GEN. BULLER FAILED.

Baron Roberts Placed in Command in South Africa.

Transvaal Republic Ready for Desperate Struggle with England.

General Kitchener Leaves Sudan for the South African War.

CABLE LINE INTERRUPTED BY STORM.

London, Dec. 18.—The following notice was posted in the war office: "As the campaign in Natal, in the opinion of her majesty's government, is likely to require the presence and undivided attention of General Sir Buller, it has been decided to send Baron Roberts as commander-in-chief of South Africa with Lord Kitchener as chief of staff."

Lieut. F. H. S. Roberts, only son of Baron Roberts, who was wounded in the engagement at Tugela river, is dead. All the reserves will be called out and the army in South Africa increased 50,000 men.

In spite of the attempts of the authorities to gloss over the suppression of General Buller, it is plain that the new appointments cannot be regarded otherwise than as the penalty for his failure. A semi-official communication says: "The disposition to regard the change as a reflection on General Buller is entirely erroneous. As the forces engaged in South Africa increase, officers of higher rank are naturally appointed to the supreme command. Friends of Buller see in the headlong plunge of the cabinet a suspicious panic. There is no denying that the prodigious exertion the government considers necessary to crush the two little republics shows that even the sedate Lord Salisbury sees the extreme gravity of the present aspect of affairs. Probably the ministers remembered the peril which the public seem to have forgotten of the possible rising of Kaffirs. Indeed, unpleasant rumors are already current in this direction, which would be infinitely more serious than the rebellion of the Utohs."

GEN. KITCHENER GOES TO TRANSVAAL.

Cairo, Dec. 18.—General Lord Kitchener appointed chief of staff of General Lord Roberts, new commander in chief of the British forces in South Africa, leaves on Tuesday, and will arrive Cape Town as soon as possible.

Cable Interrupted.

New York, Dec. 18.—The Commercial Cable company issued the following notice: "We are advised that the cable between Mozambique and Lorenzo Marques is interrupted. A terrific cyclone at Mozambique caused an interruption of the Belem Bay cable. The house has been blown down and ships in the harbor have been wrecked. The telegraph station was unroofed, but the instruments were saved."

TRANSVAAL WAS READY.

Boers Have Been Preparing for Years for the War.

New York, Dec. 18.—De Long, manager of a dynamite factory at Modderfontein, in the Transvaal, has just returned to France. He says that the British government can have no idea of the vast extent of the preparations that the Boers

have been quietly making for years with the realization that another struggle with full force with Great Britain was inevitable. Even should the Boers be driven out of Natal he points out that no British army could ever hope to enter the Transvaal and survive. He asserts that the forts in Pretoria and Johannesburg are as strong as any in the world, and have, within the last month, been rendered absolutely impregnable. De Long states that there are about 6,000 trained German volunteers in the Boer army who have not yet been allowed to go to the front.

Boatmen Burned.

New Madrid, Mo., December 18.—The steamer State of Kansas, of the Tennessee river packet company, burned to the water edge early to-day. All the passengers escaped.

Arrested for Rape.

Late last Saturday afternoon, Dan Brown, who has been assisting George Brown, the professional shoe shiner at the Oak barber shop, was arrested and placed in the city jail. Dan is quite a masher in colored circles, and he was arrested charged with attempting a criminal assault upon the person of the 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Washington.

Witnesses were heard from both the complainant and defendant in the case and the justice decided to dismiss the case.

DEATH OF LIEUT. BRUMBY.

New York, Dec. 18.—A dispatch to the Herald from Manila says: Among the numerous valuable records of the insurgent government captured by the Americans it is said there are numerous letters from the Junta. These letters give outlines of a plan formed by the Filipinos before the taking of Manila to secure arms and ammunition from the Americans with which to fight them for Manila capitulated. Other letters found indicate that Aguinaldo had the active moral support of prominent anti-expansionists in the United States. General Otis will forward these important papers to the war department at Washington.

MICHIGAN LEGISLATURE.

Gov. Pingree Announces to Equalize Tax on the Railroads.

Lansing, Mich., Dec. 18.—The Michigan legislature met in special session at noon to-day in response to a call of Governor Pingree. The governor's object is to secure the passage of a joint resolution providing for submission to the people at the general election next November of an amendment to the state constitution placing railroads upon the same basis for taxation as all other property.

At present the railroads pay specific taxes upon gross earnings. Interest in the special session is increased by the fact that the grand jury, which returned indictments alleging bribery against some of the legislators is still in session here. Speaker Adams of the house of representatives, one of the indicted men, presided to-day as usual.

Death of a Hero.

Washington, Dec. 18.—Lieutenant Thomas M. Brumby, flag lieutenant to Admiral Dewey during the Manila campaign, died on Sunday, of typhoid fever.

New York, Dec. 18.—It is announced that the clearing house banks made a rate of six per cent. for renewals of time loans to-day. It has been decided that no extreme rate for money will be charged if it can possibly be avoided.

Trust Company Fails.

New York, Dec. 18.—The Produce Exchange trust company has suspended payment pending examination of its books. The suspension of Henry Allen & Co., bankers and brokers, has been announced on the stock exchange.

The Produce Exchange Trust company was organized a couple of years ago with a capital of \$2,500,000, and had reported surplus and undivided profits at this time over \$2,600,000. Its business was chiefly with merchants, traders and corporations in its immediate vicinity.

Investigation of Roberts.

Washington, Dec. 18.—As the Utah witnesses in the Roberts case could not reach here until late to-day, Chairman Taylor, of the house investigation committee, determined on having no session to-day, and called a meeting for 10 o'clock to-morrow.

Marine Lost.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Dec. 18.—The Whaleback barge 115, which has been missing on Lake Superior since Wednesday, was today given up for lost, with her crew of nine men. Arthur A. Boyce, was captain; Michael Sillop, mate; William Buckner, cook.

London, Dec. 18.—Business on the stock exchange to-day opened with a better tone than the previous government to face the situation. Combs were below par, the first time since 1894, being quoted 99 1/2. Americans flat.
