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## BOERS RAIDING!

Orange Free State Being Looted.

British Shell Town of Fourteen Streams.

Boers Amazingly Active in the Vicinity of Bloemfontein.

GEN. ROBERTS SEVERELY CRITICISED.

Maseru, April 7.—The Boers who were massed last week near Ladybrand to the number of 10,000, after seizing Thabane and the Modder river waterworks, broke up into strong divisions, and are now raiding in the south of the Free State, recouping small towns evacuated by the British. The Boer policy seems to be to make rapid movements with little transport, looking to the English farms and stockkeepers for provisions, and cutting communications of the British forces.

General Brabant's colonials are now mostly at Wepener. A squadron of Brabant's horse captured 400 rifles near Wepener. His outposts are reported to be in touch with the Boers and a fight is regarded as imminent.

Persistent reports are being circulated that the Boers are preparing to flank the British position at Wepener and thus secure entrance into Basutoland. Such attempt will be resisted by the Basutoland government, which, it is believed, has made quiet preparations. The approach of armies toward Basutoland produces much excitement among the natives.

## AMAZINGLY ACTIVE.

Boers Swarm About Lord Roberts' Army Near Bloemfontein.

London, April 8.—The amazing activity of the Boers south, east and southwest of Bloemfontein continues, the Boer commands seemingly coming and going throughout the wide region they please, but taking good care not to throw themselves against a strong body of the British. The retirement of the Irish rifles from Rouville to Avil leaves General Brabant without communication with other British forces. He has 2,000 or 3,000 colonials soldiering in a fine defensive county, but is apparently invested as far as London knows. Telegraph and railroad communication with Bloemfontein is kept up as usual, but nothing comes through for public consumption. From the last official news Roberts has 15,000 mounted men altogether. In the Orange Free State the situation is complex with many reports for forming a correct estimate of the situation. Afternoon newspapers criticize the condition of affairs.

## ANTI-ENGLISH MEETING.

Webster Davis Talks for the Boers and Against the English.

Washington, April 8.—Webster Davis, late assistant secretary of state, made a profound and impressive report last night on behalf of the Boer republics. The Grand opera house was packed and thousands turned away. Davis denied that the Boers had violated the red cross or white flag, but declared that the British had done so. He cited many violations of the rules of civilized warfare by the British and said the reason for the war was British greed. Somebody interrupted Davis when speaking of the British control of the mail and cables, saying: "Yes, and they own the administration." Davis replied: "Let the administration alone. It is a patriotic act and will do its duty." The resolutions adopted denounced the British government and its secret allies in this country.

## FLOODS IN TEXAS.

Fifty Lives Lost and Large Amount of Property Destroyed.

Dallas, Texas, April 9.—Reports received at Dallas today from flood sections show conclusively that more than fifty lives have been lost, including those at Austin. Many localities where lives probably were lost are isolated from the railroads and telegraph lines. Most of them are in the Colorado valley south of Austin and Bastrop.

At noon it was reported from La Grange that the river was still rising and menacing more country districts. The stream is now four feet higher than during the great flood last year.

Bastrop is entirely surrounded by water and cut off. The property damage is enormous. Wires in the southern section are in worse condition than ever before. All the wires along the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railroad south of Temple were lost today. Railroad traffic in the southern half of the state is abandoned, and all outlets to southern California are gone because of washouts on the western divisions of the Texas and Pacific.

Austin, April 9.—Reports today from Bastrop, Fayette and Wharton counties on the Colorado river below here are to the effect that the full force of the flood is just being felt there. Water is rising so rapidly that the people are compelled to desert their homes, with all possible speed to protect their lives. Reports have been received from Bastrop that twelve people were drowned there during the night. In Wharton and Fayette counties the situation is even more grave.

The following flood bulletins were received:

Waco, April 9.—The water is receding slowly in the Brazos; weather threatening.

Columbus, April 9.—The flood in the Colorado reached here last night; 25-foot rise; still going up. Lowlands flooded; property damage serious. No loss of life here.

## Blew His Brains Out.

Oakland, Cal., April 9.—Banker H. H. Pitcher, who had charge of the Livermore bank in the capacity of manager and cashier, blew his brains out today. Pitcher was trustee of the estate of the late Thomas Varney, deceased, valued at \$600,000. His trust was being investigated. Pitcher was to produce the books before the court today and testify how he had handled the bank and trust.

## Oppose Leasing.

Denver, April 9.—About 400 Colorado live stockmen assembled here today to take action regarding the proposed leasing of public lands for grazing. It is expected that resolutions in opposition to the leasing will be adopted.

PENSION CLAIM COURT.

What the Members of the Grand Army Want.

Washington, April 8.—A committee of the Grand Army of the Republic, consisting of the commander in chief, A. D. Shaw, and General Daniel Sickles, which is endeavoring to secure legislation looking to the creation of a court of pension appeals, have submitted the proposed measure to some of the most eminent jurists of the country and it has been endorsed by them. The committee also has conferred with the president.
