FIRING REPORTED!

British Attacked at
Karee Siding.

Uprising of Tribes in Cen-
tral Africa.

America's Demand on Turkish Sul-
tan for Losses in Armenia.

FLOOD AT NEW ORLEANS.

London, April 20.—A dispatch from Bloemfontein, under yesterday's date, says firing is reported in progress south of Karee siding, six miles north of Glen. The strength of the Boers is not known. Turkish infantry, supported by artillery, hold a strong position in a large dam.

Fighting at Karee Siding.
London, April 20.—Reports of the fighting at Karee siding contained in a dispatch from Bloemfontein to-day, may be the first news of the progress of the British advance on Pretoria, but even if this only important skirmish, there are other indications that Lord Roberts has already started for the northern goal.

A dispatch from Cape Town to-day says. Censorship restrictions have been greatly increased owing to the movements of the troops. The Boers south of Bloemfontein are reported retreating, and large numbers were seen on April 19 near Thabon Chu, on the north. Their progress was slow, owing to the terrible condition of the country. By way of Pretoria comes a report that fever is decimating the Mafeking garrison.

Cecil Rhodes returns to Capetown to-morrow. It is learned that he came to England purely on business connected with the British Chartered South African company, and the Delors Line company. He absolutely refused to be interviewed, though privately he expressed warmest comments on several generals still holding commands at the front.

Floods at New Orleans.
New Orleans, April 20.—Rains in this season which began early in the week, still continue. There are now in the city no less than 500 water-bound travelers, who are not only unable to return to their homes, but also do not know when they will be able to leave. Partial reports of the damage incurred in the storm belt have run the figures up into the millions and the losses will foot up an enormous figure.

Uprising of African Tribes.
Lagos, British West Africa, April 20.—Three hundred Nigerian troops have been despatched overland to the Gambia country, in northwest Ashanti, where the British resident reports a recurrence of the trouble which necessitated an expedition last year. One hundred and fifty other troops are proceeding from the Gold Coast. There are unconfirmed rumors here of trouble with the French at Mokoyereh country, in the neighborhood of the Dahomey frontier. Owing to the distance, however, this can hardly be connected with the troubles in Ashanti and Gambia.

Indictments Read.
Frankfort, Ky., April 20.—In the circuit court this morning all the names announced as having been indicted yesterday were read, but the name of Governor Taylor was not mentioned.

Holt in Tennessee.
Nashville, Tenn., April 20.—The Evans men in the republican state convention held this afternoon and will hold a separate convention.

Demand on America.
Constantinople, April 20.—The firm attitude of the United States government regarding the claims of the Americans for losses and massacres in Armenia is entirely approved in political and commercial circles. It is hoped the United States will steadfastly maintain its demands, such course being the only one likely to succeed. It is thought at the powers should follow the same course, not only concerning indemnities, but also with regard

NEGRO HANGED!

Rapist Mobbed in West
Virginia.

Alleged Assassins of Goebel
on Trial.

Heirs to Immense Estate Hold a
Reunion in Texas.

FEARFUL FAMINE IN INDIA.

Bluesfield, W. Va., April 20.—News has reached here that on Wednesday, at Tazewell, twenty miles west of here, John Peters (colored) assaulted Miss Katie Richie, 16 years of age, and escaped. Bloodhounds were used, and he was captured and brought to jail. Shortly after midnight masked men stormed the jail and secured the negro, who confessed a rape was placed around his neck, and he was dragged 200 yards toward the woods. Bullet after bullet was fired into Peters' body while he was being dragged, and before the woods were reached he was dead. The body was then hanged to a tree.

Heirs to Immense Estate.

Houston, Tex., April 20.—If the objects of the organization formed in this city to-day are fully attained, \$200,000 worth of property will be divided among the heirs of Philip Francis Renault, and distributed all over the country. The organization is known as the John and Susan Thorne Renault-Reunion, and is composed of all direct descendants of the couple. The property comprises 16,000 acres of land in Missouri and Illinois on part of which the city of Peoria is situated.

This property, according to the claim of the Renaults, was granted to Philip Francis Renault by the French government. Organization was effected by the election of the oldest member of the family present, L. J. Renault, of Anthony, Texas, president. Peoria, Ill., April 20.—The Renault claim involving land title in the city of Peoria has ceased to interest Peoria, as no dispute. That it can possibly effect the title of real estate is denied by prominent citizens.

Alleged Assassins on Trial.
Frankfort, Ky., April 20.—The commonwealth's attorney in the circuit court this morning asked that Henry R. Youtsey, one of the men indicted as of the principals in the assassination of Governor Goebel, be arraigned immediately. The indictment was read to Youtsey, who pleaded not guilty. The hearing is set for Monday, April 20.

Army Bill.
Washington, April 20.—The senate committee on military affairs today reached an agreement to report a bill for the reorganization of the army with a number of amendments. The bill confers the rank of lieutenant general upon the senior major general and that of major general upon the adjutant general.

Navajo Reservation.

Washington, April 20.—Both houses agreed to conference for adjustment of settlers' claims on the Navajo reservation, permit mining north of thirty-six, thirty-one hundred and eleven longitude west.

Culson Murder Trial.
Frankfort, April 20.—In the Culson murder trial today the defense introduced several witnesses who testified that Scott began the shooting at the Capitol hotel which resulted in his being killed.

They were on their return to this city when, on reaching Flagstaff, Mr. Kermack received a flattering offer from a Cripple Creek, Colo. mining company to represent and prospect for them at Cape Nome, Alaska. The offer was accepted, the backboard and team of horses were sold, and Mr. Kermack left immediately for Cape Nome. Mr. Groenendyke came on to this city, and will remain here for a few days before continuing on to Denver.

In the case of Glotino Serra vs. Lena Maria Serra, the court heard the evidence and granted an absolute divorce to plaintiff, giving him custody of two minor children until further order of the court.

The case of the Merchant's National bank vs. Albuquerque National bank, et al., was dismissed by the plaintiff. In the consolidated opera house case, the court heard testimony as to the value of the special master's services in selling the opera house under order of the court, and made an allowance to the master of \$250 and \$50 to the special master's attorney, saying that the order setting aside the sale made by the master was in no sense upon any ground of conspiracy or fraud in the sale, or misconduct of the master, but that the master had properly performed his duties in the premises.

The case of the territory vs. E. H. Hurd and Miguel C. de Baca is now on trial. B. S. Hodge appearing for the defendants, and E. V. Chavez, with the district attorney, for the plaintiff. The defendants are indicted with assault with intent to kill. May 17th of last year, a fight occurred over sheep pasture, and in it the prosecuting witness received a deep gash with a knife between the shoulder blades which laid him up for many months.

In a short time the Japanese population

Only by constant attention to clean-
liness of all premises can a city be
kept clean.

New Mexico now leads the list of
states and territories with the largest
number of sheep.

The city marshal of Santa Fe must
have a snap. No report is ever made
by him of the amount of fines col-
lected.

Italy must be figuring on taking a
more conspicuous part in the European
concert. She has ordered six big
warships of a new type.

On his deathbed Rev. Gibson con-
fessed a few days ago that he killed
the two young girls in San Francisco,
for which Theodore Darrant was hanged.

The democratic primary elections in
Georgia show an overwhelming senti-
ment for returning to the United
States senate John T. Morgan, who is
an ardent expansionist.

The New York Journal has discov-
ered the villain who put Admiral Dewey
up to running for the democratic
nomination for president. It is needless
to say it was Mark Hanna.

No industry has profited as much
from engineering as mining has with-
in the past few decades. No other
industry has, in fact, made as great a
demand upon the science for aid.

The silver war in circulation in the
United States is \$25,000,000 against \$25,000,000 in 1878. In the light of facts the
"war on silver" exists nowhere and
never did exist. The war was against
a debased dollar of any kind.

The movement for the revision of the
creed of the Presbyterian church has
been reinforced by the aid of Dr. Chas.
H. Parkhurst, of New York, who is
noted at least for the zeal, energy and
force with which he pursues any and
every cause in which he is interested.

Never has the conduct of American
public men been watched with closer
scrutiny than it is to-day. The out-
come of the Roberts case, as well as
that of the Clark case, is an evidence
of the high standard of morals which
the people of this country have set
for their public servants.

Why should the newspapers of Albu-
querque do the work of the city for
nothing? They pay heavy taxes, and
in addition are compelled to work ev-
ery day in the year for the city and
public enterprises? It is little they get
except kicks for such gratuitous ser-
vice.

The dishonest art contractor is not
exclusively American. W. A. Baile-
grohman sends a description to the
London Chronicle of the brown paper-
sided shoes which the British art
contractor supplied the South African
troops, and with it he sent a piece of
a soldier's shoe for inspection.

Greater New York contains 1,720
miles of paved streets. Macadamized
streets have an aggregate length in the
five boroughs of 746 miles; granite
blocks, 329 miles; cobblestones, 233 1/2
miles; asphalt, 234 miles; trap rock,
84 1/2 miles; Belgian blocks, 45 1/2 miles;
brick, 19 miles; gravel, 12 1/2 miles, and
wood only eight-tenths of a mile.

An archaeological discovery of great
interest has been made in Rhodesia, in
South Africa, according to the Engi-
neering Magazine. Gold ornaments
have been found in the ruins of ancient
houses dating back, it is believed, three
thousand years. The ignorant black
population could not have made them.
A photograph of a group of these ob-
jects shows trays, bracelets, beads and
other articles difficult to classify.

According to a Washington dispatch
the rural free delivery system of the
postoffice department has grown to
such proportions that it has been
found necessary to create two new di-
visions to properly handle it. This has
already been decided upon, and the
necessary order will go into effect May
1st. From these reports, it would seem
that free rural delivery for the whole
country is but a question of a short
time, and that all sections will enjoy
its benefits.

While New Mexico is the most ex-
pensive part of the United States in
which to publish newspapers, the rates
for legal advertisements is less than
in many of the states. Everything in
the way of material used in printing
offices must come up hill from San
Francisco or Chicago, and telegraph
tolls here are twenty-five per cent
higher than in the Missouri valley.
With a sparsely settled country and
limited advertising patronage it is a
wonder to the newspaper men them-
selves that such good papers are printed
in this territory.

HEAVY EXPORTS.
The month of February, 1900, has
made the most remarkable record of
any February in the history of foreign
commerce. The exports during that
month have averaged \$5,000,000 for ev-
ery business day in the month, and the
total exports were \$119,766,762, or more

than 25 per cent greater than that of
any preceding February. Not only are
the exports larger than those of any
preceding February, but the excess of
exports over imports is also much
larger than in any preceding February,
surpassing those of 1888 by nearly 25
per cent, and being more than 50 per
cent in excess of that of any earlier
year.

At a meeting of the council last night
the city council rejected the bids of
the daily newspapers for city print-
ing, claiming that they were ex-
cessive. The Citizen bid legal rates,
as did the Journal-Democrat. The Ci-
tizen has never bid less than legal
rates for county or city printing. Last
year this paper made no bid for the
city printing. The Journal-Democrat
took the work at much less than cost. In comparison
with doing work for much less than
nothing, the bids opened last evening
could be considered excessive.

AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE REGENTS.
An Important Meeting Held at Las Cruces
Last Saturday.

From the El Paso Herald.
The board of regents of the New
College of Agriculture and Me-
chanic Arts met Saturday at Las Cruces.
The meeting was a most impor-
tant one. The following members of
the faculty and department heads
were in attendance: Professor
Frederick W. Sanders, Ph. D., presi-
dent; C. T. Hagerty, M. S., professor
of mathematics and astronomy; Arthur
Goss, M. S., A. C., professor of ge-
ology; Frank W. Brady, M. E., pro-
fessor of engineering; Hiram Hadley, A.
M., professor of agriculture and hor-
ticulture; R. L. Larkin, B. S., principal
of preparatory department; Frederick
P. Barker, L. L. B., professor of En-
glish; E. O. Weston, M. S., professor
of botany and geology; Miss Honing,
professor of domestic economy and ma-
jor of the poultry department; not
P. Hare, M. S., assistant in chemistry;
Fahlan Garcia, M. S., assistant in
agriculture; Joseph Bennett, M. S., as-
sistant in botany; Miss Frenger, instruc-
tor in music; Helen McGregor, as-
sistant in mechanical engineering;
Miss Courts and Miss Thornton, as-
sistants in the preparatory depart-
ment; Dr. A. C. Cokerell, station entomologist.
Several changes are contemplated in
the minor details and several positions
will be filled.

Of the faculty the only new member
is Professor Vernon, who takes the
chair of agriculture and horticulture
that has been vacant since the resig-
nation of Professor Kieffer a few
months ago. Professor Vernon is from
the Iowa Agricultural college.

The following resolution was passed:
Resolved, That hereafter no one shall
be elected to the office of secretary and
treasurer of this board, who is not
agreed to accept in full payment of his
salary as such the sum of \$600 per an-
num.

When the college was originally es-
tablished the salary was \$400 per an-
num. It was subsequently raised at
the request of the then incumbent and
has been a source of trouble ever
since.

The committee appointed at the last
meeting to raise funds for the defici-
ency of \$1,000 in the Morrill fund re-
ported that they had succeeded in
raising the amount and had it all either
collected or pledged by responsible par-
ties. The people of New Mexico, when
they fully realized that the money must
be raised or the college would have to
be closed, subscribed liberally. Thus
the college is safe.
