BRITISH VICTORY!

Boer Army Retreats from Brandfort.

Brandfort Key to the Moun- tain Passes.

Natives of African Gold Coast Cau- sing British Trouble.

BOERS TREKKING NORTHWARD.

London, May 4.—Lord Roberts reports to the war office under date of Bloemfontein, May 2: "We occupied Brandfort to-day without much opposition and without, I hope, many casualties. The first brigade mounted infantry covered the left flank of the fourteenth brigade of the seventh division, and the right flank was supported by the fifteenth brigade. The Boer division advanced directly on Brandfort, the Boer army, under command of Delany, retired in a northerly direction.

Boers Retire Northward.
Thabon Chu, May 4.—The Boers who evacuated Thabon Chu hill are believed to be still trekking, though one gun shelled the camp yesterday. Scouts report that some of the Boers retired to Wepener. They believe the Boers evacuated their position during the night, trekking northward in three directions. General French left to-day. General Buller is in command here. It is expected that General Buller will effect a junction at any moment.

Important Strategic Point.
London, May 4.—News of the occupation of Brandfort was issued by the war office at 10 o'clock this morning, confirming a dispatch previously received by the Associated Press. This is considered the most important communication received from the front since the capture of General Cronje and the relief of Ladysmith. The position gives the key to one of the main roads leading to Drakenberg passes, which possibly may be the means of co-operation with General Buller later on, and provides an advance base of supplies, etc., and at the same time menaces the Boers now southwest of Bloemfontein.

Natives Causing Trouble.
Accra, British Gold Coast Colony, May 4.—Sir Frederick Mitchell Hodgson, governor of the colony, is still at Kumasi. His personal danger probably has been minimized by diplomatic means. The telegraphic superintendent was wounded after repairing the line to a point within the territory of the Kumaon, and communication is again stopped. More raiding in various parts of the colony is reported.

Reason for Victory.
Washington, May 4.—The president gives insufficiency of water on the Navajo reservation as his reason for vetoing the bill allowing mineral prospectors on the reservation.

Boers Captured.
Alwal North, May 4.—Smithfield was occupied yesterday by General Buller's brigade. Out of 150 Boers in the town 25 were captured and the rest fled. Ladybrand was recently full of Boer wounded who now have been removed to Frickburg.

Boatlift Nominations.
Chicago, May 4.—Henry E. Boutelle was today by acclamation nominated to represent the Sixth congressional district in congress.

WE WILL HANG!

Ruiz, the Murderer, to Swing into Eternity.

His Earthly Career Will End on June 1.

Judgment of Lower Court Confirmed by Supreme Court.

HE MURDERED PATRICIO O'BANNON.

At the session of the territorial supreme court in Santa Fe yesterday, Jose P. Ruiz, whose appeal to the supreme court was affirmed by that court entering a judgment that the defendant be hanged on the first day of June, 1900, was convicted in the district court in Bernalillo county on the 20th of October, 1898, under an indictment returned by the grand jury on October 8 of the same year, charging him with having murdered little Patricia O'Bannon in the month of May, 1898. The facts in the case, which were printed in detail in The Citizen at the time of the horrible tragedy, are briefly related in the following:

Jose P. Ruiz was engaged in the cattle industry on the ranges of this city, and came to Albuquerque with a companion for the purpose of disposing of a bunch of cattle. When he had received the money he and his companion started out to enjoy themselves and have a generally good time. They indulged freely and after drinking and carousing around at the various resorts in old town all of one night they found up at the saloons of the south-east part of this city at noon the next day. At about 5 o'clock in the evening they started south through Bernalillo for their ranches. While passing through that settlement, riding their ponies in a drunken and reckless manner, Ruiz flourished and leveled his revolver at several persons along the road, and at the head near the bridge, he again leveled his pistol and fired into a group of three innocent little children, aged from 5 to 9 years, who were playing around a pump in O'Bannon's door yard. Two of the children were killed, the first of which pierced the heart of Patricia O'Bannon, whose age was about 3 years, causing the immediate death of the child, and the second child grazed the scalp of another little one.

After the shooting an alarm was given, Sheriff Hubbell was notified and was soon in hot pursuit of the murderer. Ruiz crossed the Bernalillo bridge, changed horses with his companion, threw away his revolver and started west over the sand hills and mesa. The sheriff captured his man, and after trying him securely to the bottom of a wagon, by great luck drove through the angry and infuriated mob, which had assembled in Bernalillo, and landed his prisoner safely behind the bars of the county jail.

Ruiz is a young Mexican, 24 years of age, weighs about 135 pounds, and apparently does not possess a great amount of intelligence. Upon his trial he seemed to have the utmost indifference as to the result of the case, and upon the return of a verdict appeared not much perturbed. His attorneys, at the trial, endeavored to introduce testimony to the effect that there was a streak of insanity in the defendant's family, which on account of its remoteness was ruled out by the court. The physicians who testified as experts were unanimous in the opinion that a man could not be so drunk as to be able to ride a horse, take deliberate aim and kill one child and wound another, as Ruiz did, without knowing what he was doing.

The defense was ably represented by Attorney Summers Burkhardt, Judge W. C. Heacock, District Attorney Finckel in the prosecution.

The free home law will help settle up the west.

Congress is disposing of important legislation at a rapid rate.

The letter carriers have adopted their summer schedule, a slouch hat.

It is estimated that the various railway systems of the United States will expend \$50,000,000 this year in new track and improvements.

Wharton Barker is out with a prediction that the middle-of-the-road politicians will take about 2,000,000 votes away from Bryan in November.

The Arizona republicans are having the liveliest sort of a political contest, all over the selection of delegates to the national republican convention.

The word "metemorphosis" has been in the English language, as a new Oxford dictionary will contain the word "metemorphosis."

An American steam laundry is doing business in Shanghai, China, and it would not be out of place for the Chinese of that city to start an agitation against American cheap labor.

The democratic papers of New Mexico are respectfully informed that the newspapers of Albuquerque have treated Mr. Bryan much more harshly than the democratic papers have treated republican leaders.

Captain O. M. Carter, who was convicted of embezzlement of a large sum of money while in the government employ, has at last been landed in the penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kan., and set to work as a bookkeeper.

The New York Herald failed to get the Dewey boom on its feet now abandons the democratic cause entirely and declares for McKinley as the only practicable candidate with whom to beat Bryan and the Chicago platform.

Rajah, slayer of nine men, the giant elephant, died in Kansas City, last week. He was the largest animal in captivity and weighed 3,000 pounds more than the famous Jumbo. He stood thirteen feet high.

The fact that a commercial company has over 100 men employed excavating the cliff dwellers' ruins in northwestern New Mexico, and is carrying away relics found in them, shows that it is time for the government to act if it desires to preserve those ruins to posterity.

The bill designed to give rank as brigadier-general in the regular army to Generals Lee and Wheeler and their retire them will be heartily approved. These two old confederates have done much to reimburse the north and the south and the people of all sections feel grateful. Their public services in military and civil life have been arduous and trying and ought to be recognized.

Rev. Charles M. Sholdon, who recently edited the Topeka Capital for one week, has sailed for England. He will devote two months to speaking and organizing the movement of practical Christianity in the country and will then return to the United States, where he will establish headquarters in some western city and continue the work of speaking and organizing in every state in the union.

The birth rate in the United States is gradually decreasing, this diminution being due to both the white and black races. For the last 100 years this decline has been recorded as having gone on. Official figures show that increase for our total population was 30.08 per cent from 1870 to 1890, 24 per cent from 1890 to 1900, while it is believed that this decade will only show an increase of 18.94 per cent.

The New Mexican says: "It is to be hoped that when the time comes in Bernalillo county will not be stopped altogether. Its construction promised to add considerably to the prosperity of Albuquerque. The completion of extensive irrigation works around the city of Albuquerque would have assured the future and permanency of the city more than the construction of additional railroad shops or a new hotel."

Governor Otero is preparing a call for a convention to meet at Albuquerque on May 15 for the purpose of taking action and sending delegates to Washington to fight the passage of the Stephens bill, now pending in congress. The delegates are to be five from each county, three from each organized municipal government, and two from each organized irrigation company. The official call will be published to-morrow.

There is no need of having hideous things for signs. Signs may be beautiful. In Belgium particularly, a municipal art society has taken hold of the matter and initiated competitions for beautiful signs. They give liberal prizes for the best designs. Sculptors and skilled workmen in iron compete because of the value of prizes and because of their interest in the work and the merchants because of the advertisement which it gives them.

HEALTHY BUSINESS.

The monthly comparative statement of the government receipts and expenditures shows that during April the receipts aggregated \$4,029,328 and the expenditures \$4,093,927, leaving a surplus for the month of \$124,600. The receipts during the month show an increase of \$1,500,000 as compared with April, 1899, and the expenditures a decrease of \$2,000,000. The receipts from the several sources of revenues are given as follows:

Customs \$1,765,037, increase \$1,120,000.
Internal revenue \$2,269,291, increase \$1,490,000.
Miscellaneous \$2,624,017, increase \$900,000.
The total receipts for the ten months of the present fiscal year were \$42,387,062, an increase over the receipts for the same period of last year of more than \$48,290,000. The disbursements last month on account of the war department were \$10,244,871, a decrease of nearly \$5,000,000 over the same period last year; navy \$4,700,678, decrease \$72,000. The disbursements during the last

ten months were \$118,884,000 less than for the same period last year. The United States export nearly \$500,000,000 in meats and livestock, and the account is growing. With the exception of sheep and mutton this country exports more meat than all other lands combined.

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TERRITORIAL SUPREME COURT.

Opinions handed down—Argument of Elephant Butte Dam Case.

The territorial supreme court resumed its sessions at Santa Fe at 10 o'clock Wednesday with Chief Justice Mills presiding and Associate Justices Crumpacker, McFie and Parker present.

Opinions were handed down in the following cases: The Liverpool, London and Globe Insurance Company, plaintiff in error, vs. Martin, Perrin & Co., defendants in error; judgment of lower court in favor of defendants in error affirmed. Opinion by Judge Leonard.

Marcelino Garcia, auditor, plaintiff in error, vs. H. O. Bursum, defendant in error; judgment reversed, with instructions to dismiss petition of relator, H. O. Bursum. Opinion by Judge Crumpacker.

Thomas & Huttbell, appellants, vs. Orange County Fruit Exchange, appellees; judgment of lower court affirmed. Opinion by Chief Justice Mills.

Pueblo of Nambé, et al., appellants, vs. Epimerio Miera, et al., defendants in error; judgment of lower court affirmed. Opinion by Judge Crumpacker.

Thomas F. Conway, administrator, appellants, vs. Emil Conway, by Jacob Schaublin, guardian, appellees; settled and dismissed.

The argument in the case of the United States of America, appellant, vs. the Rio Grande Dam and Irrigation Company, appellee, known as the Elephant Butte dam case, was commenced before Chief Justice Mills and Associate Justice McFie and Crumpacker, Judge Parker being disqualified on account of having heard the case in the lower court, and was in progress at 4 o'clock.

Hon. W. B. Childers, United States attorney, represents the government, and Judge A. B. Fall and John Franklin are the attorneys for the appellee.

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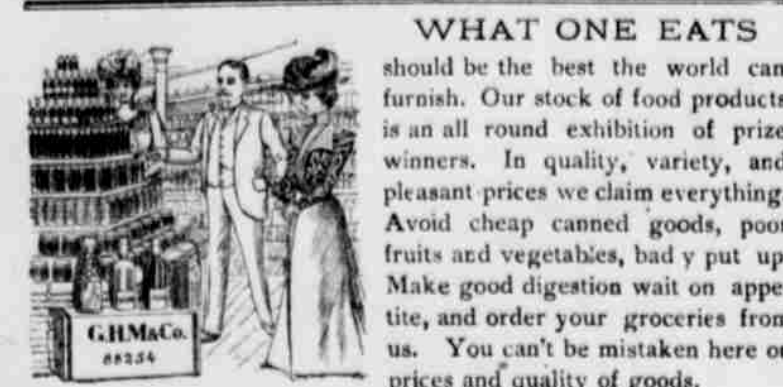

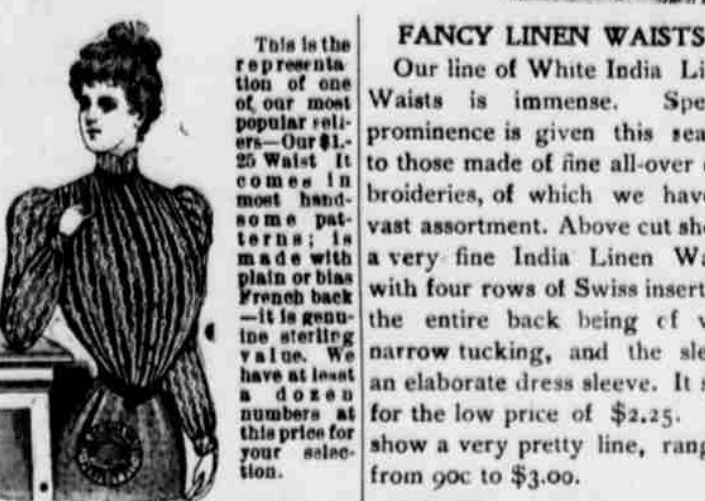
