## WAR IN SOUTH AFRICA.

### Boers Make Desperate Resistance at Town of Belmont.

### Boers at Pretoria Anxious for Finish Fight with British.

### British Lost Two Hundred and Twenty Men in Belmont Battle.

### BOERS PREPARING TO ATTACK BULAWAYO.

Cape Town, Nov. 24.—From accounts received of General Methuen's fight with the Boers, it appears that Boers from Faneham's farm shelled the advance body of British on November 22. The British artillery shelled a hill which the British subsequently occupied.

The Boer main column left Faneham's farm during the afternoon and camped five miles ahead. Thursday the Boers fired from the hills, a thousand yards distant, on the British advance forces. Other troops pushed up and the engagement became general. The British artillery shelled the Boers' guns. Crossing the fire zone amidst a storm of lead the Grenadier guards and Northumberland pushed up the incline and reached the summit doing great execution with their bayonets, capturing a laager with guns and equipment, prisoners, cattle and sheep. The Ninth Lancers and mounted infantry pursued. The Boers, it is estimated, numbered 3,500 men. Their loss is unknown.

**BRITISH LOSS.**  
London, Nov. 24.—The victory of Methuen's advancing column over the Boers at Belmont has caused as much anxiety as rejoicing. The Boers must have been in a decided minority, yet the total British loss, 220 killed, wounded and missing, proves the effectiveness of their resistance. The fact that no guns and only forty prisoners were captured by the victors and that the Boers carried off their dead shows that they retired in an orderly manner and that, probably, the Boer casualties were not numerous. The road is now presumably open to the Boer main position on the Modder river.

**SUKKING BRITISH CARRY.**  
Mool River, Natal, Nov. 24.—Boers only sent occasional shells into the British camp since this morning. The range of the British guns is not sufficient to be effective. Official native runner corroborates the report of heavy firing occurring at Belmont.

**BOER CASUALTIES.**  
Cape Town, Nov. 24.—Late arrivals from Pretoria estimate the Boer casualties so far 1,000 men, half of whom were killed. They say the race course there is being prepared as a laager for prisoners.

A Maxim gun is placed at the gate of the race course. From President Kruger down, everyone is in favor of fighting. They believe they will succeed in annexing all the beleaguered towns. The flag of the United Republic is now ready. It bears the Orange cross. The Boers expect the war to last four to six months, when they will possess South Africa. Commandant Albrecht and Lieut. Klo have started with a command to capture Bulawayo.

**Cabinet Meeting.**  
Washington, Nov. 24.—No important business was transacted at the cabinet meeting today.

Annual reports were under consideration. All the members of the cabinet will accompany the president to Paterson tomorrow to attend the funeral of Vice President Hobart.

**Kentucky's Trial Trip.**  
Boston, Nov. 24.—In a trial run today the new battleship Kentucky made an average speed 16.51 knots per hour, not quite equalling the speed of her sister ship Kentucky.

**Secretary Root's Report.**  
Washington, Nov. 24.—President McKinley has received a synopsis of Secretary Root's annual report.

These are some of the essential features of the secretary's observations and recommendations: Immediate appointment of civil governors in Cuba and Porto Rico; substitution of civil government for the Philippines immediately following the suppression of the present insurrection; a complete system of survey in the Philippines, Cuba and Porto Rico, with educational and property qualifications required for all voters; immediate construction of a cable between the United States and the Philippines. No general reorganization of the army will be recommended.

**A Day of Hopes.**  
Mrs. Botwick, who was injured in a runaway a few days ago, and who has since lain in an unconscious state, gave her family a small ray of hope this morning by opening her eyes and recognizing her daughter, Mrs. Miller. She afterwards relaxed into her former state of all appearance, and Dr. Wroth forbade any one to question or talk with her.

The Hon. Lorion Miller, son-in-law of Mrs. Botwick, had been summoned from El Paso and is now in the city. The family have very grave doubts of the recovery of Mrs. Botwick, but feel a little encouraged by the fact of her having awakened to a state of semi-consciousness. Her chances of life are not increased by that much.

**Captain McClintock.**  
Capt. J. H. McClintock, of Troop B, Arizona "Rough Riders," came in from the west last night and registered at Sturges' European from Phoenix. The captain uses a cane, the result of gun shot wounds received in the battle of Las Guasimas in Cuba on June 24, 1898.

The captain is the Arizona correspondent for the Los Angeles Times. He is here taking up the Phoenix Indian and Cowboy carnival, and would like to see quite a crowd of Albuquerque people in attendance.

**Who Wanted to Hug and Kiss.**

## INSURGENTS DISPERSE.

### Philippine Government and Army Scattered in the Mountains.

### President of Filipino Congress Surrendered to MacArthur.

### The Wrecked Cruiser Charleston Has Disappeared Beneath the Waves.

### FACTS REGARDING KENTUCKY ELECTION.

Washington, Nov. 24.—General Otis cabled today: "The claim to a government by the insurgents can be made no longer under any fiction. Its treasurer, secretary of interior and president of its congress are in our hands; its president and the remaining cabinet officers are in hiding, evidently in several of the Luzon provinces; its generals and troops, in small bands, are scattered through these provinces acting as bandits, or dispersed, playing the role of 'amigos' with arms concealed. The indications are that Aguinaldo did not escape through the lines of Lawton or Wheeler, but fled westward from Bayambang railway station. Telegraphic communication to Dagupan has been established and will be open to San Fabian to day. By relaying rail two miles of track with material at hand, way communication to that point will be re-established."

Another dispatch from Otis gives the results of the fighting in Iloilo as follows: "Iloilo, in Iloilo, reports the enemy driven back into the mountains. The insurgent capital, Cabatuan, has been captured. The only serious action was that of Carpenter at Pavia. Total casualties, five killed or since dead of wounds, twenty-seven wounded. The enemy's casualties not stated."

**Philippine Surrenders.**  
Manila, Nov. 24.—Bastista, president of the Philippine congress, presented himself to General MacArthur to-day and formally renounced all further connection with the insurrection. He says that the Philippine congress and cabinet are scattered never to re-assemble. He believes that the Philippine soldiers will lay down their arms everywhere as soon as they learn the truth.

**Cruiser Charleston Sinks.**  
Washington, Nov. 24.—The navy department has received the following cablegram from the naval station at Cavite: "Culgoa reports that the Charleston has disappeared." The Culgoa was the relief ship sent from Hong Kong. This report has dispensed the last hope of saving the ship.

**Kentucky Election.**  
Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 24.—Goebel attorneys arrived here to-day with an appeal from the decision of Judge Jones that the 1,193 votes of Nelson county are erroneously certified for W. F. Taylor should be counted for W. S. Taylor. The case was argued this afternoon.

**District Court.**  
This is probably the last day of court for this term.

In the case of H. D. McKinney vs. Alton Mining and Milling Co., the cause was heard on plaintiff's motion to strike out defendant's motion to abate made under special appearance for defendant in this cause. The motion was sustained and defendant was granted ten days in which to appear and answer.

The case of the Albuquerque Auction company vs. Hannah Harris was referred to Referee Wm. D. Lee.

In the case of Santiago Baca vs. Board of County Commissioners, exceptions to report of the referee, were overruled and the report confirmed. The referee was allowed \$100.

Judge Crump appointed the following gentlemen jury commissioners for the March term: H. K. Rogers, David Weiler and Kalavio Vigil.

**Pleasant Harris Dead.**  
Pleasant Harris, a well-known colored man of this city, died last night at his rooms on West Tijeras avenue, after a short illness. He leaves a wife and son, the former now residing in Denver, and the latter, a boy about 12 years old, is here. The deceased, so it is stated, was addicted to the use of opiates, and it is thought that the sudden breaking down of his health, for only a short time ago he was considered in robust condition, was due to the constant use of the drugs. The remains will be buried in Fairview cemetery to-morrow afternoon.

**Convicted of Bribery.**  
Philadelphia, Nov. 24.—Kilgry P. Ingham, ex-United States district attorney, and his former assistant, Harvey K. Newitt, were today sentenced to imprisonment for two years and a fine of \$1 and costs for conspiracy, in attempting to bribe a secret service officer in connection with the big revenue stamp counterfeiting conspiracy.

It is said that sixteen thousand horses have arrived in South Africa in the British transports for Buller's army.

The national democratic committee announces that they have \$147,000 to squander in the campaign next year.

THE CITIZEN to-morrow afternoon will be a double sheet paper, and will contain a complete review of everything happening in New Mexico.

CHINAMEN near El Paso, Texas, are raising green garden truck for the market. These thrifty Celestials seem to be minding their peas and beans all right enough.

The people of western Colorado county vigorously protest against the government forest reserve recently established, which covers the best mining and grazing sections of that county.

In spite of the retirement of Russell A. Alger to private life he will not doubt be charged by some with responsibility for the embargoed beef about which complaint is being made in England.

THERE has been a rapid increase of independent telephone companies. It is stated that the close of this year will see 5,000 independent telephone exchanges in operation, having over 750,000 instruments.

THERE is probably more real solid comfort in growing and baling alfalfa hay at \$10 a ton than being a military hero. Nervous critics now assert that General Funston never swam a river and that he robbed a church near Manila.

CORRUGATED galvanized sheet iron is the almost universal building material of the South African. It is used in the immense buildings of the Kimberley mines and in the buildings of Johannesburg, as well as in thousands of dwelling houses, barns, warehouses, fences, etc.

THE censorship established over all dispatches from South Africa makes us certain every item of news coming from there. No one outside of New and British official circles has any true knowledge of what has actually occurred at the scene of strife and the present condition of the opposing armies.

THE youngest of the territories, Oklahoma, has taken the initiative toward securing admission to statehood and it will be represented in the lobby at the next session of congress to influence favorable action. Arizona and New Mexico have, however, since the San Francisco Chronicle, a prior right to the privilege.

THE election of a queen for the Phoenix carnival festival, as usual in such cases, in a middle and of course hard feeling, Miss Callie Mills, who had secured from her many young gentlemen friends that they would pull their purse-strings to secure votes for her, gracefully withdrew the contest for carnival queen by withdrawing, thus preventing a continuance of the middle and electing Miss Lena Purdy.

THE gentle members of the Utah state democratic central committee respectfully decline to work to seat Roberts, the polygamist, and the Mormon members of the committee seemed desirous to drop the subject when it was seen that their gentle colleagues would not cooperate. There is really no political question involved. Roberts is a democrat, but democrats are not bound to support a man who, in violation of the laws of the United States, has three wives, even if he is a democrat.

RIO GRANDE BRIDGE.  
The chairman of the board of county commissioners, Hon. E. A. Miera, informs THE CITIZEN that there has been no change in the location of the bridge across the Rio Grande on the Cochiti road. The location was selected on account of the narrowness of the river at that point, enabling the erection of a good bridge within the limit allowed by law for the appropriation. Mr. Miera states that the bridge will be put at Pena Blanca provided the additional expense

is contributed by those interested in the location. At Pena Blanca the bridge and approaches would be nearly one and a half miles in length, and would cost several thousand dollars more than the county can pay. This is a question that the business men of Albuquerque and Bland can consider. Mr. Miera says that the board of county commissioners will be guided in the matter by the wishes of the business men of the two places, and if the additional expense can be provided that the bridge will be located at Pena Blanca.

THERE are more standard silver dollars in circulation than ever before, the amount being \$71,936,815. The highest amount previously reached was December, 1890, when the total was \$67,547,023. The minimum since that date was July, 1894, when the total was \$50,950,540. During the last fiscal year the government paid out in the regular course of business \$42,532,296 in standard silver dollars and received over the counter in the regular course of business \$7,581,044, which shows that \$10,429,894 of the coins remain in circulation.

THERE are 160 acres of land in present 9, Colfax county, New Mexico, that belonged to the late Robert G. Ingersoll. He, at one time, owned many cattle in eastern Colfax county and on the 160 acres in his name, built the "Ingersoll Cabin." The property will be sold for taxes due upon it for six years.

FEEDING IN TRANSIT.  
Cattlemen Seeking to Have the Old Arrangement Renewed.

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HERE HERE!  
An Engineer at Bland Makes a Few Corrections.  
A short time ago this paper clipped an article from the Topeka State Journal, which had been wired that paper from Chicago. The article in question referred to the engineers' committee of the Santa Fe system and engineers' pay, and from all accounts contained some errors. An engineer at Bland makes the following corrections:

The only division on the system paying \$4.15 per 100 miles was the division from Bland to Las Vegas. And no difference was made for consolidation engineers on any division.

On mountain runs they receive \$4.35 for first 100 miles or less.

The only pay of that class was from Bland to Las Vegas, which was \$4.35 for the 23 miles. The pay from Trinidad to La Junta was 4 cents per mile on consolidation engines as well as all other classes.

His parting shot, that the committee would "adjust" without securing any increase at all, is far from the facts as some of the rest of the statements, for there was a raise secured in certain places, and some of it to engine drivers, and some to the rest of the details of which I am not at liberty at present to note here.
