LET'S get that big smelter.

KENTUCKY stands firm for fraudulent elections.

THE way to build up a town is for its home people to build it.

GEN. FUNSTON is in Denver, on his return to the Philippine Islands.

THE sugar trust is rapidly absorbing all the refineries in the country.

It is predicted that the approaching session of congress will be one of the longest on record.

WHILE on his western trip it is expected General Miles will visit Albuquerque and other points in New Mexico.

MEXICO is producing \$50,000,000 of silver per year, and can keep up the output to that limit for two hundred years.

THE China beet sugar factory has had a run of sixty-five days this year and produced 12,000,000 pounds of fine grade sugar.

THE meteoric display was not visible in New Mexico. The moon was so bright last night that only stars of the first magnitude were visible.

VICE-PRESIDENT HOBART, who was given up as a dead man by his attending physicians, is now considered good for several years of life.

THE number of national banks organized in the United States since January 1 is given as fifty-eight, with an aggregate capital of \$8,820,000.

THE formation of trusts and combines continues, regardless of the money famine in New York. But the trusts are composed mostly of water anyway.

THE monument over the grave of Miss Winnie Davis, daughter of the president of the Confederacy, in Hollywood cemetery, Richmond, Va., was unveiled on November 17.

THE Times says that one of the largest cotton manufacturers in America was in Denver recently on his way to China and Japan to look into new markets. Trade follows the flag.

IT is estimated that within the past sixty years nearly 300,000,000 tons of rock have been broken down by the Niagara Falls, which is slowly cutting its way up stream.

GEN. OTIS has filed a report with the war department of the military operations in the Philippines. The report covers the time since he assumed command at Manila.

HAWAII's population has increased 25,000 during the last two years, showing that annexation has had a favorable effect on the census returns, as it has on its general prosperity and social condition.

THAT the work of Americanizing Cuba is going steadily forward is shown by the proclamation of General Brooke designating November 30 next as a day of general thanksgiving throughout the island.

THIRTY years ago today the Suez canal was opened. That it has been a tremendous financial success of late years is shown by the latest report, that of 1919. The receipts of 1919 have amounted to \$7,900,000 francs, which exceeds those of any previous year.

AN Arizona paper advises the planting of sunflowers as food for cattle and poultry. The Danish dairymen have been using the seeds of this plant as winter food for their cattle, and the North Sea butter has always commanded the top price in the London market for the last half century.

RECENTLY a specialist in New York told a patient that he had heart disease, whereupon the latter went off and killed himself. A post-mortem examination followed and it was demonstrated that the man's heart was perfectly sound. All of which goes to prove that "there are others" besides the weather man who don't know it all.

THE National Association of Manufacturers has taken up the task of securing a parcels post for this country. It is stated that ninety per cent of the members of the organization are in favor of extending the postal facilities of the country so that packages not exceeding twelve pounds in weight may be carried in the mails at a uniform rate throughout the country.

THE San Diego Vidette says that the people who are crying the loudest against the syndicates and expressing sympathy for the smaller producer, are the ones who, as a rule, are the most persistent in their demands for shorter hours and increased pay, but they do not stop to consider what the effect their demand will have on the small concerns now competing with the syndicates.

SINCE General Otis has shown his ability to sweep everything before him in the Philippines with less than 20,000 troops available, the yellow press has temporarily ceased its malignant slanders at that officer. Otis will soon have more than 20,000 soldiers in his command, and everything now points to his making good every prediction he has uttered regarding his ability to successfully crush the rebellion.

HURRY UP THE WORK.

THE irrigation company constructing a canal above Albuquerque and company planning to irrigate lands at Socorro should hurry up their work, says the New Mexican, for there is certainly a well-organized effort on foot to again try to work a treaty through the senate for the construction of the so-called international dam at El Paso. The treaty as prepared, which has so far failed to

secure committee support in the senate, promises in unmistakable language that the United States will not permit any more water to be appropriated from the Rio Grande or its tributaries. This promise will, of course, be insisted upon by Mexico, especially as the government of that country, according to some of its officers and promoters of the scheme in El Paso assert, in order to add to the popularity of the proposition, will donate one third of the estimated cost of the El Paso enterprise.

SMELTER PROPOSITION.

This city at last has a practical proposition for the erection of a big smelter, and it should be accepted at the earliest possible moment. A Denver firm offers to build a smelter with a capital stock of \$30,000, provided the people of this city will take one-third of the stock. Mr. T. J. Curran of this city has received the following letter, which explains itself:

"Denver, Colo., Nov. 12, 1920.

"Mr. T. J. Curran, Albuquerque, N. M.

"Dear Sir:—When you were in Denver during the early part of September you mentioned Albuquerque, as being an ideal point for the erection of a smelter plant."

"I was greatly impressed with what you had to say upon the subject, so much so, in fact, that I am now prepared to make the following proposition to the citizens of Albuquerque through you and your bureau:

"That I will organize a smelting company with a capital stock of \$30,000, and if the citizens of Albuquerque will purchase 10,000 shares of said stock for \$3,000,000, with the balance of \$20,000,000 to be paid in cash, I will build a smelter on a suitable site for said plant, undertake to erect within two miles of the city a modern smelting plant of 100 tons capacity, together with a 100-ton sampler and a roaster."

"The subscription for stock must be all in before said company will be organized."

"The plant to be paid for in installments as follows: 33 1/3 per cent when the sampling work is erected; 33 1/3 per cent when the machinery for the 100-ton sampler is on the ground, and the balance when the smelter is ready to be blown in."

"I want to enter into an agreement with the subscribers for the 10,000 shares that no stock shall be sold for less than its par value after the works are in operation."

"I can put in the plant and have it in operation in six months after the organization of the company."

"The plant will employ about 225 men the year around, and will be of immense value to your city."

"Please let me hear from you regarding the proposition at your earliest convenience. Respectfully yours,

"J. H. MONTGOMERY."
