ROCK ISLAND ROAD TO EXTEND SYSTEM

Will Refund Indebtedness for \$250,000,000 for Improvement And Purchase of Additional Roads.

Chicago, Oct. 9.—Stockholders of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad company will hold a special meeting in Davenport, Ia., with a view of authorizing the new bond issue amounting to \$250,000,000. No official information has been given the public regarding the purpose of this gigantic financial deal, but it is generally understood that the proceeds are to be used in refunding the bonded debt of all the railroad companies which now go to make up the Rock Island system of nearly 20,000 miles.

The new bond issue, however is far in excess of the sum needed for this purpose, and is sufficient to provide a sinking fund to be drawn upon, if so desired, for the purchase of additional roads, for betterments and for purposes of offense and defense.

It was rumored last night that strenuous opposition to the bond issue would be made by R. R. Cable, former chairman of the Rock Island board, and his friends. The Moores, however, through the ownership of the preferred stock of the Rock Island company of New Jersey, are in absolute control of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad company, incorporated in Iowa. It is difficult, therefore to see how Mr. Cable could prevent the bond issue unless he sees fit to serve an injunction before the meeting is held.

ENGLISH MISSION OPEN.

Nineteenth Annual Session Opened in Albuquerque.—Reception to Bishop Walden.

The nineteenth annual session of the New Mexico English mission of the Methodist Episcopal church, was opened at the Lead avenue church, Albuquerque, at 3:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon, by the superintendent, the Rev. Dr. A. P. Morrison, who delivered an address on "What This Conference Ought to Be to Us and Our Work," after which the Rev. W. J. Chalfee of El Paso, conducted the pentecostal service.

A reception was tendered last evening to Dr. John M. Whalen, the presiding bishop, and the Spanish and English conferences.

HAMILTON FISH ILL.

Associate United States Treasurer in New York Threatened With Appendicitis.

New York, Oct. 9.—Hamilton Fish, associate United States treasurer, in charge of the sub-treasury here, is ill and the doctors say he is threatened with appendicitis. Unless his condition gets worse, however, an operation will not be necessary.

MASKED MAN TRIED TO ROB A CHINAMAN

Entered the American Kitchen Restaurant and was Working on the Cash Register When the Chin Shot-gun in Hand Surprised Him.

Silver City, N. M., Oct. 9.—At half past four o'clock this morning a masked man came into the American Kitchen restaurant, kept by a Chinaman, and attempted to force the cash register.

As the result of the cool head maintained by the lone Chinaman in the kitchen, with shot gun in hand, the would-be robber fled across the bridge over the arroyo where Main street formerly was. There were two of the masked robbers as one remained to hold the horses near Necome Hill.

The description of the men tallies with that of the men who held up some parties in the northern part of the county about six weeks ago. They are believed to be Mexican bandits.

Cripple Creek, Oct. 9.—In the district court today information was filed against Brigadier General John Chase, Adjutant General Sherman Bell and Major Thomas McClelland judge advocate, in behalf of P. H. Mulvaney, W. F. Davis, Thomas Foster, Emil Johnson and A. A. Frye, charging unlawful arrest.

LOCAL DEMOCRATS TO WELCOME HEARST

Colonel W. S. Hopewell Appoints Committee, But Desires That the Citizens Committees Taken the Lead in the Reception to Be Tendered.

Colonel W. S. Hopewell, chairman of the Territorial Democratic committee, has appointed the following committee to welcome Congressman-elect William Randolph Hearst, upon his arrival in the Capital City next Wednesday.

Colonel Hopewell has appointed this committee, inasmuch as Mr. Hearst is a Democrat, and as he comes to the Territory with a Congressional delegation in the interests of statehood for New Mexico.

It is, however, the wish of Colonel Hopewell, and the representative men in the Democratic ranks in Santa Fe, that the citizens committees take the lead in the reception to be tendered to Mr. Hearst, and that the Board of Trade also appoint a committee, the committee of Democrats being ready and willing to assist in every way.

The Democratic committee consists of Colonel W. S. Hopewell, Judge N. B. Laughlin, C. F. Easley, Esq., Hon. Marcelino Garcia, H. N. Wilcox, Colonel George W. Knaebel, Jose Segura, A. R. Gibson, A. B. Renahan, Esq., and Colonel C. G. Coleman.

FLAG OF TRUCE.

Differences Between Generals Chase and Bell Have Been Satisfactorily Patched Up.

Denver, Oct. 9.—As the result of the recent conferences at the Governor's office, General Chase and General Bell are getting closer together, and it is not improbable that all the charges made against the various officers will be withdrawn and the proposed court martial will fall through.

The Mine Owners' association has been hard at work trying to patch up peace and it is believed they have succeeded. It is expected the Governor will take some action before night that will clear the atmosphere but he refuses, however, to make public his plans.

CONSTABLE'S HOME WRECKED BY DYNAMITE.

Joplin, Mo., Oct. 9.—The home of Foster McConnell, constable, near here, was wrecked with dynamite early today. His two little children were hurt, but the other members of the family escaped injury. McConnell earned the enmity of the tough element by making several arrests.

TROOPS POISONED.

Alleged Attempt Made on Those in the Garrison at Camp El Paso.

Camp Goldfield, Colo., Oct. 9.—An alleged attempt was made day before yesterday to poison the garrison at Camp El Paso, and it was so successful that every man with the exception of three who were absent was laid on his back with diarrhoea.

Altogether sixty-eight men were affected. Poison of some kind, it is alleged, was placed in the water tank of the mine, from which the water is taken for domestic purposes. Many of the miners were also affected. The water is being analyzed.

FRISCO VOTES AGAINST MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP.

San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 9.—A special election was held yesterday for the purpose of deciding upon an issue of \$710,000 municipal bonds for the purpose of buying the Gery street railway. It was proposed to operate the road by the city. The issue was defeated by 14,481 yeas to 10,745 nays, two-thirds being required to pass.

SCHOONERS BLOWN ON ATLANTIC SHORE

Norfolk, Va., Oct. 9.—Three two-masted schooners are reported blown ashore off Ocean View, in lower Chesapeake. A sixty mile gale is raging along the Virginia and North Carolina coast, from Cape Henry to Kitty Hawk, and reports of very heavy weather are coming in from the seaboard.

GOTHAM SUFFERS SEVERE FLOODS

Railroads Crippled and Delayed—Flooded Cellars, Sewers and Impassable Streets the Result.

New York, Oct. 9.—After twenty-four hours of pouring rain New York City and the adjacent country suffered early today from severe floods. All told 6 24-100 of rain has fallen during the twenty-four hours ending at 9 o'clock this morning, and it was still raining hard then. This is believed to be near the record rainfall.

Railroads were thier crippled or delayed and the conduit containing seventy telegraph wires was badly damaged. From all parts of the city were received reports of flooded cellars, sewers and impassable streets.

The trolley service at St. George, Staten Island, was completely tied up. Water was two feet deep in South street, at the New York side of Fulton street ferry. Much damage was done in other portions of the city.

Part of the dam across the Ramapo river near Pompton lake, New Jersey, was washed out, inundating the valley below. A number of houses were flooded but there were no fatalities.

Many thousands of men and women were unable to reach their places of business owing to the washouts and the land slides in New Jersey, Long Island and Westchester county.

The Newark branch of the Erie railroad is reported as entirely tied up. The telegraph wires also suffered badly. Local Forecast Officer Emery said he believed it was the record rainfall.

The highest previous occurred in 1892 when 6.1-7-100 inches of rain fell in twenty-four hours.

The water from the damaged dam at Pompton lake has covered the territory ten miles in extent. Several bridges were carried away.

Much Ruin at Ballston.

Ballston, N. Y., Oct. 9.—Three and a half inches of rain fell here during the eighteen hours ending at 8 a. m. today. The storm was general throughout Saratoga county. All the streams in this vicinity are at flood height.

Washout at Hastings.

Tarrytown, N. Y., Oct. 9.—All the north bound traffic on the New York Central railroad was stopped today by a washout at Hastings, six miles from here. The Empire State express is among the trains held up.

Paterson is in Danger.

Paterson, N. J., Oct. 9.—Unless the rain soon ceases there is danger of another destructive flood in this city. The river district is again partly flooded, and the river is rising rapidly. It is feared if the rise continues the business section will be flooded.

HEAVY RAINFALL CAUSES DAMAGE IN NORTH ENGLAND.

London, Oct. 9.—The heaviest rain fall of the year is causing enormous damage in the north of England. The roads are impassable, railroads are being interrupted, bridges are down and the valleys of the Dee and Tweed are like inland seas.

ANARCHIST'S BONDSMAN WAS A CAPITALIST

Therefore William McQueen Convicted of Rioting in New Jersey and Sentenced to Five Years in Prison Fled to King Edward's Realm.

New York, Oct. 9.—William MacQueen, the anarchist, who was convicted of rioting in Paterson, N. J., and sentenced to five years in prison, and who escaped by jumping bail, has been heard from in London, where he has taken to writing letters to various papers.

He asserts he was induced to flee by the "committee of defense," on the ground that his bondsman was a capitalist.

WRIGHT AGAIN UMPIRE.

Will Decide Question of a Short Working Day on Saturday in Anthracite Region.

Scranton, Pa., Oct. 9.—Judge Gray of the anthracite strike commission, has appointed Carroll D. Wright umpire in connection with the question of a short working day on Saturday in the Schuylkill region. He had acted in a similar capacity over five previous questions.

SIR THOMAS SAILS.

Challenger For America's Cup Left For England on the Steamer Cedric Today.

New York, Oct. 9.—Sir Thomas Lipton sailed for England today on the steamer Cedric. Sir Thomas said he was not feeling as well as he looked, but expected to gain strength on the way to England.

NO FRUIT FOR EXHIBIT

Conditions Not Favorable to Santa Fe County Being Thus Represented at the Fair.

WOULD NOT DO JUSTICE

Any Available Display Would Be A Reflection on Well Known Horticultural Resources

To the Editor New Mexican:

Sir—In view of the fact that the Albuquerque fair is held very late this year; that the season for all fruits such as cherries, peaches, plums, etc., is over; that owing to drought, frosts and hail the fruit crop is a failure and vegetables dried up, I have found it impossible to get together an exhibit for Santa Fe county which would be even creditable in competition with the best products of other counties.

I have therefore notified O. N. Marmon, Esq., president of the Territorial Fair association, that Santa Fe county will not make an exhibit. I have either seen personally or communicated by letter with every prominent fruit grower in Espanola, San Ildefonso, Tesuque, Pojoaque, and Santa Fe, and all have expressed a willingness to contribute toward the exhibit, but only had anything worth showing, but all say: "It is too late. The best fruit is over, and the pears and winter apples are damaged by hail, besides the scarcity of water has made the fruit small, and the high winds of the last two weeks have blown the largest and best of the winter apples off the trees."

An inspection of many of the orchards has demonstrated that these statements are correct, with the exception of Edward Miller's orchard, I do not think that any sound apples can be found in the county.

It is to be regretted that this is the condition of affairs, but these are circumstances over which we have no control, and it is better not to be represented at the fair than to make an exhibit which would not do justice to our well known horticultural resources.

ITINERARY OF HEARST THROUGH NEW MEXICO

Congressional Party Will Stop Over in the Capital City for Two Hours Next Wednesday Afternoon—Special Leaves Chicago Monday Night.

Hon. Bernard S. THREE TURKS KILLED.

Battalion of Troops Crossed the Bulgarian Frontier and Attacked the Block House.

Kostendil, Bulgaria, Oct. 9.—A battalion of Turkish troops occupying the post at Karamenitza, yesterday, crossed the Bulgarian frontier and attacked the Bulgarian block house. In consequence of the Turkish superiority in numbers, the Bulgarian detachment retired firing at the invaders. The Turks subsequently attacked the village of Cuvesevo and looted a number of houses, but on the approach of Bulgarian reinforcements retired. Three Turks were killed.

JAPANESE SQUADRON.

It is Maneuvering Off Corea—Russian Fleet is in Readiness For Action.

New York, Oct. 9.—A dispatch to the Herald from Port Arthur under yesterday's date says: "The Japanese squadron is maneuvering off Corea. The Russian fleet is perfectly ready. It is lying with steam up and the vessels are painted as in war time. It is denied here from the highest quarters that the Japanese are landing troops."

THE NEGRO PROBLEM.

One of the most serious questions that confronts the American people, and which in all human probability will become more serious in future is the political status of the colored race. After having remained comparatively quiet for years, it suddenly assumes a commanding position, not so much urged on by the negroes as by the descendants of their former owners, who affect to believe that the very presence of the colored race in this country is fraught with danger to them. Again and again in pulpits, press and public speeches it is reiterated and reiterated that this is a "White Man's Government." Well it is not, except in their own imaginations. The articles of Confederation, the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution, (all of which were adopted by a majority of slave holders) are absolutely silent on that subject. In fact the word negro does not appear in any of these documents. If the men who gave them to the world believed in the doctrine of "A White Man's Government," it is strange they did not incorporate it in some of the provisions of the documents named. One of the principal faults found with the negroes is that they are illiterate, as class. Well, while this may be conceded, it is unfortunately true that illiteracy is by no means confined to them. But the question arises who for over 200 years or more sternly closed every avenue of education upon them and kept them ignorant deliberately and designedly. The question answers itself, none others but the slave holders. It may be said that the present generation of the South should not be held responsible for the acts of their ancestors, and this is correct, but are they willing to make any amends for the cruel wrongs inflicted on the negroes by these ancestors? It does not seem as if they are. The desire in too many parts of the South is to keep the negroes in a servile condition, not in slavery, in a state as closely analogous thereto as the laws of the country will permit. In what is known as the black belt, the condition of the negro is almost, or wholly, as bad as previous to the civil war. The fourteenth amendment to the Constitution is openly violated under the flimsy veil of illiteracy, it being always understood that the exclusion of illiterates shall only apply to negroes and never to whites, no matter how illiterate the latter may be. Not satisfied with this the Democrats North and South sternly oppose the application of the provisions of said amendment to the states which have adopted such laws. This is a flagrant wrong not only on the disfranchised negroes but to every white Republican in the country, and we must concede that the Republican party is responsible for this shameful violation of the Constitution, as that party has control of both the executive and legislative branches of the republic. Some time in a close election the states in which those so-called illiterates prevail will hold the balance of power and a President will be elected by them; then the Republicans will wake up to regret their own neglect of "plain duty" when it is too late. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, and now is the time to apply the preventative.

The Premier of Great Britain, Mr. Balfour is urging the adoption of the protection policy for Great Britain and thinks such a one will also prove beneficial against the exactions of trusts and capital monopolies. Rather strange this, but true nevertheless.

Senator Hanna is evidently somewhat obstinate. He will not accept the resignation as chairman of the Republican National committee which some newspapers and also some political leaders have so cheerfully tendered him.

It looks as if the refunding and reduction of the Santa Fe county debt will become a fact by the first of January of the coming year. Hope so for the best interests of all concerned.

The Carlsbad Argus puts the people of Eddy county in the right upon the question of statehood, in a recent editorial and its utterances seem to be based upon facts. It holds that the majority of the people in the Pecos valley of New Mexico favor statehood because in a state they could make themselves felt and their wishes would be regarded by the state government and legislature; they have found out, in a Territorial condition, they amount to very little. The paper rightly says upon the question:

"The idea must not be carried abroad over the Territory that the people of the Pecos valley, and especially those of Eddy county, are indifferent in the statehood matter. There are a few, perhaps, who prefer to wander awhile longer in territorial darkness, but the great majority are for statehood, and truth is, they are not very particular in just what form, so long as it is statehood. Probably here, more than in any other portion of the Territory, the desire is strong to throw off territorial conditions. This desire is induced by a wish upon the part of the people to have a voice in territorial affairs. To be counted—to have a place on the map. In a state, a people of the character and temperament of those who make up the inhabitants of the Pecos valley will make themselves count. Under present arrangements their position and weight so far as New Mexico in its entirety is considered, is nil.

"The recent and present entanglements in judicial matters in this district has caused many an anti-statehood to climb over the fence and become a shout for admission.

"Count the Pecos valley, therefore, strong for statehood."

The question of passing resolutions looking towards the reduction and refunding of the big funded debt of this county including delinquent coupons and judgments will be taken up and acted upon by the board of commissioners of Santa Fe county Saturday next. The necessary data for the proper consideration of the matter and showing the number and amount of bonds issued in aid of railroads, delinquent coupons and judgments thereon, are now being prepared by Major R. J. Palen, president of the First National bank and County Commissioner Arthur Seligman, both very competent in such matters. It is the hope of the taxpayers and property owners, with but few exceptions, that the board will act promptly, and energetically in the matter of the reduction and refunding of the debt. Then it will be up to the bond holders and for their own best interests they should promptly accept the compromise offered by the county and authorized by the refunding acts, enacted by the Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth Legislative Assemblies. It is a question of give and take. The county and its creditors will serve the best interests of all concerned by being just and fair to each other.

The Otero County Advertiser makes the following very proper comment upon the poor railway mail service on the El Paso & Northeastern railroad as well as upon the lack of service on the Santa Fe Central: "The people along the Santa Fe Central are kicking because no mail is carried over that line although the road has been in operation for over two months. It is also a fact that Colorado mail comes around by the Santa Fe and up from El Paso to Alamogordo and other stations along the line rather than over the Colorado Southern to Del Norte and then over the E. P. & N. E. Uncle Sam's postoffice department might be more progressive in one or two directions by not spending so much time and energy on red tape."

District Attorney Frank W. Clancy of Albuquerque knows whereof he speaks and when he asserts over his signature that gross irregularities, to say the least, have occurred in the financial affairs of Bernalillo county of late years, the people believe him. He is too good a man to make rash statements or say anything in an official way that he cannot substantiate. In addition he has the courage of his convictions. Mr. Clancy will have the support of his community and law abiding people of the Territory in his endeavors to bring about improvement and reform in Bernalillo county affairs.

The city council and the board of trade should take the necessary steps to have the party met at the depot by special committees and to make it as interesting for the members thereof as can well be done.

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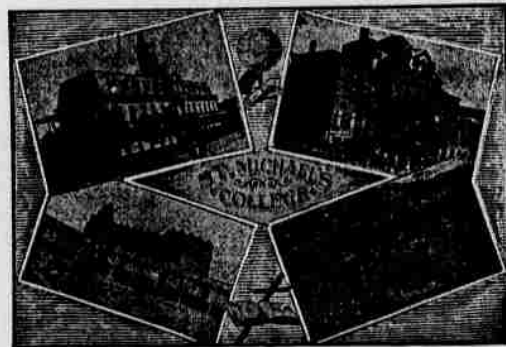

OUTPUT OF COONEY MINE

Opening of New Bodies of High Grade Ore Has Made It a Paying Property.

BEST IN SOUTHWEST

Santa Fe Gold and Copper Company
Stock Brings \$1 to \$1.25 on Boston Exchange.

The Silver City Enterprise reports that the Cooney mine, the recently acquired property of the Mogollon Gold and Copper Mining company, is opening new bodies of high grade ore with recent development work until now, it is one of the best paying properties in the Southwest. A new gold and silver lead was encountered several weeks ago, while tunneling from the third level of the mine under the bed of the creek. The new lead is said to contain very high values in gold and silver. Several leads that were supposed to have pinched out have come in again, good and strong, after drifting through several feet of shale, and are now among the most valuable veins in the mine. The stope on one of these is fully thirty feet wide and a mining man who was present when the blast was made estimates that fully forty tons of high grade ore were thrown down by the charge. The mill is running night and day as water which was such a scarce article during the summer months is now very plentiful. Between 70 and 80 tons are concentrated in the mill every 24 hours and a car of concentrates is shipped every week to Silver City to which point it is freighted overland. The company is preparing to install machinery which is now on the ground and which will give the mill a daily capacity of 140 tons. At present the efforts of the company are directed toward repairing the road between Cooney and Silver City.

The Gold Gulch Mining company operating in Gold Gulch, Socorro county, installed its pump last week but the flues in the boiler were found to be defective and had to be replaced by new ones before work could proceed. The pump, however, is in operation this week.

The concentrator of the Faywood Lead company at San Jose, Grant county, is operating regularly. Shipments were recently made to the smelter at El Paso and proved very satisfactory. New improvements have been added lately to the mill. A large fan was installed last week to clear the mill of the dangerous lead dust.

At the Boston Mine Exchange last week 690 shares of Santa Fe Gold and Copper company stock was sold at from \$1 to \$1.25 a share.

The Engineering and Mining Journal reports the following condition of the mineral market: "Generally speaking business is uninteresting and with few exceptions market prices are easier. Silver is particularly strong advancing to 59.34 cents which is the highest price in many months. Opinion is somewhat divided as regards the reasons for this advance; some authorities attribute it to speculations abroad, and others to the improved demand from the far East. It is apparent however, that the situation has been greatly influenced by the urgent demand for prompt shipment to meet the liabilities of eastern countries in which London bankers are interested. Another fact which may have a bearing on future prices is the gradual depletion of the silver reserve held by the Indian government. India is witnessing a period of prosperity as a result of good crops, and the increasing demand for silver makes it imperative for the currency department to carry sufficient metal to redeem notes when presented for payment. On the other hand the advancing price of silver narrows the margin between the bullion value of the Philippine pesos and its face value to a point where the United States is obliged to limit its purchases. It is also worthy of mention that in another month the balance of the French order for 2,000,000 ounces purchased on August 10 for Indo-China will be delivered. This also may influence prices in future. Copper has been affected somewhat by the liquidation on the stock exchange. Business is dull and prices are easier. Exports from the United States for September are estimated between 12,000 and 13,000 tons. Reports from abroad indicate a good consumptive demand. Lead is in moderate request at unchanged prices. The coal markets in the West have improved with cooler weather, and the demand is much more active than a few weeks ago.

The Krupp works at Essen, Germany, are the owners of large coal and iron mines. A census taken last month shows that the firm employs in Germany 41,013 persons of whom 4,046 were classed as managers, clerks, bookkeepers, overseers, etc., and 36,967 as workmen. The total number of persons supported by these works including employees, their wives, children and other dependents, was 147,645. The average wages paid last year was \$1.08 per day.

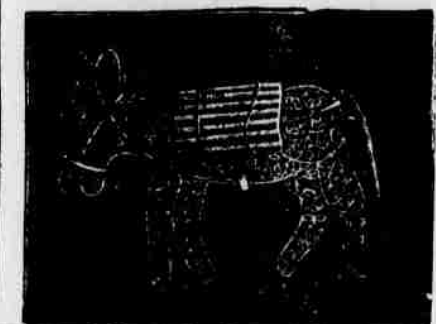

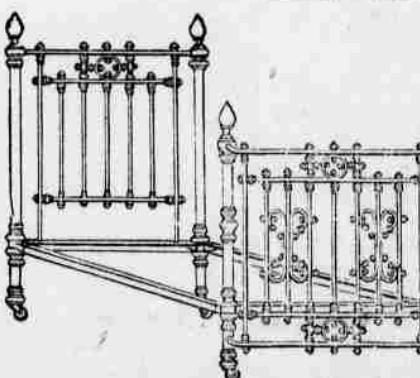

QUAY COUNTY.

The Dawson railway will erect a twenty chute coal plant and a round house at Tucumcari.

S. M. Brewer of Tucumcari has been awarded the contract to erect the warehouse of the Continental Oil company at Tucumcari.

F. A. Townsend and company have been given the contract for 16,000 feet of grading on the Dawson road, at Tucumcari. They have also received a large contract for grading in Maverick canon on the Rock Island and other work along the Dawson line.

SOCORRO COUNTY.

Harry Jaynes has sold his residence at San Marcial to Mrs. R. C. Banks. The Armstrong Brothers have purchased the saloon, dwelling house and cabins at Rosedale formerly owned by Frank Sellman.

San Marcial lodge No. 5 of Workmen, will celebrate the thirty-fifth anniversary of the order on October 27 with a public meeting.

The Socorro University club was organized last week at the Sperling house. The following officers were elected: President, Dr. Charles R. Keyes; vice-president, James G. Fitch; secretary, Professor O. R. Smith; treasurer, Professor E. P. Smith.

Rev. Edward LeBreton and Mrs. LeBreton have left San Marcial to take charge of the Methodist church at Cerillos. For the past three years Mr. LeBreton has been running a grocery store at San Marcial but he has decided to re-enter the ministry.

The Ladies' Aid society of Socorro has undertaken the work of raising money to build a Presbyterian parsonage. To start the proposed fund a series of teas is to be given, the first by Mrs. James G. Fitch, the second by Mrs. Daniel H. McMillan and the third by Mrs. C. G. Duncan.

Bishop J. B. Pitaval will visit the following Socorro county parishes this month: Santa Recio, October 12; Paraje, October 13; Contadero afternoon of October 13; San Marcial, October 14; Valverde, afternoon October 14; San Antonio, October 15. Between 250 and 300 children will be confirmed by Bishop Pitaval on this trip.

Says the San Marcial Bee: "The local flouring mill is in operation at odd intervals only, for lack of wheat. The territory from which the mill is supplied has yielded a very limited supply of wheat this year, hardly sufficient to keep the mill going for three months. In consequence of the shortage noted none of the product of the mill is being shipped to outside points as was the case when the crop was up to the average."

Says the San Marcial Bee: "The regents of the Socorro School of Mines have been anxious to trade 5,000 acres of timber land in Otero county for the smelter plant located near the school. Mr. McChesney, representative of the syndicate owning the plant, accompanied by Deputy Sheriff Cook of Socorro and Surveyor George W. King of San Marcial, inspected this timber land last week and the decision was reached that the timber thereon is of too poor a grade to warrant the trade. It is the intention of the syndicate to keep the smelter intact, believing that at a period not so far distant its utilization where it now stands will be justified by the present evidence of development in the mining industry of this county."

SEPTEMBER WEATHER.

Weather Bureau Records Show a Deficiency of Rainfall and Temperature During Month.

The mean temperature for the month was 59.4 or 1.6 degrees below the average for thirty years. The highest was 82 degrees on the 4th and the lowest 37 degrees on 16th. The greatest daily range was 31 degrees on the 10th and the least 14 degrees on the 28th. Since the first of the year the accumulated deficiency of temperature is 328 degrees, an average daily deficiency of 1.2 degrees. The mean or average maximum temperature was 70.3 degrees and the mean minimum temperature was 48.6 degrees.

The total precipitation was 0.55 of an inch or 0.97 of an inch less than the average for thirty years. There have been only five Septembers with less rainfall than the month just past, and the least was in September 1892, when only a trace fell. Since the beginning of the year there is a deficiency of 2.02 inches of rainfall. There were 14 clear days, 11 partly cloudy, 5 cloudy, and 10 days with 0.01 of an inch, or more of rain. Light frosts, the first of the season, which blighted squash and cucumber vines and other tender vegetation, occurred on the 16th and 17th. The mean relative humidity at 6 a. m. was 58 per cent; 6 p. m. 34 per cent, and for the month 46 per cent. The total movement of the wind was 4171 miles and the highest velocity was 28 miles per hour from the southwest on the 14th. The prevailing direction was from the southwest.

WISHES TEAM GOOD LUCK

Illness Prevents Henry Alarid, the Veteran Ball Player, From Going to Albuquerque.

Henry Alarid, one of the oldest baseball players in the Territory, is unable to be on the team that will be entered in the baseball tournament to be held during the thirty-fifth Territorial fair at Albuquerque next week, on account of having been ill for the past four weeks. He is slowly recovering, and will probably be able to resume his shoemaking business within the next two weeks.

Mr. Alarid is anxious to go with the team to Albuquerque, but he is so weak that he can hardly walk. He, however, appreciates the offer of Manager Billy Martin that he accompany the team to Albuquerque, despite the fact that he is unable to play.

"I hope the Santa Fe team will win first money," said Mr. Alarid today. "I am a Santa Fe boy, and have always worked for the Santa Fe team in former contests, and I am sure that the boys will carry their colors to the front and win everything in sight."

GALLEGOS ACQUITTED.

Found Not Guilty of Assault With Intent to Murder.—Tobacco Thief Sentenced.

Judge Baker announced yesterday that Saturday morning, October 10, 1903, at 9 o'clock he would call the Bernalillo county civil docket and set all cases for trial or other disposition. All attorneys interested are requested to be present.

W. G. Watson, charged with larceny of tobacco from the warehouse of L. B. Putney, pleaded guilty and stated to the court on his plea for mercy, that his guilt was not in the taking of the goods, but in holding and trying to dispose of them after he discovered they had been stolen. He also stated that he had never before been in trouble of this kind, and that at different times he had held positions of trust and honor under the government. The court stated, that upon the facts presented and on account of his age, he would make his sentence light and sentenced defendant to three months' imprisonment in the county jail, the sentence to date from the time of his arrest, which would give defendant about thirty days more to serve.

In the case of Territory vs. Adolfo Gallegos, the defendant being charged with assault with intent to murder. The testimony showed that on the night of May 31, Richard Whitlock, while in the state of semi-intoxication, was struck in the lower part of the head with a knife inflicting a wound about an inch in length. Whitlock had been seen in company with the defendant, and one witness, seemingly intimidated, testified that he saw the defendant strike Whitlock and that he took a knife from the defendant's hand, but he being the only known eye witness for the Territory having

made conflicting statements, and the Territory's failure to establish without doubt the guilt of the defendant, the jury found the defendant not guilty, after deliberating thirty minutes.

ARMY SURGEON WEDS.

Dr. E. D. Sinks and Miss Edna May Married in Club Rooms at Fort Bayard.

Special to the New Mexican. Silver City, N. M., Oct. 9—Dr. E. D. Sinks, United States army surgeon, and Miss Edna May, were united in marriage in the club rooms at Fort Bayard, at 3:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. Miss May is the daughter of Captain Henry J. May, U. S. A.

Chaplain Gavitt officiated at the nuptials. The beautiful bride was given away by her father. It was a regular army wedding, the club room being profusely decorated with flags and bunting, while the officers in attendance were all in full dress uniform.

After the wedding the bride and groom, together with the guests, passed to the home of Dr. Sinks, where refreshments were served. The wedding cake was cut by the bride with her husband's sword. The bride threw away her bouquet which was caught by Miss Eckols. Miss Hozlet got the ring and Miss Eckols the thimble in the cake cutting.

The bride and groom left for El Paso where they will make their future home.

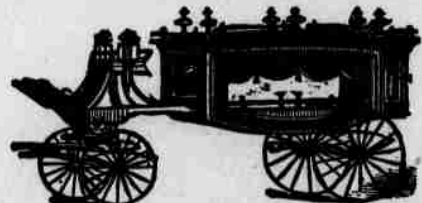
