PRETORIA TAKEN!

British Take Possession
of the Capital.

Boer Armies Defending Pre-
toria Driven Back.

Business Men of St. Louis Petition
for Militia to Restore Order.

GREAT RIOTING IN ENGLAND.

London, June 5, 12:47 p. m.—The war
office has issued the following dispatch
from Lord Roberts:
"Pretoria, June 5, 11:40 a. m.—We
are now in possession of Pretoria. Of-
ficial entry will be made this afternoon
at 2 o'clock."

BOERS DEFEATED.

Defenders of Transvaal Capital Driven
from their Trenches.

London, June 5.—The war office
has issued the following dispatch
from Lord Roberts:

815 Miles Spruit, 8:30 p. m., June 4.—

We started this morning at daybreak
and marched about ten miles to the
Miles Spruit, both banks of which were
occupied by the enemy. Henry's and
Ross' mounted infantry, with the West
Somerset, Dorset, Bedford and Sussex
companies of the Transvaal, quickly dis-
mounted them from the south bank, and
pursued them nearly a mile, when they
found themselves under heavy fire
from guns of the Boers placed in a
well-constructed and commanding posi-
tion.

The heavy guns of the naval and royal
artillery, which had purposely been
placed in front of the column, were
hurried to the assistance of the
mounted infantry, supported by Ste-
venson's brigade of Police-Carew's di-
vision, and after a few rounds drove
the enemy from their positions.

The Boers then attempted to turn
our left flank, in which they were again
foiled by the mounted Calcutta infan-
try and the yeomanry, supported by
the Maxwell brigade of Tucker's di-
vision. As, however, they still kept
pressing our left rear, I sent word to
Ian-Hamilton, who was advancing
three miles to our left, to incline to-
wards us and fill up the gap between
the two columns. This finally checked
the enemy, who were driven back to-
ward Pretoria. I hoped that we would
be able to follow them up, but the days
now are very short in this part of the
world; and after nearly two hours'
marching and fighting we had to bi-
vonnack on the ground gained during
the day.

Boer Envoys in Chicago.

Chicago, June 5.—The Boer envoys
arrived here this morning. News of
the fall of the Transvaal capital was
received by them as a calamity. Fish-
er said: "The fight will continue."
Mayor Harrison headed the reception
committee.

Maryland Democrats.

Baltimore, June 5.—The democrats of
Maryland in state convention today
selected delegates to Kansas City, and
adopted a platform which leaves the
delegates uninstructed, but declares
Wm. J. Bryan the choice of the demo-
crats of the state of Maryland.

West River Blockaded.

Vienna, June 5.—Nieuw Presse to-day
says that representatives of the foreign
powers at Peking have requested their
government to assist to a squadron
of foreign warships blockading the Ho
river leading to Peking, as well as
blockading Tien Tsin.

Democratic Convention.

Kansas City, June 5.—Four thousand
Missouri democrats met in a huge tent
at Shelly park to-day at the state con-
vention to name a full state ticket and
adopt the platform. Congressman Wil-
liam S. Cowherd, of Kansas City, was
temporary chairman.

New York Democrats.

New York, June 5.—The democratic
state convention met in the Academy
of Music to-day. Every precaution
was taken by leaders to avoid any ap-
pearance of friction in the proceed-
ings. To this end there had been pre-

pared a resolution providing that all
resolutions offered by any delegate
shall be referred to the committee on
resolutions without debate.
It was apparent that endorsement of
Bryan by instructing the delegates was
decided upon.

Big Republican Gains.

Portland, Oregon, June 5.—Complete
returns from the state indicate the elec-
tion of Wolverson, republican candidate
for supreme court judge, and Bailey,
republican candidate for food and dairy
commissioner, by 8,000 to 10,000 major-
ity. In the first congressional district
Tongue, republican, is elected by 1,500
to 2,000 majority, a gain of from 500
to 1,000 over last election. In the sec-
ond congressional district Moody, re-
publican, is elected by 1,500 to 2,000
majority. Conceding the democratic
claim of the election of the fusion ticket
in Omaha county, the re-
publicans claim that the state legisla-
ture, which will elect a successor to
Senator McBride, will have a republic-
an majority of ten or eleven.

There are 32,000 enumerators at work
this month taking the census of the
United States.

A decrease of 244,000,000 pounds in the
quantity of wool imported into the United States
shows the value of protection to wool
to the American farmer.

Congress will adjourn tomorrow.
Important legislative business will be
attended to by the entire session.
Delegates from all states will arrive here in a
few days.

The total number of compound locomotives
built in the locomotive works of
America is 1396 up to date. Of this
number, 1293 were constructed at the
Baldwin works.

Internal revenue receipts during the
first ten months of this fiscal year were
\$14,187,116, an increase of \$19,390,449
over the corresponding months of the
previous fiscal year.

There were killed 1,958 employees by
railroad accidents in the United States
in 1899, 3,174 were injured. The passen-
gers killed were 221 and 2,945 injured.
The statistics of 1899 are not available.

The number of immigrants into the
United States from 1890 to 1899 was 2,944,692.
The number between 1890 and
1899 was 5,533,728. The immigration from
1890 up to January 1, 1899, was 3,395,846.

Chairman Kerr, of the democratic
congressional committee, says that he
has sent out practically no 16 to 1
speeches this year. There is no de-
mand for such literature, the subject
being a dead one.

While there was a good representation
from Albuquerque at the capital
dedication yesterday, it was nothing
to what it will be at the arena's
tournament in the capital city on the ap-
proaching Fourth of July.

Brig. Gen. Theo. Schwan's report of
the war department shows that most of
the large towns in the Philippines are
garrisoned by American troops. More
trouble is caused there by the Filipino
brigands than from any other cause.

Samoa's trade last year amounted to
about a million dollars, rather more
than half being imports. The bulk of it
was transacted with the Australian
colonies. The share of the United
States amounted to only \$127,000, but
will now rapidly increase.

A census of the American soldiers in
the Philippines will be taken.
Factories will be visited by the regular
enumerators only for the purpose of
taking the census of those living in
them, such as porters, etc. The
Special enumerators will gather the
statistics of factories after July 1.

The republicans of Hawaii have held
a convention and elected a couple of
delegates to the republican national
convention. There are no democrats
or pope of free silver republicans in
the islands so far and probably will not
be for some time to come. In Porto
Rico also a republican party has been
organized and delegates will doubtless
be elected soon.

Records of the postoffice department
show that the amount of mail matter
of all classes in the United States, in
1899, weighed 1,565,665,588 pounds. This
was enough to fill 39,142 cars with
freight. This record was the largest
in the history of the country, and was
due to the remarkable prosperity and
unprecedented business activity now
existing. In the department of the

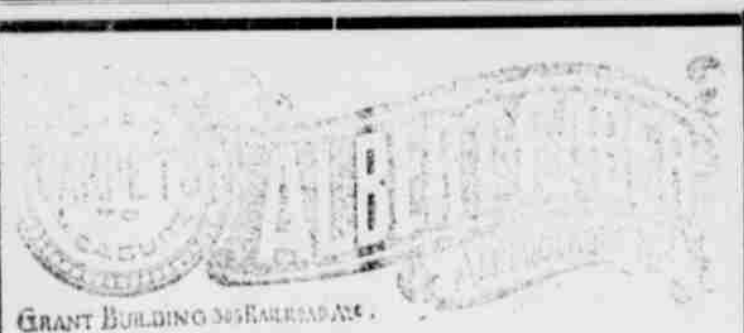
