WAR IN SOUTH AFRICA.

**Gen. Methuen in Communication
With Troops at Kimberley.**

**Orange Free State Has Annexed
Portion of Cape Colony.**

**Predicted That Big Fight May Soon Take
Place at Spytfontein.**

BRITISH LOSS AT KIMBERLEY.

London, Dec. 7.—The war office received the following message from General Methuen, Cape Town: "Dec. 6. General Methuen writes to-day that he has resumed command and is night in communication with Kimberley. The health of the troops is excellent."

ANNEXED A COLONY.

Pretoria, Dec. 7.—Official dispatches received from different Boer forces say that all is quiet, except at Kimberley, where the armored train made a sortie this morning.

The Orange Free State has proclaimed the annexation of Dordrecht, about fifty miles north of Queenstown, Cape Colony.

Tugela bridge, it is announced, is completely ruined; it will be work of great magnitude for either belligerents to repair it.

The British fired on some republican scouts south of Tugela this morning. No casualties.

SKIRMISH AT KIMBERLEY.

London, Dec. 7.—The story was current at Durban on Tuesday that the Boers made their final effort to capture Ladysmith on December 4, and were defeated and retreated. As the story was brought by runners, it should be received with reservation.

Dispatches from Pretoria confirm the retirement of the Free State burghers from the vicinity of Ladysmith, but do not indicate that retreat was the result of defeat on the previous day, while the same dispatch says that the Boer guns are still active. It is also pointed out all suggestions of weakening refer to the Free State. Apparently Transvaal Boers are still full of fight, though it is reiterated that they are short of supplies.

Perhaps the explanation of the retirement of burghers from Natal can be found in a dispatch from Modder River, Dec. 3, saying that a strong Boer force, estimated at 3,000, is re-inforcing General Cronje from Natal. The same dispatch says that everything indicates that a great engagement will be fought at Spytfontein. The Boers are massing on the hills there and vigorously building defenses and digging rifle pits in every direction. The Boers work on every ridge, and the British are also being extended and strengthened, showing that the rumors of the intentions of the Boers to abandon the attempt to stem General Methuen's advance are unfounded.

The British shifted their camp a few hundred yards away from the battlefield and are settling in for a week. There are some cases of fever among the troops. Much depends on General Gatacre's advance.

There is undoubtedly a large concentration of Boers ahead of General Methuen. Practically the whole of their fighting forces have joined the Kimberley besiegers. An official account of the sortie on November 29, when the British casualties as captured were 1,000, is being received. The Boers were victorious, and the British were repulsed. The same dispatch gives reports from Col. Kekewich showing that the Boers are increasing in numbers around Kimberley. The Boer advance in the northwestern part of Cape Colony is becoming remarkable. Local farmers are fleeing to the Boer laagers. Annexation of British territory proceeds daily.

The war office has been notified that the British had five killed and twenty five wounded in a sortie from Kimberley, November 25, including three colonial officers.

PRESIDENT STEYN.
London, Dec. 7.—Announcement is made in a special dispatch from Bloem-

fontein that President Steyn, of the Orange Free State has joined the Boer forces at Modder River. His appearance has caused great enthusiasm among the Boers.

LADYSMITH RELIEVED.
London, Dec. 7.—A rumor on the stock exchange here to-day that Ladysmith has been relieved, caused bidding for South African securities.

PROCEEDINGS OF CONGRESS.

HOUSE.
Washington, Dec. 7.—Before the house met to-day the republican and democratic leaders attempted to perfect an agreement for debate on the financial bill to begin next Monday. But the negotiations failed. The republican leaders then decided to resort to a special rule to be brought in to-morrow. Overstreet, Indiana, who is to have charge of the bill, introduced a formal resolution for a special order upon which the committee on rules will act. It provides for consideration of the bill beginning Monday and continuing until a date to be decided upon by the committee on rules.

SENATE.
Washington, Dec. 7.—On motion of Hale, Maine, it was decided that when the senate adjourned to-day it would be until Monday next.

CHANDLER, NEW HAMPSHIRE.

Chandler, New Hampshire, offered a resolution instructing the committee on privileges and elections to investigate the right of Clark, of Montana, and Scott, of West Virginia, to seats in the senate and to take testimony. The resolutions were referred to the committee on privileges and elections.

BERY, ARKANSAS.
Bery, Arkansas, offered a joint resolution in favor of the election of United States senators by the people, and gave notice that he would address the senate on the subject.

The bill offered by Chandler to increase the efficiency of the special training at West Point and Annapolis a measure, and pay less attention to higher education, was the subject of an amusing colloquy between Chandler and Hale, (Maine). Chandler asked that the measure be referred to the committee on education and labor. Hale took it, he said, to be a bill to encourage foot ball and similar games, and he could hardly act as sponsor for such a proposition.

In a facetious speech, Chandler replied that he thought athletic contests among the collegians ought to be encouraged. The bill was referred as desired by Chandler. After an executive session the senate adjourned until Monday.

Committee on Rules.
Washington, Dec. 7.—The speaker has appointed the following members of the committee on rules of the house: Hale, Maine; Dingle, Pennsylvania; Grosvenor, Ohio; republicans; Richardson, Tennessee; Bailey, Texas; democrats. The speaker is also a member of this committee.

Washington, Dec. 7.—Major Albert E. Wool on Ninth United States cavalry has been relieved as acting Indian agent at the Cheyenne and Arapahoe agency, Oklahoma, and ordered to report by telegram to the commanding general of the department of the Colorado, for assignment to station.

Favorable to Organized Labor.
Berlin, Dec. 7.—The re-laying to-day passed to the third reading a bill repealing law prohibiting the workmen's associations.

FILIPINO SITUATION.

**A Manila Correspondent Says the
Insurrection is Not Ended.**

**General Young Has Skirmish With
Filipinos Near Vigan.**

**Congressional Committee Investigating
Character of Mr. Roberts of Utah.**

ARGUING KENTUCKY ELECTION CASE.

New York, Dec. 7.—A dispatch to the Herald from Manila says: "The hope of ending the insurrection and halting military operations in the Philippines, which seemed bright a few days ago, has again faded into the uncertain future. The insurgents have had a series of route and disasters. The slaughter has been great. They have lost a large quantity of supplies and munitions of war and more than 5,000 armed men have been rendered or have been captured. Their government has been scattered or captured. Notwithstanding these things there is no reason for extreme optimism. The field commanders now think the end is still afar. It is said that little is definitely known of the present strength or whereabouts of the insurgents. Aguinaldo's entire army is estimated at 20,000 to 30,000 armed men, scattered throughout the islands. There are 45,000 American soldiers in the Philippines, 35,000 being in Luzon. These are greatly scattered."

SITUATION IN LUZON.
Washington, Dec. 7.—General Otis has called the war department as follows, respecting the military situation in Luzon: "In central Luzon there is no insurgent force of importance, except in Bulacan province near the mountains, where General Pilar has one thousand or more men, which will be attacked soon. General Grant moved a small column down the east coast of Batavia province, encountering little opposition. The column moving westward from the mountains is expected to reach the western coast of Luzon by the tenth instant. Many small insurgent armed bands are in the country, robbing, and in some instances, murdering the inhabitants. The troops are being sent to the troops quite successfully. To the south of Manila, the insurgents still maintain their positions but necessary force to scatter them will be sent there soon."

GENERAL YOUNG'S OPERATIONS.
Washington, Dec. 7.—General Otis cables this morning as follows: Manila, Dec. 7.—General Young reports his arrival at Vigan, on the evening of the 5th, having encountered the enemy at Naraban, twelve miles south of the city, whom he drove to the westward later. He reports that his troops are now pressing them back. The country is extremely rough and strongly entrenched. About 600 prisoners were captured, and that the insurgents had allowed all but American and prominent Spanish prisoners to escape from Bangard. Later the insurgents were driven back to the mountains. Will send transportation with subsistence and medical supplies to Vigan to bring the prisoners to Manila and are being guarded with necessary quartermaster's stores. Our casualties: One killed, twelve wounded, the wounded mostly slightly. The enemy left in the trenches five dead, a few rifles, several thousand rounds of small ammunition and forty shrapnel. Young has sufficient troops to meet all difficulties.

Committee Investigating Mr. Roberts.
Washington, Dec. 7.—A special committee of the house to investigate the charges against Mr. Roberts, Mormon representative from Utah, held its first meeting to-day behind closed doors for the purpose of determining the method of procedure. The chairman, Taylor, of Ohio, presided. All the other members were present. They are: Morris, Minnesota; Freer, West Virginia; Littlefield, Maine; McPherson, Iowa; Landis, Indiana; republicans; DeArmond, Missouri; Latham, Texas; and Miers, Indiana, democrats.

Little progress was made to-day and adjournment was taken until to-morrow at 10 o'clock. It has not yet been decided whether Roberts will be allowed counsel or whether the hearings will be open or private. A determination of the latter question it is believed will depend upon Roberts' wishes. Roberts will doubtless be allowed counsel.

To Indians cost the United States last year \$2,377,074, of which \$2,338,300 was expended for education.

Last year the American life-saving service rescued 4,000 persons and saved property worth \$6,000,000.

UCAR's sugar beet crop aggregates about 60,000 tons. The crop has averaged twelve tons to the acre or \$54.

ENGLAND'S patent office has granted letters to the inventor of a process for the extraction of gold from sea water.

The delegates from New Mexico, Arizona and Oklahoma are working together to secure statehood for their territories.

ON December 5th the Phoenix Republican consisted of sixteen, ages describing the carnival in progress in that enterprising city.

The estimate for the navy department for 1921 is \$7,469,690, against \$51,925,210 appropriated for this year and \$64,734,159 expended last year.

The tobacco production of the United States during October was 24,951,914 pounds, an increase of 6,371,075 pounds over the previous October.

POSTMASTER GENERAL SMITH points out an abuse of second-class mail privileges which cost the government a loss of at least \$20,000,000 a year.

VALLEJO county does not pay taxes with commendable rapidity. During the last quarter that county paid into the territorial treasury only \$74.20.

LIKE late Vice President Hobart, another millionaire who has just died in New Jersey, John I. Blair, began life as a penniless boy and worked in a country store.

FALL RIVER cotton mills paid dividends amounting to 7.71 per cent last year, the largest since 1912. The item is completed by the advance of ten per cent in the wages of 28,000 workmen.

THE report of the United States treasurer shows that there were coined during the past fiscal year 19,254,709 silver dollars. The coinage of silver dollars since July 14, 1890, has been 97,006,966.

ACCORDING to the detailed report of Treasurer W. F. Burdell the late Ohio campaign cost the republicans \$79,476.71. The democratic state committee reports receipts of \$18,149.55 and expenditures of \$17,988.58.

PORTO RICO now has compulsory education in English in the public schools. English had been taught in some of the schools in the island since the early days of the American occupation, but it has now been extended to all of them.

THE government is making a strong effort to have the Indians of the Mesquite agency and reservation in Otero county self-sustaining. It is supplying them with modern agricultural machinery, as well as equipment for dairies and other work. The Indians are far advanced in civilization and have changed from their native dress to modern clothes.

THE biggest salary on record was paid to George Gould. For ten years' work he has been paid five million dollars. The account went down as "for services rendered." That was at the rate of half million dollars a year. The highest salary ever paid a railroad president was the \$75,000 a year that went to Sir William C. Van Horn when he was president of the Canadian Pacific.

In 1890 the population of the United States was 31,443,321; its national expenditures were \$66,344,960, or a little over \$2 per capita. In 1920 the population of the United States, including the Philippines and Porto Rico, will be about 86,000,000; its expenditures, according to Secretary Gage, will be \$631,061,964, or more than \$7 per capita.

THE DEEP MINE.

A Socorro County Property That Will Enrich Its Owners.

This morning very encouraging news was again received by Mr. Bureau as to the progress of the work and the character of the ore of the Deep-Down mine, which is one of the principal claims owned by the company. There is every reason to believe that the property of the company is very valuable and will fair to make the owners and stockholders wealthy men in a short time.

THE 14th of December is the centennial of the death of George Washington, and a great Masonic celebration will be held at Mount Vernon. The event will be to revive the memory of the life and the circumstances of the death of Washington.

SECRETARY HITCHCOCK, of the interior department, estimates the irrigable area of the arid region of the United States at 74,000,000 acres, capable of sustaining a population of 50,000,000 people under a proper irrigation system.

THE territory of New Mexico received during the quarter ending Dec. 2, the sum of \$37,821.46, and expended \$93,461.13. The territory had a cash balance in the treasury on December 2 of \$127,893.45.
