## THE DEAF AND DUMB ASYLUM.

A special meeting of the board of trustees of the deaf and dumb asylum was held at the office of the secretary, Hon. B. M. Read, in Santa Fe. All the members were present: Mrs. T. P. Gable, president; Hon. B. M. Read, secretary; Superintendent of Public Instruction M. C. De las, Maj. Fred. Muller and Mrs. F. P. O'Brien.

The secretary reported that \$1,583.89 had been placed to the credit of the institution.

Mrs. Gable reported that she had received \$15.00 from the United States government for the tuition of J. B. Salazar, a Navajo boy, for October 1920.

The secretary was instructed to ask Solicitor General K. L. Bartlett for an official opinion upon certain questions, one of them being as to whether the board could furnish board, washing, etc., to other pupils than paupers, or whether parents and guardians should pay for the board and washing of their children or wards the same as is done at other territorial institutions. The law is a silent on this point, as it provides that tuition shall be free for children of the territory, but says nothing as to board, washing, etc.

The board agreed to inspect the asylum next week to ascertain what repairs are absolutely necessary, with a view of having the work done as early as day possible.

The question as to the sale of real property of the school was left undecided for the present.

The clerk of the school districts, as well as the county school superintendents, have wholly neglected to comply with the law as to the enumeration of deaf and dumb children in their respective districts and counties. Section 4, chapter 42, of the session laws of 1913, is very plain, and the school officers failed to be warned by the board to comply with the law, last suit brought against them, but says nothing as to board, washing, etc.

McKenzie, solder work, \$1.50; Santa Fe Water company, water for four months, \$32; Mexican Printing company, printing, \$24.50; I. Sparks, putting in electric light, \$1.25. The parties whose bills have been ordered paid can get the money at the office of Hon. B. M. Read, on Palace avenue.

## NOT TO DIVERT COURT FUNDS.

Judge John B. McPhee has entered orders requiring that the court funds of the four counties in the district be held in a separate fund, and that no portion of them shall be diverted to a general county or general school fund. In nearly every county of the territory the practice has been followed of crediting all delinquent taxes to the general county and general school funds, but Judge McPhee holds this to be unlawful.

## GOOD WOMAN GONE.

Mrs. R. E. Twitchell at Last Passes to Her Reward in Another World.

After a lingering illness, Mrs. R. E. Twitchell died Monday at 6 p. m., says the Las Vegas Optic. As the golden rays of the setting sun softened into twilight, the curtain of the night began to draw, and the devoted mother, who had been suffering peacefully, surrounded by her family, without awakening—her soul was called to the land she was so long to leave.

The body was taken to St. Joseph, Mo., for interment on N. 2 Tuesday, accompanied by the bereaved husband and son, Mrs. W. A. Collins and Mrs. L. C. Barnes, her mother and sister.

The burial services took place in St. Joseph, only a brief service being held at the residence at 4 o'clock, Rev. J. F. Kellogg officiating, assisted by Rev. Geo. S. Selby; the music being rendered by Mrs. R. C. Rankin and Mrs. H. H. Whetstone.

The hymns selected for the sad occasion were "Lead Kindly Light," and "Nearer My God to Thee." The pall bearers were Messrs. Frank Springer, A. B. Whitman, C. C. Gao, W. K. Gortner, K. G. Murphy and D. T. Hoskins.

Margaret Olivia Collins, daughter of William H. and Annie Fisher, Coughlin, was born at St. Joseph, Mo., on November 16, 1895. On December 9, 1885, she was married to Ralph Kenneth Twitchell, now assistant collector for New Mexico for the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway company, and June 20, 1887, Walter, their only child, was born. Shortly after their marriage they took up their residence in Santa Fe, where they remained until 1906, when this city became their home. Prior to her residence here, she was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, but joined the Methodist Episcopal church in this city.

The death of Mrs. Twitchell has caused a pall to overshadow the entire community. Always tender and affectionate, uniformly cheerful and amiable, she had many warm personal friends, who can scarcely realize, even after her long life of sickness, which had partly prepared their minds for the inevitable, that she has gone, never more to return. Blessed with many of God's choicest gifts, she had that character, beauty and refinement that made her the center of a large circle of acquaintances, and along with the above qualities, she possessed a modest simplicity that attracted everyone to her, causing all to admire and many to love her dearly. ## DELEGATE PEREA.

Sketch of His Life in the Congresses I.

The following historical sketch of the delegate from New Mexico appears in the last issue of the Congressional Record:

Donato Perea, republican, of Bernalillo, was born at Bernalillo, N. M., April 22, 1852; was educated at St. Michael's college, Santa Fe, N. M.; Georgetown university, District of Columbia, and Loyola university, St. Louis, Mo.; has all his life been a resident of Bernalillo; has been principally engaged in farming and sheep raising, and was one time president of the First National Bank of Santa Fe; was four times a member of the council of the New Mexico legislature; was elected to the Fifty-first congress, receiving 18,722 votes, to 10,609 for H. B. Ferguson, democrat, on a straight sound money platform, which induced the late republican national platform adopted at St. Louis, to which convention Mr. Perea was one of the New Mexico delegates.

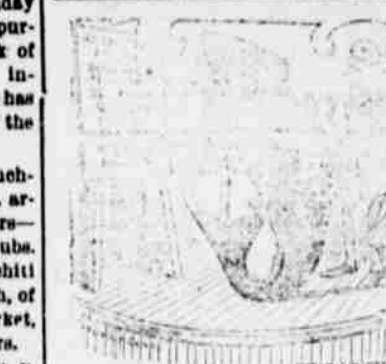

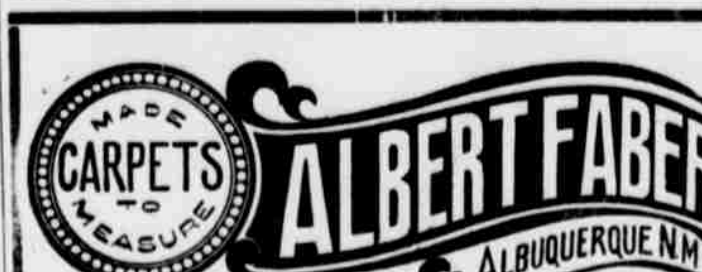

### PROCEEDINGS OF CONGRESS.

Senator From Utah Speaks to a Question of Personal Privilege.

Washington, Feb. 1.—Rawlins, Utah, rose to a question of personal privilege and to make a personal inquiry. "I noticed," said he, "in the record last week frequent references to myself, intimating that if I had taken the pains to do so I might have revealed certain things as to the domestic affairs of citizens of my state and perhaps to the moral status of a member of the house of representatives. The parliamentary inquiry I wish to make is whether such allusion to a member of this body is a breach of the courtesies and privileges of this body, and whether it would be within the privilege of a member of the senate to reply to such allusions."

Chairman Freye held that if any senator should bring an attack upon any member of the house the chair would call him to order, but said that it was for the speaker of the house to determine what evidence he should take under such circumstances. Rawlins said that was his understanding, and he had made the inquiry so that his silence should not be taken as admission of the truthfulness of the statements made.
