## CONGRESS A BIG SUCCESS

Former Governor Prince Reviews the Work Done at the National Irrigation Sessions.

## TERRITORY'S SHOWING

Was Better Represented Than Usual, Having no Less Than Fifteen Delegates Present.

Hon. L. Bradford Prince returned from Ogden Monday night on delayed train No. 7 of the Santa Fe system on which the El Paso delegation and their band were also traveling. In discussing the National Irrigation congress with a representative of the New Mexican Governor Prince said:

"The congress was a big success in every way. In members it was the largest ever held and more states were represented than ever before, as the people of the Mississippi valley and the East have begun to understand the wide interest of the irrigation question, and the intimate connection between storing the surplus waters at the head streams and preventing floods further down. There were more Governors, Senators and Congressmen than ever before; Senator Clarke, of Montana, being president and Senator Burton of Kansas, making one of the most valuable addresses.

"The most notable feature, however, was the presence and active intent of Secretary Wilson, who made a most encouraging speech and was always on the platform, and of Newell A. M. Prichard, chief of the bureau of irrigation and of forestry, with no less than twenty-five of the leading engineers in charge of the work in different states and territories.

"New Mexico was better represented than usual having no less than fifteen delegates. The event of most interest to Santa Fe was the selection of El Paso as the place for the next congress. This will almost certainly accrete the improvement of the line of the Denver & Rio Grande from Alamosa to Santa Fe and the establishment of rapid communication between Denver and El Paso by way of the Santa Fe Central.

"All the delegates from Oregon, Washington, Nevada, Utah, Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, Colorado and the Dakotas will naturally come via Denver or Pueblo and this will be an incentive to the early completion of the through line. By proper arrangements a large number of those traveling on that route can be induced to stop over at Santa Fe, to visit the places of interest, just as the majority of the delegates stopped over at Salt Lake City.

"Now that the Irrigation congress will be held on the very border of New Mexico, the Territory must arrange to have a large delegation from all sections. There is no reason why two or three hundred of our people should not be present. We should also have a fine fruit display, as that was an important feature at Ogden."

The New Mexico officers of the next congress are: Hon. L. B. Prince, vice-president; G. A. Richardson, Esq., member executive committee.

## RUSH OF IMMIGRANTS

Inspectors at Ellis Island Having Been Working Overtime During Past Three Days.

New York, Sept. 23—There has been a fresh rush of immigrants to America, and during the past three days inspectors at Ellis Island have been working overtime. On Monday 3,646 persons were passed by the authorities and the next day showed nearly 5,000.

Most of the immigrants during the past two days have been of the better class of Germans and Poles. Comparatively few remained in this city, the majority going at once to distant parts of the country. According to reports received from various parts of Europe, the immigration to this country this fall will be greater than ever before.

## A NEW CONSTITUTION

The Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of New Mexico Adopts One.

The committee of Knights Templar, which has been at work in this city for the past two days preparing a new constitution and by-laws for the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of New Mexico, has finished its labors and will report the results to the annual convocation of the Grand Commandery meeting in Albuquerque next month.

The committee consisted of C. M. Blackwell, grand commander, Raton; Colonel J. P. McGrorty, past grand commander, Deming; Solicitor General E. L. Bartlett, past grand commander, Santa Fe, and A. A. Keen, grand recorder. Grand Commander Blackwell was unable to be present and the work devolved upon the three remaining members of the committee.

A great deal of the preliminary labor had been prepared by Colonel McGrorty, who also got up an excellent digest of the constitution, by-laws, edicts and decrees of the grand encampment of Knights Templar of the United States as far as applicable to important questions and of use by New Mexico Knights Templar. The work has been well and expeditiously done.

## A JOYFUL REUNION

Mrs. I. B. Hanna Meets Brother Whom She Had Not Seen in Twenty-Seven Years.

## PROSPEROUS RANCHER

For Twenty-Three Years Mr. Hall Has Been Identified With Arizona's Business Interests.

There was a joyful reunion at the home of I. B. Hanna, superintendent of forest reserves, the other evening, when his wife met for the first time in twenty-seven years, her brother, Norman Hall, who left his home in Kankakee, Ill., when but seventeen years of age, to cast his fortunes with the people of the great West.

Mr. Hall who is a prosperous ranchman in Arizona, has been in communication with his sister, ever since she came to Santa Fe four years ago, from her native town of Kankakee. The change, however, in both brother and sister, since they parted in the Centennial days, was not so great, but what they would have recognized each other, even though they had not met under the sister's roof.

On leaving Kankakee Mr. Hall went to Idaho, and after spending some time there located in Montana. Later he went to Arizona, where for the past 23 years he has been identified with the business interests of Prescott, Phoenix and Flagstaff. In addition to owning a ranch, Mr. Hall has made a small fortune as a freighter, having half a hundred teams engaged in transporting merchandise across the arid sections of Arizona.

Mr. Hall will spend a week or ten days with his sister, before returning to his home.

## TO REDEEM BONDS.

Secretary Shaw Authorizes Taking Up at Once of 1904 Five Per Cent Series.

Washington, Sept. 23—Secretary of the Treasury Shaw authorizes the statement that owing to the scarcity of two per cent bonds, both for circulation and as security for government deposits, he will renew the refunding operations to the extent of \$20,000,000 in accordance with a previous circular.

Secretary Shaw also authorizes the statement that he will redeem five per cent bonds maturing February 1, 1904, paying interest to maturity. Formal instructions to the several sub-treasuries authorizing them to redeem on presentation will be issued today.

# CENTERS OF LEARNING IN CAPITAL CITY

Over Fourteen Hundred Pupils Are Enrolled at the Various Schools and at St. Michael's College.

## NEED OF MODERN PUBLIC SCHOOL HOUSES APPARENT

The children of school age enrolled at the various centers of learning in the Capital City at the present time number 1,405, although this number will pass the 1,600 mark by October 15, as none of the institutions are as yet enjoying a full attendance of pupils. The public schools of the city have the largest enrollment, notwithstanding the fact they have the poorest accommodations.

To the stranger within the city gates, to the ranchman who would educate his children at the city schools, or to those contemplating moving into the Territory from some other section of the country, the public school buildings of Santa Fe present the most deplorable condition. And why? They are nothing more or less than adobe shacks, badly ventilated and absolutely without sanitary conditions. And yet the parents among the population of the Capital City wonder why parents desiring an education for their children, halt on the threshold of such school shacks, and consider the advisability of sacrificing their children's health, for the fund of knowledge that could be obtained amid such unsanitary surroundings.

All of the other centers of learning of Santa Fe, with the exception of the public schools, boast of modern school buildings and class rooms, well ventilated, and with all sanitary conveniences. The need of well ventilated and sanitary school buildings at the public centers of learning in the Capital City of the Territory of New Mexico should be apparent to all, for, until then, will the enrollment be materially increased, and the citizens of Santa Fe in a position to invite the stranger or the prospective settler, to take advantage of the public school system here. The system pursued in educating the children is up to the standard, but the seats of education are far, far below that mark, and are a menace to the community.

At the Public Schools. At the public schools of the city, the enrollment to date has reached four hundred. This student body is under the direction of Prof. J. A. Wood, superintendent of schools, under whom there is a competent staff of twelve teachers. With the exception of 60 who are in the kindergarten and 30 in the high school, the pupils are divided among the eight grades of the common school course.

United States Indian School. Next to the public schools of the city, the United States Industrial Indian school, of which Prof. C. J. Crandall is superintendent, has the largest enrollment. Here 327 of the young Indian ideas are taught how to shoot, by a staff of seven teachers, augmented by a staff of twenty, who teach the pupils the industrial arts. The student body consists of 215 boys and 112 girls.

Cathedral Parochial School. At the Cathedral Parochial school, with Sister Lajolo at the head, the enrollment of 222 pupils, is made up entirely of members of the weaker sex. Four teachers induct the student body into the intricacies of a common school education, at this institution.

St. Michael's College. The enrollment at St. Michael's college, the oldest seat of learning in the great Southwest, comes fourth on the list. Here a faculty of the Christian brothers, under the direction of Brother Botolph, the president of the college, divide their time among 175 boys, 70 of whom are boarders at the college, while the others are simply day pupils. The faculty consists of ten competent professors and teachers, the number having been increased by one during the past week, the increased attendance necessitating not

only an additional teacher, but the opening of another study hall for the juniors.

Miss Duval's Private School. The Capital City also boasts of a private school, which is conducted by Miss Elizabeth Duval in the Gallegos block. Miss Duval is assisted in instructing 25 day pupils, by Miss Collins, of New York City. The educational course received at Miss Duval's school prepares the students for collegiate courses.

St. Catherine's School. St. Catherine's Industrial school, which is maintained by Sister Catherine Drexel, of Philadelphia, for the education of Indian children of both sexes, has at present 80 children in attendance, 35 of whom are boys and 45 girls. Mother Gabriel, superior, is at the head of the institution. A staff of 13 teachers is employed, and the enrollment should reach 150 within the next few weeks.

The Allison School. The Allison school, which is conducted under the auspices of the Presbyterian Mission board, has at present an enrollment of 80 pupils, 74 of whom are boarders, and the rest day pupils. Miss M. Bertha Leaningham is superintendent of the institution, and Miss Olinda Meeker, is principal. A staff of eight teachers is employed. The student body is made up exclusively of young girls.

Loretto Academy. At the Loretto academy there is a student body of 110, instructed by a staff of seven teachers, under the direction of Sister Lucia, superior. Of this number 63 are day pupils, and 47 boarders. There is also a music class of 52 pupils. Like the Cathedral Parochial school, the pupils are all girls.

CONVENTION REPORTS ON SUSPENSION OF UNION. Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 23—The credentials committee today presented two reports to the convention of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, on the status of Local Union No. 2, of New York City, whose leader is Samuel J. Parks, and which recently was suspended by President Buchanan. The majority report referred the matter to the convention for final action, while the minority declared that the suspension of the union was unconstitutional. At noon the convention took a recess till 2 o'clock, without having reached a conclusion in Parks' case.

SENATOR FARWELL DEAD. Was Prominent in Illinois and National Politics Since 1884—An Octogenarian. Chicago, Sept. 23—Former United States Senator Charles B. Farwell died in his home of heart trouble today, after an illness of several months. Senator Farwell had been prominent in local, state, and national politics since 1884.

In 1864 he purchased an interest in the wholesale business of J. V. Farwell & Co. He was born in Steuben county, New York, eighty years ago.

## HIS ANNUAL MESSAGE

President Roosevelt Already at Work On It at His Oyster Bay Home.

Oyster Bay, Sept. 23—Already the President has begun work on his annual message to Congress. The message to be presented to the extraordinary session of Congress will be comparatively brief, and will not be issued until about the middle of October.

## DENVER CHARTER DEFEATED.

Face of Returns Show Plurality Votes Against it Numbered 7,000.

Denver, Sept. 23—W. H. Bryant, chairman of the Charter Campaign committee assisted by other attorneys interested in the efforts of the honest election league to punish persons guilty of fraud in registration and the election of yesterday, are engaged today in arranging a mass of testimony which has been secured for presentation to the grand jury which will be summoned Friday in the west side court. All the evidence will be submitted to the grand jury and indictments secured before the arrests are made. On the face of the returns the charter was defeated by over 7,000 votes.

## KING PETER REQUESTS

HIS CABINET TO RESIGN.

Belgrade, Serbia, Sept. 23—At King Peter's request the cabinet will resign tomorrow, but ministers still remain in office until the meeting of skupstina.

## COUNSEL WITHDREW

Objected to Presence of Militia in Courtroom During Habeas Corpus Hearing.

## HEAVY GUARD PRESENT

General Chase Produced Military Prisoners and Arguments to Quash Proceedings Resumed.

Cripple Creek, Sept. 23—General Chase produced in the district court today the four military prisoners for whom writs of habeas corpus were issued, and a strong force of military was stationed in and about the court house.

Former Attorney General Eugene Engley who instituted the habeas corpus proceedings protested against the presence of the thirty soldiers in the court room, declaring it to be a violation of the constitution. Because they were permitted to remain he withdrew from the case. Attorney John Murphy also withdrew.

Arguments on motion to quash the proceedings in habeas corpus were then resumed.

## United Mine Workers Meet.

Pueblo, Sept. 23—The called convention of District No. 15 of the United Mine Workers of America, began this afternoon and resolved itself into executive session. Every union in the district which includes Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, and New Mexico was represented by delegates. It is believed that unless operators accede to the demands of the miners, the strike will be declared to be effective after October 5.

## MASKED ROBBERS.

Burlington Offers Reward for Arrest of Quartette That Held Up Portland Express.

St. Joseph, Mo., Sept. 23—Officials of the Burlington railroad company, in St. Joseph, announce that a suitable reward will be offered by the company for the arrest and conviction of the four masked men who held up and robbed the Portland express last night north of here. Railroad and express officials still insist that the robbers got no booty. Posses are scouring the country adjacent, on both sides of the river today, but so far without success.

## RAILROAD TO TUCUMCARI.

Work has been resumed on the construction of the Rock Island extension from Amarillo, Texas, to Tucumcari, N. M., which was suspended several weeks ago. Grading is now in progress on both ends of the line. The extension connects the Choctaw, Oklahoma & Gulf, a Rock Island road, with the El Paso line of Rock Island system.

## CANADA'S CASE CLOSED

Attorney General Finlay Thanked By Chief Justice and Receives Congratulations.

London, Sept. 23—Attorney General Finlay concluded his argument in behalf of Canada at this morning's session of the Alaskan boundary commission. He received the thanks of Chief Justice Alverstone and the congratulations of Secretary of War Root and Senator Lodge on his "lucid legislation of so technical and comprehensive a subject."

The attorney general made it clear that Canada wants about everything, and the American counsel told the Associated Press that every effort will be made by them to convince the tribunal that the treaty contemplated is a barrier between the Dominion and the ocean, and that the question of territory is not important, provided the shores and inlets remain in possession of the United States.

David T. Watson of Pittsburg, counsel for the American side, opened for the United States, describing the purchase of Alaska and stating that the United States published in 1867 a map issued by Russia in 1826, and that no protest was made against the boundary therein fixed, either by Great Britain or Canada.

## SUICIDE AND MURDER IN A VACANT CHICAGO LOT.

Chicago, Sept. 23—The bodies of a well dressed woman about twenty, and a man apparently thirty, were found in a vacant lot in the fashionable residential part of the city today. A revolver clutched in the dead man's hand, a bullet from which had passed through the woman's lung, and two bullet wounds in the man's neck, lead the police to believe it a case of murder and suicide. Names "Laurie" and "Sherman" on the woman's clothing, and initials "D. O. R." on the man's linen, are the only identifying marks of the bodies.

## PENNSYLVANIA BANKERS IN SESSION IN PITTSBURG.

Pittsburg, Sept. 23—Bankers from every section of Pennsylvania, and from New York, Chicago, Cincinnati, and other centers, were present today when the ninth annual convention of the Pennsylvania Bankers association was called to order. At the session addresses will be made by ex-Comptroller Chas. C. Dawes and William H. Smith, of Philadelphia, representing the banking department of Pennsylvania.

## PANAMA CANAL TREATY SITUATION IS UNCHANGED.

Washington Sept. 23—The state department today posted the following: "Department of state this (Wednesday) afternoon received from Minister Beaupre at Bogota, a telegram dated 5 p. m. September 22, stating that since the introduction of the proposed law in regard to the canal treaty, and its first reading, there has been no discussion of the measure in Colombian Congress and that the situation is unchanged."

## OIL DISTRICT ABLAZE

Fire in the Shoestring Fields Caused Damage to the Extent of \$200,000.

Beaumont, Texas, Sept. 23—(Bulletin)—Fire started at noon today in the east end of the Shoestring oil district and caused a damage of \$200,000. Dericks of Wierd, Davis, Davy Crockett, Emmett Landy and Jackson Tobin oil companies were destroyed. The tanks and pipe lines burst, causing a wild excitement. The fire crossed to the Texas field but was under control apparently at 2:30 o'clock.

## TO DIE ON SCAFFOLD.

Cythiana, Ky., Sept. 23—After a trial last eight days, a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree, and fixing the penalty at death on the scaffold, was returned by the jury in the case of Curtis Jett, charged with the murder of Town Marshal Cockrill at Jackson, Ky. The jury was out less than five hours.

## PUSH AHEAD, KEEP MOVING.

For many years the New Mexican has been urging the claims of New Mexico as a manufacturing country and at last this work is beginning to bear fruit. Along the line of the Santa Fe Central there are vast coal fields which will be utilized in the very near future. It is proposed to erect, at Estancia, a woolen mill, scouring mill, dipping works and dipping vats and sat works. When it is known that of every pound of wool shipped East, in the grease, more than half of the weight is dirt, and that freight must be paid on that as well as on the wool it reflects little credit on the sagacity of our wool growers to permit this shiftless condition of business to go on year after year when the wool might just as well be scoured here and a large part of what is now paid for freight be saved to themselves. But how much better than even this would be if instead of shipping wool East it could be woven into cloth here. The true secret of manufacturing success is to erect mills and factories closely contiguous to the raw material for that saves the transportation spent in freighting these materials in their crude state to the factories. It is repeating a truism to say that raw material is here in boundless quantities, that is patent to all and does not need repeating and a rich reward is waiting capital invested in woolen mills in New Mexico. Considerable interest is now being taken in New Mexico's iron deposits. Only a few days ago Colonel Heman of Tucumcari stated that he has known for many years of large iron deposits and that he was then in negotiation with several syndicates who intend to bring them into the market. It is such business as this that will bring New Mexico to the front.

This year's corn crop has suffered a great deal of late among the speculators in Chicago and on Wall street, but in reality it has been but very slightly injured and will be very large and of great value.

The Aztec Index tells of its "invincible" baseball team having gone down to defeat in two games with the Silverton team. That is the same kind of invincibility of which the Democratic party boasts.

The Shah of Persia is economizing. He has just put aside 364 of his wives and the fall supply in his harem will amount to 50 new ones. There is nothing like economy applied at the right time and in the right place.

Two years ago Mayor Low and District Attorney Jerome ran upon the same ticket in Gotham and were elected. Now, Mr. Jerome declares that Mayor Low is an egotist. Evidently things between these two worthies are not as pleasant as they once were.

The esteemed Albuquerque Citizen remarks that during the Albuquerque fair there will be much irrigation in the Duke City regardless of the holding of an irrigation convention there. This goes without saying and without opposition. The forty saloons in the town will help the irrigation movement along in every conceivable shape.

The railway mail division of the postoffice department should make more haste in the matter of establishing railway mail service on the Santa Fe Central. There are several growing towns along the new road which should be supplied by such service. Probably this branch of the postoffice department needs some investigations in order to punch it up to more speedy action.

The practice which prevails in a few towns in New Mexico of separating in the public schools the children of Spanish and English speaking parents is pernicious. It not only engenders race feeling but deprives English speaking children of the opportunity to learn Spanish and makes it more difficult for the Spanish speaking children to acquire English.

Las Cruces is blessed with five weekly newspapers and another has heralded its coming. That town is bound to make itself felt as the intellectual center of the Southwest.

The Journal-Democrat which has been making propaganda for the joint statehood proposition is honest enough to acknowledge that practically all the newspapers of Arizona are opposed to the idea, first, last and all the time; that nearly all of New Mexico newspapers advocate single statehood and that the Carlsbad Argus has discovered that a good many business people in its neck of the woods do not wish statehood at all for the present. It is well to be honest in these things. There is no use of deceiving ourselves about the sentiments of the people for the people will have the final say. If a poll were taken today it would be found that far the greater majority of the voters of the Territory are in favor of single statehood and that the advocates of joint statehood are not even as numerous as those who oppose statehood altogether.

Traveling Auditor Charles V. Safford has discovered that in more than one county financial matters are in a deplorable condition and that if the tax payers are not being robbed outright, they are at least losing large sums through ignorance or negligence. Unfortunately, the authority vested in him is not sufficient to compel county treasurers to produce the funds which they are charged or to remedy some of the gross negligence. It will be the task of the next legislature, to devise legislation to compel county officials to give a stricter account of their financial stewardship. However, the fact that a traveling auditor is keeping close tab on them, that he is unearthing all irregularities and is willing to instruct them in a better way of keeping accounts, is having a good influence in itself and it is hardly likely that the tax payers will suffer financially as much from the hands of dishonest or incompetent county officials as they have done in the past.

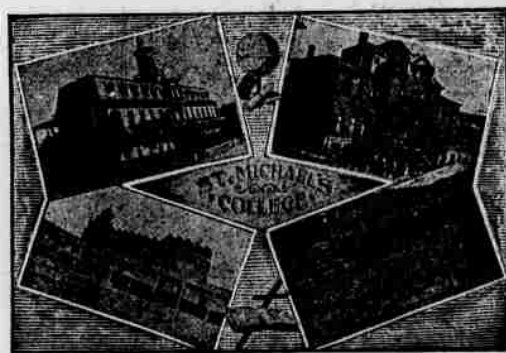

## MINES AND MILLS

A deal is pending for the Superior mine near Lordsburg, Grant county, and when the deal is completed work will be resumed on the mine.

E. C. Belt and others have transferred a group of claims near the Miser's Chest near Lordsburg to S. W. Maltbie. Some rich ore has been shipped from these claims and Mr. Maltbie has put a force of men to work to continue these shipments. The claims carry the largest body of shipping ore in the Virginia district.

The Shamrock Mining and Milling company has decided to put up another 40-ton furnace at its smelting plant at Pinos Altos. The company is daily receiving an increased tonnage for treatment and its present plant is taxed to its utmost capacity. One furnace is in use with a capacity of 35 tons a day while the shipments received amount to fifty tons a day. The company recently took a lease on the Philadelphia, a copper iron property at Hanover and is receiving several tons of ore a day from this mine which is owned by Frank Bell. This is in addition to its Pacific lease from the Hearst's which is giving it ten to fifteen tons a day. The St. Louis, Samson and Alessandro properties in the Burros are also shipping to the Shamrock. The Shamrock mine has been closed down temporarily owing to an accident to the air compressor but work in the mine is to be resumed as soon as the necessary repairs are made. There is some talk of moving the Shamrock's plant to Silver City.

More good strikes are being reported from Gold Gulch in Grant county. The first strike was made in the main shaft of the Owl at a depth of about 45 feet. It carries free gold and gives the owners Moses, Robertson and Craig two places from which to take pay ore.

The second strike was on the Lucky Bill by the lessees Easton and Gibson. They have a whim on this lease and have been sinking very rapidly since they started about two weeks ago. They encountered the main lead at a depth of seventy feet and now have a pay streak varying in width from three to twelve inches which will run several thousand dollars to the ton and which contains beautiful specimens of wire gold. The vein itself is about twenty-two inches wide, the value being \$100 to the ton on the average. The strike was made sixteen feet from the end line of the Owl and about 160 feet from the main shaft of the Owl. It is on the same dyke which can be traced for several thousand feet straight across the country.

Thompson & Copp who are leasing on the Owl claim farther up the hill and on the same dyke struck a body of ore at fifteen feet. The ore is spotted with galena. At present only a windlass is used but a whim will be erected in the course of a week or so. The claim is a few feet from the rich strike on the Pactolus made several weeks ago.

Westlake, Goodell and McPherson, Henry Carter and A. Bowman are subleasing on the Lucky Bill. The first named have struck a small body of ore which carries free gold.

Horace Moses has shipped a carload of ore from his lease on the Owl, weighing twenty-two tons and estimated to be worth \$25,000.

It is the intention of Dr. C. R. Lutton of the Michigan-New Mexico Copper company at Lordsburg to go down 800 feet on the Dakota-Pearl. A new sinking pump with a capacity of 100,000 gallons daily is being installed. A contract to sink 125 feet from the 260 foot level has been let to George Petty. The company will also put up a 60-ton smelting furnace and a 50-ton concentrator and leacher. The Dakota-Pearl group comprises three claims four miles from Lordsburg which have been patented by the Michigan company.

The Samson mine in the Burros last week shipped 50 tons of ore to the Shamrock smelter at Pinos Altos.

Ten tons of silver ore are being shipped daily by Adolph Witzel from his lease on the Baltic mine at Chloride Flat, near Silver City. A car of ore per month is being shipped to the El Paso smelter, the lower grade ore going to the Shamrock smelter.

Twenty-five men are employed on the Mountain Key mine recently reopened by its owner W. C. Chandler. The production is from twelve to fifteen tons a day. A new vein has been encountered, the lead varying in width from sixteen inches to four feet and carrying values in gold, silver and copper. It is a true fissure vein and upon drifting 120 feet on each side of the main shaft at the 700-foot level stopping has been commenced. The output from this new vein alone is to be increased to twenty tons a day, to be secured simply by stopping from the 700-foot level. The ore is shipped to the Shamrock smelter where it averages \$16 to \$18 in gold, \$5 in silver and 1 in copper. At first concentration was tried on the ore and after experimenting with something over 300 tons and finding that it was too base to permit of that process of treatment, smelting was resorted to with the greatest success.

The New Mexican Printing Company has on hand a quantity of tablets made from ledger, linen, flat and book papers which they will close out at 10 cents per pound. Suitable for school purposes and businessmen, also useful for the home. Only a limited supply.

**EDDY COUNTY.**

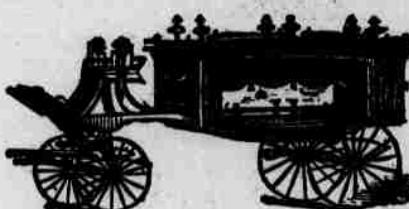
