THE republic of Mexico has 125 cotton factories in operation.

DURING the next century the United States may annex all of the western hemisphere.

In the army last year typhoid fever caused nearly three times as many deaths as bullets.

New Mexico has made more permanent growth this year than in any previous year in the history of the territory.

THE Denver Post has conceived a happy idea—that of issuing the poems of James Barlow Adams in book form.

DURING 1899 there were 6,443,110 cattle received at the eleven principal cattle points in the United States.

The chances are that the bonds of this country will be refunded at a premium. The credit of the country and city is first-class.

THE mining towns of Gallup, Hanover, Bland, White Oaks, Silver City, Cerrillos and Kittabothtown, all report prosperity this year.

THE first number of Vol. 2 of the Mirage is out, and it is a credit to the university and the young people who publish it.

THE largest river in Luzon is the Cagayan, whose mouth is at the northern end of the island. American cavalry have already reached its headwaters.

THE city of Albuquerque presented Captain Lawton with a gold watch after he captured Geronimo. We should give him a sword after he catches Aguinaldo.

ENGLAND is sending men and supplies to the Cape in ninety chartered ships. Some of the largest British armies yet organized will be in motion before the month is out.

THE friends of the democratic candidate for governor of Ohio insist that he bought up enough votes to elect him, but that the voters were not honest and would not stay bought.

THE calamity howlers are sullen over the prosperity of the country. They predict, however, that it will not last. It is a strange phase of humanity that rejoices only over misfortunes.

THE executive committee of the New Mexico Educational association has secured the Palace hotel for headquarters at a very low rate for all attending the association during the holidays, December 27, 28 and 29.

THE rapid and unchecked advance of the American troops in the Philippines causes some officials to believe that the war on the island of Luzon will be practically ended long before thousands of our troops bound for that destination have arrived.

GENERAL LAWTON will capture Aguinaldo. The Filipino insurgent chief is a good dodger, but he is not in the same class with Geronimo, the Apache chief, who was captured by Lawton after a chase of hundreds of miles over deserts and mountains.

THE world's record for the production of steel rails by one plant in twenty-four hours was beaten by the South Chicago mills on October 25th, when they turned out 2,600 tons. The product of this plant for October was 60,000 tons, and for the year will be 625,000 tons.

AN Australian wool famine is predicted on account of the demand for mutton to feed the British troops engaged in South Africa. It is said that Australian sheepbreeders are not only killing their sheep for mutton, but that they are also reducing their goods by culling the breeds in order to obtain better meat sheep.

THE New Mexico says that it is an encouraging exhibition of enterprise that passengers on the Santa Fe train can see daily on the Rio Grande, where several hundred men, teams and several

big wagons are conducting a dam and canal for the utilization of waste lands around Albuquerque. If New Mexico would keep something like this going on all the while, the ocular demonstration of progress would be very convincing.

DURING the past year the counterfeiting of silver coins rapidly increased, the amount detected at the office of the treasurer last year being \$5,417.15, as compared with \$2,483.40 in 1908. There was an increase in each denomination, but it was greatest in the dollar piece, of which the amount was more than doubled.

THERE is a corner in cotton goods in New York City, and prices are said to be soaring skyward. The rise is explained by the statement that the H. B. Claffin company has practically cornered the products of the mills. The mills have sold their products far ahead and are thought to be in sore straits for the raw material.

THE people are interested in the information that Mr. Bryan is securing a good income from his lectures and speeches. He will have something to fall back upon after he is again defeated for the presidency next year.

THE imports of Africa amounted during the past year to \$40,000,000, of which \$15,000,000 was furnished by the United States. The exports for the same time were \$350,000,000, of which the United States took \$10,000,000.

THE cardboard manufacturers of the United States, in conference at Buffalo, have decided upon an advance of ten per cent. in prices, consequent upon an increase in the cost of material.

THE establishment of a beet sugar factory near this city would be worth hundreds of thousands of dollars to the farmers in this valley.

THE secret service has uncovered another band of counterfeiters, and secured a large quantity of bogus bills, which are so cleverly executed that the average person would never suspect them of being spurious. Things of great value are always selected by counterfeiters for imitation, notably the celebrated one hundred dollar bill, which has many imitators but no equals for its ingenuity, design and general debility. On Tuesday afternoon a writ of habeas corpus was granted by the territorial supreme court at Santa Fe in the following cases from Bernalillo county, the Second judicial district: Jose Maria Cavada, plaintiff in error, vs. Epimeno Miera, et al, defendant in error; J. L. Perea, treasurer and collector of Bernalillo county, appellant, vs. Territory ex rel Josefa P. Castillo, appellee. This is an appeal in which it is sought to set aside the judgment of the lower court for taxes alleged to be due the territory and county. Barbara Chavez de Armijo, appellee, vs. Justo R. Armijo, appellant. This is an appeal from a judgment for \$9,000. A writ of error was also filed in this suit.

The three members of the family, Mrs. Rosa Valdez, her son, Filogonio Sanchez, and his wife, therefore died within ten days of each other. Mrs. Sanchez was aged 40 years, and leaves six children. Her funeral will take place to-morrow forenoon at 9 o'clock at Embudo. This is not the only misfortune that has visited Mr. Alarid's family lately, for yesterday Come Alarid's only brother, Thomas Alarid, was brought home from Bland with his leg broken, and two months ago Mrs. Maria Gonzalez y Alarid, aged 95 years, the mother of the two Alarids and their sister, died. All the above attended her funeral, and seemed hale and hearty at that time.—New Mexican.

The decision of the United States court of appeals that suicide does not invalidate a life insurance policy unless it can be proved that the insurer contemplated suicide at the time of taking out the policy is sound sense as well as sound law.
