ALBUQUERQUE DAY.

It should be a matter of patriotic pride for every citizen of Albuquerque to attend the state fair today. The day will be observed generally as a holiday, and there will be few who can truthfully say that they can not afford either the time or the money required for the trip.

This is Albuquerque's own day at the fair, and it is up to Albuquerque to show her appreciation of the benefits that the fair brings her. Her merchants have been made more prosperous, her advantages as a convention city and a general center of population and progress have been emphasized, money has flowed more freely through the channels of trade in her borders and her people have enjoyed as never before the genuine pleasure of playing host to the entire state. All this Albuquerque owes to the fair, and it is fitting that she should in some substantial way show her recognition of these blessings.

It is always the case that the attendance on Albuquerque day makes the difference between financial success and failure in any state fair. On the other five days of the week the management does well to break even. It is on Albuquerque day that the ledger must be made to show a balance on the right side if there is to be such a balance.

Last year, under Robert E. Putney, a new standard was set for the fair, but in setting it a deficit of several thousand dollars was incurred. Through the munificence of Mr. Putney this deficit was made good and the account was squared. To President Southard fell the task of giving a state fair fully up to the standard set by Mr. Putney and making it pay for itself. The task was one which could have appalled the ordinary man, but by the exercise of a wise economy and a patient determination Mr. Southard has accomplished it. He has provided his fellow townsmen with every citizen of Albuquerque, and this gratitude can best be shown by the attendance of a crowd at the fair grounds today that will tax the capacity of the stands and tents.

Albuquerque has never been known to fail in the crisis of any great public movement. Let her not fail today.

WILCOX AND CHILD LABOR.

In attempting to liberate President Wilson's efforts in behalf of national legislation to prevent child slavery in the mills Chairman Wilcox seems to have put his foot into it—indeed, putting his foot into it has gotten to be rather a habit of the gentleman national chairman of late.

Immediately after the enactment of the child labor law in the closing days of the last congressional session the charge was made that Mr. Wilcox had "dressed politics" with a question in which only simple humanity was involved. But this charge didn't lack much effect. Advocates of a child labor law were content with the fact that such a law had been passed after many years of patient and resolute action, and were not disposed to question Mr. Wilcox's motives in insisting that Congress act in regard to it as to quibble about the fact that he would probably derive political benefit from it.

Failing to get a rise on this charge, Mr. Wilcox belittled himself, of another, and forthwith announced that the child labor law wasn't a child labor law at all, and that the measure enacted by Congress upon the demand of the president contained a "hook" that rendered it useless for the purposes for which it was intended—in other words that the law will not prevent child labor at all.

In attacking thus at President Wilson Mr. Wilcox left another target in the hands of men and women who for years have been laboring tirelessly for the enactment of child labor legislation. It was their bid

that passed. The measure had been framed not only by politicians trying to "put one over" on the reform forces of the country, but by devoted and lifelong friends of the child children who had given years of study to the subject and knew exactly what they wanted and what they had gotten. There was an indignant protest from these men and women, who resented the imputation by Mr. Wilcox that they had allowed themselves to be duped, or that they had drawn a bill without knowing what it meant.

And so it seems that Mr. Wilcox, like his candidate, is to be driven to something else for an issue. Every time he takes a step he hoes up a little deeper. An appeal to sectional prejudice has brought down the condemnation of patriotic men on both sides of Mason and Dixon's line who are calling attention to the fact that the civil war has been over for quite a while and that no right-thinking man wants the fast vanishing bitterness aroused by it revived. The charge that the passage of the Adamson law was a "surrender to force" has evoked a bitter protest from the workmen of the railroad industry and is not taken at all kindly by the numerous republicans of the house who voted for the bill and who resent the imputation that they were coerced—to say nothing of the feelings of the general public who are told, in effect, that if Hughes had been president there would have been a strike with all its terrible consequences.

Mr. Hughes has not yet answered the pointed questions asked him as to what he would have done in meeting the grave problems that have confronted the present administration. He has frantically endeavored to concentrate public attention on other issues, but the harder he tries the more sharply he calls attention to his own lack of qualification to meet the emergencies of a great public crisis.

It would be interesting to learn Secretary Lansing's authority for saying that Villa was not present at the Chihuahua raid. Could the information have come from Villa himself?

A BRIGHT IDEA.

The suggestion has been made by the Mexican commissioners on the International board of mediation now in session at New London that neutral zones, twenty miles wide on each side of the border, be established and patrolled jointly by the troops of Mexico and the United States, the inhabitants on both sides to be disarmed.

Of all the brilliant ideas that have originated at New London during the sessions of the commission, this is easily the most sparkling. We can imagine, for instance, that the people of Texas, who still cherish a lively recollection of the Alamo, would take enthusiastically to this suggestion. We can also imagine that citizens of our own state, remembering Columbus, would glow with gladness at the idea of disarming and placing their lives and property at the mercy of a joint patrol, while Arizona, being near the border would grow hysterical with delight at such a prospect.

Of course the proposition is too absurd to warrant serious consideration. It is mentioned only for the purpose of calling attention once more to the open-hearted character of the proceedings at New London and the utter futility of any hope of getting anywhere through the instrumentality of a joint commission to straighten out the tangle in Mexico.

NO "POOK" IN THIS.

(Daily Financial America.) Good roads are sound investments. It is readily demonstrable that they are a source of the development of prosperity that they are indeed a strengthening influence to virtually all the elements which make up and exude economic health. They are basic factors in public welfare.

In the last few years the demand for good roads has risen to the extent and intensity of a national craze. It has not been a demand, initiated or stimulated by a greed for the bettering of political necks. The good roads movement has been fostered apart from partisan considerations. Many factors of motor vehicle have, of course, given ardent support to the good roads propaganda, but this is not demonstrable—no more so than it is for the International Harvester company to promote scientific methods of agriculture. But it is one thing to insist upon funding fault with the part which automobile makers have had in the movement. It can be pointed out that the support from these interests represents but a very small part of the general demand, which is from the public itself. Civic and commercial organizations throughout the country have wholeheartedly placed themselves behind the movement, which is to reach an expression of broadening intelligence and of progress.

The definite steps taken by the federal government for good roads construction are in harmony with the character of the demand for good roads. There is no "pook" in the expenditures authorized by the Knickerbocker-Bankhead good roads law, which was signed on July 11 by President Wilson. Although the substantial sum of \$1,000,000,000 is involved, when restrictions placed upon the spending of this money comprise a guarantee that the funds provided by the tax-

LITTLE TALKS ON THRIFT

Spending of money is a thing, and it is a thing that is of importance to the country. It is the home economies that count up large and in this way we learn the truth of the saying: "Small things are not small if great results come of them."

Thrift, in the home, should have as its highest exponent, the wife and mother. Her aim should be always to conserve and to improve living conditions by the strict practice of home economies. She should not only be the manager of the household, but she should be the business manager of the family. She should keep a family budget and personally do her own marketing. She should learn to cook and serve the foods she buys without waste.

What do the little savings carefully hoarded for these small economies of the housewife amount to? A visit to the Probate Court will give answer more graphically than any written word. It is the little savings, begun in the first years of married life that met the payments on the little homes of the widows, the little savings that reached to dollars and then still larger sums, which were invested, or which paid the life insurance, or which the greatest benefit of all coming from the home where the housewife is thrifty will be the fragrant habits inherited by the children.

It is reliably stated that women spend 90 per cent of all the money spent in the United States. They regulate the expenses of the household of the nation. Until recently how little study has the average housewife given to the home income and expenditure? How little attention did she pay to the values of food, not estimated by the price but the amount of nutriment contained? Do women realize what great administrators

of the country will be properly concerned.

The present law is the first granting federal aid to states in road building. The amount which the government proposes for good roads under this act is just half of the total of \$1,000,000,000 for the states. These states must provide the other half in order to obtain the federal appropriation. In other words, no government funds will be available unless the states spend equal amounts, matching the government contributions dollar for dollar. Federal financial aid will be apportioned among the states according to their respective areas, populations and rural and urban miles.

SHOOTING AFFRAY AT FORT BAYARD BETWEEN NEGROES ENDS FATALLY

(Special Correspondence to Morning Journal.) Silver City, N. M., Sept. 27.—Vernon Williams is in the county jail charged with murder. Leslie Butler is dead and Annie Smith is in the hospital suffering from probable mortal wounds as a result of a shooting affray at Fort Bayard, nine miles from this city. All the parties to the tragedy are negroes.

Jealousy is believed to have prompted Williams to shoot and kill Butler and then turn the gun on the Smith woman, mortally wounding her. Details of the shooting tend to prove this theory, since Williams, after admitting himself a specialist, announced he was going to kill Butler and the woman and before he could be restrained had carried out his threat.

After the shooting, Williams fled into the foothills of the military reservation, but was captured by soldiers from the post and brought to the sheriff's office here and brought to the county jail, where he now is held for arraignment, pending action by the federal authorities. Civil authorities can not handle the case since the crime was committed at the military post which is exclusively under federal jurisdiction.

Pioneer Woman Dead.

Silver City, N. M., Sept. 27.—In the death of the past week at her home near Tyrone of Mrs. L. L. Turner, another pioneer woman of this part of New Mexico passed to her final reward. Mrs. Turner was the wife of a well known ranchman. Besides the husband, six sons survive, as well as 24 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. The deceased was a member of the Baptist church for forty years. At the funeral five of her sons and one grandson served as pallbearers. Mrs. Turner was 71 years old and a native of Arkansas.

Boy Takes Own Life.

Silver City, N. M., Sept. 27.—Because of a love affair, Valentine Giffert, a 15-year-old boy of the Phoebe Allen mining camp, north of this city, shot and killed himself last night. He left letters explaining the cause for his rash act.

LIFE SENTENCE GIVEN FOR CRIME AGAINST CHILD

Gregorio Mendriquez, Who Narrowly Escaped Lynching for Revolting Offense, Given Extreme Penalty.

(Special Correspondence to Morning Journal.) Silver City, N. M., Sept. 27.—Gregorio Mendriquez, convicted of a statutory offense against a 12-year-old child of the Tyrone mining camp last month, must spend the balance of his natural life in the state penitentiary at Santa Fe. Sentence was pronounced on Mendriquez by District Judge Colin Nield yesterday. The crime of which Mendriquez was found guilty was one of the most revolting in the annals of the county. At the time of the attack on the child, Mendriquez was narrowly escaped lynching at the hands of the infuriated people of Tyrone. His prompt removal to the county jail here by officers in all that prevented summary vengeance on the culprit.

At his trial, Mendriquez, residing at his own home, declared he remembered nothing of the occurrence, pleading drunkenness as an excuse. The jury was out but a short time before arriving at a verdict of guilty. When called before the bar for sentence, Mendriquez asked the court to be lenient with him, that he might not be confined long since he was the sole support of a number of near relatives. His plea fell on deaf ears as the sentence shows.

Criminal Docket Concluded.

The criminal docket of the present term of the district court was concluded this week. There were 14 jury trials, resulting in six convictions and five acquittals. During the time between the opening of court and the opening of the fall term, September 4, there were 24 pleas of guilty by prisoners charged with felonies, a number of whom were sentenced to the penitentiary. By their pleas they saved the county the expense of having a trial.

The district court is now engaged in hearing cases on the civil docket, chief among which are a number of suits growing out of the failure of the People's Savings Bank and Trust company of this city. District Judge Nield, in addition

to passing sentence on Mendriquez, noted on prison terms to the following prisoners convicted at the present court term:

Santos Gonzales, assault with a deadly weapon, plea of guilty, six months in the county jail.

James Ruiz, assault with a deadly weapon, plea of guilty, one to two years in the penitentiary.

Manuel Valdez, larceny of an automobile, plea of guilty, one to two years in the penitentiary.

Brother Moreno, assault with a deadly weapon, found guilty by a jury, 18 months to three years in the penitentiary.

Daniel J. Wolfe, larceny from a dwelling, found guilty by a jury, 18 months to three years in the penitentiary.

James H. Miller, killing a calf, plea of guilty, two to three years in the penitentiary.

Ray Turner, larceny from the person, plea of guilty, one year to 15 months in the penitentiary.

John V. Martin, larceny, found guilty by a jury, 10 to 12 months in the penitentiary.
