WAR IN SOUTH AFRICA.

False Dispatches to Bolster Up English Credit.

Boers Report a Victory and British Loss Two Thousand.

Sharp Engagement Near Orange River and Several Killed and Wounded.

BRITISH BOMBARD AT COLENSO.

New York, Dec. 15.—A dispatch to the Herald from London says: The rumor of Ladysmith being relieved and 10,000 prisoners taken, it is said, was gotten up by a clique of brokers to stop the slump in South African shares.

BOERS CLAIM A VICTORY.

Pretoria, Dec. 15.—General Cronje reports yesterday that there was a desultory fighting till six o'clock, when the Boers were repulsed. The British were driven back to a position, but it became untenable and they suffered severely. I was unable to send help. The British were in overwhelming force, but must have had at least 2,000 men put out of action either killed or wounded.

Another report from Capt. Finn Hart says: "There were no signs of surrender, the burghers fighting with conspicuous bravery and maintaining their positions under heavy fire. Our cannon was of very little use."

BRITISH BOMBARD.

Frere Camp, Dec. 13.—Reported artillery duel between the British and the Boers did not come off to day. The British bombarded positions around Colenso, but the Boers did not reply.

CATTLE CONVENTION.

Scheme to Gobble up Government Land from Actual Settlers.

Fort Worth, Texas, Dec. 15.—Arrangements for the meeting of the National Live Stock association on January 15, are being rapidly completed. The attendance from the north and the northwest promises to be very large. One of the most important subjects to be considered is that of leasing the public grazing lands to stockmen. At the Denver convention, the proposition was to have the arid lands ceded to the states, but this was so strongly opposed by Wyoming, that the resolution failed to pass.

ARIZONA COPPER MINES CASE.

New York, Dec. 15.—In the supreme court to-day, Judge Gildersleeve heard arguments on the motion to make permanent the injunction to restrain the sale of the United Verde copper mines and smelters, at Jerome, Arizona. Action was instituted by George A. Treadwell, owner of 40,000 out of 300,000 shares.

ARIZONA COPPER MINES CASE.

Special to The Citizen.

Law Center, Dec. 15.—W. P. Sutton was recalled yesterday morning and questioned as to his connection with the Mexican government in relation to the International Dam site. He said that he had been employed by Max Weber, of Juarez, and had discussed the International dam with President Diaz and Minister Romero.

Philip H. Harrison, of Albuquerque, was the next witness called. He is a civil engineer and has known the Rio Grande since 1889. He investigated the stream flow of the Rio Grande and reservoir sites for the United States government. He took measurements of the flow of the Rio Grande at four different stations, at Rumbulo, White Rock canyon, San Marcial and El Paso.

The data collected was printed and offered as evidence. The daily reports of the river from 1889 to 1897 in tabular form were also a part of the evidence introduced.

W. W. Bailey was the next witness. He is a civil engineer and holds the position of consulting engineer of the United States on the International Boundary commission. He has been acquainted with the Rio Grande for many years and took the course from Del Norte, Colo., to twenty-five miles south of El Paso and the river from Laredo to Brownsville, Texas.

He said that the Rio Grande at Del Norte, Colo., was a mountain stream, with rocky banks, south until it reaches the Colorado, then through a hilly country with quite a fall, until it reaches Rumbulo. Then south through alluvial soil, lower Española valley, it enters a valley which extends to a few miles south of San Marcial, passing through only one small canyon above Socorro, thence west of the Jornada del Muerto to near the Elephant Butte site, where it again enters hilly country, then through a valley to below Rincon; from Rincon to old Fort Belknap, through hilly country, and from Belknap to El Paso over sandy soil.

At El Paso he gauged the waters of the Rio Grande from May 1897 up to the present time.

A table estimating the entire flow of water that passed El Paso for a number of years, gathered from the data and measurements taken there, showing how little it would take the entire flow of the river to fill the Elephant Butte dam, was offered as evidence. The table estimated from nine to forty days according to the amount of water in the river.

According to his investigations, there are seven ditches that use the Rio Grande water between the Elephant Butte site and Rincon, with a capacity of 200 sec. feet. In the Mesilla, twelve ditches, with a capacity of 675 sec. feet. In the Rio Grande valley seven or eight ditches with a capacity of 500 sec. feet. Another table showing that it would take from twenty-two to forty-six days to fill the Elephant Butte dam, after enough water had passed to supply these ditches was next offered in evidence.

He stated that he had taken cross-sections from Rio Grande City south to Brownsville, Texas, while surveying for Boundary commission, and submitted maps showing the amount of water that passed at different times, both at high and low waters, and estimated the amount of water necessary to the water level, two, three, four, etc. On cross examination, Mr. Hawkins asked him how much would the flood water that passed El Paso in 1897 raise the river at

PHILADELPHIA WINS.

Place for Holding Next National Republican Convention.

American Troops win a Victory in Isabella Province.

Closing day of the Debate on the Finance Bill.

KENTUCKY CONGRESSMEN CLAIM.

Washington, Dec. 15.—The republican national committee met at the Arlington hotel, to-day, to select the place of meeting of the next republican convention. Chairman Hanna presided.

Delegates from various cities presented their claims. An hour was accorded each. For Chicago, Samuel Raymond made the opening address. He said Chicago would guarantee the fulfillment of any request the committee might make.

George W. Miller spoke for the Chicago limitation club. He said that Chicago desired to have the republican platform adopted in that city to wipe out the name "Chicago platform of 1896," which stood for repudiation.

John B. Miller, president of the Union League club of Chicago, said the convention should be held in the west, at St. Louis, Omaha, Denver or St. Paul, but more particularly Chicago, which was the center of the whole war.

St. Louis claims were presented by E. Mayor Walbridge making the first speech. He eulogized President McKinley, saying they were for him because he tried to prevent the horrors of war, but when Congress decided upon war, he conducted it in a manner which reflected credit upon the country, and established the United States upon a high plane before the world.

AMERICAN VICTORY.

Filipino Insurgents Cleaned Out by Twenty-four Infantry.

Washington, Dec. 15.—The war department to-day received the following: Manila, Dec. 15.—Battalier, Twenty-four infantry, reports that on the 14th instant he had an engagement at the junction of the Magat and Rio Grande in Isabella province, the enemy leaving four dead and five mortally wounded in the trenches. One was drowned, four wounded. He says he is in need of clothing, provisions and money. Will reach Taguigay shortly. Doubtless the army will reach him yesterday. Four hundred and seventy-five Spanish prisoners arrived this morning, among them the sick at Vigan, numbering 120.

Young, at Benguet, northwestern Luzon, reports that his troops are still pursuing the remnants of the insurgents who had twenty-three American prisoners in their possession. The country is exceedingly rough. Our men without shoes are still persistently pursuing. The number of Spanish prisoners now in the hands of the insurgents probably is one thousand, mostly in the south. We expect to effect their release in the next few days.

A Negro report says that Sergeant Alfred Roeder, Sixth infantry, with twenty soldiers and thirteen native police, attacked 400 insurgents at Madrigal, Negros this morning, by casualties. Roeder was wounded, twenty-eight killed and many wounded.

FINANCE DEBATE.

Washington, Dec. 15.—This was the closing day of the general debate of the financial bill in the house of representatives, but that fact failed to arouse much languid interest in the proceedings. During the early hours there was less than a score of republican members on the floor.

THIS city supports two prosperous cigar factories.

The capital at Santa Fe is now insured for \$100,000.

The Albaric mine at Bland is again in operation with a full force of miners.

The democratic newspapers of Arizona show evidence of dislike of Gov. Murphy.

SENATOR STEWART of Nevada has deserted Bryan and renewed his allegiance with the republican party.

The appointment of Hon. Pedro Sanchez as census supervisor of New Mexico has been confirmed by the senate.

New Mexico is well represented in the Philippines by the gallant Thirtieth regiment. Albuquerque has a large number of young men in that regiment.

DURING the past year the publishers of THE CITIZEN have paid nearly \$1,500 in taxes. That revenue law that we helped Senator Duncan prepare is a sure enough tax collector.

GEORGE MARSH, the well-known newspaper writer, has prepared a lecture on Edgar A. Poe, which he will deliver this evening in Santa Fe for the benefit of the woman's board of trade of that city.

GRANT county loses a representative and progressive citizen by the death of Hon. J. A. Ancheta. He was a gifted orator and well educated lawyer, and favored progress for the territory. The present public school system is a monument of his work in the territorial legislature.

The San Francisco Chronicle says that evidence of the Santa Fe railroad company's interest in the roads reaching in to the northern coast redwoods is accumulating. Rails have been shipped by the Santa Fe from San Diego and Redondo to be used in extending the Vance company's road from Arcata to Eureka.

The Presbyterians of New Mexico will establish a weekly newspaper at Las Vegas. The standing committee of the synod having charge of the publication is composed of Rev. Norman Skinner, Rev. T. O. Beattie, Rev. Jose Inez Perez, Elder Manuel Madrid. All communications and remittances should be addressed to Rev. Norman Skinner, East Las Vegas.

SIMILAR CASE.
At the close of the Mexican war and after the annexation of California, New Mexico and Arizona to the United States, the Apache, Navajo and other Indian tribes revolted and opposed the government. No one suggested that the government of the annexed territories should be given over to the Indians. They are fully as capable of governing a country as the Tagals of Luzon. The United States would put him in a remarkably humiliating position if the democratic plan was carried out. The Philippines was acquired by conquest and purchase from Spain, exactly as New Mexico and California was acquired from Mexico. One of the numerous tribes on the island of Luzon revolts and engages in open war with the United States, and the democratic party of the United States wants this country to submit to that tribe and withdraw its forces. The resolutions introduced yesterday in the house of representatives show the desperate straits to which the democrats are reduced. They would disgrace the brave deeds of the army and navy of the United States in a war for the benefit of civilization.

DEMOCRATS FAVOR PHILIPPINES.
Two joint resolutions were introduced in the house of representatives yesterday by Representative Williams, Mississippi, which are the result of a consultation among the democratic leaders of the house and are understood to be the expression of their general position on the Philippines.

The first resolution declares the intention to recognize the independence of the Philippines and withdraw our land and
