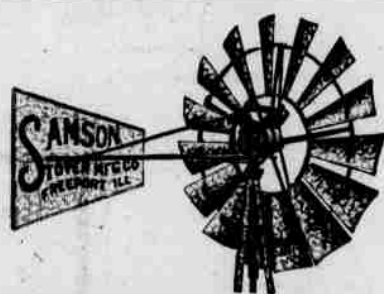

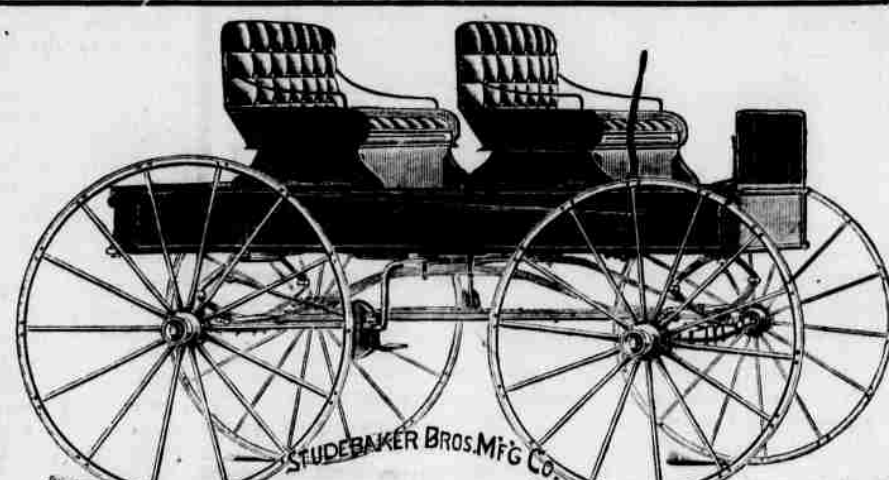

FOREST REGULATIONS.

Objects of the Establishment of Reserves Have Been Posted Throughout New Mexico.

Large cloth posters are being placed on the boundaries of forest reserves in New Mexico and other parts of the United States. There seems to be a notion prevailing among some people in the vicinity of these reserves that the establishment of forest reserves is an imposition upon them. These posters are being put up for the purpose of briefly acquainting any who do not know why forest reserves are established with the reason and briefly describing the benefits of the reserves. The object of the reserves, as stated in the posters is:

"1st. To protect a growth of timber on land which is not fit to grow other kind of crops.
"2d. To keep a growth of vegetation, especially timber on land which would otherwise wash and gully. The timber and other vegetation protects the ground against this washing and thus it does two things: It prevents the rain and snow waters from rushing off as fast as it otherwise would and thus prevents floods. It maintains a pervious layer of earth into which the water can soak and be stirred up for the summer months, when it is needed for irrigation.

"3d. It is for the welfare of the people of this particular region more than that of other localities, that these reserves are created; it is for the settler and homemaker of the adjacent region that the reserves are created and the government spends large sums of money to insure to the home of these homesteaders the benefit of future supplies of timber and water and a protection against flood and drought."

The principal regulations governing forest reserves are as follows:
"1st. Agricultural settlement of any kind and under any claim is forbidden.
"2d. Timber may be obtained under the free use permit which entitles settlers and prospectors to use the timber for their own use only. It may also be purchased but no one is allowed to use the timber without first having obtained permission to do so from the superintendent of the reserve.
"3d. Persons desiring to graze stock on the reserves other than pack, riding or team animals, must apply to the supervisor for permission to do so. A permit is also necessary to take a herd of cattle across the reserve.
"4th. Persons desiring to erect buildings for occupancy for purposes other than mining, must first obtain a permit to do so from either the reserve superintendent or from the secretary of the interior.

"5th. Prospecting and mining is permitted anywhere in the reserve but the taking up of land as mining ground does not entitle the prospector to use the same for any other purpose.
"6th. Rangers and other forest officers are by law made game wardens within the reserve and they are re-

quired to assist in the enforcement of the local laws in the reserve." Attention is also called to the law which relates to forest fires. Persons convicted of maliciously firing the forests of the reserve are liable to a maximum fine of \$5,000 and two years' imprisonment or both, and those who are responsible for fires in the reserve through carelessness, are liable to a maximum fine of \$1,000 and one year's imprisonment or both. The law provides that such fines are to go to the school fund in the county in which the offense is committed.

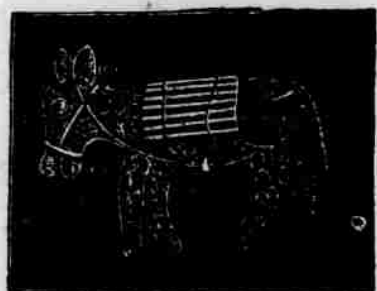

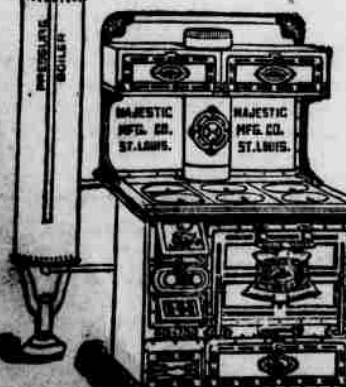
