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NEW MEXICO EASTERN

Work Will Probably Be Resumed
on the Cut-Off Early
Next Year.

MOUNTAINAIR EVENTS

Postoffice Site Changed--A Strike of
Timber Men at Abo
Pass.

Special to the New Mexican.

Mountainair, N. M., Oct. 25--On what is considered good authority, work will be resumed on the Santa Fe cut-off early in the New Year, probably in January, but possibly not before February. On the same authority the work was stopped principally in order to make a good financial showing in the next annual report of the company and also on account of the present disturbed condition of laboring men all over the country. That the present condition of affairs is a serious menace to commercial activity, there can be no doubt and railroad companies early feel the effects of this demoralization. The work of hauling ties and other timbers has never stopped and there are now more than enough ties along the line east to build the line to Willard. The surplus will be hauled west as needed in course of construction.

The casing for the new well on the townsite is on the ground and the work of drilling will begin as soon as the drill can get here. S. S. Pickens, of Las Vegas, will do the work and the well will be sunk 300 feet, not only to secure an immense reservoir but to determine definitely the volume and quality of the water. The two wells which have been drilled are on private property and in each of them small drills were used. The same formations were encountered in both wells and in both of them water was struck in sand.

FIRE PLAYS HAVOC AT SAN PEDRO

General Store and Postoffice Destroyed--Supposed to Be of
Incendiary Origin.

San Pedro, N. M., Oct. 25--The general store of N. J. Strumquist, of this place was burned to the ground this morning at 3 o'clock. The postoffice was also contained in the building. Mr. Strumquist being postmaster, and that, together with the stock of goods, of about \$3,000 value are a total loss. The buildings burned were two in number, adjoining, and were probably the best in the village. The fire was first discovered between the buildings, but so much headway had been gained that access was impossible so that nothing whatever was saved.

The origin of the fire is supposed to be incendiary. No insurance.

BIG CALIFORNIA FIRE.

Sawmill of the Truckee Lumber Company
Food for Flames--Loss
\$50,000.

Truckee, Cal., Oct. 26--The sawmill of the Truckee Lumber company has been completely destroyed by fire. The loss is \$50,000, partially insured. The flames communicated to the company's flume and the lumber piles and all through the night a general conflagration was feared. The water supply gave out and a fire engine was sent from Sacramento.

At present the fire is under control but the lumber yard is built upon forty feet of old slabs and there are burning far down beneath the surface. Several attempts have been made to blast a fire break through the slabs and nearly all the windows in the upper part of town are broken.

F. AUGUSTUS HEINZE WILL ADDRESS MINERS AT BUTTE

Butte, Mont., Oct. 26--F. Augustus Heinze, has announced that at 4 o'clock this afternoon he will address all the miners of Butte, particularly those made idle by the suspension of the Amalgamated mines and will listen to any proposal that they might make, looking to a resumption of the mines and smelters.

He said that he would act as a representative of John MacGinnis, vice president of the United Copper company, who at present is in Salt Lake. This proposal caused much commotion among the idle miners and the people of this city.

Officials of the miners' union refuse to divulge the proceedings of the executive session last night. By a practically unanimous vote the Silver Bow Trades and Labor Assembly endorsed the action of the miners' union on the past Saturday, both as to their offer to buy MacGinnis' stock in the Boston and Montana company, and the resolutions adopted.

A contract has been let for the survey of the township in which Estancia is located. The interior department should survey all the unsurveyed land in this valley so that settlers might get titles to their homes. The red-tape policy, of petitioning by townships, is tedious and expensive to homesteaders and there is no apparent good reason why it should be insisted upon.

Mountainair people are anxious for mail service to be established on the Santa Fe Central. It comes now around Robin Hood's barn and it takes it two days to cross the mountains from Albuquerque. Coming the other way it would be two or three days earlier and much more satisfactory generally.

In order to secure the desired right of way for yardage at Belen the Santa Fe Railway company agreed to construct several miles of new irrigation ditches and this work is now under full headway. James Dunn, the chief engineer, is also anxious to resume work on the bridges especially the bridge across the Rio Grande this fall, but as yet no move in that direction has been made.

Timber Men on a Strike.
Mountainair is gradually assuming metropolitan airs. All the men, engaged in the tie and timber yards at this place, struck the other day for higher wages. They were receiving \$1.25 for nine hours work, and their places were soon filled. They were all native laborers.

ACQUITTED OF MURDER.

Frederick Serna, Charged With the
Murder of Joseph Perea, Found
Not Guilty.

Frederick Serna, charged with the murder of Jose Perea which occurred at Los Griegos about three years ago, was acquitted by the district court in Bernalillo on Saturday. This trial has attracted much attention in the county.

On the night of October 9, 1900, Jose Perea and his wife, two very old persons, heard someone rapping on the opposite side of the house. The old people went around the house to ascertain the meaning of the noise, and as they passed an unfinished wall at the side of the house, someone concealed in the shadow fired upon them killing the old man who was leading the way. Frederick Serna had been at the house a week previous to the shooting and the wife of the deceased testified that she recognized him in the shadow on the night of the shooting.

The testimony of the prosecuting witness was not thought sufficient to convict the accused, as she was so old and her mind was somewhat feeble.

SENTENCED TO BE SHOT FOR MURDERING WATCHMAN.

Ogden, Oct. 26--At Farmington today, Judge Rolapp sentenced Nick Haworth to be shot on Friday, December 11. Haworth, about four years ago, killed Thomas Sandall, a watchman, in the store at Layton. Haworth was one of the prisoners who escaped from the penitentiary two weeks ago and was recaptured after four days liberty.

TO IRRIGATE VAST ACREAGE

Rinconada Land and Reservoir Company
to Build a Dam in Rinconada Canon
--To Begin Work at Once.

To construct a dam that will irrigate from 16,000 to 20,000 acres. For this purpose Judge B. S. Baker, of Albuquerque, has arranged with the board of public lands to secure about 16,000 acres of land opposite the mouth of and in the Rinconada canon, for reservoir purposes, as provided by the laws to encourage irrigation. He represents the Rinconada Land and Reservoir company, the incorporators of which are G. B. Hengen of New York City; J. E. Smith, of Beatrice, Neb.; Judge F. W. Parker, of Las Cruces and Judge B. S. Baker.

"It is the purpose of the Rinconada Land and Reservoir company," said Judge Baker today, "to build a dam in the Rinconada canon, to a height of 110 to 120 feet. It will impound sufficient water to amply irrigate not less than from 16,000 to 20,000 acres of land."

"The site is an extraordinary favorable one, on account of the large and extensive watershed and the immense basin just above the site of the dam. The water will be conveyed about five miles to the land selected for irrigation. The land is in every way suited by nature for irrigation. It is almost perfectly level and very fertile. It lies on both sides of the El Paso & Northeastern and Rock Island system, about ten miles north of Tularosa."

"It will be the purpose of the company to build a town on the El Paso & Northeastern system, a siding being already established there. The incorporators are all western men, with a sufficient amount of capital to push the matter to completion in the near future. It is hoped arrangements can be made and work commenced, so as to have the dam completed by March 1, next. If the venture is a success it will be of great value to the Territory, especially to the section where the dam is to be located, and be of more or less profit to the projectors."

Judge Baker was before a special meeting of the Territorial land board today, and this body entered into a provisional contract with the Rinconada Land and Reservoir company to sell to the company upon the completion of the reservoir and dam 160,000 acres of land lying adjacent to and to be supplied from the reservoir. A lease for a large amount of land for grazing purposes at three cents per acre per annum for five years was also made provisionally between the board and the Rinconada Land and Reservoir company.

Preliminary surveys for the dam and reservoir have already been made and the permanent survey is also under consideration. It looks as if actual construction work on the project will commence at a very early date.

REVOLUTION HAS BROKEN OUT AT SANTO DOMINGO

Cape Haytien, Hayti, Oct. 26--The revolution which has broken out in the northern part of the republic of Santo Domingo, and which has already resulted in the establishment of a provisional government under the presidency of General Moreles at Puerto Plata, was according to advices, caused by custom house frauds and the prevarication of the ministers of war and of finance. The signal for the outbreaking revolt was given at 2 o'clock on Saturday afternoon by three cannon shots. The same evening, all partisans of President Wos y Gil at Puerto Plata were arrested.

The inhabitants of Monte Christo, La Ligne and Moca united and attacked Santiago. That town is now surrounded by revolutionists, who have severed telegraphic communication between Santiago and La Vega. The revolutionary movement is extending. Vice President Deschamps sought safety in flight. The general opinion is that the government of Wos y Gil is lost.

Advices to France Confirm Reports.

Paris, Oct. 26--Advices from Cape Haytien, Hayti, confirm the reports that the revolutionary movement in Santo Domingo is in favor of the former President Jimenez. The election of Morales as president of the provisional government, it is said to be a step taken pending the arrival of Jimenez.

MIRACULOUS ESCAPE FROM INSTANT DEATH

Fell thirty feet to a stone pavement and escaped death. This was the experience of Frederick Stanley Dunlavy, aged two years and two months, the son of F. E. Dunlavy, the general manager of the Dunlavy Mercantile company. The child with his father had gone up into the offices of the Dunlavy Mercantile company, yesterday afternoon, on the second floor of the Catron block.

While Mr. Dunlavy was busy at his desk, the child with an older sister went out into the hall. Finding the window open leading to the fire escape, the youngster climbed out and had ascended the fire escape about two-thirds way to the roof, when he slipped and fell. The child landed on the stone pavement thirty feet below, and was picked up by his father for dead. A superficial examination made by Dr. David Knapp, however, allayed the father's fear, and later when the child was taken to his home on Palace avenue, an examination by Drs. J. L. Norris and William M. Popplewell showed that no bones were broken, and that the child had not suffered internal injuries.

The child sustained a badly mangled nose, which, however, will not result in a permanent disfigurement, his teeth were loosened, and his chin badly cut. The child passed a restless night, but this morning had recovered from the shock of the fall, and although very sore, from bruises all over his body, the little fellow was none the worse for his thirty foot drop.

STRIKE AT TRINIDAD.

Miners Object to the Weightman Employed by the Victor Fuel Company.

There was a small strike at the Hastings mine of the Victor Fuel company in Trinidad, Colorado, Saturday, but the trouble has been settled and it is thought that the men will return to work today. The leaders of the strike were discharged by the company. The strike started at mine No. 1 and was on account of a weightman, put to work by the company, when the men wanted one of their own choosing. About 100 men were involved.

This strike had no connection with the threatened strike of the union in Colorado and New Mexico.

There is little change in the general situation in this district. No word has yet been received from President Mitchell though the officers of the miners' union are expecting it hourly, and it is said that a formal call for the strike is printed, sealed and addressed, and will be sent out as soon as the orders arrive.

DOWIE'S COACH AND TEAM ATTACHED IN GOTHAM.

New York, Oct. 26--The usual early morning service of the Zion restoration host in Madison Square Garden today was attended by a large crowd of Zion citizens, with a small sprinkling of outsiders. Dowie attended the meeting and spoke for a short time. An attachment was served on Dowie's coach and team today, as the coachman was driving along the street. It is said to be for a thousand dollars and was secured by an attorney, his claim being for services rendered in defending a former Zionite who was convicted for allowing his child to die without medical attention.

OFFICIALS KILLED DURING REVOLT OF TWO ARAB TRIBES.

Constantinople, Oct. 26--It is announced that the military commandant, Ahmet Pasha, and the governor of the province of Azir on the Red Sea coast of Arabia, were killed as a result of a revolt of two Arab tribes against the imposition of a new cattle tax and about a thousand Turkish troops were killed or wounded. The rest of the Turkish force was routed. About fifteen battalions of troops have been dispatched thither.

TO EXONERATE GEN. CHASE--- GEN. BELL MUST RESIGN

Denver, Colo., Oct. 26--The court martial proceedings in the case against Brigadier General John Chase of the Colorado National Guard have been adjourned until Thursday next in order to give Colonel Fashnestock, the president of the court, opportunity to attend the funeral of his father-in-law.

It is reported that on reconvening, the court will exonerate General Chase from the charges of perjury and disobedience to orders which were made against him by Adjutant General Sherman M. Bell.

It is understood that Governor Peabody has asked Adjutant General Bell to resign and should he refuse to comply, it is said that the governor will remove him from office. According to report Major Zeph T. Hill is slated for the appointment as Bell's successor.

HELD ON MURDER CHARGE

Frank Hall, a Wood Hauler of Albuquerque Fatally Injured Adversary in a Fight.

Frank Hull, a wood hauler of Albuquerque, knocked down two laborers with his fists, last Sunday.

One of the men had a rib broken in the fight. A fractured end of the rib pierced the right lung and caused a hemorrhage from which the man died. Hull is now in jail awaiting a hearing.

BANK AT SHEPIDAN, ORE., BLOWN UP BY DYNAMITE.

Sheridan, Ore., Oct. 26--The bank of Scoggin & Wortman was blown up by dynamite at three this morning and looted of its contents by a gang of bandits. Seven thousand dollars in coin were secured. The robbers escaped in a buggy. The explosion awakened Mayor E. H. Eakin who lives across the street and he fired three shots at the fleeing men from a rifle. The principal depositors in the bank are farmers.

REAR END COLLISION ON D. L. & W. SYSTEM.

New York, Oct. 26--A rear end collision between two Delaware, Lackawanna and Western passenger trains, occurred today at Orange, N. J., and a dozen were injured, two seriously. Both trains were crowded.

FRENCH BARK SAVOYARD WRECKED OFF BREST.

Brest, France, Oct. 26--The French bark Savoyard has been wrecked near here. Thirty-one of its crew, the captain's wife and four other women were lost.

STREET FAIR TENTS FOLDED

Talbot-Whitney Carnival Company Left Capital City as
Quietly as They Entered.

AFFORDED GALA WEEK

Mayor Sparks and Officers of Capital City Band Indorse Company and Management.

The mighty hosts of the Talbot-Whitney Carnival company, who, during the week had given a big street fair and carnival under the auspices of the Capital City band, quietly folded their tents Saturday night, and when Old Sol arose in the east Sunday morning, Lincoln avenue which had been the scene of activity and gaiety for a week, was deserted. The attractions of the Talbot-Whitney Carnival company had all been hauled to the depot, and loaded on cars, preparatory to the trip to Las Vegas, where the company will hold forth this week.

The Talbot-Whitney aggregation, from Messrs. Talbot and Whitney down, was made up of as fine a representation of men and women, as any law abiding community could wish to have enter the city gates for a week of high carnival and pleasure. Not a single arrest was made during the week, and there were no scenes of disorder or disturbance on the midway. Had the aggregation been made up of home talent, drawn from the ranks of the citizens of Santa Fe, good order could not have prevailed on a higher scale, than it did during the week that the Talbot-Whitney Carnival company held forth here.

It can further be said that none of the touts and pickpockets that usually follow circuses and attractions of the Talbot-Whitney order, were in evidence during street fair week. As a matter of fact they were conspicuous by their absence. The special officers, sworn in for the week from the ranks of the Capital City band had

simply to mingle with the crowds, and enjoy themselves on the midway, as they had no arrests to make, or no tough customers to deal with.

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A GOOD TIME FOR PURIFICATION.

The Bernalillo county situation, as pictured by District Attorney Frank W. Clancy, is attracting much attention throughout the Territory and Mr. Clancy, judging by the tone of the Territorial press and by the expressions of leading citizens, is certainly being upheld in his course. On this the San Marcial Bee says:

"District Attorney Frank W. Clancy of Albuquerque has made the discovery that certain officials of Bernalillo county have been far from circumspect with the people's money. To put it more plainly, they have looted the country treasury. Clancy objects, and the push of the gang takes a humorous view of the situation and comes back at him with the query, what are you going to do about it? The district attorney realizes that he is up against a hard proposition, for the other fellow is 'it' with the men who serve on the grand juries. It is greatly to the credit of many of the best people of Albuquerque that they are willing to stand by Mr. Clancy in his work of reform. And the district attorney finds a good deal of comfort in being backed by three influential daily newspapers—the Albuquerque Morning Journal, Santa Fe New Mexican, and the Las Vegas Optic, in addition to a number of weekly papers. The present time, just about a year previous to the general election, is an opportune moment for purifying political conditions up there. A year from now the verdict of the voters will be due, and there is a fair prospect that it will be in line with the result in Socorro county, a year ago when the taxpayers decided that a certain boss was a menace and standing disgrace to honest government and clean party rule. Apparent impossibilities were easily overcome in this county. The joyful news the boss is dead was sweet music to the ear. So why should Bernalillo county hesitate, when such a movement there is going to have aid and encouragement from every part of the Territory? The beheading of corrupt kings in a free country is bound to become a more popular form of sport."

A large dam and extensive reservoir for the use of the Indians of the Zuni pueblo will be constructed during the coming two years in the Zuni river valley by the interior department at the expense of one hundred thousand dollars. This is the first large appropriation for irrigation purposes made for New Mexico, and it is hoped that it will be succeeded by many others. Heretofore the inhabitants of the Zuni pueblo have only been able to irrigate a few isolated patches and to raise a little corn, some melons and vegetables. With the water to be furnished by this reservoir and the ditches connected with it, they will be able to irrigate between six and eight thousand acres of very fertile land and will become prosperous and comfortably fixed. The Zunis are good, peaceable and quiet people. They have occupied their present pueblo, about four miles from the contemplated reservoir, for hundreds and hundreds of years and it is gratifying to know that the government will help them in the right direction. Work on the reservoir will commence about January 1, and it will take two years to complete it. All common labor necessary will be furnished by the Indians, which in itself, will prove beneficial as it will enable them to earn good wages and thus improve their condition materially.

The first Roosevelt administration deserves to go down in history as clean, capable and honest and it will always be a reminder of the time when the administration exposed the huge frauds and the great corruption that had eaten their way into the departments at Washington. They overshadow the frauds uncovered under previous administrations and President Roosevelt will receive the greatest credit for eradicating these evils, which eventually if unchecked, would have proved of the greatest harm to the public service.

Drs. H. W. Hoagland and C. F. Gardiner of Denver, Colorado, are conducting interesting experiments to ascertain the effect of high altitudes on the blood pressure. It has been asserted that apoplectic persons should not change altitude suddenly and that persons afflicted with certain chronic troubles in which the blood pressure plays an important part should live at sea level. The result of the experiments as far as conducted by these Denver physicians seems to bear out those assertions. The blood pressure of 24 persons was taken upon their arrival at the top of Pike's Peak, and again at the end of four hours, and a decided difference was noted although the exact nature of this difference will not be disclosed until the experiments are concluded. These experiments, of course, are of great interest to the entire Rocky mountain region for whatever additional light can be thrown upon the effect of altitude upon the human organism, is of value. However, the mistake of generalization must be avoided for although the effect of a sudden change of altitude upon the blood pressure may be quite noticeable, yet that effect may wear off with a longer stay in a great altitude or may not be noticeable at all if the change of altitude is made gradually instead of being made suddenly. Experiments along similar lines have been and are being made at the Hadley Climatological laboratory at the University of New Mexico and very important results have been noted.

It now looks as if the Low ticket is gaining in New York and the betting by the sporting fraternity of Gotham favors that ticket. Other indications also point to the fact that the Republican and reform tickets are making headway. In its political columns the Washington Post of a recent issue contained the following significant item upon the New York campaign:

"Two New York experts on political matters, both well known in Washington, agree that in the municipal campaign the fusion ticket is now having the best of it and unless serious reverses come, has a superior chance at the polls. This is the word brought here by Samuel G. Blythe, Washington correspondent of the World, who has been in the city after a long stay in New York, during which he gave careful study to campaign conditions. It is stated that the same view is held by Mr. H. S. Brown, Washington correspondent of the New York Herald, who has been at the home office several weeks following city politics."

"It is interesting in that connection to know that both men were originally of the opinion that Tammany was due for a victory this fall. Both are probably as good political judges of the New York field as one can find, and is goes without saying that their opinions are not colored in the slightest by party bias."

Industrial stocks are away down and this is easily explained. There is no good reason, however, why good railroad securities should not be strong. For instance the Northern Pacific railroad system has declared a dividend of seven per cent for the present year. This is very high and certainly shows that the railroad corporations are doing a vast business and wherever and whenever honestly conducted can pay handsome dividends on their bonds and stocks. No panic need be feared as long as great railroad systems pay fair interest on their securities. The business of the country is all right, although the business of Wall street is somewhat wrong.

While a war between Russia and Japan would be deplorable from a humanitarian standpoint, yet, it would be very desirable from the standpoint of American producers and manufacturers. War means an enormous waste of material and Uncle Sam would be called upon to help to make good that waste. Of course, that would add to the prosperity of this nation. Nevertheless, this nation can get along and be prosperous without encouraging other nations to fight each other.

The trust corporation's boom has collapsed. A fact upon which the country at large is to be congratulated. New Jersey, however, feels sore; the state's fees from such corporations have been enormous of late years, but this winter they will bring very little money into the state treasury.

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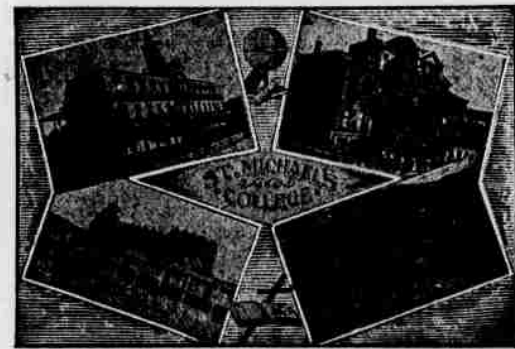

AFFAIRS IN WHITE OAKS

Stockholders of Free Gold Mining and Milling Company Pleased With the Camp.

SANTA RITA DISTRICT

Has Copper Camp Par Excellence of New Mexico Says J. Hamilton Stewart.

GRANT COUNTY.

There are at present 300 miners employed in the Burro mountain mining district, 100 of them doing annual assessment work.

The following interview concerning the Free Gold Mining and Milling company at White Oaks, is printed in the El Paso Herald:

"D. J. Carr, manager of the Free Gold Mining and Milling company, of White Oaks, N. M., is here on a short visit to the city. In speaking of affairs in his section of the country Mr. Carr said:

"Ten of the stockholders of our company from Quincy, Ill., have been spending the past week at the camp looking over the ground to ascertain the conditions there and they are all well pleased with the camp.

"We have just perfected a new machine for washing placer gold which was invented by Foreman Wise, of our camp. The machine is built to treat three hundred tons of dirt per day and while it is a wet process very little water is required for treating the dirt. The machine is constructed so that the water, after once being used, can be used over and over again. All that we lose by the process is what is lost by the absorption of the dirt.

"Just recently we put down a well to a depth of a hundred and sixty feet and got a supply of water, amounting to 25 gallons per minute which is enough to run our machine and supply the camp.

"The machine is constructed on a platform car so that it can be moved to follow up the dirt. While the stockholders of the company were at the camp we made a trial run of one and a half hours, during which we treated 16 tons of dirt from the surface of the ground and from which we secured \$30.48 in flour and coarse gold.

"I figure that the machine will save about 95 per cent of the values of the dirt and that which we lose is as fine as flour. About the middle of next week we hope to start the machine on a regular run.

"Two more companies have been organized to work in that camp and they will also use the same process for treating the dirt as we are using."

J. Hamilton Stewart, E. M., of New York City, who is making a careful study of Grant county mining camps, sums up Santa Rita district as follows:

"At Santa Rita you have the copper camp par excellence of New Mexico. One of very high grade is being shipped to the extent of four or five cars daily, averaging from 40 to 70 per cent.

"At Pinos Altos are also many fine properties, where depths of over 800 feet have been attained, showing permanency and stability of ores and values. These facts are most encouraging to mining men. They overthrow many theories that have been ventilated relative to repositions of ores by descending waters. The geologist by practical observation and investigation realizes that ascending waters are the prime factors in the precipitation of the base ores of this mineral zone. Frequently the presence of zinc is considered a detriment in the successful smelting of the ores, but in this progressive age, ways and means are being constantly discovered for the treatment of various ores and very successful results are being obtained by the use of improved pyritic smelters, and the treatment by volatilization. Ores are classified, according to the remunerative extraction of the metals they contain, and according to the metallurgical treatment, as roasting, smelting or milling ores, and according to metallic element predominating, as sulphuric, chloride, carbonate, etc. The ores of Grant county are pre-eminent ly smelting ores, with base metal chlorides, and it must be admitted that in the past it has been very difficult to get rid of all the base chlorides which are formed under the action of chlorides which are disposed to transfer chlorine to other metals in combination with sulphur or arsenic, are the proto chloride or iron and copper, the chlorides of zinc, lead and cobalt, when in this way most of the metals are chlorized. The base metals, principally iron and copper, are losing their chlorine gradually, by being first converted into sub-chlorides, and then into oxides. Roasting with increased heat will produce satisfactory results in the destruction of base metal chlorides, after wasting the process of lixiviation will extract copper, gold and silver, each of which is obtained separately. The presence of zinc in Grant county ores by modified treatment can be so utilized that it is a redeeming factor instead of a detrimental feature."

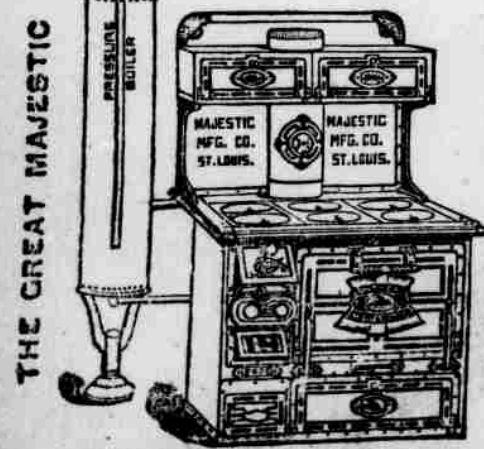

RUSSIA SAYS THERE IS NO NEED OF WAR RISKS.

London, Oct. 26—In connection with insurance against war risks, suffered on shipments of Welsh coal to Port Arthur for Russia a telegram was received in London today from St. Petersburg saying that there was no further necessity to insure against war. This is interpreted as casting a favorable outcome of negotiations between Russia and Japan.

PROPOSED AUSTRO- RUSSIAN CONTROL.

Constantinople, Oct. 26—The proposed Austro-Russian control of Macedonia does not meet with the approval of German and Italian diplomats and the Porte is expected to utilize the disagreement between the powers in order to delay action.

RUSSIAN AND JAPANESE MINISTERS RESUME CONFERENCE.

Tokyo, Japan, Oct. 26—Baron de Rosen, the Russian minister, and Foreign Minister Komura resumed their conference today. The Japanese cabinet also held another session.

HAIL AND SNOW FALL IN NEW YORK STATE.

Buffalo, N. Y., Oct. 26—Hail has fallen here since daybreak, but it disappears almost as fast as it falls. Snow fell in a number of places in the state today, the first of the season.

Pittsburgh, Pa., Oct. 26—The first snow of the season fell today. A light snow was general in this district.

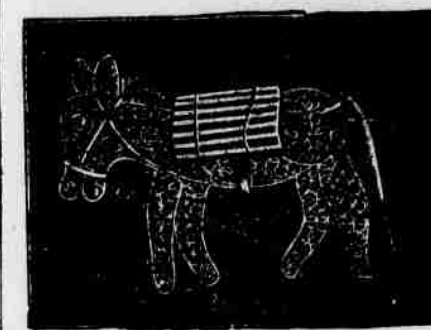

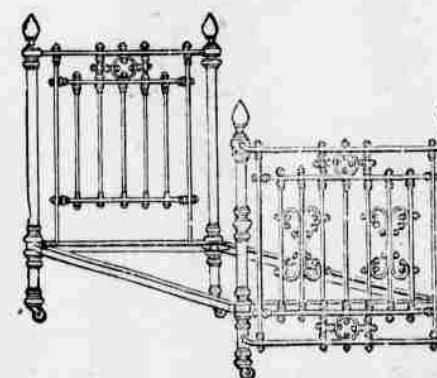



Many Mining Men Have Been Attracted There by the Recent Big Strikes.

COURT IN DONA ANA

WASHINGTON NOTES.

Land Frauds to Be Investigated—Salvation Army Colonists for Reclaimed Lands.

Congress will consider, at its coming session, the proposed plan of the Salvation Army of bringing settlers to those parts of the West to be reclaimed under the new irrigation act. The proposed plan is based on the experience of many years, as the Salvation Army has already established several colonies, the principal being at Amity, Colo.

Secretary of the Interior Hitchcock has given free reins to the special agents investigating alleged land frauds in the western states, and there is reason to believe that every guilty party will be apprehended and indicted. Mr. Hitchcock has conferred on the subject with Gifford Pinchot, chief of the bureau of forestry, Governor Chamberlain of Oregon, and Tams Bixby, chairman of the Dawes commission.

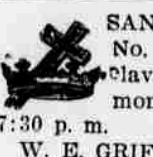

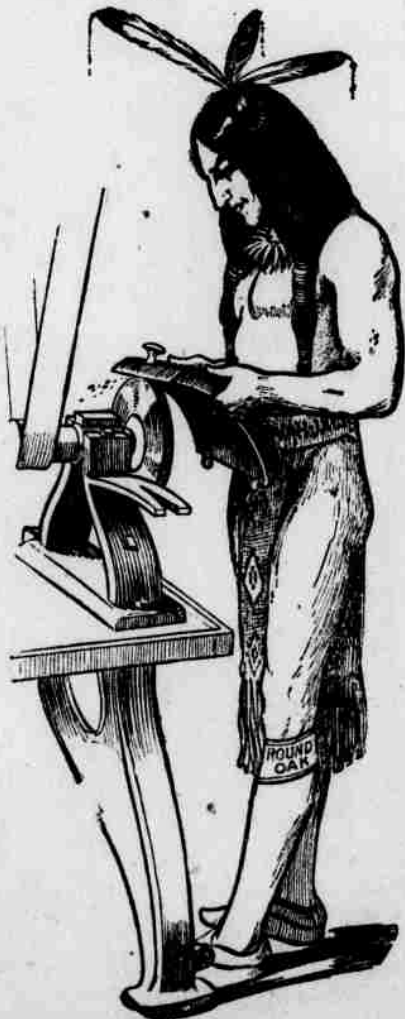
