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### BRITISH SUCCESS!

#### Sharp Fighting in Progress Daily.

Boers Driven from Point to Point.

British Army Within Twenty Miles of Free State Headquarters.

**BIG FIGHT PREDICTED.**

London, May 11.—Lord Roberts telegraphs from Mafeking, May 10, evening, as follows: "We had a successful day, and have driven the enemy from point to point. French, with Porter's and Dickinson's brigades of cavalry and Hutton's mounted infantry, crossed the Zand at Vermeulen's kraal then worked around in a northerly direction to Mafeking, but were opposed continuously by the enemy. Porter's division and Gordon's cavalry brigade, augmented by "J" battery of the Royal Horse artillery, and by Henry's and Ross' mounted infantry, crossed the river by a drift near the railway bridge. My quarters accompanied this force. With the infantry portion we are eight miles north of the river. The cavalry and mounted infantry are at Vermeulen's road station and Tucker's division is at Deffontfontein. Jan Hamilton's forces and Headwood's cavalry brigade are making for the cross roads near Vanterburg when I last heard from them. "Hamilton's column met with stubborn resistance and Smith-Dorrien's brigade was engaged some hours in protecting the rear and flank of this force. "The only casualties reported at present are:—Rank and file, four; wounded, five. No returns have as yet been received from the cavalry nor from Hamilton's forces."

### PRIZE FIGHT!

#### Jeffries and Corbett Fight To-Night.

Senator Hanna Makes a Statement.

Notorious Mrs. Craven of San Francisco Indicted for Perjury.

CLARK WILL NOT RESIGN.

New York, May 11.—Jeffries and Corbett, who are to meet at the Seaside Sporting club, Coney Island, to-night, to contest for the heavy-weight pugilistic championship and sixty per cent of the receipts, the winner to have seventy-five per cent of that, which will not be far from \$20,000, left their training quarters early to-day for hotels close to the scene of the conflict. Both men seemed to be in the best of physical condition possible, and both professed the utmost confidence of winning.

The fight will begin at 10 o'clock. Jeffries is nine years younger than Corbett. He will go into the ring weighing 210 pounds; Corbett's weight, 185. Corbett and his adherents count upon superior skill, agility and ring generalship to overcome the seeming advantage of the present holder of the championship honors. In betting the odds are 2 to 1 on Jeffries.

On approaching the principal town, Palanan, the insurgent trenches appeared occupied and the gunboat Helena bombarded them vigorously, after which three companies were landed and took the trenches with little resistance. One of the Filipinos was killed. Two or three hundred insurgents took neighboring towns, and the natives appear unfriendly.

### BRITISH VICTORY.

Immense English Army Press the Boers on All Sides.

London, May 11.—A dispatch from Lord Roberts, dated May 10, describing a fully successful day's operations says: "General Hamilton's forces had on two previous days ascertained the Boers' position and strength. Wednesday night the Cheshire regiment crossed the river and entrenched themselves, prepared to hold the passage for the regiment following. At daybreak on Thursday the main body of the British army crossed the river and the mounted infantry was then in action, driving off the advance of the Boers, preparatory to a general forward movement. The Boer right flank gave way, but Tucker and Hamilton had a tough task on the left. The Boers had six guns, and served them well, working with great determination, but the British worked up closer and closer, and guns were fired incessantly. The East Lancashire and Sussex regiments by 11 o'clock had worked well to the front. The order was given, and like a flash the two regiments sprang forward simultaneously and in a few moments secured the two commanding ridges. The advanced line was now within twelve hundred yards of the Boers' main trench, and the latter were already losing heart from the demonstration on their flank, but kept up a rapid, though wild, fire. At this moment the final charge was ordered and away went the Lancashire and Sussex regiments again, and the Boers bolted and the rout of the Boers along their whole line was then completed."

### BIG FIGHT PREDICTED.

British Army Within Striking Distance of Free State Capital.

London, May 11.—So quickly has Lord Roberts advanced that his cavalry is only twenty-two miles from Kroonstad, while his main army is only eleven miles behind them. Hence, in about a day, the British will be within striking distance of the Orange Free State headquarters. The presence of 10,000 Boers in the neighborhood of Thabana Chu in the mountains is being a line of twenty miles north to southeast of Thabana Chu. The Boer patrol was sighted Thursday. ### FIRE FIENDS AT WORK.

They Attempt to Put Out the Lights of La Bandera de Americana.

**NO INSURANCE ON OUTFIT.**

Another fire in Albuquerque and this time another "mystery."

Last night, at 11:45 o'clock, three shots fired in rapid succession, startled the people residing in the vicinity of Copeland avenue and Fifth street from their slumbers, and those who looked out of windows soon thereafter saw a little girl (Miss Anna) in her night gown running East on Railroad avenue yelling, at the top of her voice: "Fire! Fire! Fire! Oh, please turn on the alarm."

Just then several gallant young men, who were out calling, promptly appeared to the little girl's rescue, and broke the midnight air by yelling "Fire," and stated that an alarm had been sent in.

By this time the dials of all regular fire alarm boxes in the city showed 12 o'clock, midnight, and just then the Scott Moore hose company, with Foreman H. Scott Knight, came dashing west along Railroad avenue. A few minutes later the No. 2 hose company and then the Hook and Ladder company appeared on the scene, but their services were not needed, for the Scott Moore hose company had unreeled at the corner of Railroad avenue and Fourth street, had connected with the corner plug, and was vigorously drenching the little frame building, No. 466, with a powerful stream of water. Soon thereafter the announcement was made, "Fire out," and Chief Ruppe called off his fire-fighters.

The Citizen representative investigated this morning, and is free to state that the fire is no mystery—it was the work of some enemy of the editor and proprietor of the Spanish weekly newspaper known as "La Bandera de Americana," published at the place. W. H. Stevens, wife and Miss Anna occupy the little cottage on the east side of No. 466, and Mrs. Stevens, who was residing from sickness last night, positively declares that she heard footsteps around the burned building last night, that she heard the matches crack, and soon thereafter saw the blaze of the burning building reflect into her sleeping room adjoining. It was then that Mr. Stevens was aroused, and it was he that fired the first three shots. This morning, with Amado S. de Baca, father-in-law of the editor of La Bandera de Americana, Manuel Salazar y Otero, a visit was made to the building. It is evident that the fire fiends had, by some means, entered the building, for evidences of fire were discovered in several places, and it was their intention to see the building, with its contents, completely consumed, but
