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BATTLE IMMINENT.

General Buller Ready to Attack
Boers at Ladysmith.

Philippine Insurgents Torture to Death
Three American Prisoners.

Investigation in Progress of Election of
Senator Clark of Montana.

WEEKLY BANK STATEMENT.

London, Jan. 6.—Though nothing definite is permitted to pass the censor, sufficient transpire to confirm the belief that an important move at Tugela river is imminent. Continual bombardment is kept up on the Boer entrenchments and numerous reconnaissances are apparently connected with a well defined purpose. There are some indications that the British plan of attack includes an important movement via Weenen.

Colonel Baden-Powell's defeat in sorties at Mafeking raises serious doubts of his ability to hold out much longer. To-day, however, comes the report that Colonel Plumer reached Vochudi from Fort Tuli, about January 1, with Rhodes' relief force. As Colonel Plumer had at his disposal about 2,000 men, if news is correct, he ought to be able to raise the siege at Mafeking.

Inconclusive fighting around Coleberg was resumed this morning. The British artillery opening westward of the town. Dispatches indicate that the attack is developing into a general engagement.

Advices from Belmont say that two companies of Canadians dispatched to cover the return of Colonel Plumer's column, occupied a pass six miles out to prevent any attempt of the Boers to cut off their force.

The dispatch from Cape Town relative to the release of the steamer Mashona, having a quantity of American flour on board, says the case arouses less interest than that of the Bundesrath, which it is claimed has been known for a year as a carrier of war materials for the Transvaal.

A special dispatch from Cape Town to-day says that it is rumored that General French entered Coleberg.

BRUTAL TO PRISONERS.

Philippine Insurgents Torture to Death Three American Soldiers.
Manila, Jan. 6.—Advices from Magdalong, province of Pangasinan, report that Captain Conhauser, with three companies of the Twenty-fifth regiment, captured the insurgent stronghold, Comanche, on Mount Arayat, yesterday. Three Americans were wounded. The enemy's loss not known. Three members of the Ninth and two of the Twelfth regiment, whom the insurgents held prisoners, were shot and horribly mutilated. Three are dead, and the other two are recovering. Captain Conhauser set fire to the barracks and the town.

Americans Recovered.

Washington, Jan. 6.—The war department received the following cablegram this morning: Manila, Jan. 6.—The prisoners now en route from Vigan will arrive to-night. List telegraphed to-morrow. Captain Gilmore is among the number.

Weekly Bank Statement.
New York, Jan. 6.—The weekly bank statement shows a surplus reserve increase, of \$588,600; loans, increase, \$1,107,000; specie, increase, \$504,800; legal tenders, increase, \$2,311,400; deposits, increase, \$8,996,200; circulation, increase, \$191,400.

The banks now hold \$11,757,725 in excess of legal requirements.

Investigating Election of Senator Clark.
Washington, Jan. 6.—Henry C. Stiff, speaker of the Montana house of representatives, was the first witness in the Clark case before the senate committee on privileges and elections to-day. Representative Campbell, of Montana, questioned Stiff. The questions were directed to a showing that the embarrassed financial condition of State Representative McLaughlin had been taken advantage of by Clark to approach him to secure his vote. Stiff also stated that he himself had been approached by W. M. Bickford as a representative of Clark and his support solicited for the latter. FATAL FIRE.

Terrible Tenement Fire in New
York City.

Portugal Declines a Loan From
Germany and England.

One of the Railway, New Jersey, Banks
Forced to Suspend.

GERMAN SHIP RELEASED.

New York, Jan. 6.—A tenement house fire on east Ninety-second street, early to-day, resulted in three deaths and seven persons being badly injured. Dead: Mrs. Mary Sutherland, widow; Frank Sutherland, nine years old; James Sutherland, twenty-two months old; both sons of Mrs. Sutherland. Injured: Harry Sutherland, five years; Ralph Pittzko, five years; Lillian Sutherland; Fireman Michael Egan; Michael Sullivan, Charles McCarthy and Martin O'Leary, over come by gas and smoke.

The fire, which started in the cellar, gained much headway before the firemen arrived. Police men aroused the tenants. Harry Sutherland was found unconscious in the hall way of the second floor. He made his way from the top floor but could get no further. He inhaled the flames and it is thought he will die. Ladies were raised by the firemen and a number of women and children carried down.

Raphael Pittzko, who lived on the third floor, took his three small children down the rear fire escape to the second floor, where he was cut off by the flames. While clinging to the fire escape he was compelled to pass his children over a 12-foot fence, surmounted with spikes, which separated the tenement from the adjoining house. His arms were cut by the spikes and when he saw the children all in safety, he fell, sustaining bruises. When the firemen were about the center of the building they found the dead body of Mrs. Sutherland lying face down with her baby dead in her arms. A few feet from her on the floor lay the half-burned body of her boy, Frank.

PORTUGAL OBJECTED.

Declined to Fall into the Clutches of England and Germany.
Lisbon, Jan. 6.—A semi-official note to the press regarding the Anglo-German agreement has just been issued. It is as follows: "The British and German governments having previously reached an agreement between themselves, informed Portugal that in the event of her contracting a large loan for the purpose of reorganizing the finances of the government, they were disposed to guarantee the success of the operation. At the same time the governments of Great Britain and Germany assured Portugal that the basis of the agreement between them was the recognition of the integrity of the Portuguese colonial dominions and the legitimacy of Portuguese sovereignty over the Portuguese possessions. They further suggested that in the event of Portugal accepting the proposal concerning the loan, that they be granted the colonial and customs receipts. The Portuguese government then declared that it had no need of such loan and according to our information has no such need to the present day."

Bank Failure.

New York, Jan. 6.—The Union County Bank, Rahway, N. J., to-day placed a notice on the door announcing that it had been compelled to suspend, owing to the unusual demand made upon it by depositors, "but there is good reason to believe the depositors will be paid in full as soon as the bank can realize on investments."

The bank has been paying 8 per cent dividends on its capital of \$40,000. It is a state institution and had a surplus of \$25,000. After the difficulties of the Middlesex County bank, at Perth Amboy, N. J., which was robbed by its cashier, George M. Valentine, there was some evidence of timidity on the part of the depositors of the Union County bank, as the president, Edward F. Savage, had been Valentine's lawyer and vice president of the Union County bank. Mulford D. Valentine was an uncle of the defaulting cashier of the Middlesex County bank.

German Ship Released.

Berlin, Jan. 6.—A dispatch from Aden says that the authorities have renounced further search of the imperial German mail steamer, detained there under suspicion of having contraband of war on board. The steamer will resume her voyage in a few days.

CASE OF ROBERTS.

The Utah Congressman Speaks
in His Own Defense.

Kentucky Election Cases Before the
Court of Appeals.

One of the Buffalo, N. Y., Bank Tellers a
Heavy Embezzler.

LOUISIANA LILY WHITE PARTY.

Washington, Jan. 6.—When the Roberts committee resumed its session to-day, Roberts went on with his argument. He reviewed the action of the constitutional convention of Utah, urging that this carried out the requirements of congress for the admission of Utah as a state, namely that polygamous marriages should no longer be contracted. In particular, Roberts contended that there was no requirement by congress or in the constitutional convention that previously contracted matrimonial associations should be interrupted.

Roberts said he had observed that the ladies involved in this question of plural wives were quite generally received in the circles of the gentle ladies of Utah. He vehemently denounced what he characterized the sensational crusade made against him, and also the effort to arouse public feeling by saying that the "American home" was in danger. "If necessary," he exclaimed, "I could call attention to ten thousand evils which threaten the country without going to the state of Utah."

In closing, Roberts said that the patriotism of the Mormon church toward the country could not be questioned. Mr. Schroeder, gentle representative, stated that no further point would be made on Roberts' naturalization papers, as it was desired to exclude him from congress solely on the ground of his being a polygamist. At 12:30 arguments on both sides closed, and the committee in executive session decided to close the hearings unless ex-Secretary Carlisle desired to be heard further. Adjourned until next Wednesday.

Does Albuquerque Want the Location of Rio Grande Bridge Changed?

Some time ago certain of the leading business men of Albuquerque seemed to think that the site of the proposed bridge, to be constructed near the Cochiti Indian village, should be changed. The Commercial club at that time held a meeting and appointed a committee to investigate the matter. Hon. R. A. Miers, chairman of the board of county commissioners, hearing that the citizens of Albuquerque wanted the site changed, drove from his ranch over a hundred miles away, and took a week off, in order to assure the people of this city that he would co-operate with them in locating the bridge where they wanted it, providing the additional expense of changing the location was borne by the city, as the county had already contracted for so large an amount as it was authorized to expend for the bridge.

Mr. A. C. Bullen, who has the contract for building the bridge, is now here; the county commissioners will be in session next Monday, January 8, and if anything is to be done it will have to be done while the commissioners are in session and Mr. Bullen is here. If the people of this city really want a bridge built lower down the river than contracted for, now is the time for them to act, and it would seem that by concerted action several thousand dollars could be raised to defray the proposed change.

FOREST RESERVES.

Arizona Correspondent Favos Grazing of Sheep on the Reserves.

Flagstaff, Jan. 4.—My attention is called to an editorial in your valuable paper of the 21st instant on "Forest Reserves," in which it is stated the democratic delegate from Arizona has introduced a bill in congress, at the request of several large sheep companies in northern Arizona, the provisions of which, if adopted, would virtually make these reservations free ranges for vast flocks of sheep. We know you would not knowingly make any erroneous statement or do injustice to any person, business interest or community on this important question of grazing on forest reserves, hence we take the liberty of asking the correction of this error.

The bill referred to was not introduced at the request of any sheep companies or sheep men. On the contrary, the wool growers of Arizona know nothing of the proposed measure until the bill was introduced, and have since advised our delegate that in their judgment the bill is unnecessary, and their interests and the interests of northern Arizona would be fully protected by the secretary of the interior when the facts and conditions were fully made known to the department.

The excitement and uneasiness on this question come from lack of knowledge of the facts and conditions existing in northern Arizona. In many localities in other states it has been found necessary to exclude all kinds of stock from forest reserves.

The conditions in northern Arizona are radically different, and the grazing by stock and the violence of the stockmen of northern Arizona are the only reliable safe guards against forest fire which has in past years been more destructive to the forests of this section than all other enemies combined. The open porous soil and volcanic formation makes arid water and running streams impossible, therefore reasonable grazing is not detrimental to the watershed. Our delegate knew these facts, and when he learned the department of the interior was liable to exclude all kinds of stock from all forest reserves, he introduced the bill referred to for the protection of northern Arizona, every county in which district would be bankrupt if such measure was enforced. These forest reserves cover practically all our summer grazing lands and our cattle and sheep interests comprise more than half the business and taxable property of northern Arizona.

There is no opposition to forest reservations from the cattle and sheep men of northern Arizona. The people of this district ask only that full investigation be made in this field before the enforcement of regulations, made for other localities, which would inevitably bring financial ruin to both public and private interests of the entire northern counties of Arizona.

THE SUPREME COURT.

Cases Dismissed Yesterday Morning or Reset for Hearing.

The territorial supreme court met yesterday forenoon at the court house in Santa Fe with Chief Justice Mills and Associate Justices McFie and Parker on the bench.

In case No. 780, the First National Bank of Albuquerque vs. W. W. McCellan et al., a motion for rehearing was overruled. A judgment had been given in the case in favor of the plaintiff in March, and the judgment satisfied.

In case No. 741, The Waters Cattle Raising company, plaintiff in error, vs. The Territory of New Mexico, defendant in error, a tax case, has been reset for January 11.

In case No. 816, Marcelino Garcia, defendant, plaintiff in error, vs. H. O. Bursam, defendant in error, was submitted on record without oral argument. This is a mandamus case.

In case No. 821, Jose P. Ruiz, plaintiff in error, vs. The Territory of New Mexico, defendant in error, was reset for January 19.

In case No. 823, The First National Bank of Albuquerque et al., plaintiffs in error, vs. William W. McCellan et al., defendants in error, was dismissed by plaintiff.

The following twelve applicants, who had been admitted to practice in the courts of one or more states, and had practiced for the last three years or more, were reported as eligible for admission to practice in New Mexico: C. K. Smith, Edward E. Neal, Frank C. Matson and Arthur C. Good, Otero county; K. S. Whitehead, San Juan county; Manley M. Dawson, Martin H. Baker, Colfax county; W. H. Winter, Socorro county; Edmund C. Abbot, Edward Peirce, Taos county; Arthur N. Jordan, San Miguel county; Oscar A. Appel, Grant county. The court admitted the candidates, as recommended. Four candidates for admission have not yet completed their examination. The report on the above twelve candidates was signed by Judge A. A. Freeman, Solicitor General, E. L. Bartlett and F. W. Clancy.
