LIFE ENDED!

Minnie L. Wray Committed Suicide.

She Formerly Resided in this City.

Fatal Accident by Falling Bridge at Paris Exposition.

MEXICO MINE FLOODED.

Chicago, April 29.—Standing before a mirror in the Palmer house, Minnie L. Wray, a beautiful young woman, sent a bullet through her brain. Scarcely a word was uttered in the wake of the tragedy. The woman, who was known to many friends as "Miss L. Gray," she left a note to the manager of the hotel and requested that no effort be made to find her relatives. It was learned that she had sent her trunk to Mr. Ohler, cashier of the American Express company at Moline, Ill. Ohler says that he has known Miss Wray for ten years, but claims that he knew nothing of her antecedents. He says she came to Moline two weeks ago and stopped at the Windsor hotel. She told him she had been living the past two years in California, New Mexico and Arizona. In her purse were found cards of several persons living in Los Angeles, Albuquerque, N. M., Williams, Arizona, and Lincoln, Neb. Geo. H. Wray, a brother of Minnie L. Wray, was unable to advance any explanation for his sister's suicide. She resided here with him until six months ago, when she went to Louisville, Ind., where her parents reside.

Sent to Prison.
New York, April 29.—William F. Miller, manager of Franklin syndicate, recently convicted of grand larceny, was sentenced today to ten years imprisonment. The "Franklin Syndicate" promised to pay ten percent per week on deposits. The total amount secured by the concern was about \$1,000,000.

WAR IN SOUTH AFRICA.

Boers Hold Strong Positions in the Mountain Passes.
London, April 29, 2:30 p. m.—The latest news received from the Orange Free State indicates that though the Boers vacated Thabanku Chu they only have done so in order to occupy stronger positions. On Sunday, General De Wet made an effort to turn French's eastern flank, which was only foiled by the cavalry after vigorous maneuvering. The Boers held the ridges eastward, whence they probably will fall back when the pressure of superior numbers increases. The British casualties during the Thabanku Chu firing were slight. General French's object, now that all chances of catching the main body of burghers has disappeared, is to harass the Boers and prevent any well organized retreat. An agent of Johannesburg, who is making reports, under date of April 12, most cheerfully saying everything was satisfactory. The Boer guns were firing heavily into the town and a determined attack had been repulsed without casualties to the British side.

A conception of the continuous ravages of the war can be gathered from a Cape Town dispatch dated today, briefly announcing the arrival of 25 officers and 252 men, invalided home and sailing on the Aurora for England with four hundred sick and wounded soldiers.

Endeavors are being made to remedy the remount question, a Simia dispatch announcing that five hundred experienced native horse keepers, one hundred and fifty shoemakers and fifty veterinary officers have been drawn from India for service in South Africa.

Heavy Rain in Colorado.
Denver, April 29.—After 26 hours of storm the weather is clearing to-day. The precipitation this month has been over eight inches over the normal and so far this year the precipitation exceeds the entire precipitation last year. The Platte river is higher than for

Shops Employes to be Increased.

Concentration of Work in the Big City.

Territory of Master Mechanic Smith Greatly Increased.

PROCEEDINGS DISTRICT COURT.

Yesterday The Citizen was put into possession of facts to the effect that Albuquerque would receive another haul along the line of prosperity from the Santa Fe Railway company, namely, the concentration of all shop and road work on the Santa Fe road proper from Las Vegas south of the shops of this city.

The news came from a source which could not be denied, but in order to have the report thoroughly substantiated, The Citizen representative called this morning on G. W. Smith, the well-known and popular master mechanic.

After relating to him the substance of the rumor, Mr. Smith promptly confirmed the news as true, and, during the conversation, stated that notices have been issued appointing him master mechanic of the Rio Grande division of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railway, in addition to the shops of all the Santa Fe engines from Las Vegas south.

This means that the Santa Fe Pacific shops at this city are expected to overhaul and keep up the repairs on all engines and cars from Las Vegas to El Paso, and from all lines west of Albuquerque, constituting the Santa Fe Pacific, Southern California and San Francisco & San Joaquin Valley railroads.

Not since the days of one of Albuquerque's pioneers, Mr. Talbot, has been so much business done here. The first car since 1884, arrived yesterday and today the delivery is being made. CASES DISPOSED OF TO-DAY.

Verdict Rendered in Favor of T. F. Robinson for \$1,000—Tannerhill not guilty.

The jury in the case of T. F. Robinson vs. Palestine Insurance company, after having been out from Saturday morning until late last night, returned into court this morning a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$1,000, with interest at 6 per cent from October, 1896.

The plaintiff sued for the payment of \$2,000 insurance on a building burned in Gallup last year. The defendant first set up the claim that the building was burned by the connivance of the plaintiff, but evidence introduced on this point being insufficient to implicate the plaintiff, the court ruled out the testimony. The second point made by the defense was that the building had been vacant for more than 10 days previous to the fire, which the plaintiff answered that the building had not been vacant 10 days, and during the days it had been vacant a watchman had been provided.

The defendant further alleged that the plaintiff failed to furnish within the proper time proof of the fire. The plaintiff introduced testimony to show that the adjuster from the company was in the city a few days after the fire and had been furnished with the required proof. The defendant further set up that the plaintiff had a year previous to the fire been served with notice that the policy on the building had been reduced to three-fourths the amount agreed upon in the original contract. The plaintiff answered that he had received no notice of such change, and if he had received notice, the original contract would not have been affected thereby. The defendant also claimed that the plaintiff, as agent of the company, had misrepresented the value of the building in such a manner as to secure far too high a policy.

The case of the territory vs. W. H. Tannerhill, who conducted a junk shop in Albuquerque, was tried this morning. The defendant was indicted for the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railroad company. The evidence showed that one Charles Field has sold to the defendant a certain amount of broken scrap brass and scrap copper, which was identified by witnesses to have been the property of the Santa Fe Railroad company. The defendant attempted to ship the material to Pueblo, but the shipment was examined by the railroad company, with the result that Field was indicted for larceny and the defendant in this case for receiving the stolen property. All the bridges have been repaired and the trains are enroute. Trains Nos. 3, 1 and 17 will not arrive here until 3:30 o'clock to-morrow morning.

Death of C. H. Henderson.

Last Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock occurred the death of C. H. Henderson at his home on Washington street in the Highland. He came here with his wife in January last from their former residence in Whitewater, Wis., and shortly after their arrival Mr. Henderson became ill and has been in failing health since that time. Being possessed with a great amount of energy he struggled along until last week, when it was known for the first time that his death was only a matter of a short duration and the quiet and patient sufferer was compelled to keep his bed. The deceased was aged 35 years and was a successful business man in Whitewater prior to his journey to New Mexico. The remains were embalmed and will be shipped to Wisconsin on Wednesday night. On Tuesday evening the father, a sister and brother and brother-in-law of the deceased will arrive from the east, and accompanied by the bereaved young widow the family will leave with the mortal remains on Wednesday evening's train.
