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## EVERYTHING IN SIGHT

**Albuquerque Firemen Take Four Firsts and One Second in the Tournament.**

## VEGAS GETS ONE FIRST

**Award of the Prizes in the Wet Test the Occasion of Considerable Contention.**

The St. Elmo team of Albuquerque practically took everything in sight in the various contests held yesterday under the auspices of the New Mexico Association of Firemen. The Albuquerqueans captured four of the firsts and in the single coupling contests the Albuquerque company settled all disputes by handily walking away with both first and second money. There was a dispute over the award in the wet test and it was claimed that the Albuquerqueans not only used a fresh man and a non-runner in making the nozzle coupling, but that outside interference was also had. The decision of the judges was appealed from and the board of control met last evening and the matter was formally disposed of by announcing that the unanimous vote of the board was that the Albuquerqueans were the winners and that the real cause for protest was on the part of the visitors, who were the parties interfered with and not those interfering.

From what was heard as evidence last night the case seems to be about as follows: The St. Elmo team made a beautiful run and had all the others distanced from the start. The team on reaching the point where the nozzle coupling was to be made was interfered with by a Las Vegas man who attempted to turn the nozzle off instead of on. His close personal resemblance to one of the members of the Albuquerqueans at once gave rise to the statement that the St. Elmo team had a man in the crowd and that it was this fresh man and a non-runner who attempted to make the attachment. There was some trouble and for a time it looked as if matters would result in an unpleasant breaking up of the whole affair. Cooler heads, however, intervened and the whole matter was settled by the board of control at the meeting held last night. There is no question in the minds of the Santa Feans, who were witnesses to the whole affair, that the Albuquerqueans were the real winners of the contest and that the record run made by them was one of the most powerful arguments in support of this claim. It was simply a case of where enthusiasm got the better of judgment, and now that the whole thing is decided, and time having been given to the disputants to think the matter over, it is regarded as settled, and will no doubt, soon be forgotten.

The events were all held yesterday and the meet is over. Today the various teams are leaving for their homes and by this evening there will be few if any of the visiting firemen left in the city. The results of the contests are as follows:

## FELT LIKE A STRANGER

**Capt. George H. Pettis Visits New Mexico After an Absence of Many Years.**

Capt. George H. Pettis, now of Providence, Rhode Island, but who was one of the "old timers" of New Mexico, was in the city a few days this week having stopped over in Santa Fe on his way home from the national encampment of the Grand Army at San Francisco. Captain Pettis was accompanied by his friend, Charles W. Rhodes, another veteran, who saw hard service in the First Rhode Island infantry during the late unpleasantness. The two remained in Santa Fe for a few days and then continued their journey home.

Captain Pettis is a native of Massachusetts, and he came west in '54 going to the coast. At the time of the breaking out of the war he was a resident of San Francisco and was commissioned as a lieutenant in company K, First California infantry. In 1865 he was mustered out of the California service with the rank of captain and was at once commissioned first lieutenant of company F and adjutant First New Mexico infantry. In this regiment he served for about two years and then went to Algodones where he conducted for several years the famous old hotel, "The Railroad House" at that place. There were probably few men in New Mexico at that time who were more widely known from Algodones and Santa Fe to the Mexican border than was Captain Pettis, and his hostelry was known alike to both soldier and traveler. He remained in the Territory until late in '68 when he went back to his old home in the New England states settled at Providence, and has been prominent in the affairs of Little Rhody since his adoption of that State as his home. At present Captain Pettis is the State sealer of weights, measures and balances, and his offices are in the state house at Providence. Captain Pettis is the post-commander of Arnold Post, No. 4, department of Rhode Island, G. A. R. and secretary and treasurer of the California Volunteer Veteran association. He is a prominent and active member of the Grand Army of the Republic and is always found at the front when the interests of the old soldier are to be considered.

In speaking of the many changes that had taken place since his residence in Santa Fe and in New Mexico, Captain Pettis said that nearly all the old-timers that he knew were gone and that he felt more like a stranger than one who had come back to visit old and familiar scenes. ## THE PUBLIC DOMAIN

**During Past Fiscal Year 1,082,128 Acres of Land Entered in Territory.**

## LARGE AS RHODE ISLAND

**Fifty Million Acres Still Open to Entry Under Federal Laws in New Mexico.**

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1903, there were entered under the federal land laws 1,082,128 acres of the public domain in New Mexico, an area exceeding that of the state of Rhode Island and almost equaling that of the state of Delaware. Of this area 468,196 acres were taken up under the homestead act, representing over 3,000 entries. Under the desert land act 74,585 acres were taken up; under lien selections, 377,596 acres; under the mineral land act, 2,468 acres; under commutation, 3,556 acres, while the Territorial selections amounted to 167,008 acres. The Roswell land district leads with 635,319 acres taken up; the Clayton district is second with 262,498 acres; the Santa Fe district third with 120,822 acres, while the Las Cruces district is last with 63,489 acres.

Among the counties Chaves leads with 354,131 acres segregated from the public domain; while Union is second with 147,449 acres and Eddy a close third with 147,440 acres. Then come the other counties in the following order: Roosevelt, 114,262 acres; Colfax, 59,565 acres; Quay, 44,262; Lincoln, 34,250; Taos, 30,539; San Miguel, 34,025; Otero, 23,359; Mora, 21,665; Grant, 18,031; Leonard Wood, 15,856; Socorro, 13,537; Valencia, 10,590; Santa Fe, 5,859; Dona Ana, 5,250; Sierra, 5,189; Rio Arriba, 4,499; Bernalillo, 3,851; Luna, 2,994; Sandoval, 2,477; San Juan, 2,040; McKinley, 1,276.

As to homestead lands taken up the order of the counties is not quite the same. Roosevelt leads with 86,642; Chaves coming second with 67,749 acres, and Eddy third, with 49,511 acres. Then come the other counties as follows: Union, 47,038; Quay, 42,703; Colfax, 28,806; Otero, 18,258; Mora, 17,905; Lincoln, 15,445; Grant, 15,150; San Miguel, 15,145; Leonard Wood, 15,060; Socorro, 10,819; Valencia, 9,171; Santa Fe, 5,598; Sierra, 4,509; Dona Ana, 4,690; Rio Arriba, 4,282; Bernalillo, 3,671; Luna, 2,400; San Juan, 1,960; McKinley, 1,036; Taos, 320; Sandoval, 308.

Leonard Wood lies in three land districts, those of Clayton, Santa Fe and Roswell. The following counties lie in two land districts: Colfax, Mora and San Miguel in the Clayton and Santa Fe districts; Roosevelt in the Clayton and Roswell districts; Socorro in the Santa Fe and Las Cruces districts; Valencia in the Santa Fe and Roswell districts; Otero in the Las Cruces and Roswell districts. Of the other counties Union and Quay are in the Clayton district; Bernalillo, McKinley, Rio Arriba, Sandoval, San Juan, Santa Fe and Taos in the Santa Fe district; Dona Ana, Sierra, Luna and Grant in the Las Cruces district; Chaves, Eddy and Lincoln in the Roswell district.

Although the land entries during the last fiscal year amounted to over a million acres, yet almost fifty million acres of the public domain in New Mexico still remain open to entry. Nevertheless, the time is measurably distant when the splendid public domain will have passed into private ownership or be included in forest or other reserves.

If the present rate of the segregation of the public domain is kept up it will be less than fifty years before New Mexico must put up the sign, "No more free homesteads."

## FOUR CONVICTS KILLED AND ONLY ONE ESCAPES.

Birmingham, Ala., Sept. 4—Four convicts were shot at the Pratt mines prison this morning in an attempt to escape. They blew an opening in one end of the prison with dynamite, ran through and hurled sticks of dynamite at the guards. The latter opened fire and prevented a wholesale delivery. Only one man escaped.

## LANDED MARINES

**Some of the European Powers Have Their Warriors in Constantinople.**

## FRENCH FLEET TO SAIL

**United States Has No Authority to Send Warships Through the Dardanelles**

Washington, D. C., Sept. 4—Minister Leishman has not yet made any request for the landing of a detachment of marines at Constantinople from the squadron which is expected to reach Beirut today. The United States has no authority to send a warship through the Dardanelles and would need the consent of Turkey and other European powers to do so.

## POWERS TO SEND FLEETS TO TURKISH WATERS.

Paris, Sept. 4—It is authoritatively stated in view of the growing disorders in Turkey that a French fleet will be ordered to hold itself in readiness to proceed to Turkish waters. This determination followed the receipt of a report from the French ambassador at Constantinople that it was desirable to have ships in readiness for all eventualities. Similar preparations have been made by Italy, Austria, Russia and Great Britain. The officials expect the fleets to act together in case of a crisis.

## EUROPEAN MARINES LAND AT CONSTANTINOPLE.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 4—Minister Leishman today informed the state department that some of the European powers had landed marines at Constantinople. If the lives of Americans there become endangered the United States government also will send a detachment of marines to Constantinople.

Minister Leishman also reported that in order to protect the lives of the occupants of the American legation and the American consul-general at Constantinople additional detachments had been added to the force there. He said he took this precaution because of a warning sent him by the Sultan that an uprising was feared.

## REVOLUTIONISTS CROSS TURKISH BORDER.

Sofia, Sept. 4—Colonel Jankoff, the insurgent leader, with a band of 300 men, crossed the frontier Monday evening and passed through the Turkish outposts unopposed. General Zentcheff, disguised, also crossed the frontier. A dispatch from Rila says the date of the general insurrection has been postponed.

## SEEKING ASSAILANT OF VICE-CONSUL.

Constantinople, Sept. 4—Consul Randall telegraphs from Beirut to Minister Leishman that the authorities have been actively seeking the assailant of Vice-Consul Magelsen but the consul is unable to say if he is among those who have been arrested. The United States cruisers Brooklyn and San Francisco are expected to reach Beirut today.

Turkish official reports indicate that complete success of the military operations against the insurgents in the Klissura district. Over 400 insurgents are said to have been killed.

## COLORADO EX-AUDITOR AND CLERK ARE INDICTED.

Denver, Colo., Sept. 4—The special grand jury today reported indictments against Former Auditor Charles W. Crouter and his chief clerk, W. Cary Munsell. Munsell is accused of embezzling \$8,000 of the flat tax money. Crouter is charged with making no effort to collect this and not turning over the other flat taxes which he collected. There are nineteen counts in the indictment.

## ROUNDABOUT WAY TO GET MEN OUT.

Telluride, Colo., Sept. 4—The Federal Labor union called on the cooks and waiters at the Smuggler-Union mines this morning and in consequence 300 miners will be forced to cease work as there is no other place where they can obtain board. The miners' union could not call out these men as they were under contract.

## CONSPIRING TO KILL THE KILLERS.

Belgrade, Sept. 4—Forty-seven officers of the Nish garrison have been arrested. It is charged that they were in a conspiracy to kill all concerned in the palace assassinations.

## SCENIC ROUTE ROAD

**Detachment of Convicts to Be Kept at Work Until the Fifteenth of October.**

Superintendent H. O. Bursum of the Territorial penitentiary spent yesterday on the Pecos forest reserve looking after the work in connection with the construction of the "Scenic Route" road. There are forty convicts at work and very good progress is being made. Seventy-six hundred feet of road from the canon of the Santa Fe River east have been partially constructed and this stretch will be completely finished by the tenth inst. The road will be one of the finest in the country when completed. Mr. Bursum expects to keep the detachment of convicts in the field for at least six weeks or longer. The bridge across the Santa Fe River which is to be located about four miles east of town in the Santa Fe canon, and which is to connect the present road with the new road, will have to be built by the county commissioners of this county, that is if the timber and other necessary material are furnished by the county, the convicts will do the work of erecting the bridge. As soon as this is done, there will be a good road from this city to about a mile above Monument Rock and thence due east to the Dalton divide, by the fifteenth of October. There are about thirty convicts at work on the "Scenic Route" road in the Gallinas canon west from Las Vegas and Mr. Bursum's information is that construction work there is also progressing as well as could be expected.

## CARDINAL GIBBONS SAYS RUMORS ARE FALSE.

Paris, Sept. 4—A report published by the Patrie that the government might expel Cardinal Gibbons from France owing to his alleged statements to the Breton Clergy is officially pronounced false and absurd. Cardinal Gibbons wrote the Associated press August 28 saying that his alleged meetings with the Breton clergy were fabrications.

## NEW FOREST RESERVE

**Immense Tract of Land in Rio Arriba and Sandoval Counties Withdrawn from Entry.**

A dispatch from Washington says that on the recommendation of the forestry bureau the interior department has temporarily withdrawn from all entry a tract of about 1,200,000 acres in southeastern Rio Arriba and northwestern Sandoval counties, New Mexico, to determine the advisability of ultimately creating a forest reserve to embrace this mountainous region. It is suggested that if the reserve be created it be known as the Rio Jemez reserve.

Lands withdrawn are described as follows in a telegram to local land officers at Santa Fe: Beginning at the southeast corner of township 17, range 5, thence northerly to the northeast corner of township 20, range 5; thence westerly to the southeast corner of township 21, range 4; all north and east, thence northerly along range line to sixth standard parallel north; thence westerly to the northwest corner of township 24 north, range 1 west; thence southerly along range line to boundary of old San Joaquin del Nacimiento claim; thence in general southwesterly and easterly direction, along said boundary, to range line between ranges 1 and 2 west; thence southerly to southwest corner of township 19 north, range 1 west; thence easterly to southeast of said township; thence southerly along New Mexico principal meridian to the intersection with the eastern boundary of Ojo del Espritu Santa grant; thence southeasterly along said boundary to the intersection with the fourth standard parallel, thence easterly along said parallel to place of beginning.

## DESCENDANT OF ANDRE DIES IN MISSOURI.

St. Joseph, Mo., Sept. 4—Samuel Jacobs, a lineal descendant of Major Andre of revolutionary fame, is dead at his home here aged 82. He was a civil engineer.

## DIPLOMAT DIES OF HEART DISEASE.

Vienna, Sept. 4—Count Von Deyme, the Austro-Hungarian ambassador to Great Britain, died yesterday at Ekersdorf, Silesia, of heart disease.

## TROOPS FOR CRIPPLE

**Upon Request of Mine Owners Governor Peabody Orders Out State Militia.**

## THE DISTRICT IS QUIET

**Sheriff Robertson Declares There Is No Necessity for Presence of the Soldiers.**

Denver, Colo., Sept. 4—Governor Peabody decided at noon today, after receiving the report of the committee which he sent to Cripple Creek to investigate the strike conditions, to dispatch troops to that district. Orders were issued by Adjutant-General Bell to the First regiment infantry, company H, Second regiment, first squadron cavalry, consisting of troops B, D and C, Battery A, and signal and medical corps of the National guard to proceed to Cripple Creek. The force, which will number about 1,000 men, will be commanded by Brigadier-General Chase. Troops were asked for by the Mine Owners' association but Sheriff Robertson declared he saw no necessity for calling out the militia. There has been no disorder in Cripple Creek since Tuesday night, when several men were assaulted.

## THREATENED EXPOSURE UN- BALANCED HIS MIND.

New York, Sept. 4—More than \$50,000, perhaps \$100,000, is lost to the St. Michael's Episcopal Church according to the Herald through the forgeries and misappropriations by Henry T. Edison, who Wednesday killed Mrs. Fannie E. Pullen and himself. Threatened exposure is believed to have unbalanced his mind.

## BULLETIN NO. 46.

Agricultural College Experiments With a Corn Crop.

The New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts has issued Bulletin No. 46 relating to "Soil Moisture Investigations for the Seasons of 1901 and 1902." A number of experiments were conducted at the agricultural experiment station at Mesilla Park in order to ascertain the best methods of irrigation for corn; the relation between the amount of moisture in the soil the number of irrigations, and the yield of corn; the effect of different numbers of cultivations on both the moisture content of the soil or the yield of corn; the effect of sub-soiling; the amount of moisture in the soil when corn shows a decided drought effect; the effects of winter irrigation on the moisture in spring and summer; and the amount of lateral percolation in the soil. The work, as in former years, was carried on jointly between the departments of agriculture and soils.

The bulletin contains 46 pages of text and tables and much valuable information to agriculturists. As the pamphlet was printed by the New Mexican Printing company its typographical appearance is, of course, excellent.

## BURNED PAPER IN A STOVE.

And Incidentally Fired a Large Portion of the Town.

Tuesday afternoon after a clerk in the Remsburg Mercantile company at Elizabethtown had unpacked a consignment of hams and bacon he threw the grease-soaked paper wrappers in a stove and set them on fire. The fire was evidently defective, and the roof of the building caught fire. The flames spread to the Mutz hotel, Mutz butcher shop, Remsburg's warehouse, Brainerd's saloon and warehouse, and the Moreno hotel, entirely consuming them, as well as all buildings in the rear of the block.

The losses are estimated at about \$25,000 in all, divided as follows: Remsburg Mercantile company, store and warehouse, \$12,000; H. Mutz hotel and butcher shop, buildings and stock, \$7,000; Harry Brainerd, saloon, warehouse, stock, \$4,500; Moreno hotel, \$1,000; business building of Pritchard estate, \$1,500.

## ELECTRIC RAILWAY.

Albuquerque to Have Street Cars With All Modern Improvements.

Wednesday afternoon the county commissioners of Bernalillo County held a special meeting and granted a franchise to the Albuquerque Traction company to operate an electric street railway line in the county, the franchise to run for a term of fifty years. The franchise requires that construction upon the line must begin within a year from date, and that the cars must be of improved pattern, with fenders and brakes. The franchise is granted to William H. Greer.

### GOOD BYE, SIR THOMAS.

Fifty years ago the yacht "America" won a cup from the entire British Royal Yacht Club. Commodore Stevens sailed across the Atlantic in his little boat and arrived in England just before the annual race of the above club. Being an American the Commodore was naturally a modest man, and rather timidly asked some of the officers of said club if they would permit him to enter the America. After a good deal of joking at the Yankees' audacity he was informed that the permission was granted; of course it was regarded as a good joke as not a member of the Royal Yacht Club ever entertained the ridiculous idea that any one outside of "the tight little island" could lift that cup, which by the way was presented by Queen Victoria. The course was round the Isle of Wight and Victoria was present in her royal yacht. As the time arrived for the end of the race the Queen asked her signal officer to try to see which of the contestants was ahead. It did not take him long to ascertain, and with a very glum face he told the Queen that the America was the first. "And which is second," asked the Queen. The reluctant reply was, "May it please your majesty there is no second at all." The fact was that the Yankee boat was so far ahead that the Britishers were lost in the fog, and came straggling in during the day and night, the most disgusted lot of British Tars that ever sailed the salt seas.

New York, Aug. 31.—It was learned tonight that before the race with Reliance today Sir Thomas Lipton offered Captain Wringe \$50,000 and \$2,500 annually for life, and also promised a bonus of \$500 to every member of the crew if the Shamrock should win the three next races.

The above dispatch is just to hand and after all these liberal inducements they were not able to do it and the cup remains in America until, as Sir Thomas says, "We can get a Herreshoff to build our boats," which they are not likely to do, as they have never been able to build either fighting or sailing ship to be any better than a bad second to ours.

The Canadian Pacific railway presents the unique spectacle of a railroad which owns \$2 of assets for every \$1 liabilities. It were better for this country if such could be said of its great railway systems.

The Albuquerque Citizen has enlarged, and this week appears with a new head and head letter. If New Mexican newspapers continue to enlarge and improve at the present rate they will soon be on an equal footing with the best of the Denver dailies.

There was an enormous decline in the mineral output of the Cripple Creek district of Colorado last month and this month no better showing is made. Continued strikes at mines and smelters threaten to ruin the mineral industry of the Centennial State for the time being. The unions in their endeavor to make things easy for their members are killing the industry that gives them sustenance.

The third annual tournament of the Firemen's Association of New Mexico held in this city yesterday was a success and will prove a benefit to the association. The holding of such meetings brings about a much better spirit between the different towns, cities and sections of the Territory and should be encouraged as much as possible. Only good can come from such gatherings and conventions.

The New Mexican is a consistent and energetic advocate of statehood for New Mexico, but it does not believe that the cause of statehood can be aided by holding a convention of delegates from New Mexico and Arizona upon the question during the present year. Hence its opposition to such plan as above stated. Give the people of New Mexico a rest on political conventions during the present year. They certainly deserve it.

New Mexican want and miscellaneous ads always bring good results.

Tucumcari is happy. Orders have been issued to resume work on the extension of the Choctaw railroad from Amarillo to the capital of Quay County. This town bids fair to be one of the largest and most prosperous of any of the newer towns of the Territory within two years. Here is to the town with the euphonious name "Tucumcari." May the municipality exist long and prosper constantly.

For some reason or the other, El Republicano seems an unpropitious name for a newspaper in New Mexico. A few weeks ago El Republicano at Socorro gave up the ghost and last week El Republicano at Tierra Amarilla followed suit. In the meanwhile the Portales Herald has been revived leaving the number of publications in New Mexico at the figure sixty-nine. An effort should be made to have it reach seventy at least.

The New Mexican's esteemed contemporary, the Albuquerque Citizen would be a most creditable paper for a town containing double the number of inhabitants of the Duke City. The enterprise and pluck of the proprietors of the paper are certainly highly commendable and should be fully appreciated by the citizens and business men of its town. The fact that the Citizen was enabled to so speedily again improve in size and appearance, shows well for all concerned.

Although Chaves County gave up considerable area and wealth toward the formation of Roosevelt County, yet its assessment for 1903 shows an increase of \$30,000 over that of 1902 despite the fact that Chaves County already had the highest per capita assessment of any county in New Mexico. This shows two things: That Chaves County is mighty prosperous and that the assessor and the board of county commissioners of the county understand their business even though they are Democrats.

Report comes from Washington that Chief Justice Joseph R. Reel of the U. S. court of private land claims, who is a resident of Iowa, is a candidate for appointment to the vacancy now existing on the Territorial Supreme bench. Chief Justice Reel is a most estimable gentleman, an able jurist and an exemplary judge, but notwithstanding all this, the people of New Mexico prefer that the appointment be given to a citizen of the Territory. That is what they want and that is what they will have if possible. In addition the New Mexican is inclined to the belief that the report is untrue.

El Boletín Popular, published at Santa Fe, is following the example of the New Mexican and is printing a number of very interesting historical sketches. Much of this material has never before appeared in print and from it the future histories of the Territory will be written. The Deming Graphic recently published such reminiscences of the pioneers of Deming and it would be well for other newspapers to perform the same service for their towns. The history of New Mexico abounds in romance and thrilling incidents and many of these incidents are forgotten with the death of those who took part in or witnessed them. Therefore, the importance of putting them into print and preserving them for future generations.

The cement industry promises to become an important factor in the industrial upbuilding of the Territory. The cement plant at Ancho in Lincoln County, is quite a success and may furnish part of the building material for the New Mexico World's fair building at St. Louis. Two more cement plants are to be built in the near future, both in Chaves County, and there is a probability of a third plant being erected at Alamogordo. In eastern Pennsylvania the cement industry employs thousands of persons and yet the United States annually imports a large amount of that material which it might as well manufacture at home. New Mexico has the raw material in abundance for a very excellent quality of cement and sooner or later the Territory will supply the market not only at home but also beyond.

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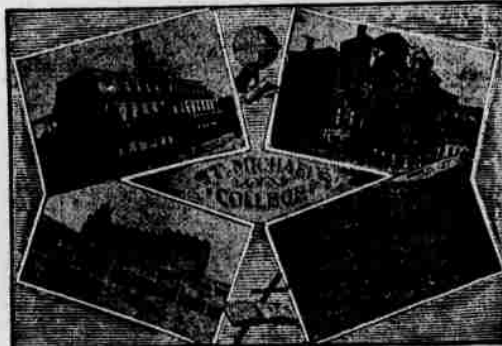

# MINES AND MILLS

Contrary to reports, operations by the Santa Rita Mining company at Santa Rita, Grant County, will be pushed with even greater energy than in the past. B. B. Thayer, the manager of the company, has returned from New York where he had been in consultation with the officers of the company and as a result work will be kept up on the company's properties.

Charles Taggart of Pintada, Leonard Wood County, is arranging with Matt Standish at Las Vegas for the reduction of a large quantity of ore from his mining claims thirty-five miles southeast of Anton Chico.

Dr. J. R. Shive of Shawnee, Okla., D. C. Jones and J. A. McSpadden of McClellan, Tex., and J. W. Campbell left Roswell last week for the White mountains to investigate the property of the Mesquero Mining and Milling company in which they are interested.

The shaft on the coal deposit near Elida, Roosevelt County, is down several feet. It has reached a two and a half foot stratum of coal. It is intended to supply Portales and Roswell with coal from the mine if the deposit does not pinch out.

What the mining world owes to the early silver miners in Nevada is set forth in an article in the Mining and Scientific Press of last week from which the New Mexican quotes the following, for conditions as they existed in those days in Nevada exist today to a certain extent in New Mexico mining camps:

"The decadence of the once famous mining town of Virginia, Nev., calls to mind the debt that mining owes to the methods pursued by the miners of the Comstock and their splendid audacity in the days when it took nerve to do what they did, viz.: prove the existence at depth of ore in greater paying quantities than surface or superficial workings would warrant. Like the cautious voyagers of ancient days, who crept carefully from headland to headland ever content to skirt the shores of the great sea, many miners of an earlier day had mostly confined their workings to be continuous only with the continuity of ore, and when a 'barren zone' was encountered work usually stopped in that particular place. If the oxidized ore gave out and the sulphurets came in; if water made sinking a matter of expense, or the small appropriation made further progress a question of doubtful finance the tendency was to stop and try elsewhere. But as Columbus, sublime in the conception of scientific fact, forsook the shore and sailed boldly out to discover a new world, so the Comstock miner discarded ancient custom and regardless of precedent or tradition went on in demonstration of the fact that a superficial stratum of hard rock, or an apparently insuperable obstacle of water or swelling ground, only made necessary the exercise of greater enterprise and skill. The material success that crowned his efforts, that poured a steady stream of treasure into the nation's life at the very time the nation was engaged in a struggle for existence and most needed help, great as that success was, is but a part of the advantage the world derived in the splendid lesson taught, that in mining, as in other things, the greater the obstacle the greater the incentive to overcome it. It is largely because of his indomitable courage and energy that deep mining is now possible in every place where now successfully carried on, for when men saw the vast treasure uncovered at Mount Davidson the sight told them that in many other places the same energy would tend to the same success."

The Oro Dredging company now at work in the Moreno district in western Colfax County is being worked very successfully. The dredge is a wonderful piece of machinery and the results are satisfactory. J. H. Reiling, an expert mining engineer, has charge of the dredge. The dredge works down 20 feet below the surface of the river bed and is now at work in the bed of the Cimarron river. About 3,000 cubic yards of dirt per day are being handled and the mechanical appliances are so perfect that only a half dozen men are required to do this. Report has it that the company is taking out from 50 to 75 ounces of the purest placer gold per day. The dirt runs at an average, according to the best obtainable information, from 15 to 25 cents per cubic yard. It is said that one-third of the gold produced in New Mexico during the last year was realized from the Oro Dredging company's operations.

R. H. Sanders who organized the Timber Peak Mining company in Socorro County in 1898, has recently purchased all of the company's interest at Timber Peak and resumed work on the property.

Nathan Hall of Socorro has bonded the Zeldia claim in Water canon and is systematically working it.

The Key, the property of the Mines Development association, is assuming the conditions of a property as the development advances. This property has the greatest prospects of making a regular Magdalena producer of any of the undeveloped properties in Socorro County.

Judge Brown's favorable opinion of the Supreme court of New Mexico means a good deal, as in his official capacity, he has read and understands the decisions of the New Mexico Supreme court and especially of the cases appealed to the United States Supreme court, and the people of New Mexico have, therefore, good reason to be justly proud of their highest tribunal.

### OFFICIAL MATTERS.

#### Territorial Funds Received.

Territorial Treasurer J. H. Vaughn has received from the collector and ex-officio treasurer of Grant County, John W. Fleming, funds to the amount of \$499.50, taxes for 1902.

#### Postoffice Discontinued.

The postoffice at Albemarle Sandoval County, has been discontinued. Mail for Albemarle will hereafter go to Bland.

#### Bulletins on Eddy County Sent Out.

The bureau of immigration today sent 2,000 copies of the new revised and enlarged edition of its publication descriptive of Eddy County to F. G. Tracy, president of the Pecos Irrigation company at Carlsbad, for distribution and 5,000 copies to Don A. Sweet, traffic manager of the Pecos Valley & Northeastern railroad at Amarilla, Tex., for similar use. There is a great demand for these bulletins and 10,000 have just been printed by the bureau for distribution by railroads, by the Pecos Irrigation company, by citizens of Eddy County and by the bureau itself.

#### Dona Ana 1903 Assessment Rolls.

Territorial Auditor W. S. Sargent has received the assessment rolls of Dona Ana County for 1903. The following are the figures given: There are 39,747 acres of agricultural lands assessed at \$3,725.05 and the improvements of same are placed at \$125,494. The pastoral lands are put at 71,645 acres; the assessed valuation is \$103,431 and improvements at \$23,835. There are 1,187 town lots with a valuation of \$55,689 and the improvements are assessed at \$143,638. There are 137 miles of railroad in the county with an assessed valuation of \$900,583 on tracks and rolling stock and of \$14,639 on buildings, tools and machinery. Mines are assessed at \$23,385 and of the flouring and other mills at \$11,500. Book accounts are listed at \$5,900. There are 4,461 horses valued at \$40,603; 176 mules at \$3,687; 15,023 head of cattle at \$169,898; 18,540 sheep at \$20,540; 5,628 goats at \$5,628; 725 swine at \$1,775; 60 burros at \$200; while the total valuation of all kinds of vehicles is \$13,061 and saddles and harness is \$7,210. The value of merchandise is \$3,750. Farming implements are valued at \$17,639 and the fixtures of stores and other places of business at \$3,205. There is \$2,090 in money and the valuation of the bonds, etc., held is put at \$350, while the value of jewelry, etc., is \$1,390. The value of household furniture is \$19,844. The value of shares in corporations is put at \$6,000 and the value of the 26 tons of hay and alfalfa on hand March 1 at \$215. The total assessed value of all kinds of property is \$2,189,899 and the exemptions and reductions amount of \$112,200 leaving available for taxes property to the amount of \$2,077,699.

#### THE GOLD BULLION COMPANY.

Operates Twenty-Four Claims at Golden in Southern Santa Fe County.

Col. J. A. Wood, manager of the Gold Bullion company, operating in the placer fields at Golden, in the southern part of this county, spent yesterday in the city.

The company has twenty-four placer claims in their district at Golden and upon which there are now in operation three wells, 520 feet deep, from which water is pumped to use in washing the placer dirt of the claims. The capacity of each of the wells is 70 gallons per minute. There are 17 men employed and the pumps are operated by steam power. Colonel Wood expresses himself as highly pleased with the operations this season and believes that his company has a very good thing.

#### DISTRICT COURT.

The hearing in the case of the Defensive Association of the Land Settlers of the Rio de Castilla vs. The United States Freehold Land and Irrigation company, which has been in progress for the past two days before Judge John R. McFie of the First District court for Taos was concluded this morning. The court sustained the demurrer to the complaint and replication of the plaintiffs. The gist of the decision is that the so-called Defensive association was not and had never been a corporation under the laws of the Territory and as such could not maintain its suit against the defendant. The motion was for judgment on the pleadings in the case which were filed for the defendant. The attorneys for the defendant are Abbott & Abbott and for the plaintiffs Larrazolo and Spiess.

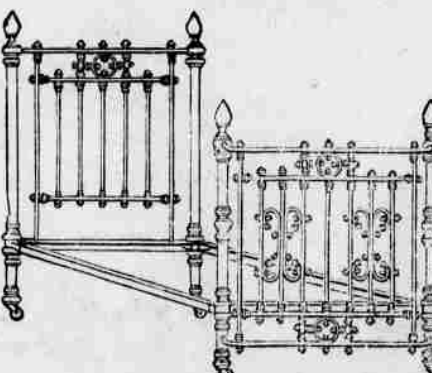

## TERRITORIAL PICKINGS

### CHAVES COUNTY.

Charles E. Wilson Drwined in the Pecos River--Contract Awarded for a New School House.

J. W. Walters has purchased the interest of C. E. Edgerton in the Wildy Realty company at Roswell.

The \$6,000 residence on the ranch of Walter Chisum, five miles south of Roswell, has been completed.

J. W. Maxey will erect a beautiful residence at Roswell on the lot adjoining the Roswell National bank.

The New Mexico Military Institute opened its fall session on Tuesday, September 2, with an enrollment of 98 cadets.

C. M. Berryhill has a balloon 60 feet high and 100 feet in circumference at Roswell and will give ascensions every day this and next week.

Mrs. J. H. Elliott and daughter-in-law, Mrs. Walter W. Elliott, and child, were painfully injured at Roswell this week in a runaway. The buggy was badly smashed.

W. T. Davis, owner of the Wood-awn farm four miles southeast of Roswell, has, since July 20, sold \$213 worth of roasting ears from a three-acre plot planted with corn.

The Lawrence Plaster company will establish a plant twenty miles north of Roswell, while the Pecos Valley Cement and Plaster company will establish a plant 60 miles south of Roswell.

The board of education of Roswell has awarded the contract for the erection of a new modern school building on Military heights to Sherman & Tomlinson. The contract price is \$6,274.

J. Meece, a consumptive, who died at Roswell a few days ago, confessed that he was a fugitive from justice and had deserted his wife at Murray, Ky. He stole \$40 at that place and has been on the road eighteen months since then to escape the officers.

The Roswell Record will have the Associated press service within thirty days as the negotiations with the Western Union Telegraph company have at last resulted favorably. A new wire is to be strung by that company from Denver to Amarillo and from there to Roswell.

The Wildy Realty company at Roswell last week sold to J. Walters a lot north of the Wisely building. Consideration, \$2,500. Mr. Walters will immediately erect a business block on the lot. The company also sold to J. W. Maxey twenty-two feet of the Bonny lot for \$4,000. A store building will be erected on the lot.

Major Stanford, a young colored man of Roswell, was arrested on charge of Benjamin Harrison, an old negro. The charge was disorderly conduct. As old Harrison was standing in the door of the justice of the peace's office waiting for the hearing, Stanford walked up to him and assaulted the old man, then taking to his heels. Stanford was rearrested and held in \$200 bond.

Charles E. Wilson was drowned in the Pecos River eighteen miles from Roswell, last Friday. He was hauling water from the Green ranch to his own place and in so doing he crossed the Pecos river. He had two barrels in the wagon and in going into the river the wheels went into a deep hole causing the barrels to roll to the front. They struck Wilson, knocked him into the river and the wagon passed over his body. He was not found until Saturday when his body was discovered by Oscar Walter. He was lying face downward in about twelve inches of water. The remains were taken to Independence, Mo., for interment. Wilson was 65 years of age and had been in Chaves County two years. He is survived by two daughters and three sons.

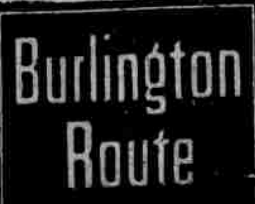

## A MILE IN 58 SECONDS

Made on the Santa Fe Central by a Special Last Sunday—Magnificent Roadbed.

The best time that has been made on the new Santa Fe Central was made last Sunday by the Burke special and the time of a mile in 58 seconds was made for more than a mile between the stations of Moriarty and Willard. There is a beautiful stretch of track lying on the top of the Estancia plains here and it is a part of the 24-mile tangent that has caused so much favorable comment on the part of engineers and railroad men who are thoroughly familiar with the essentials, as well as the pretty features, of modern railroad building.

The Burke special was in personal charge of General Superintendent J. H. Harris of the Santa Fe Central and while this record breaking time was made it was not due to any especially arranged plan on the part of the management. The train had left Moriarty and nothing was thought of the run until someone remarked that the train was making good time. The stop watch was held on the train between mile posts 39 and 40 the time was 58½ seconds, and between 41 and 42 the mile was clipped off in exactly 58 seconds. The run was kept up until mile post 47 was passed at an average rate of a mile a minute. The best time was for the miles given, however, and this was without any particular effort on the part of the management to establish a new record over that made by the special run over the road last week carrying the party of General Manager W. S. Howell and other officials of the road.

The physical condition of the Santa Fe Central is one of the most notable features in railroad construction in the southwest. The road has been open for regular travel only since August 20, and it would be hard to find anywhere in the Southwest a smoother piece of work or an easier riding road. The track and road bed are really models. The train of Sunday which broke the record was very light and was composed of only a tank-car and a coach. The conductor was James Carlisle and Engineer S. S. Marshall was at the throttle.

The Santa Fe Central management is especially pleased with the steel rails on the tracks of the road. These are of the 70-pound A. Carnegie section variety and are giving perfect satisfaction. They are superior to the 60-pound rails manufactured by the Colorado Fuel and Iron company.
