## KRUGER TALKS!

Opening of the Transvaal Legislation.

Boer Force is Increased Around Mafeking.

British Army Steadily Advancing Towards the Transvaal Capital.

BIG BATTLE IS IMMINENT.

Pretoria, May 8.—The official closing of the 1899 vanguard, which broke up unofficially in September last, took place to-day, and the session of 1900 was graduated. All delegates and foreign attaches were present. President Kruger in a speech opened the session, and said he was profoundly struck with the proof of sincere friendship given by the people of the Free State, who had fulfilled their obligations to the Transvaal under the treaty. He had implicit confidence in the future of the Afrikaander nation. As to the peace propositions presented by both republics to Lord Salisbury, Kruger said: "We proved by our legislation and our dealings with Britain last year that it was our desire to preserve peace, and now that war has broken out we will do everything to restore peace. Notwithstanding the difficult circumstances, I am glad to say our finances will enable us to bear the great expense of the war and that our mines are flourishing." Kruger invoked the blessing and help of the Almighty. Fifty out of a total of sixty legislators were present, several still suffering from wounds.

Increased Boer Force.  
Lorenzo Marques, May 6.—A dispatch from General Buller's camp bearing date of April 28, states that the Boers around Mafeking are gradually being reinforced, and their strength is estimated at 3,000. Buller succeeded in communicating with Mafeking by means of carrier pigeons, and is endeavoring to communicate with the southern relief columns.

Dispatch from Lord Roberts.  
London, May 8.—The following dispatch from Lord Roberts was received by the war office:  
"Bulwer, May 8.—The railway from Brandfort to this place has been considerably damaged, and the bridge over the Vet river helplessly damaged. This delays supplies coming up. Every few yards charges of rickety carts have been laid under the rails. This might have cost lives, but was fortunately discovered by a West Australian infantryman. Winburg is occupied by the Highland brigade."

In spite of the wrecked railroad the British advance goes steadily on. Roberts' outposts are apparently about twelve miles north of Mafeking. General Buller joined General Buller at Thabana Chu, whence they are moving forward.  
A dispatch from Cape Town says: "Lord Roberts' phenomenal advance is utterly demoralizing the Boers and striking terror in the rebel colonies. The relief of Mafeking is expected at any moment."

Strike Declared Off.  
Atlanta, Ga., May 8.—President Powell, of the Order of Railway Telegraphers, has issued an order formally discontinuing the strike of the Southern railway telegraphers. The boycott on the Southern will be continued.

Arizona Indian Ruins to be Despoiled.

Mount Versuvius in State of Eruption.

St. Louis Street Car Lines Tied Up by a Strike.

PROPOSED PRESBYTERIAN CREED.

Chicago, Ill., May 8.—Ruins of the dwellings of the Hopi Indians of northern Arizona and various other tribes of Indians of the western states will be searched in the next two months by two experienced parties to secure additional collections for the anthropological department of the Field Columbian museum. Two assistants of that department left on Saturday for Arizona to be gone six months. The work in Arizona will be carried on by C. L. Owen and J. A. Burd, assistants of the anthropological department, who left for Arizona on Saturday.

Street Car Strike.  
St. Louis, Mo., May 8.—With the exception of a few cars run by non-union men, all the street cars of the St. Louis Transit company are tied up this morning, in consequence of a strike of the employees. At several points along the Park avenue division, crowds of three and four hundred men and women were seen. The police were called to disperse the crowds. It is said that 2,300 of the 2,600 men employed by the company are out. The suburban line, the only one in the city not part of the extensive St. Louis Transit company's system, ran cars for several hours this morning, but later was compelled to shut down as the men were pulled off of the cars by the strikers.

Hotel Burned.  
Geneva, N. Y., May 8.—The American hotel burned early today. The hotel of Lafayette Carney and Sherman, located on the corner of Broadway and Broadway, was destroyed. The hotel was a fine building, and was one of the best in the city. The fire broke out at 11 o'clock, and the hotel was completely destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$100,000.

Presbyterian Strike.  
Washington, D. C., May 8.—By a vote of 25 to 15 the Presbytery of Washington City, has decided to send to the approaching general assembly an overture by Rev. T. S. Ham, requesting that body to take steps to prepare a brief evangelized creed to be submitted to the church for adoption as part of its constitution.

Rescued at Sea.  
Philadelphia, May 8.—A dispatch from New Orleans reports the arrival of the steamer El Paso from New York with the second officer and four members of the crew of the steamer Virginia, which went to pieces on Diamond Shoals, Va., several days ago. They were taken from a leaking yawl boat.

Mount Versuvius in Eruption.  
Rome, May 8.—Mount Versuvius has been in a state of eruption the past three days. Explosions within the crater throw lava and masses of rock to a great height.

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## THE POPULISTS!

Kicker Crowd Meeting at Cincinnati.

Three Americans Killed by Filipino Insurgents.

Eight Receptions to Admiral Dewey To-day in Memphis.

BAVARIAN KING NEAR DEATH.

Cincinnati, Ohio, May 8.—The national convention of the middle-of-the-road populists will open here on Wednesday afternoon. Wharton Barker and Ignatius Donnelly are both on the ground. The Texas delegation of over fifty arrived to-day. This gives rise to predictions on the part of J. A. Parker, secretary of the national committee, that no less than 600 delegates will attend. The general feeling seems to be that the initiative and referendum ticket of Barker and Donnelly, selected two years ago, should be ratified now. It is believed that the Omaha platform will be endorsed practically verbatim, with a few additional planks on new issues.

Dispatch from MacArthur.  
Washington, May 8.—The war department has received the following telegram:  
"Manila, May 8.—General Pantaleon Garcia, a prominent insurgent officer of the northern province, was captured yesterday with some valuable documents by Funston's troops. Records capture important. MacArthur."

Receptions to Dewey.  
Memphis, Tenn., May 8.—Eight receptions in honor of Admiral Dewey had been arranged for to-day. The admiral, fearing to overtax his strength requested the committee to eliminate the receptions during the afternoon. His wishes were complied with. A reception lasting an hour was held at the Cotton Exchange this morning.

Three Americans Killed.  
Manila, May 8.—A force of rebels on May 3 attacked twenty men of company I of the Fourth United States, stationed at Barotac, Iloilo, island of Panay. Three Americans were killed and seven were wounded.

Expected to Die.  
Berlin, May 8.—The health of King Otto of Bavaria is completely broken and he is expected to die soon.
