Let's keep something going on all the time.

This city cannot afford to refuse to build the Coal Avenue viaduct.

The consumption of cotton per head here is more than doubled in Germany since 1870.

French statistics are said to prove that 250 French officers threw up their commissions to join the Boers.

It costs \$400,000 a year to maintain the twenty-four royal palaces of the Emperor William throughout the German empire.

The legislature of Mississippi has passed a bill forbidding the sale of cocaine except on the prescription of a physician.

Lady Smith's death last from all causes during the siege was 100, or at the rate of 250 a year in a population of 10,000.

German steel and iron manufacturers have contracted in England for the entire output of pig iron in Great Britain in 1901.

Great Britain appeals to her colonies to send more troops to South Africa, as British troops are required to protect the empire's interests elsewhere.

At the end of eight months of the fiscal year the surplus of receipts over expenditures is \$17,000,000. The February decrease of the public debt was \$1,000,000.

An interesting item appearing among other items of statistical information tells us that there are 2,500 persons confined in the penitentiaries of the United States.

El Republicano at Socorro holds the name of Cyrus Leand, of Kansas, for vice president. If the republicans nominate Cy, they will know where he is at on all questions.

The man who should print a newspaper as Jesus would, might not be crucified, but he would come near starving to death at the job anywhere in the United States.

The sum of \$2,000,000 has been expended in New Jersey in making 40 miles of good roads. Massachusetts has spent \$2,000,000 on 200 miles, which are as perfect as any highway in Europe.

Spain lost 15,000 soldiers in Cuba. The revolution cost 50,000 Cuban lives. Jose Marti raised the flag of independence in February, 1895. American intervention occurred in April, 1898. American occupation began January 1, 1899.

According to a statistical table recently prepared Denver leads the United States in proportion of attorneys to its inhabitants. Denver has a lawyer for every 221 inhabitants. San Francisco comes next with one for every 361.

During the past year 15,774 cattle were sent to market from New Mexico. Their value was \$2,377,000. No reliable data as to the number of cattle slaughtered within the territory could be secured owing to the adverse legislation, which permits hides to be taken out of the territory without either inspection or release.

Arthur Sewall said in New Orleans the other day that his western trip had convinced him that the American people would never consent to hauling down the flag in the Philippines. "No man," said he, "can be elected president on the anti-expansion plank in relation to the Philippine Islands. We can not pull down the American flag."

As thus far arranged, the national conventions of the various parties for 1900 will meet in the order: The two branches of the populist party will convene on May 9, the "middle-of-the-road" in Cincinnati and the fusionists in Sioux Falls, S. D.; the republicans in Philadelphia on June 19, the prohibitionists in Chicago on June 27, and the democrats in Kansas City on July 4.

A few days ago, while the editor was thinking about what Jesus would do if he was conducting a newspaper, the democratic mayor of this city came in and asserted that the paper the day before had erred in its criticism of the appointment of the boards of registration in the city election. He was requested to point out wherein the paper was in error, and he clearly showed that the republicans had the full quota of members of said registration boards. That afternoon the paragraph was corrected, and the next day the mayor had a copy of the paper in his hand and went to various places ridiculing the paper for its attempt at fairness, and the democratic party editor, by asserting that The Citizen published a lie and had to correct it. No further attempt will be made around this office to publish a paper as Jesus would. Jesus never had democratic officials to deal with.

UTILIZING NEW MEXICO RESOURCES.
President C. B. Eddy of the El Paso & Northern Railway, is responsible for the statement that Captain J. C. Eddy are now putting out 600 tons of coal daily, or twenty cars. That product will soon be doubled. The Southern Pacific alone is paying \$10,000 weekly for Captain coal, and it will double the quantity taken as soon as the supply is forthcoming.

The Sacramento mountain branch of the El Paso & Northern Railway is

hauling to the mills at Alamogordo 120,000 feet of timber daily; 6,000,000 feet of sawed timber is at the mills, and much lumber has already been sent to the market. The stock on hand must have a value of \$100,000, and the daily delivery of logs will give lumber worth \$1,000,000.

The lumber and coal resources of Otero and Lincoln might have gone untouched for another decade but for the enterprise of Mr. Eddy. Now they are being utilized and the public is benefited, for 100 men are employed by the new enterprises of that region. It goes without saying that the companies are making a handsome thing.

The preliminary figures of the newly completed census of Cuba and Porto Rico show a total population for Cuba of 4,028,000, a loss from 1887 of 50,000. The population of Porto Rico is 1,000,000, which is an increase of 100,000 over the census of 1887. The largest Cuban province is Havana, which has 425,000 inhabitants, a falling off of 25,000 in the twelve years. The next largest is Santa Clara, which with its 205,000 residents, shows an increase of 2,000. Santiago has gained about as much as Santa Clara has lost, says the Army and Navy Journal. The former province returns a population of 217,000, an increase of 20,000. Pinar del Rio has fallen from 205,000 to 195,000. Matanzas has dropped from 205,000 to 200,000. The smallest province in point of population is Puerto Principe, to which the census gives 200,000 inhabitants, a gain of 25,000.

The populists held their national convention in May, and will nominate candidates for president and vice president. It is certain that they will name Bryan for president, but nobody can spot the man who will get the nomination for vice president.

Admiral Dewey ought to be a pretty good authority on the value of fortifications to the proposed Nicaragua canal, and he says that if the navy can not defend the canal without fortifications, nothing can.

The Montana senators has cost Clark nearly \$200,000. Daily, by his own admission, over \$40,000, and the United States \$20,000. If the seat is declared vacant the total loss will be appalling.

Ex-Governor W. T. Thornton, of New Mexico, is credited with the purchase of the "El Magistral" copper mine in the Ameca district, Old Mexico, for \$25,000 in gold coin.

The political situation in Alabama may be envisioned by the appearance of General Joe Wheeler as a candidate for governor. It is given out that he will make the race.

Socorro is making arrangements to royally entertain the republicans when they meet there in territorial convention on March 17.

The government has during the past three months sent fifty tons of candy to the troops in the Philippines.

Siberian Exiles to be Prohibited.
The thought of exiled Russian criminals clanking their way over the snows of the Siberian plains to a life of terrible death in the line of horror. It is now rumored that the barbarous custom is to be abolished, and that Siberia, which is really a fertile country, is to be cultivated. THE KEARNEY CODE.

How Civil Government Was Established for New Mexico.

STATUTES LONG IN FORCE.

In the last annual report of Governor Otero to the secretary of the interior occurs the following statement of how Mexico for the last thirty years has been ruled in Arizona, New Mexico and the southern half of Colorado by a code approved by military authority and enforced by officers and judges appointed by a brigadier general, for a term:

The organization of civil government in the territory of New Mexico was the result of the establishment of the territory was approved September 20, 1890, the ratification of the treaty of peace between the United States and Mexico was made May 30, 1848, and proclamation thereof made July 4, 1848, just two years earlier than the capture of Santiago. But two years prior to that time the United States government had established through its military authority a complete code of civil laws for the future territory of New Mexico, which, at that time, consisted of the present territory, all of Arizona and the southern half of Colorado. On the 23rd day of September, 1848, Brig. Gen. S. W. Kearney, in command of the army of invasion, issued a proclamation to the people of "bill of rights," which is still retained on the statutes unchanged. On the same day he proclaimed "the Kearney code," which was re-enacted by the legislature in 1850, and nearly all the provisions of which are still in force, and on the same day, by virtue of his authority as brigadier general, he appointed the following list of civil officers: Charles Bent, to be governor; Donatiano Vigil, to be secretary; Richard L. Latham, to be marshal; Frank Blair, to be United States district attorney; Charles Blumner, to be treasurer; Eugene Leitzendorfer, to be auditor of public accounts; and John Houghton, Antonio Jose Otero and Charles Johnston, to be judges of the superior court. In his letter transmitting to the adjutant general a copy of these laws and list of appointments, General Kearney made the following statement:

"I take great pleasure in stating that I am entirely indebted for these laws to Col. A. W. Doniphan, of the First regiment of Missouri mounted volunteers, who received much assistance from Private Willard F. Hall, of his regiment. These laws are taken, part from the laws of Mexico, re-enacted in the original, a part with such modifications as our laws and constitution made necessary; a part are from the laws of Missouri territory, and a part from the laws of Texas, and also of Texas and Louisiana, a part from the statutes of Missouri, and the remainder from the Livingston code."

The first governor, Bent, was assassinated the first year after his appointment, at the pueblo of Taos, during what is known as the "Taos rebellion," which was supported by the entire able-bodied men of the territory. The civil war and the Kearney code remained the rule of civil action down to 1875, when, by statute, the "Common law as recorded in the United States of America" was adopted. This was the law of the land until the legislature of 1897 adopted a code of civil procedure.

The first legislative assembly of the territory of New Mexico assembled in Santa Fe in December, 1847. The laws passed at that session were printed in a pamphlet, to which was added "Order No. 16," from the headquarters of the ninth military department, imposing a duty of 8 per centum on merchandise imported into the territory. The authorization of these laws is printed in the same pamphlet as follows:

(Special Order No. 6.)
Headquarters Ninth Military Department, Santa Fe, N. M., February 5, 1848.—The foregoing legislative enactments of the territory of New Mexico, having been duly reviewed by the commanding general of the territory, they are hereby approved, and they will be duly observed. By order of the brigadier general.

TO BUILD A WOOLEN MILL.

The Beginning of An Industry That is of Importance.

O. B. Steen was in Las Vegas last week and bought a site for a woolen mill which a New York syndicate of wool manufacturers will erect this summer at Las Vegas. The concern will employ 200 men and manufacture blankets and other woolen articles of that nature. The firm will employ native labor, which is 25 per cent cheaper than New York labor; it will save freight rates on the raw material and endeavor to dispose of its manufactured products in the west. The plant will undoubtedly pay and be the governor of other woolen mills at Las Vegas, which is destined to be not only the woolen mart of New Mexico, but the woolen mart of the entire west. Mr. F. A. Mainwaring is interested in the project. While Mr. Steen was at Las Vegas the machinery of a modern wool scouring plant was also being put up. This is the fourth wool scouring plant established at Las Vegas.

Asylum Matters.
The rates for pay patients have been increased from \$100 to \$125 per month. There are ninety-seven patients at the asylum, the male department being crowded.

Bulletins from Weather Bureau on Snow Fall the Past Winter.
U. S. Department of Agriculture, Weather Bureau, Santa Fe, N. M., March 2, 1900.

Reports from all stations in the territory show that not only the snow lying on the ground is usually light for the season, but also that the total snowfall in winter so far was much less than the average amount.
