## ON TO PRETORIA!

British Army Pushing  
into Boer Country.

Immense Host Pressing For-  
ward Steadily.

Everything in Readiness for Siege  
of the Transvaal Capital.

BOERS RETREAT TO MOUNTAINS.

London, May 9.—Although the British expected considerable opposition at the difficult climb on the Zeand river, the latest advice from Smaldeal, Orange Free State, indicates that the Boers are not yet ready to make a determined attack to stem Lord Roberts' advance. The latter's front, indeed, is so wide and overwhelming in numbers that it is difficult to see how the Boers can help being ousted out of the Orange valley. The same considerations would probably effect the situation at Kromstad, hence the belief that little real opposition will be encountered south of the Vaal. Repairs of bridges over the Vet river and the Vaal are expected to retard the general march from Smaldeal and Fourteen Streams (three or four days, when General Buller will also be ready. The general idea is that Roberts will direct his efforts on Harrismith in order to get in touch with the Natal army coming through Van Heeren's pass. A dispatch from Maseru, dated May 8, says the Boers deserted both Ladybrand and Franksburg in a panic condition, owing to reports that the British had occupied Zerkal, thus threatening their retreat to the Transvaal.

Boers Retreating.  
Smaldeal, Pa., May 8.—It is reported that the Boers are retreating toward the Vaal, taking up a position at Bostrand, south of Kromstad. A large number of burghers have delivered Maseru and horses to the British. The Boers are in a bitter quarrel between the Free States and the Transvaal, which is likely to end in the speedy surrender of the former. General French has arrived here. To the public.

CONNECTICUT REPUBLICANS.

Favor McKinley and Expansion and Oppose Trusts.

Hartford, Conn., May 9.—The republican state convention reaffirmed the declaration of the St. Louis platform. As to Porto Rico and the Philippines, the platform expresses the belief that "it is the high and sacred duty of the nation to secure to the people of those islands the blessings of liberty, peace and happiness." On trusts the platform says: "So far as those great corporations strive to lessen the cost of production without lowering the standard of wages, to the extent that they may be accompanied with the legitimate interests of the several states should without delay enact such laws as may be necessary to protect stockholders against fraud, laborers against injustice, and consumers against extortion."

BRYAN POPULISTS.

Great Gathering of Long Whiskered Calamity Waiters.

St. Louis, Pa., May 9.—At 2:30 p. m. the populist national convention was called to order by United States Senator Butler, chairman of the national committee. A great tent, which has a seating capacity of 8,000, was comfortably filled. Governor Andrew E. Lee welcomed the delegates in behalf of the city and state. Secretary Edgerton, of the national committee, read the call of the convention, after which Chairman Butler delivered an address. ## ST. LOUIS STRIKE!

All Street Car Lines  
Tied Up.

Republican State Convention  
at Peoria, Ill.

Several Men Injured in a Labor Riot  
in Pennsylvania.

SMALL TOWN BURNED.

St. Louis, May 9.—Every street railway line in St. Louis county is tied up this morning. General Manager George W. Baumhoff, of the St. Louis Transit company, which operates all lines in the city except the Suburban, has announced that no attempt will be made to run cars today, unless ample police protection is afforded. Baumhoff says the company has plenty of men, willing to take out the cars, but does not feel it will be right to risk their lives while the present condition of lawlessness continues. Chief of Police Campbell declares that the force under him is too small to handle the situation properly, but if the companies would send one main line to operate he would see that the cars were run without molestation.

Workmen Injured.  
While engaged in demolishing the old Grunfeld building this afternoon, four men were hurt by part of the structure falling on them. Ed Gerber, for W. W. Strong, the contractor, was bruised and cut on the arms; Polly Lawson, a carpenter, was struck by an iron column on the side and considerably bruised. He also received a cut on the head, which bled freely, and his left thumb was knocked out of joint. Two Mexican laborers were cut about the faces and arms, and all the men were much jaded by the fall. There have been several narrow escapes from serious accidents during the week.

Great is "Quo Vadis."

George K. Neher, the proprietor of the new theater, has heard from Chas. Riggs, manager of the house. Mr. Riggs has sent to Mr. Neher views of three scenes in the great play, namely: "Exterior of Nero's Palace," "The Burning of Rome," and "The Exterior of the Coliseum at Rome." Mr. Neher, who is interested, expects to have the "Quo Vadis" company before an Albuquerque audience in a short time.

ILLINOIS REPUBLICANS.

Big State Convention is in Session at Peoria.

Peoria, Ill., May 9.—Chairman Dawes called the republican state convention to order this morning. The committee on credentials reported in favor of seating the majority of the contesting Caucus delegates. The report was adopted. Chairman Pifer made an eloquent speech extolling the McKinley administration and appealing to the republicans of Illinois to act in harmony. Congressman Hopkins read the report of the resolutions committee. They reaffirm the principles of the national platform of 1896, and congratulate the country upon the enactment into law of a currency bill which provides the gold standard as the monetary unit of value. Pifer's allegiance to the policy respecting new possessions "formulated and carried out by the present administration," and "favor such legislation as will destroy all unlawful combinations of capital for the purpose of limiting the production or increasing the price of manufactured products."

This is the season when cold supper or lunches are in demand. Our Senator Butler announced the following temporary offices: Chairman, P. M. Ringold, of Minnesota; secretary, R. L. Bray, of Oklahoma; assistant secretary, Lee Vincent, of Colorado, and Eugene Smith, of Illinois. The Nebraska delegation to-day decided against the nomination by the populists of a vice president, and support the proposition for a committee on conference, instructed to accept the best man offered for the place by the democratic convention at Kansas City. Other delegations with this position are those of Colorado, Iowa, Indiana, Wisconsin, Idaho, New York and West Virginia. General Weaver claims that the action of the Nebraska delegation will have the effect of preventing a nomination, but the friends of Towne and other aspirants do not by any means concede this. The Minnesota delegation voted to place Towne in nomination.

HOLD A CONFERENCE.

President McKinley and Governor Roosevelt Have a Chat.

Washington, May 9.—Governor Roosevelt was with the president about half an hour this morning. On leaving the white house Governor Roosevelt said that he really had nothing to communicate and courteously declined to be interviewed. Later, however, a close friend of the governor and also of the president, stated that the president and members of the administration generally are in full harmony with the governor's purpose not to allow his name to be used in connection with the republican vice presidential nomination. They were convinced that he could do the party greater service as a candidate for reelection as governor of New York than as a candidate for the vice presidency.

## THE POPULISTS!

They Gather in Force  
at Cincinnati.

Appeal of Netherlands for  
Peace in Africa.

Accused Murderer of Goebel of Kentucky Surrenders Himself.

DEWEY AT NASHVILLE.

Cincinnati, May 9.—At Robinson's opera house, at 1 o'clock this afternoon, the banner of the anti-fusion element of the people's party, otherwise known as middle-roads, was nailed to the masthead. Nearly seven hundred delegates were present, representing every state excepting Arizona, New Mexico, North Carolina, South Carolina and Vermont. Across the footlights hung a banner bearing the alleged remarks of the fusionist at Lincoln, Nebraska, February 19, when the populist elements celebrated: "We have thrown them over the transom," supplemented with the reply, "You have thrown the party with us." Chairman Clem Deaver, of Nebraska, called the convention to order and made a lengthy speech. He was wildly cheered.

Former Congressman M. W. Howard, of Alabama, was introduced as temporary chairman. Howard delivered an eloquent address and aroused the delegates to continued outbursts of applause. Chairman Howard appointed a committee on credentials which immediately retired. The convention then resolved itself into an experience meeting for the interchange of views on the work of the delegates.

Accused Murderer Surrenders.

London, Ky., May 9.—Jim Howard, accused of firing the shot that killed William Goebel, came in this morning from his home in Clay county, and took the train for Frankfort to surrender himself to the authorities. Howard says he will have no trouble in proving his innocence.

Dewey at Nashville.

Memphis, Tenn., May 9.—Admiral and Mrs. Dewey started this morning on their journey to Nashville. The admiral expressed his gratification at his reception in the south.

Appeal for Peace.

The Hague, May 9.—The Netherlands Grand society has addressed an appeal to President McKinley, begging him to further the peace object of the Boer mission, investigate their case, bring about arbitration and put a stop to the pernicious war in South Africa.
