## TWO BATTLES!

Boers Routed by Methuen and Kitchener.

Drawn Fight Between Roberts and Botha.

Court Awards Prize Money to Sampson's Fleet for Santiago Victory.

END OF LAWLESSNESS IN ST. LOUIS.

London, June 12.—Lord Roberts' line of communications is practically restored by the complete victory gained by Generals Methuen and Kitchener over Gen. Dewet yesterday. The Boer camp was captured and the burghers scattered.

Lord Roberts fought a battle with Gen. Botha, at the end of which, though the British gained considerable ground, the Boers were not beaten. All is quiet at Pretoria and Johannesburg.

A lengthy dispatch from Lord Roberts has been forwarded to the war office by Major General Knox from Krommedijk, presumably sent there by messenger, which says: "After surrendering the city Botha retired to a place about fifteen miles east on the Middleburg road. He had a small force but during the last few days his numbers increased. He held a strong position, practically unassailable in front, which enabled him to place the main portion of his troops on his flanks which he knew from former experience were his vulnerable parts."

French with Porter's and Dixon's cavalry brigade and Hutton's mounted infantry around by our left and Ian Hamilton with Broadwood and Gordon's cavalry brigade round by our right. Both columns met great opposition. About 3 in the afternoon, about two of Hamilton's infantry battalions advanced to what appeared to be the key of the enemy's defense on their left flank. This was almost gained before dark and I ordered the force to bivouac on the ground they had won.

"Pretoria, with his division, occupied our center. He gradually advanced so as to support Ian Hamilton and when I left the field he was on the line held by the enemy's outposts in the morning."

"I hurried back to get news of Methuen's movement. On hearing that the Free Staters had taken advantage of our crossing the Vaal to interrupt our communications, I sent Kitchener with troops as I could then spare to Vredersburg with orders to push south and communicate with Methuen, who I knew had a very compact force in the vicinity of Heilbron. I also dispatched a special messenger to him instructing him to push on at all speed to the main line of the railway. These two officers met at the Vredersburg station on the evening of June 10. They marched yesterday to the Rhenoster river, where Methuen gained a complete victory over Dewet, and took possession of his camp, and scattered his troops in all directions. He and Kitchener marched to-day towards Krommedijk."

"Her Majesty's government need have no apprehension as to the security of the army in South Africa. The enemy gained a slight success, which was unfortunate but which will be remedied very shortly. It will not take long to repair the damage done to the railway. As these diversions are all in existence, I am now able to hold the line between this and Rhenoster in strength. Methuen will arrange to guard it on west as he advances."

"Methuen should be at Potchefstroom to-day. He will then move on Johannesburg."

"We have communicated with Bulwer, who will no doubt, soon make the presence of his force in the field felt."

"Our losses yesterday were not, I trust, serious, but I deplore the death of that gallant soldier, the earl of Albion. The only other casualties reported as yet are: Seventeenth Lancers—Major Hon. Lionel Fortescue and Lieut. Hon. C. Cavendish, both killed."

"American Warship in China. Washington, June 12.—The navy department has been informed that the Yorktown sailed yesterday from Shanghai for Chefoo. The United States consul at Chefoo informed the state department yesterday of Boer disturbances at that place but no particulars are furnished. Chefoo is on the northern coast of the Shan Tung peninsula."

Riots at Pekin. Washington, June 12.—Official dispatches received at diplomatic quarters in Washington, show that rioting in Pekin has reached an acute stage, the rioters directing assaults against the members of the different foreign legations. One of these dispatches states that the secretary of the Belgian legation was attacked twice on Monday and escaped after being maltreated by the mob. The same day two officials of the British legation serving as student interpreters were attacked by a large crowd of rioters. A young Englishman held the attacking party back awhile, and when the mob threatened to close in on them they drew revolvers. By a show of force they made them retreat without bodily injury. About the same time the British summer quarters, four miles from Pekin, were burned. The killing of the Chinese legation is not referred to in official dispatches received here, but full credit is given to this report by Japanese officials.

Empress Promises to be Good. Shanghai, June 12.—Extraordinary rumors are current here to the effect that the powers have settled the Chinese question by agreeing to forgive the dowager empress and her Manchurian advisors provided they promise to amend their future conduct.

End of Reign of Terror. St. Louis, June 12.—Sheriff Pohlman and Chief of Police Campbell held their first session here to-day. Chairman Hanna was not present. Vice Chairman Henry C. Payne presided. There were several reports, especially from the western states. Secretary Dick announced thirty-three arrests, involving the seizure of seventy-four delegates. This is about one-eighth of the entire convention, a remarkably large proportion of the convention, where there is no contention as to main issues. The involved seats are: Alabama 16, Georgia 2, Louisiana 14, Mississippi 2, New York 2, Pennsylvania 11, Ohio 2, Tennessee 12, Texas 16, Delaware 6, District of Columbia 2.

MISSIONARY MURDERED. Dr. Terry of Methodist Missionary Church Murdered in China. New York, June 12.—News has been received in this city of the murder of Dr. Edna G. Terry, in charge of the station of the Methodist Episcopal Woman's Foreign Missionary Society at Tsung-Hua, China. The tidings came in the following message to Terry's brother-in-law: "Dr. Terry murdered. Break news gently."

This is the first indication of trouble at Tsung-Hua. Later the Methodist Episcopal board received this message: "Dr. Terry, June 12." "Hopkins and Hayner safe." The persons named are missionaries at Tsung-Hua. There is one other Methodist missionary at the same place, Miss Croucher, of Boston.

Tsung-Hua is six or seven miles north of the great wall about 100 miles from Pekin.

## ARIZONA NEWS!

Miner is Arrested for Starting Forest Fire.

A Phoenix Saloon Keeper Shoots Mining Prospector.

Four Men Shot and Stabbed in a Row in Helvia.

MONEY PLENTIFUL IN NEW YORK.

Tucson, Ariz., June 12.—Thomas Lewis, a miner, has been arrested on the charge of setting fire to the Catalina forests, where 50,000,000 feet of timber was destroyed. A miner who was with Lewis, claims that Lewis became incensed because the pine needles hurt his feet and set fire to them, causing one of the most disastrous forest fires ever known in the southwest.

Four Men Shot and Stabbed. Helvia, Ariz., June 12.—A miner named White broke up a card game in a saloon here, where Mexicans were playing, and fighting commenced. White was stabbed twice in the back of the head. The Mexicans then opened fire with pistols. Tom Wayland, proprietor of the saloon, received a scalp wound. One Mexican was fatally shot in the stomach and another had his arm shattered.

Prospector Shot. Phoenix, Ariz., June 12.—William Connel, prospector, was fatally shot by E. H. Gibson, proprietor of a saloon at the Hot Springs, north of Phoenix. Connel, who was intoxicated, had threatened to kill Gibson.

Money Plentiful in New York. New York, June 12.—Secretary Gage was asked, says a Washington special to the Herald, if he would continue withdrawing government funds from the national depository and if this action meant that the money stringency had disappeared.

"These funds," said he, "will be withdrawn in proportion to the amounts deposited until \$25,000,000 has been turned into the treasury for the purpose of paying for two per cent bonds which will be redeemed shortly."

"Yes, this is a sign that the money stringency has disappeared but a still better one is the fact that money is plentiful in New York at 1 and 2 per cent."

British Loss. London, June 12.—The following dispatch was received at the war office from Roberts: Katschub, June 12.—In yesterday's engagement Methuen and I killed and captured 18,000 men. Among the latter is Lieut. Corrie, of the 12th battalion of Yeomanry.

June 7th the Derbyshire militia lost 28 killed and 104 wounded, all of whom were in the Yeomanry hospital, which was captured by the Boers and re-taken by Methuen.

Success of Butler. London, June 12.—A dispatch from Joubert's farm under to-day's date announces the continuation of Butler's successful march and the occupation of Valkester without opposition, and the capture of a number of prisoners, while the casualties are reported to have been very heavy.

Request for Taylor. Frankfort, June 12.—Sheriff Suter has gone to Indianapolis with a requisition on Gov. Mount from Gov. Beckham, asking for the extradition of W. S. Taylor, on an indictment charging him with being accessory to the murder of William Goebel.

Byrns in Chicago. Chicago, June 12.—Col. W. J. Byrns, with his wife and children, arrived in Chicago to-day. The party leaves to-night for Milwaukee, Wisconsin, where they will be the guests of Col. M. C. Wetmore.

ICE CREAM SOCIAL. Ladies' Aid Society of the Presbyterian Church Secured a Big Success. The Ladies' Aid society of the Presbyterian church, aided by the Christian Endeavorers, entertained a large crowd of the city's population at the beautiful Robinson park last night, and the affair—an ice cream social—proved to be one of the very nicest ever held in this city. Japanese lanterns hung here and there throughout the park, made the scene a beautiful one indeed, and under these ice cream and cake were served. The social was a great financial success, more than \$100 being netted. The music for the occasion was furnished by the First Regiment band.

CEMENT SIDEWALKS. Architect Rapp anxious to secure the services of James McCorriston. J. H. Rapp, the architect of the territorial capitol—the handsome building dedicated the other day—came in from Santa Fe last night and registered at

Sturges' European. He was met by James McCorriston, Albuquerque's famous cement sidewalk builder, and the two held a conference of an hour, which resulted in Mr. McCorriston leaving this morning for Santa Fe for the purpose of making estimates on cement sidewalks for the capitol grounds. Mr. Rapp accompanied Mr. McCorriston to Santa Fe, and it is understood that he is anxious for the latter to do the cement sidewalk work mentioned above. Mr. McCorriston will return to the city to-night.

HE HOLDS A PROXY. Col. A. W. Harris Will Attend Republican National Convention. Col. A. W. Harris, the mine operator of the Kingston, N. M. district, who enjoyed yesterday in this city, left this morning for the east. He will go direct to Philadelphia, and as he holds the proxy of an alternate delegate from southern New Mexico, expects to be allowed a seat—a prominent one at that—in the republican national convention. After the convention he will visit his old home in Rhode Island, and will return in time to attend the street fair carnival.

BOUND OVER TO THE GRAND JURY. Jose Baca y Simeron Forged Endorsement of Check and Secured the Money. Mrs. Nicolaus Sanchez gave permission to Jose Baca y Simeron to call at the postoffice and get her mail. The man performed his duty, and secured a letter addressed to the woman from her husband. This letter was opened without consent, by Baca, and from it a check calling for \$10 and made out to Mrs. Sanchez was taken. Baca endorsed the check by forging the name of Mrs. Sanchez and had it cashed at a railroad avenue store. When confronted by Mrs. Sanchez, who asked for her letter and check, his answer was evasive, whereupon he was arrested. This afternoon his case was heard by Justice Crawford and after Baca had confessed to the forgery, the justice bound him over to the next grand jury of this county. In default of \$250 bail he was taken to the county jail.

The Proposition Was Never Thought in Doubt During the Day.

THE VOTE BY WARDS.

The result of the election held yesterday in this city, for the purpose of deciding the question whether or not Albuquerque desired to grow and keep pace with other wide-awake and progressive southwestern towns, is told in the following summary:

By reference to the above figures it will be seen that the ward which will receive more actual benefits than the other wards had two men who got hold of wrong ballots and cast their votes against the proposition to issue \$15,000 in bonds to pay the city's half for the construction of a viaduct across the railway tracks on Coal avenue.

In the other wards everything went along smoothly—every person that appeared at the polls were wide-awake, and not a taxpayer picked up the wrong ballot.

It was an election as near unanimous as can be made, without a slush fund, and it is a pity that the town, on yesterday, possessed two non-designated men voted against the proposition.

However, the victory was so complete and overwhelming that the Santa Fe Railway company will have no cause for complaint, and the sooner the company commences to put into execution the extensive improvements contemplated the better will be the feeling among the merchants and people of the city.
