WILL FIGHT TO A FINISH.

President Kruger is Conferring
With President Steyn.

General Roberts Getting Ready to
Advance On Pretoria.

Mexican Troops Having Hot Work with
the Maya Indians.

WEEKLY BANK STATEMENT.

LONDON, March 3.—President Kruger is said to have left Pretoria to meet President Steyn somewhere in the Orange Free State. Those in South Africa conversant with the effect the recent reverses had on the Boers, express the opinion that the meeting is preliminary to a suggestion of negotiations for peace, but if this is the case, it must be due to the pressure brought to bear upon the president by the burghers and Afrikaners in the British colonies, rather than his personal inclinations, as available information depicts them as determined as ever to persist in the war until the resources of the republic are much more exhausted than at present, although some significance is attached to the consultation in view of the reported visit to England of Chief De Villiers. Mr. Hofmeir and Dr. Trewar, ostensibly on private business and for their health. The Boers are apparently rallying with their accustomed ability to repair temporary reverses, and Great Britain has yet to test their force as a defensive power under the new conditions of warfare. Telegraphing from Ootmarloot to-day, thanking the lord mayor of Liverpool for his congratulations in behalf of that city, Lord Roberts says: "I trust the majesty's soldiers in this county will get in such further successes as to speedily restore the freedom and prosperity of South Africa."

BOER PRISONERS.
Cape Town, March 2.—The railroad is now repaired northward from Kimberley to Riverton. Engineers are pushing the work as rapidly as possible. Boer prisoners captured at Paardeberg total up 4,600 men. About 3,000 are on their way here.

Battle With Indians.
OAGUA, Mexico, March 3.—General Bravo's government troops made an aggressive advance against the Maya Indians in the state of Yucatan during the last few days. His army is within a few miles of Santa Cruz, the main stronghold of the rebels. An attack on this stronghold will be made early next week.

Three thousand Mayas were strongly entrenched at Aguada. Six hundred Mexican troops, commanded by General Bravo, drove them from the trenches. Thirty-two Indians were killed.

Weekly Bank Statement.
New York, March 3.—The weekly bank statement shows a surplus reserve decrease of \$1,027,000; loans, increase, \$1,021,000; specie, decrease, \$1,507,000; legal tenders, decrease, \$7,400; deposits, increase, \$3,550,400; circulation, increase, \$972,800.

The banks hold \$12,841,550 in excess of legal requirements.

The Clark Case.
Washington, March 3.—The senate committee on elections to-day held a consultation with counsel of the Clark investigation and decided to give them two weeks for the preparation of their arguments. The argument will begin on the 20th inst.

Pension Bill.
Washington, March 3.—At 3 o'clock the pension appropriation bill was taken up, but on account of the slim attendance its consideration was postponed.

First Lafayette Dollar.
Paris, March 3.—Robert J. Thompson, secretary of the Lafayette Monument association, as special commissioner of the United States, representing President McKinley and in his name, presented

President Loubet this morning with the first of the Lafayette dollars, which was enclosed in a packet costing \$1,000. The presentation took place at the Elysee palace.

Harrison's Opinion.
Indianapolis, March 3.—In response to a question whether he had, as reported, in conversation with friends, expressed an opinion adverse to the Puerto Rican bill, General Harrison said to-day: "Yes, I regard the bill a most serious departure from right principles."

Steamers Aground.
New York, March 3.—The steamers La Normandie and Pennsylvania are aground in Gedyen channel. Tugs are endeavoring to float them.

Republican League.
Chicago, March 3.—The official call was issued to-day for the meeting of the national republican league of this state on July 17.

EDITORIAL ASSOCIATION.
The Pencil Pushers Resolve Against the Trusts.

New Orleans, March 3.—At to-day's session of the National Editorial Association resolutions against trusts, introduced yesterday, were taken up. J. E. Lanning, Newark, Ohio, said emphatically that there was no duty on wood pulp. Delegate John Naigel, Mantowoc, Wis., said he yesterday called at the local custom house and from the collector ascertained that there was a tariff on wood pulp. He made a note of the rates. Lanning read from the free list of the existing tariff law showing that wood pulp was in reality on the free list. The debate continued with much heat. Resolutions against trusts were adopted, 224 to 64, with an amendment urging congress to take immediate action against the paper trust.

COTTON EXCITED.

Prices Advanced and Big Profits
Made on Options.

Miners Testify Regarding the Cœur
d'Alene Strike Trouble.

Polygamist Postmasters in Utah Being
Investigated by Congress.

THE CASE OF QUAY.

New York, March 3.—Tremendous excitement prevailed in the cotton exchange to-day. Transactions were upon a colossal scale. The market advanced 15 1/2 points on near options and 4 1/2 on new crop deliveries, following the unexpected advance at Liverpool. The facts that the receipts are double what they were a year ago and an immense new crop area contemplated are overlooked in the present excitement.

Quay Case.
Washington, March 3.—Ross (Vt.) argued against seating Quay. He contended that under the constitution in the provision of a vacancy in the senate could only be filled when it occurred during the recess of the legislature. Teiler (Colo.) discussed the conference report on the disqualification bill. He maintained that too much power was given the secretary of the treasury. He was opposed to all provisions of the measure, which he discussed in detail.

Starting Senator.
Washington, March 3.—Pittsburg introduced and the senate passed a resolution instructing the secretary of war to send to the senate the proceedings of the court martial of 1894 against Lieutenant Colonel Corbin, now adjutant general of the army. The resolution also calls for information bearing upon Corbin's military record.

MINING TROUBLES.

Witness Testify Regarding the Cœur
d'Alene Strike in Idaho.

Washington, March 3.—In the investigation in the Cœur d'Alene troubles to-day, Edward Flannigan, of Mullan, Idaho, explained the "permit" system put into effect after the military arrest. Men could not work unless they got a permit from the state officials. The witness said the permits were purchasable. He advanced \$250 to a friend who paid it to a deputy and was put to work the next day. Letters to men in the "bull pen," he said, were opened by officials.

Thomas Henry, formerly a miner, now owner of mining and other property, testified that he was appointed deputy sheriff and ordered the saloons closed. He was arrested by one of the state deputies, accompanied by soldiers, and put in the "bull pen." He could have given bail up to \$100,000, but was not allowed to do so. In proceedings before the court he said witnesses who testified against accused were released, while those favorable to them were held.

POLYGAMOUS POSTMASTERS.

The Mormon Natchez of Utah Being
Investigated by Congress.

Washington, March 3.—Rev. William R. Campbell, Utah, was examined to-day by the house subcommittee investigating the charges that certain postal appointees are polygamists. He said it was a matter of common report that John C. Graham, postmaster at Provo, Utah, had children by plural wives. Similar testimony was given as to Orson Smith, lately postmaster at Logan, Utah. Witness spoke only from general hearsay. He presented two copies of letters signed by Private Secretary Porter, acknowledging the receipt of letters from Rev. Clementson, of Logan, Utah, protesting to the president against the appointment of Smith. Porter's acknowledgment stated that the letters had been referred to the postmaster general.

A number of small firms not affiliated with the manufacturers' association signed the union scale during the day. So far, however, there are no signs of yielding by the manufacturers.

Jamestown, N. D., March 3.—Judge Giapponi has appointed F. P. McQuinn, Carrington, N. D., receiver of the Western Mutual Fire Insurance company, of Fessenden, N. D., on application of State Insurance Commissioner Harrison. Assets, \$15,000; liabilities anywhere from \$22,000 to \$50,000. The company's failure results from severe losses in Walsh county in 1898. Farmers are heavy losers, and a rigid investigation will be asked.

Louisville, Ky., March 3.—It is thought the argument in the case to determine rights of rival claimants for the governorship will be concluded before Judge Fields this afternoon.

Death of a Congressman.
Washington, March 3.—The death of Representative Kipes, of Virginia, who died last night, was being with a cold and covered with flowers. It had been intended to proceed to-day with the Aldrich-Hobbs contested election case, but unanimous consent was given to vacate the order and postpone the final vote until next Tuesday.
