## SHARP SKIRMISH!

Boers Surprised and Routed by British.

Bill to Disapprove Creation of McKinley County.

House Will Vote on Financial Bill on Tuesday.

DEBS NOMINATED FOR PRESIDENT.

London, Mar. 8.—The following is the text of Lord Roberts' dispatch: "Poplar Grove, Mar. 8.—Two brigades of cavalry, with horse artillery and Kelly-Kenny's division, marched to-day ten miles eastward. "The Boers were quite taken by surprise yesterday. They moved off so hurriedly that they left cooked dinners behind. We captured a Krupp gun, several tents and wagons. The total British casualties were: "Killed—Lieutenants Kowick and Frieslack. "Wounded—Lieutenants Bailey, Twelfth lancers, and De Crispigny, Second Life guards, both severely, and Lieutenant Smith, of the shroveton, who is believed to have been picked up by a Boer ambulance. Two men were killed, forty-six wounded, and one man missing. "Galsore reports that he intends occupying Burgersdorp today. "Repairs to the railroads towards both Stormberg and Steynsburg are being pushed. "Clements now occupies Norvalspont on the south bank of the Orange river. The bridge was blown up March 6th, and the enemy are holding the north bank of the river, but it is not believed in any great strength."

## DEPOT AND HOTEL!

President Ripley Meets the City Council.

Proposition for the Building of Viaduct Submitted.

Location of the Depot, Hotel and Adjoining Park.

SUPERINTENDENT HURLEY INTERVIEWED.

President E. P. Ripley and Division Superintendent J. E. Hurley in their Santa Fe railroad private coaches arrived last night attached to passenger train No. 1 from the north. Upon the arrival of the train Mayor Marron and members of the city council except Alderman McKee and Hoppling, entered the private car of President Ripley and a rather lengthy consultation with that gentleman and the popular division superintendent. No time was lost, and that most important piece of news—the building of the Coal avenue viaduct—occupied the attention of the railroad officials and members of the council. A proposition was suggested by Mayor Marron for the city to pay 25 per cent of the cost of the building of the viaduct, pay for its maintenance, and be responsible for any and all damage suits which might occur. This suggestion did not meet the hearty approval of the president or even Mr. Hurley, and a member of the council then stated that probably the city could afford to pay 50 per cent of the cost of the viaduct structure. President Ripley, knowing the financial condition of the city said he did not expect the city to accomplish its possibilities, and that the 50 per cent proposition was not an unreasonable one and that he would give a definite answer in a few days, possibly a week. Division Superintendent Hurley then stated to the council that he would have the company's viaduct engineer at Las Vegas, E. W. Grant, to come to Albuquerque and make surveys and estimates as to the cost of the construction of the viaduct free of cost to the city. From the consultation, it is apparent that the railway company is ready to erect a viaduct at once on a proposed new depot and hotel, but they are desirous of reaching a satisfactory conclusion regarding the viaduct across Coal avenue. At the present cost of iron the construction of the viaduct was estimated at about \$200,000 and Mr. Ripley stated that he thought the price of iron was now as high as it would go. It was thought if the terms were agreed upon that work on the viaduct could not commence until August at the earliest, and by that time the price of material would be much lower. It was stated by Mr. Hurley that he has assurances from business men, signifying their intention of keeping abreast with the new improvements, and contemplated the erection of handsome business houses in the vicinity of the depot and hotel. Mr. Ripley, realizing this to be one of the most important cities along the Santa Fe system, was confident that the company would not permit their interest to lower but will establish as fine a depot and hotel as any city along the line. When the president, decides on the 50 per cent proposition, the proposal will be submitted to the voters of this city for final action. MR. HURLEY INTERVIEWED. President Ripley, who is accompanied by his brother, J. T. Ripley, Adolphus E. E. Driver, of Chicago, and H. D. Mack, of Rock Island, remained in the city until early this morning and then continued on west to California, leaving his Division Superintendent Hurley, who is spending the day in the territorial metropolis. The citizen representative met Mr. Hurley this morning and the gentleman gave out the following information: "The proposed new depot will occupy the ground by the new used by the press company at the depot and will extend out, as convenient, into the street toward the Army building. The structure will be of modern design and large enough for purposes indicating a city treble the present size of Albuquerque." "Now for the hotel," remarked the reporter. "The hotel which will be constructed by the company should President Ripley accept the proposition of the city council, will occupy the present site of the M. P. Stamm commission house and extend south as far as First street as the Army hall. This piece of ground as designated will be occupied exclusively by a hotel building, and if not better, than any new hotel erected for several years by the company along its line of railroad. From the Army hall, down to Coal avenue, and extending to within a few yards of the main track on the east, the present buildings will be all removed and the ground laid out into a park and sodded or planted in blue-grass." "Will the company provide other quarters for those who now occupy the ground between Gold and Coal avenues?" "No," remarked Mr. Hurley, "if they desire good yard room anywhere else in the yards I think the company can accommodate them, but it is a fact that the hotel, depot and park will occupy all the ground between Gold and Coal avenues on the south and that between First street and the main track on the east." Mr. Hurley also substantiated his remarks made to The Citizen representative on the train coming south recently by stating that the railroad company would transport free from the east all materials and supplies used in the construction of the viaduct, and that Resident Engineer Grant's services, to survey and furnish estimates, will also be given to the city free of cost. Mr. Hurley will go north to Las Vegas this evening. After a New Mexico Office. ## HORRORS OF WAR!

Terrible Plight of People of Mafeking.

British Troops Occupy Town of Molteno.

Gen. Clements' Army Reaches Town of Norvalspont.

GEN. ROBERTS CAPTURES GUNS.

Mafeking, Mar. 8.—What may be termed a malaria has broken out in the women's laager, and dysentery, due to the absence of vegetables, is rife among the garrison. All luxuries are exhausted or commandeered for hospital use, which are filled to overflowing. The children's graveyard, close to the women's laager, grows weekly, as the young lives are cut short prematurely by shill and fever. We look with hope deferred for relief. The natives are in the worst plight. Those unable to obtain work are allowed a small handful of meat daily. From advanced posts the Boers rake the streets and the market square. It is impossible to dodge the bullets. Two hundred and ninety-two persons have been killed, wounded or died of disease. The garrison is so small that it would be criminal to make its weakness public. Boers Not Discouraged. Pretoria, Mar. 8.—Secretary of State Bult has issued a war bulletin saying that the Boers are not discouraged by reverses and will fight to the death. General Dwyer is in command of the Boer north of Mafeking. President Kruger has gone to Bloemfontein, presumably to settle the differences between Transvaalers and Free Staters. Captured a Gun. London, Mar. 8, 12 p. m.—Lord Roberts telegraphs that he captured a Krupp gun and a number of tents and wagons. He also announces that General Clements has occupied Norvalspont. British Occupy Molteno. London, Mar. 8.—A special from Molteno says that the British occupied Burgersdorp, unopposed, last night. Cheer the Queen. Learn to British Council. Bordeaux, Mar. 8.—Yesterday evening a number of students and others, including a pro-Boer meeting, marched to the British consulate and battered down the door and shattered the windows with stones, and then proceeded to the consul's private residence, where they indulged in a similar demonstration. Police dispersed the mob.

Mason's Motion. Washington, Mar. 8.—Mason, of Illinois, moved to discharge the senate committee on foreign relations from further consideration of his resolution introduced on December 6th, expressing sympathy for the Boers. Under the rule the motion went over until tomorrow.

Troops Recalled. New York, Mar. 8.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Instructions have been sent to Major General Miles to return to the United States in May one battalion each of the Fourteenth, Eighteenth, and Twenty-third infantry. The withdrawal of these troops was recommended by General Miles. The three regiments designated will have been two years in the Philippines in June next.

McKinley County. Washington, Mar. 8.—The house committee on territories has introduced a bill to disapprove an act to create the county of McKinley. The county in question was created against the protest of many of the residents of the district from which it was formed, and they seek to have Congress exercise its right to render void the territorial act of which they complain.

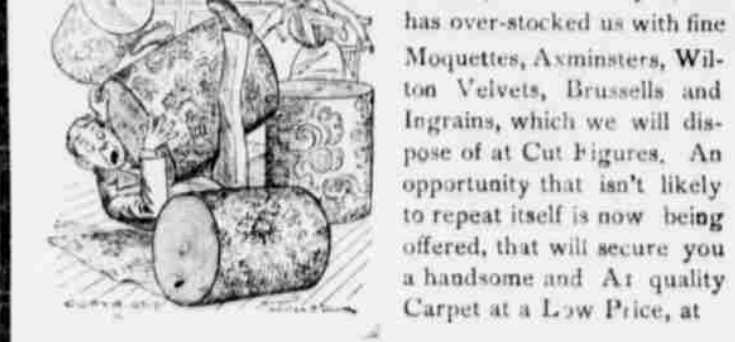

The Rio Grande is dry at El Paso.

New Mexico will have a half million  
of lambs to sell this year.

A woolen factory would be a paying  
proposition in Albuquerque.

It is business for the city to erect  
that viaduct on Coal avenue.

The Santa Fe company employs over  
seven hundred men in the shops in  
this city.

Both political parties in the city  
favor the building of the Coal  
avenue viaduct.

The wool scouring mills in this city  
has forty-five employees on its pay rolls  
and is doing a big business.

Several thousand bills have been in-  
troduced in congress this session and  
not one has yet become a law.

In Great Britain last year there were  
71 strikes, and it was estimated that  
15,000,000 days were lost to workmen.

The city Republican committee will  
hold a meeting this evening, and re-  
quest Republicans to attend and as-  
sist in deliberations.

An appropriation of \$500 for plans  
for a memorial of General Grant at  
Washington has been approved by the  
house military committee.

If the leaders of the Republican party  
in this territory use common sense  
and tact, it will be impossible to get up  
any factional discord in the party.

The citizen has asked about a thou-  
sand dollars worth of new material to  
its job office and bindery and is much  
better prepared to do all kinds of work.

This city will cast at least fourteen  
hundred votes at the election next fall,  
and will have considerable say in the  
selection of county officers.

It is 140 years since Canada passed  
from the French to the British, and the  
two races in the Dominion are no  
nearer assimilation now than they  
were then.

The city of Las Vegas pays nearly  
one-half the taxes collected in San  
Miguel county, Albuquerque pays  
nearly three-fourths of the taxes in  
Bernalillo county.

The Texas Republicans are in a  
hopeless minority and probably always  
will be. The party in that state is  
divided into factions, each trying to  
control the federal patronage.

The Republicans of Indiana are so  
much pleased with the course of Con-  
gressman Crumpacker in opposing the  
Puerto Rican tariff bill that they want  
to make him governor of the state.

The "bloodiest battle of the century"  
was that of Borodino, a Russian vil-  
lage, where Napoleon fought the Rus-  
sians on September 7, 1812. Nearly 80,  
000 men were placed hors d' combat.

The Santa Fe company pays out  
about \$40,000 a month in wages in this  
city, and wants to expend several  
thousand dollars in improvements.  
What they ask of the city in building  
of the Coal avenue viaduct is not un-  
reasonable.

The Optic interviewed Mr. Ripley at  
Las Vegas. That paper says that  
when asked about improvements in  
general, and Albuquerque in particu-  
lar, Mr. Ripley said that the extent  
of the latter depended somewhat upon  
the sort of a trade that could be made  
with the people down there.

In 1859 a law was passed in Germany  
which made it compulsory for every  
German with an income of \$400 or more  
to insure himself against sickness and  
death. In 1899 there were 11,200,000  
persons in Germany thus insured, and  
so many of these suffered from con-  
sumption that thirty-seven of their own  
expense a sanitarium for the care of  
these persons.

## WHO ARE EQUATORS.

The recent order issued from the  
general land office to forest rangers  
to notify all squatters and trespassers  
on the forest reserves to vacate has  
raised the question, "Who are equat-  
ors?" Some of the forest rangers do  
not seem to be able to answer the  
question as notice has been served by  
them upon several apparently bona  
fide settlers to vacate their places.

The land laws give a settler upon  
surveyed land ninety days after set-  
tlement to appear at the land office  
securing title to the land he occupies.  
Failing to do this within that time,  
he becomes a trespasser and the land  
is subject to entry by any other qual-  
ified entryman.

A settler upon unsurveyed land is  
not permitted to file or make entry of  
his land in the land office until after  
survey of the land. He is then allowed  
ninety days after the plat of the  
township in which he is located is filed  
in the land office to make his entry or  
filing, and the valid entry or filing can  
be made upon such land by any other  
entryman during this ninety day  
period of preference right accorded to  
the settler. Failing, however, to make  
his entry or filing within the ninety  
days his land becomes subject to entry  
by any other qualified entryman.

In the absence of any adverse claim-  
ant or protest a man may reside for  
years upon surveyed land and may  
then be permitted to make entry of the  
land, although his rights to such oc-

## SANTA FE.

(From New Mexican.)

New carpets were received today for  
the internal revenue office in the fed-  
eral building.

Judge McFie yesterday afternoon
