BULLER'S SUCCESS

He Wins a Victory at Biggarsburg.

Free State Capital Removed to Heilbrun.

The Siege of Mafeking Will be Raised this Week.

SUNDAY BASE BALL GAMES.

London, May 14.—A dispatch received by the Associated Press from Pietermaritzburg, Natal, to-day, brings the first intimation of the success attained by General Buller in his recent campaign. The sender of this dispatch evidently assumes that news of the affair had been received direct from the scene of hostilities, for he merely says: "General Buller's official telegram notifying of his success at Biggarsburg, received here an hour ago, has given keen satisfaction. It is confidently anticipated that Dundee will be occupied by the British to-day. The president of the north country are delighted at the forcing of Biggarsburg means that they speedily will be enabled to return to their homes."

Another dispatch dated Stone Hill Farm, this morning, says: "After four days' march eastwards at the foot of the Biggarsburg ridges, in the direction of Heilbrun, which was occupied by the federal second brigade, General Buller's cavalry broke the Boers' center, and Bethuen's horse advanced on the extreme right. In the direction of Pomeroy, a small party of burghers occupied the ridge overlooking Heilbrun, but did not wait for assault."

Recent British scouting in the direction of Dundee has shown the federal force in great force on Biggarsburg. So, apparently, Buller concluded it necessary to clear the way from his rear before commencing a movement in the direction of Brakenburg range. If that is his plan he possibly divided his force, sending one column eastward to threaten Vryheid and Utrecht, and the other to move on the north, while the west column attempts to form a junction with the forces of Lord Roberts via Harpersburg railroad.

Telegrams from Kromstadt report that great forces of cavalry are keeping in touch with the Boers, but perhaps Lord Roberts will be compelled to order a brief halt of his main body in order to allow his troops to reorganize after the exhausting march of the past week.

All correspondents agree that to all intents and purposes that the Free State have severed their military alliance with the Transvaal, though scattered bodies, they say, possibly may hold out here and there.

A dispatch from Cape Town says that a proclamation will be published this week annexing the Orange Free State. It is also said that General Botha, commander-in-chief of the Boer forces, threatens to resign if any preparations are made for wanton destruction of property.

Cecil Rhodes starts for Biera, Portuguese East Africa, to-day. The war office is reported to have expressed the opinion that news of the raising of the siege of Mafeking may be expected by Wednesday.

Free State Capital.

Kromstadt, May 12.—President Steyn has gone to Heilbrun, which he has declared the new capital. Four hundred burghers have given up their arms. The Transvaal are reported mauling at Vaal. The Standard and Digesters News of Johannesburg shows that dissensions exist in the Transvaal colonies. Railway repairs are progressing rapidly. The town accepts the occupation quietly.

Burglars Taken.

London, May 14.—A dispatch from Rome Hill farm, Natal, to-day, says: "General Buller's advance commenced on Thursday, when he left Ladysmith in strength. Within two miles of Heilbrun the Boers opened a heavy artillery fire. The British guns replied, while a portion of Buller's troops worked round the Boer flank. The British attack was pressed home on Sunday. Bethuen, on the right, outflanked the Boers, whose splendid defensive positions at Biggarsburg were practically taken. General Buller's march, subsequent to the attack, was carried out without a hitch. The British are still pushing on."

BOER PEACE COMMISSIONERS.

St. Louis, May 14.—The executive board of the central trades and labor council of the street railway employees union and building trades council, were suddenly called about noon to meet this evening. This meeting is to be in place of the one called for Wednesday night, when the advisability of ordering a general sympathetic strike of all union labor in St. Louis was to have been considered. The strike leaders will not say why they they decided to call the earlier meeting, but it is intimated that Governor Taylor's action in ordering the enrollment of 2,500 special policemen, precipitated it.

The advertisement of Chief of Police Campbell for 2,500 men to serve as emergency policemen, is not mentioned with a hearty response. At 11 o'clock less than 200 men are waiting to be sworn in.

Taylor in Indiana.

Indianapolis, May 14.—W. S. Taylor, republican governor of Kentucky, arrived here to-day. "Will you go back to Kentucky if the decision of the United States court is against you?" he was asked. "I hardly think it would be the proper thing for me to do," replied Taylor, "yet my mind is not fully made up."

Filipino Incendiaries.

Manila, May 14.—Seven Filipinos attempted to burn a quantity of hay stored near the quartermaster's storehouse on the river front. The guards killed one and wounded another.

Boer Peace Delegates.

New York, May 14.—The Boer peace delegation is due to arrive here on the steamship Maasdam. A committee representing the city went down the bay on a revenue cutter to meet the visitors.

Devey at Knoxville.

Knoxville, Tenn., May 14.—Admiral and Mrs. Devey appeared in a grand parade in this city to-day. When Mayor H. O. Heikel extended to the admiral the duties of empire, and the admiral's reply was brief.

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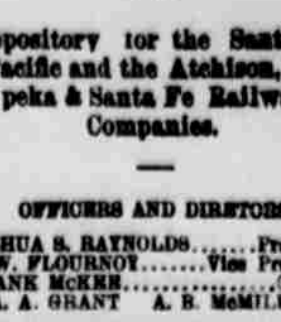
