## BOERS SURPRISED!

### English Force Passage of Orange River.

### Roberts Getting Ready to Attack Pretoria.

### Mafeking Garrison Making Desperate Fight Against Famine.

### BRITISH LOSS AT DREIFONTAIN.

London, March 16.—It is believed that the commander-in-chief of the British forces in South Africa, Lord Roberts, will soon push on to Pretoria, but Great Britain is quite content for a few days to watch the demonstrations by the people of Bloemfontein and the troops to enjoy a few days rest before expecting further success. Lord Roberts in a speech to his guards at Bloemfontein to-day said: "Through a small mistake, I have not been able to march into Bloemfontein at the head of the British army, as I had intended. I promise you, however, that I will lead you into Pretoria."

General Buller is holding Bethulie. The whole line of railroad south of Bloemfontein is now in the hands of General Buller's column. It having crossed the Orange river after a forced march at Alwal North on Sunday, and General Buller's column being across Van Zyl, the three columns will form an army of 12,000 to 15,000 men, which is expected will replace the forces of Lord Roberts at Bloemfontein as he pushes northward. Just where the Boers will attempt to oppose the march is an important question, but cannot be easily answered until General Buller is more definitely located.

Further news has reached the outside world from Mafeking, dated March 9, showing that the garrison is in hard straits and that they were buoyed up by the knowledge that their plucky fight is appreciated at home.

### British at Bloemfontein.

Bloemfontein, March 15.—General Buller is succeeding admirably as governor of the town. He issued a proclamation to-day requesting the burghers within ten miles to deliver up their arms, assuring them that they will be paid for the confiscation of their property. Lord Roberts is about to issue fresh proclamations which it is considered will have the effect of dissuading further opposition of the Free States. Mr. Collings has been appointed landrover, vice Pappasus deposed, and Mr. Prager will act as mayor. Great quantities of stores captured at Waterfall have been recovered. The British secured 25 engines and the railroad line has been cleared to the Kaffir river. Rumors are current that the President Steyn is willing to surrender. Much unrest exists among the Dutch population.

The Free States south of here are reported rapidly retreating at Alwal North when Gen. Buller's troops occupied that place. Commander Oliver apologized for the action of the Boers during the last days' occupation, saying he could not control the men. The British are entrenched on the Free State side of Orange river with the Boers holding the advantage over the hill in front of them. Brabant is greatly hampered, owing to lack of artillery.

### British Loss.

London, March 16.—It was officially announced that the British casualties at Driefontain on March 19, were 62 men killed and 321 wounded, including twelve Canadians.

### SNOW IN NEW YORK.

New York, March 16.—A special to the Journal-Advertiser from Berlin, says: A Constantinople correspondent of the Tagblatt telegraphs the following: During the last five months 100,000 soldiers have been thrown into different departments of Russia, both this side and across the Caspian. Merve, Tashkend and Samarkand are veritable war camps and only the impossibility at the present season of the year of building new barracks or harboring men in tents, has delayed the advance further of troops. Decisive manifestation against England may be expected before long. The correspondent adds under reserve that Russia has actually acquired a harbor on the Persian gulf, outside the straits of Ormuz.

The Munich Neueste Nachrichten affirms that Great Britain has consented to cooperate with Germany for the purpose of upsetting Russian plans in Asia Minor.

### Rebellion in Costa Rica.

New Orleans, March 16.—Advices from Port Limon and Graytown by steamer to-day say that President Iglesias of Costa Rica, has issued a proclamation suspending the constitution of the republic, and declaring himself dictator until after the threatened invasion on the part of Morra occurs or has been abandoned.

### Alleged Assassins.

Louisville, March 16.—Officers started for Frankfort to-day with Secretary of State Powers, Capt. Davis, W. H. Cullen and W. L. Hazlip were arranged before County Judge Moore. Hazlip was released on \$10,000 bond. Judge Moore set the examining trials for Monday.

### Courts at Alwal Investigation.

Washington, March 16.—In the Idaho investigation this afternoon the cross-examination of Special Prosecutor Frank was continued. He said no doubt that some of the imprisoned men were innocent and they were released as soon as facts could be learned.

### SENATE STEERING COMMITTEE.

Washington, March 16.—Reading the Alaska code bill was concluded. Hoar offered the following resolution which was adopted: "That the secretary of war be directed to communicate to the senate the letter of Emilio Aguinaldo, dated at Bacor, July 13, 1898, addressed to the American commander and forwarded to General Merritt July 27, 1898."

Callinger (N. H.) offered a resolution and it was agreed that members of the cabinet be directed to communicate to the senate the number of clerks in their departments, the number of specified posts, and also those who in whole or part are permanently incapacitated.

Hoar renewed his request that the time of vote on the Quay case be fixed for two weeks from next Tuesday. The senate took up the Puerto Rican appropriation bill. Amendments to the order proposed by Hoar.

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### Steering Committee.

Washington, March 16.—Senator Allison, chairman of the republican caucus committee, to-day announced the steering committee on the Puerto Rican legislation, composed of Foraker, Hale, Davis, McMillan, Spooner, Warren and Keam.

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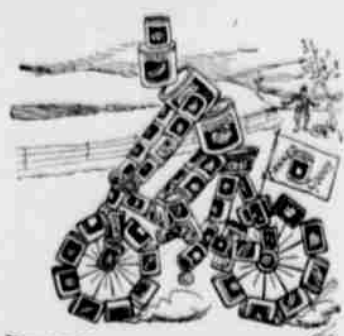
