NO PAPER TO-MORROW.

The Citizen will not be issued to-morrow afternoon and the Journal Democrat will not be issued on Thursday morning. Memorial day is a legal holiday, and the anniversary is a precious one to the printers of this city. Each of the daily newspapers has a special of their best employees to the Spanish war, and they were right at the front in Cuba with Roosevelt.

As a consequence of the building trades strike in Chicago, 12,000 workmen have left the city.

The street railway strike at St. Louis will probably knock out the government appropriation for the proposed Louisiana purchase exposition in 1902.

Notwithstanding the German adverse legislation regarding customs on this country, the sales of goods by the United States to Germany keep on increasing.

It is a matter of vital interest to every property owner in Albuquerque that the Coal Avenue viaduct proposition is carried on June 12.

The Boers face the inevitable with impetuous faces and stout hearts. Their courage and devotion to their institutions have won for them the admiration of the entire civilized world.

The marriage of first cousins is forbidden in Arizona, Arkansas, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Missouri, Montana, Nevada, New Hampshire, North Dakota, Washington and Wyoming.

It is reported that the customs service in Cuba is honeycombed with corruption. If so, the United States will be subjected to the same processes as the postal service has been. That is the American way.

All signs indicate that W. R. Hearst, publisher of the New York Journal, will be nominated for the vice presidency by the democratic party to take the Brown-Hite and bait the national campaign fund.

Lord Roberts has crossed the Vaal river and is in the territory of the south African republic. The prediction that Pretoria will be in the hands of the British by June 12 finds many believers in London.

The count for the census of 1900 will begin in all parts of the United States on June 1 and continue for two weeks, except in the country districts, where additional time will be allowed in consequence of the difficulty to be covered by the enumerators.

The veterans in this city will appropriately observe Memorial day. Business generally will be suspended, and the day given up to honoring the soldiers of the republic who fell in defense of the union of the states.

Probably the deepest mine in the world in actual working is a shaft in the Rosebridge colliery near Wigan, England, which is 2,445 feet deep. The Cornstock mine has been worked at depths of 2,900 and 3,000 feet. A mine in France is said to have reached a depth of over 4,000 feet.

The boom of George H. McLean as Mr. Bryan's running mate is not momentary. As the son of the democratic candidate in 1884, who stood on the platform that the civil war was a failure, Mr. McLean is in well with the idea that the conquest of the Philippines is a mistake.

Strikes have cost the country millions of dollars, and in every instance the loom has been people who had nothing whatever to do with the strike and the working people who gave up their positions to strike. It is time that working people should look at this problem in a common sense way, and govern themselves accordingly.

The democrats urged the war with Spain, and now denounce the government for following the advice of Spain. Now demand a war with England on account of the Boers. If the government was to follow their advice and interfere in the South African war, bringing on a war with Great Britain, which would cost hundreds of thousands of lives and billions of treasure, the democrats would be less than a pennyweight of the government for engaging in the needless contest.

The friends of temperance have struck a hard blow at their own cause by securing a bill to report from the committee on military affairs on the anti-canteen bill, which is designed to abolish the army canteen, despite the fact that army officers assert that it has been the best temperance agent that has ever been brought to bear on the soldiers. The bill reported is known as the Bowersock bill and originally applied to premises used for military purposes. This bill, however, strikes out, making the bill apply to "any premises used or owned by the United States."

The senate committee on public lands has favorably reported a bill to settle the accounts between the United States and the several states relative to the distribution of the proceeds of the public lands, and thus bring to a conclusion several long-contested questions. The bill consists of two parts, the first devoted to the claims of the states for 3 per cent upon the net proceeds of the public lands disposed of by the state land warrants, Indian reservations, and other purposes named, and the second to the advances deposited many years ago with the states out of the proceeds of the public lands. The committee recommends the payment of some \$1,000,000 to the states under the first head and the release of the government's claim for some \$25,000,000 under the second.

CASE REVERSED.  
In the supreme court of the United States yesterday, the case of Deserret vs. Cerrillos Coal Company was reversed and remanded for a new trial. This is one of the cases growing out of the explosion in the White Ash mine several years since. Ralph E. Fletcher, of Las Vegas, was the case for the defendant in the district court at Santa Fe and in the supreme court of the territory. His conduct of the case was such as to elicit the highest praise from the legal profession in New Mexico. He understood the case thoroughly.

B. S. Greeley, a ranchman and stock raiser of Lake Valley, committed suicide by shooting himself through the right side the other day. The coroner's jury declared that Greeley was temporarily insane. The deceased was about 50 years of age and unmarried.

He served one term as commissioner of the territory, and returned to Lake Valley last June from Alaska, where he had gone several years previous. He has brothers and sisters living in New Hampshire and Connecticut, and they have been notified of his death.

PAID FIRE DEPARTMENT.  
Julius Pease, of Denver, Writes an Interesting Letter to Fire Chief Ruppe.  
Denver, Col., May 28.  
B. Ruppe, Fire Chief, Albuquerque, N. M.

Dear Sir:—I notice by The Citizen that you are taking the initiative steps to reorganize the organization of a paid fire department in your city. This is a most important step in the right direction and one that will be appreciated by your citizens generally. No matter how developed, a few weeks time will vindicate your action and satisfy the most skeptical.

We have a number of paid fire departments in our state, whose membership does not exceed ten each, and who are rendering most satisfactory service and who by their good work have been the means of reducing high rates of insurance. I have equipped a number of them with apparatus, fitted up their quarters with swinging harness and trained their horses for fire work, and while so employed have run against the clock and found every citizen takes a very short time to contribute the most vigorous of them, that it is money well spent and that in the end it does not cost as much to maintain a paid fire department as it does to keep up a volunteer organization. Every tax payer pays his portion and your business men will not be asked to contribute to the annual bazaar, tournaments, etc., as is the prevailing custom in all cities having volunteer fire departments. I fully realize that you will have considerable hard work to win out in your undertaking, but you will feel under obligations to me and wonder why they did not make the change sooner.

Last week I closed a contract with La Junta, Colo., for one of our City Service hose wagons, harness and hangers all complete. They expect to arrive here at present time, and will be well satisfied with their investment. If there is anything I can do to assist you, call on me and I will most cheerfully respond and furnish you with any information that may be of service to you in your undertaking.

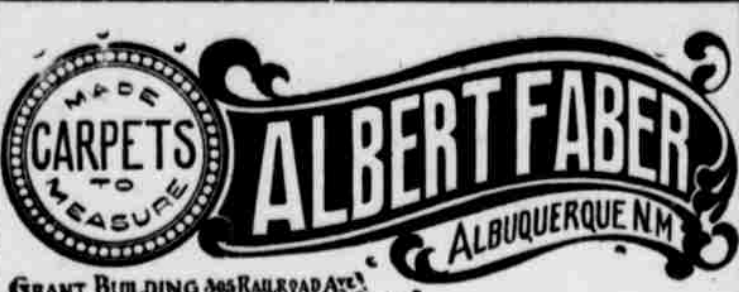
