forger was turned over to him.

A telegram was sent to Ft. Wingate, asking if Captain Fuller had returned to the fort from his trip east, and an answer was received that "Captain Fuller had not returned but was expected in a few days."

This information from Fort Wingate clinched matters and made Stuart out not only a forger, but a liar.

Marshal McMillin, with Governor Stover, then called on Stuart at the city jail and asked him to prepare a telegram and send it to Captain Fuller at Kansas City. Stuart readily complied, and as he was writing, boldly declared that he was "all right."

The writing of the telegram and the alleged Fuller letter was compared, and the similarity in the shaping of the letters was indistinguishable. Stuart then confessed the forgery, and stated that "he did not know why he did it."

Marshal McMillin then telegraphed the arrest of Stuart to the commanding officer at Fort Wingate, receiving in reply the following answer:

"Hold Stuart for trial by civil court, if you wish. If not, will send a guard for him."

"DAY, Commanding."

It will be decided this afternoon what disposition will be made of Stuart, whether he will be tried here or taken back to Fort Wingate for a military trial.

PASSENGER TRAIN DITCHED.

No. 17, South Bound Train, in a Week South of Watrous.

No. 17 passenger train, due here at 2:25 p. m., is indefinitely behind time, caused by a wreck near Watrous. At 4 o'clock this afternoon The Citizen learns that the engine, baggage and mail coaches have the track and turned over down an embankment. The other coaches are also off the track. While the wreck is a very bad one, it is thought here that no one was killed in the wreck.

DEWEY DECLINES VICE-PRESIDENCY.

DEATH FROM "HEART CLOT."

Robert Mann, a Railroad Avenue Druggist, Died Early This Morning.

This morning at 1:15 o'clock, Robert Mann, who conducted a small drug store at 115 West Railroad avenue, died last Saturday, while in Detroit and as the physicians say from "heart clot."

Mrs. Mann, with her little five-old son, left a short time ago to enjoy the summer months with her husband's people at Detroit, Mich., and Mr. Mann, now dead, was to follow her in a few weeks to also spend his vacation among relatives.

Last Saturday, while in Detroit and unimpaired of how things were going on here, Mrs. Mann received a telegram to hasten back to Albuquerque as her husband was dangerously ill. She promptly complied with the request and returned Tuesday night. Mr. Mann seemed then to rally; was better several times yesterday and for a few hours after supper, but a few minutes before the fatal summons he raised himself in bed and fell back, and expired without saying a word.

The deceased came here two years ago last May, and on June 1, two weeks later, opened up the drug store in the rear of which his death occurred this morning. He was born and reared in Ann Arbor, Mich., where his parents died many years ago. They had ten children—six boys and four girls—and the deceased was the youngest. Five brothers and four sisters now reside in Detroit and Ann Arbor, and a telegram has been sent them conveying the sad intelligence of his death. Had the deceased lived until June 19 he would have been 33 years old.

The body is being embalmed, and with the grief-stricken wife, will be taken to-morrow night to Ann Arbor, Mich., for burial.

NEW PREMIER FOR BRITISH COLUMBIA.

New York, June 15.—The Herald's Washington correspondent sends report of an interview with Admiral Dewey, in which he is represented as confessing his presidential prospect not good. He said: "I thank God they do not appear to want me," he said.

"The situation in China," the admiral said, "I regard as very serious. I can only see but one outcome and that is the adoption of the American policy in favor of open ports for American commerce on equal terms with all other commercial nations of the world. It is fortunate that we are in a position to say to the nations of Europe, 'we are in this deal, gentlemen.' This would not have been possible had it not been for the result of the Spanish war."

"Then you sincerely believe in our retention of the Philippines?" was asked.

"Most assuredly I do," was the prompt reply.

TURKEY IGNORES DEMAND.

Constantinople, June 15.—The United States legation has not yet received a reply regarding the indemnity question handed the porte on May 21st. Lloyd C. Griscom, United States charge d'affaires, is making verbal representations for a solution of the matter.

FATAL TENEMENT FIRE.

New York, June 15.—Eleven lives were lost and five persons badly injured in a fire which almost totally destroyed the only five story tenement at 34 Jackson street, early to-day. Dead: Louis Martin and wife and three children; William Cotter, wife and four children.

BRITISH COLUMBIA PREMIER.

Victoria, B. C., June 15.—Joseph Martin has resigned the premiership of British Columbia and James Dunsmuir has accepted the position, and will form a cabinet on non-partisan lines.


