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THIRTEEN ARE DEAD

Frightful Mortality as Result of Fire in the Kearsarge Mine in Montana.

MANY MORE ENTOMBED

From Fifty to Seventy-Five Men Still in Mine May Perish From Flame or Smoke.

Butte, Mont., Nov. 6.—A dispatch to the Inter-Mountain from Virginia City, Mont., says:

Seven are dead, a number more burned, and perhaps scores lost in the underground workings in the fire which started at the Kearsarge mine, situated at Summit, eight miles from here, this morning.

The known dead are: Supt. R. B. Turner, a miner named Tobin and five others, too badly burned to be identified.

From fifty to seventy-five men are still down in the mine and may perish from the flame or smoke. There is no way to estimate the loss of property. The fire is still raging. Turner gave his life for his men. When the alarm came, he, with a miner dashed into the main tunnel which was ablaze and groped his way down and dragged out five bodies, including Tobins. In their second attempt they did not come and later were brought forth dead by the rescuers. The name of the miner who perished with Turner is not known. Turner was acknowledged as the leading authority on cyaniding in America. His father was formerly state auditor of Colorado. He leaves a widow and one child.

Later news says that Turner and six others have been dragged out dead. There were many more men in the mine.

Turner was an expert on cyaniding and came to Montana from Colorado a year ago.

COULD NOT KEEP QUIET.

Foss Morgan Charged With Violating the Internal Revenue Laws—Arrested in the Sacramento.

Foss Morgan, who for some time has been working in the lumber camps of the Sacramento mountains, was arrested by Deputy United States Marshal Fred Forno of Albuquerque and is now on his way to Dallas, Texas, where he is wanted on the charge of violating the internal revenue laws. It is rumored that he was also in some serious trouble at Eastland, Texas.

The prisoner owes his arrest to his fondness for talking. News reached the authorities that Morgan had made the statement that he had been run out of Texas by bloodhounds. On investigation it was found that he was wanted in Dallas, and his arrest followed.

TO FOLLOW OLD GRADE.

Course to Be Pursued By the New Mexico and Southwestern Railway.

A. B. Renehan, Esq., who has just returned from Rio Arriba County states that the grade of the line of the New Mexico and Southwestern Railway, from the timber country around El Bado, has been completed within five miles of Lumberton, its northern terminus. The engineer corps in charge has been directed to extend its operations southward toward Chamita, following the so-called old grade, which was built many years ago. This will bring the line down by Gallina, Coyote, Abiquiu and the Chama River settlements southward.

It is rumored that this is a plan to avoid the high hill at Embudo, and to give an almost direct line from Durango, but without any purpose to abandon the present line from Antonito to Chamita, which serves to supply the Taos County points.

SITE FOR BIG RIO GRANDE DAM

Three Thousand Acres Withdrawn from Entry for Reservoir at Elephant Butte.

A special from Washington says: The acting commissioner of the land office today instructed the register and receiver at Las Cruces, N. M., to withdraw all forms of disposal whatever of 3,500 acres for the Elephant Butte reservoir project.

The land withdrawn is thus described: Southeast of southeast quarter section 20, lots 1, 2, 3 and 4, section 21, all sections 28 to 32 inclusive in township 8 south, 2 west; southeast of northwest quarter section 23 in township 9, 3 west; southwest of southeast quarter section 17 and lot 1 of section 22 in township 10 south, 3 west; west half of southeast quarter section 33 in township 11 south, 3 west.

CAPTIVE IN MOUNTAINS.

Father Receives Letter From Edward L. Wents, the Young Millionaire Who Disappeared.

Bristol, Tenn., Nov. 6.—Edward L. Wents, a young Philadelphia millionaire who disappeared from his father's house at Big Stone Gap, Va., October 14, is alive and a captive in the Cumberland mountains. A letter addressed to his father in his own hand writing was handed to his parent by a stranger. The letter says the writer is well and asks that the ransom of a hundred thousand dollars demanded by his captors be at once paid so that he can get his freedom. Negotiations of release are being made.

COAL MINE SITUATION

Conference in Progress in Denver Looking to Settlement of Trouble With Miners.

STRIKE TO BE DECLARED

Nothing to Prevent Miners Obeying Order of President Mitchell of United Mine Workers.

Denver, Colo., Nov. 6.—A conference is in progress in Denver looking to the settlement of that trouble with coal miners in the northern coal fields and with the prospects of a successful termination.

The situation in the southern fields is growing more intense however, and there is now apparently nothing to prevent miners from going out on a strike on Monday in accordance with the order of President Mitchell of the United Mine Workers.

A Times special from Florence quotes President Howells, of District 1, as saying he has abandoned all hopes of a conference with the companies and the fight will be in full blast on Monday. Southern Colorado, which employs in the neighborhood of thirteen thousand men, will be the battleground, and Howells is confident of winning.

The interests of the miners in southern Wyoming, Utah and New Mexico will be looked after, he declares. Efforts will be made to induce non-union men to go out. He said that President Mitchell will be on the ground to look after these risks.

TO SEND TROOPS

Denver, Colo., Nov. 6.—(Bulletin)—Gov. Peabody has decided to send troops to Telluride, where the miners strike is in progress. Orders were issued this afternoon to companies A and K, First Regiment, to proceed from Cripple Creek to Telluride.

MASSACRE AT WARBAD IS FULLY CONFIRMED.

Capetown, Nov. 6.—Official advices fully confirm the massacre at Warbad of Damaraland Germans in southwest Africa by Bondelzwari tribesmen. The Germans gallantly fought to the end, but were overwhelmed. It is believed that none escaped. Warbad was burned. The rebellion is officially attributed to the distress caused by the drought.

SAM PARKS SENTENCED TO SING SING PRISON.

New York, Nov. 6.—Sam Parks was today sentenced to two years and three months in the Sing Sing prison. The sentence was passed on the charge of extorting five hundred dollars from the Tiffany studios.

EXTENSIVE BUILDING IS NOW GOING ON

New Union Depot and Business Block of Judge N. B. Laughlin, on Don Gaspar Avenue, the Most Important.

DEPARTMENT STORES TO BE ERECTED IN NEAR FUTURE

Extensive building is going on in the Capital City at the present time.

The new union depot, in process of construction for the Santa Fe Central and the Denver and Rio Grande systems, is under roof. By the end of the month the building will be completed and ready for occupancy. The building is of pressed brick, and is a credit to Santa Fe and its representative citizens.

New Business Block.

Perhaps of even greater importance than the new union depot, so far as the appearance of the business center of the city is concerned, is the new business block being erected on Don Gaspar avenue, adjoining the Hotel Normandie, by the owner, Judge N. B. Laughlin. The block which is of pressed brick, will consist of one store-room 24 x 80 feet, and two store-rooms 24 x 24 feet, three store-rooms in all. In addition a two-story extension is being built to the Hotel Normandie, 10 x 20 feet, which will be used as an office and an additional bed room.

To Erect Department Store.

It is the intention of Judge Laughlin, upon the completion of the business block now in process of construction, to erect at the corner of Don Gaspar avenue and San Francisco street, with facades of pressed brick on both thoroughfares, a two-story department store, 86 x 90 feet. The contemplated improvements, when completed, will materially enhance the appearance of both San Francisco street and Don Gaspar avenue as business thoroughfares.

Still Another Business Block.

N. Salmon, of the firm of Salmon & Abovseman, yesterday made arrangements with I. H. Rapp, of the firm of Rapp & Rapp, architects of Las Vegas, for plans for a two-story building, 38 x 115 feet, to be erected on San Francisco street on the property owned by Mr. Salmon, adjoining the Bon Ton restaurant. Work on this building will be commenced the first of the coming year. The building will be of brick, with iron front, and plate glass show windows. The show windows will be lighted with 300 electric lights.

BENNETT WILL CASE.

Formal Decree To Be Announced in New Haven, When William Jennings Bryan is Present.

New Haven, Conn., Nov. 6.—A decision in the P. S. Bennett will case, in which Wm. J. Bryan appears both as executor under the will and beneficiary, was made by Judge Cleveland in the probate court today. The formal decree will be announced tomorrow when Bryan is present. The court finds that the sealed letter, about which there has been contest, providing a gift of fifty thousand dollars to the Bryan family, was not incorporated in the will. It also finds that the will property was executed, that the testator had sufficient testamentary capacity and that there was no undue influence by Bryan over Bennett. It expressed no opinion as to whether the sealed letter can be incorporated in the will. Bryan's counsel say that he will undoubtedly appeal.

PORTE PLEADS SUPERFLUITY OF REFORM SCHEME.

Constantinople, Nov. 6.—In consequence of the Porte's reply pleading the superfluity of the new reform scheme for Macedonia on the ground that Turkey is carrying out proposals previously agreed to, it is believed that Austria and Russia will send an ultimatum giving the Turkish government a fixed term within which to accept the proposals and in the event of another refusal the two powers will take steps to compel Turkish action.

The storeroom will be occupied by Salmon & Abovseman, the ground floor space to be devoted to a general dry goods business, and the second floor to millinery, gents furnishing goods, carpets and linoleum.

Four New Dwellings.

Four new dwellings, which are five-room terraces, with bath, electric lights and all modern improvements, erected by Dr. J. H. Sloan on the Cerrillos road, are receiving the finishing touches from the carpenters and painters, and are ready for occupancy. The terraces are of adobe lined with brick fronts, and will make good homes for small families.

Three New Residences.

Benjamin M. Read, Esq., has three residences under construction, which will be completed and ready for occupancy between December 1 and January 1. All of these residences are of brick. One is a four-room dwelling on Manhattan avenue, another a five-room house on Metropolitan avenue, and the other a six-room residence on Garfield avenue. Each and all will make desirable residences and greatly improve the property and appearance of the thoroughfares on which they are being erected.

A. B. Renehan's Residence.

A. B. Renehan has a fine six-room residence under roof, on the site of the old brewery on upper Palace avenue. It is expected that the building will be completed and ready for occupancy by December 1.

New House on Lower San Francisco Street.

John Patterson, the dairyman, is erecting a brick dwelling on his property on lower San Francisco street, which is fast nearing completion. Another improvement noticeable on the Cerrillos road is the improvement under way on the adobe residence of Richard Guterman.

Two Warehouses Being Built.

Two warehouses are also under construction. One is 90x24 feet, and is being erected by Mrs. J. Lowitzki, in the rear of her property on San Francisco street. The other is an extension, 90 x 20 feet to the warehouses of Leo Hersch on lower San Francisco street. A number of other minor improvements in the building line are also being made in several parts of the city.

NEED CHINKS IN MEXICO

No Restriction Placed On the Number That Can Be Brought Into Manzanillo.

San Francisco, Calif., Nov. 6.—An agent of the commercial steamship line, just returned from Mexico says that President Diaz in his new arrangement with this company places no limit on the number of Chinese which they may bring into the port of Manzanillo each month. He also says that Mexico needs thousands of Chinese to work her mines and plantations.

TWENTY WERE KILLED.

Latest Reports of the Result of Battle Between Uruguayan Police and Brazilians.

Montevideo, Nov. 6.—The latest reports received here are to the effect that about twenty persons were killed in a battle at Riviera between the Uruguayan police and Brazilians. The government has suspended Ataliva Gomez, mayor of Santa Ana, whose demand for the surrender of his brother by the authorities of Riviera caused the disturbance.

STREET RAILWAY EMPLOYEES INDORSE A STRIKE.

Chicago, Nov. 6.—By a vote of 264 to 153, the employees of the Chicago City Railway Company have endorsed a strike if necessary, to enforce the demands of their union.

SENATOR QUAY HAS NEW STATEHOOD PLAN

Statesman From Pennsylvania Would Consolidate New Mexico and Arizona.

A special from Washington says: United States Senator Matthew Stanley Quay, of Pennsylvania, is convinced that the country is not ready for the admission of four territories with eight votes in the United States senate, and is preparing a compromise. It will provide for the admission of Arizona and New Mexico as one state and Oklahoma and Indian Territory as another.

The first combination would be Republican and the second doubtful. If the Indian Territory and Oklahoma are admitted as one state, he desires, it is said, that it shall be stipulated and agreed that one of the United States senators shall be a full blooded Indian and that one the Indian chief Quannah Parker. Senator Quay has gone to the Indian Territory to promote the plan.

PAVING ORDINANCE TO BE ENFORCED

Uniform Grade Must Be Maintained on San Francisco Street—Plenty of Brick and Blocks.

It having been announced that the penitentiary authorities have quite a large amount of paving brick and paving blocks on hand the mayor has again taken up the matter of the enforcement of the city ordinance in regard to the construction of brick side walks on certain streets and will see to its speedy enforcement. The excuse that no paving bricks and paving blocks would be had, now being no longer available, property owners will do well to heed this hint.

The ordinance will be fully enforced, especially on San Francisco street, as that is the principal thoroughfare of the town and as the city authorities are anxious that the streets should be of a uniform grade. There are several objectionable and indeed dangerous offsets on the San Francisco street grade and the city authorities will insist that these be taken up and that the grade established by the city be carefully observed.

ESCAPED FROM PEN.

Convict No. 1662, Arthur Drake, Takes French Leave, Wearing Yard-master's Clothing.

An escape from the New Mexico penitentiary was recorded at that institution at 4:30 o'clock last evening, when the guards, in making the rounds in the cell house, found the cell of Convict No. 1662 vacant.

An investigation showed that the convict in question, Arthur Drake, serving a one year sentence from Bernalillo County for larceny from a store, had first appropriated the best suit of clothes owned by R. C. Garrett, the yardmaster, and then taken French leave. It is not known definitely at what hour he made good his escape, but he was last seen shortly after two o'clock.

Drake was received at the penitentiary last April, and has always been a model prisoner. Being a short term man, he was assigned to duty as stable boy to Mr. Garrett, the yardmaster. He has heretofore always been faithful in the performance of his duties, and was accorded all the privileges of a "trusty."

The following description of the escaped convict was furnished the New Mexican by Assistant Superintendent William E. Martin, who said the customary reward of \$25 for the capture of the fugitive has been offered. The description is as follows:

Convict No. 1662, Arthur Drake—Age 23, weight 162 pounds, height five feet, seven inches, eyes dark, hair dark and teeth good. Scar on left hand, vaccination mark on left arm. Scar on right leg above knee. Wore a blue serge coat and black slouch hat. Was sentenced in April last from Bernalillo County for one year for larceny from a store.

ASKS FOR WARSHIP.

Minister Powell Cables Request From San Domingo City—Cruiser Baltimore Now Due.

Washington, Nov. 6.—A cablegram has just been received at the state department from U. S. Minister Powell, dated San Domingo City, stating that the insurgents were marching on that city and asking that a warship be at once sent there. The cruiser Baltimore is now due, having sailed from Hampton Roads several days ago.

RECOGNITION OF PANAMA

Believed That the State Department's Action Will Cause Intense Feeling in Colombia.

COGHLAN TO COMMAND

Will Have Supreme Charge of American Naval Force on Atlantic Side of Isthmus.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 6.—(Bulletin.) The United States government has recognized the de facto government of Panama. It was announced at the state department after the return of Secretary Hay from the cabinet that instructions were sent U. S. Minister Beaupre at Bogota (assuming he has not left the capital yet) and U. S. Vice Consul Ehrman at Panama, now acting consul there, to inform the governments of Colombia and Panama respectively, that the de facto government is recognized.

Ordered to Panama.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 6.—Consul General Gudgeon has arrived in Washington from Asheville, N. C., and today received instructions preliminary to his departure on Sunday for Panama. Rear Admiral Coghlan received orders to convey Gudgeon to the isthmus on the Mayflower at full speed.

On his arrival at Colon, Coghlan will assume supreme command of the American naval force on the Atlantic side of the isthmus.

Glass on his arrival at Panama will relieve the captain of the Boston of command there.

Official Statement To Be Issued.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 6.—Assistant Secretary of State Loomis has announced that an official statement of the Panama situation will undoubtedly be issued from the White House immediately after the cabinet meeting today. Loomis had an early conference with the President on the situation and on leaving, asked if this statement would mean the recognition of the new government and replied that it undoubtedly did. He suggested that our government would probably recognize de facto government. He also said that it was probable that a permanent government would be established soon.

Dixie Arrives at Colon.

Washington, Nov. 6.—The navy department received a cablegram from Commander Delano of the Dixie, announcing its arrival at Colon. He states that he landed an adequate force of marines from the Dixie and the blue jackets from the Nashville have re-embarked. He says the Colombian troops have evacuated and the situation is quiet. The department also received a cablegram from Rear Admiral Glass commanding the Pacific squadron, announcing the departure of the Marblehead, of the Concord the Wyoming and the Collier Nero, yesterday at Acapulco, Mexico, for Panama. The squadron is under full speed.

Instruction From State Department.

Washington, Nov. 6.—The following telegram was sent by the state department today to Acting Consul General Ehrman at Panama:

"The people of Panama have by an apparently unanimous movement, dissolved their political relations with the republic of Colombia and assumed their independence. When you are satisfied that the de facto government, republican in form, and without substantial opposition from its own people, has been established in the state of Panama, you will enter into relations with it as the responsible government of the territory, and look to it for all due action to protect the persons and property of the citizens of the United States and to keep open isthmian transit, in accordance with the obligations of existing treaties governing the relations of the United States to that territory."

Immediately afterward an instruction was sent by telegram to U. S. Minister Beaupre at Bogota in the following terms:

"The people of Panama, having by an apparently unanimous movement dissolved the political connection with the republic of Colombia and assumed independence, republican in form, with which the government of the United States has entered into relations the President of the United States in accordance with the ties of friendship that so long and so happily have existed between the respective nations, most earnestly commends to the governments of Colombia and Panama a peaceful and equitable settlement of all questions at issue between them. He holds that he is bound not merely by treaty obligations but by the interests of civilization, to see that the peaceful traffic of the world across the

REPEAL OF EXISTING LAND LAWS

During the past few months there have appeared from time to time reports of "gigantic land frauds," alleged to have been committed in various parts of the country and through which, it was charged, the government had been swindled out of much money and that many, many and many thousands of acres of valuable public lands have been gobbled up by speculators to the detriment of the homeseeker and homesteader. That more or less of this business has been going on ever since the public land system of the United States was inaugurated, admits of no doubt but it is also becoming very plain that the recent reports upon this subject are grossly exaggerated and that the recently reported frauds susceptible of proof are not of very great extent.

The New Mexican believes that the repeal of the so-called "Timber and Stone Act" would be a good thing, but otherwise, it is of the opinion that the present land laws with some very slight amendments are good enough and should be allowed to stand as they are. In the main, this paper agrees with the Denver Republican which in a recent editorial says that two interesting facts have been brought to light in regard to land frauds. One is that the frauds committed in the twelve months covered by the last report of the commissioner of the general land office were notably less in number than those in the years immediately preceding. The other fact referred to is that the disclosures of the interior department show that the reports of enormous land frauds committed in the northwest were greatly exaggerated.

These matters are important because they bear on the question of repealing the land laws. Advocates of repeal are prompt to represent that the government is grossly defrauded, and that the most effectual way to prevent this is to repeal practically all the laws under which public land may be acquired by private individuals. To this it might be added that repeal of the land laws would also be an effectual way to enlarge the market for railroad lands, the sale of which is at present more or less interfered with by the facilities afforded for acquiring public land.

The experience of the last year shows that what is needed is not repeal of the land laws, but their vigilant and honest enforcement. If the federal officials who have to do with transfers of public land to private ownership attend carefully to their duties and require a strict compliance with the law, there will be little imposition on the government.

The land laws are all right, and they afford none too great facility for the acquisition of homes on the public domain. The public lands are for the people, and homeseekers should not be forced to buy railroad land through the refusal of the government to let them acquire land belonging to the public.

There is much vitality in members of the United States Senate. Senator Platt of New York, who was recently married is seventy years of age, and Senator Stewart of Missouri, who has also just taken a matrimonial partner is only 76 years of age. Senator Pettus of Alabama, may now be expected to do as his colleagues above mentioned did, and that soon. After all a man 84 years of age has not much time to lose in such matters.

It is a good thing for Colorado that the corrupt gang in Denver which caused the ballot boxes of the city to be stuffed on Tuesday last, could not overcome the votes cast by the honest and public spirited citizens of the state on that day. The Republican candidate for chief justice was elected by a very satisfactory majority.

The forthcoming report of Fourth Assistant Postmaster General Bristow is to contain about 2,500,000 words. He must have lots to tell. But the question is, who has the time and inclination to read the report?

THE PRINCIPLE UPON WHICH THE U. S. SENATE RESTS.

In the November number of Scribner's Magazine, Senator Lodge of Massachusetts has a very interesting and timely article on the United States Senate. Therein he endeavors to prove the principle that the Senate is the guardian of the rights of the states and the agent for the exercise of the sovereignty surrendered by the states to the union at the foundation of the government. It is not, of course, a wholly novel idea but it is presented in a peculiarly clear and fresh manner and some of the deductions from it were never before stated so impressively. Senator Lodge shows that not only has each state an equal vote in the Senate, but the basis of representation in that body cannot be changed except by the consent of every state. Again the terms of the Senators are so arranged—six years for each and a change of one-third every two years only—that each new House of Representatives meets a Senate the majority of whose members have been in service during at least one Congress and will remain during another. In the same way each President meets a Senate two-thirds of whom will remain in office at least as long as he or two years longer, and in the middle of his term he meets a Senate two-thirds of whom will remain two or four years longer than his own term. And this body is continuous; it is always organized and ready for action; it can assemble and proceed to business at any time, in full possession of all its powers.

These powers are very extensive and peculiar. It has all those of the House except that of originating money bills, and these it can amend at discretion. It shares the executive power with the President, since its advice and consent are necessary to all principal appointments. It shares the judicial power with the courts, since it must try all impeachments presented by the House. It shares the treaty-making power in a striking degree since one-third of its members present and voting can veto any treaty negotiated by the President. And Senator Lodge points out that this rich endowment of the Senate came about from the desire of the several states to strengthen as much as possible "the body that was to continue to represent them in a system where they necessarily parted with so much."

VIOLENCE SHOULD NOT BE USED IN STRIKES.

John Mitchell, the labor leader has written a book entitled "Organized Labor." It is an interesting volume and ought to be read by moneyed men and wage workers alike. Mr. Mitchell puts himself on record against the use of violence and personal strife in strikes, saying:

"It is sometimes claimed, that no strike can be won without the use of physical force. I do not believe that this is true, but if it is, it is better that the strike be lost than that it succeed through violence and the commission of outrages. The cause of unionism is not lost through any strike or through any number of strikes, and if it were true that all strikes would fail if physical force could not be resorted to, it would be better to demonstrate that fact and to seek remedy in other directions than to permit strikes to degenerate into conflicts between armed men. If it be shown that strikes cannot be won without violence, then it will be necessary to secure reforms for workmen exclusively through political action."

According to the above Mr. Mitchell, to all intents and purposes, believes in the right of every man to make an honest living and to work for whom, for what wages and during such hours as he sees fit and deems proper. This, of course, is the doctrine upheld by the law of the land and naturally the only view that can be taken of the matter as far as the best interests of the commonwealth and of the people themselves are concerned.

The question arises, however, right here: If Mr. Mitchell and other labor leaders throughout the country are opposed to violence and believe in the fundamental right of every man to engage in any lawful occupation in any manner he sees fit for the purpose of making a livelihood, why is there so much violence in strikes, why are non-strikers beaten and maltreated and sometimes killed and why is there much property destroyed in many instances in such cases? This is a question which is asked by many people who are very friendly to the wage earners and who believe that labor unions properly administered are a good thing for all concerned. If these questions can be answered by Mr. Mitchell, he will do the people a great service by doing so.

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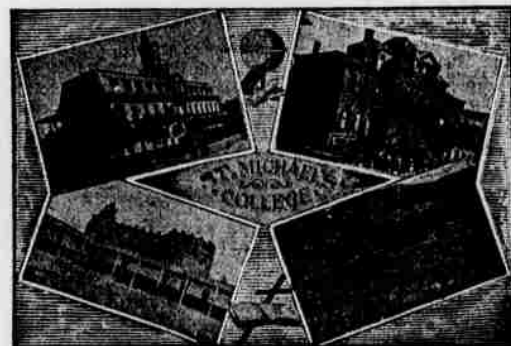

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MINES AND MILLS.

Robert T. Hill of Washington, connected for many years with the United States Geological Survey, will be in Las Vegas this week to look over the mineral indications on the Las Vegas grant. This is done in the interests of the Washington syndicate that has leased the mineral oil and gas rights on the grant for a number of years. He will study the geological formations carefully, especially with a view of locating all natural gas lands. A report made recently by an expert of the Standard Oil Company was quite favorable and if Mr. Hill's report sustains the report of the expert, the syndicate will at once send boring machinery and drills to sink several experimental wells.

The Matt mill at Las Vegas started up on Monday morning of this week, all the new machinery being in place and a large amount of ore on hand. W. D. Temple, a skillful mining expert is general manager. The mill will run day and night eight men being employed on each shift. Most of the ore comes from the Tecolote district although several loads have been received from Rociada. The Azure mine at Rociada intends to make regular shipments to the mill.

There is considerable difference between the report of the director of the mint and of the United States Geological Survey, as to the gold and silver production of New Mexico. Both, however, are too low in their figures as many dollars worth of the precious metals are produced by individual placer miners who make no reports, or considerable New Mexico ore treated at outside smelters, is not credited to the Territory. According to the director of the mint, New Mexico in 1902 produced \$531,131 of gold ore and \$591,137 of silver ore. According to the United States Geological Survey, New Mexico, during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1903, produced only \$385,000 worth of gold, \$131,000 of that amount coming from placers; \$149,000 worth of silver; \$865,000 worth of copper; and \$95,000 worth of lead while the iron produced amounted to 135,000 long tons.

Mexico gives employment to 95,000 laborers in its mines. The greater portion of gold produced in the world is from the native metal direct, by amalgamation. That obtained by smelting, chlorination, cyaniding, etc., is generally a by-product of some previous operation.

A rock sample sent the Mining and Scientific Press from Bell Ranch, San Miguel County, is pronounced by that paper's mining expert to be silica and carbonate of lime. The light yellow, silty like mineral, is iron ochre, no uranium, and the heavy, metallic mineral is iron sulphide. Unless these contain gold or silver they are commercially valueless.

The owner of a mine cannot prevent the natural drainage of water from a neighboring mine into his properties. Each mine owner has the right to mine his property as he pleases and as long as he does not cause his drainage to enter the property of his neighbor by artificial means he may continue to work as he sees fit.

The locator of a placer claim who may know of the existence of a vein or lode within the placer location may also locate the lode. No person other than the owner of a placer claim may enter the same for the purpose of prospecting for a vein. The fact that a lode or vein exists in a placer claim not being known to the locator of a placer claim, when such fact was known to others who had properly made a location of said lode, does not secure the owner of the placer against the claimant of the vein.

Analytical assays or analyses of country rock for gold with a view of determining their relation to the genesis of the ore deposit probably gives no definite knowledge on the subject, for the reason that the mineral solutions, which coming from great depth, deposited their values in the vein or ore deposit, may also have deposited a small portion of their values in the wall rock as well. Many wall rocks contain gold, silver and other metals, similar to those found in the neighboring vein, but this fact is not conclusive evidence that the values in the vein were derived from the wall rocks by what is known as "lateral secretion."

Sinking or tunneling through rock strata of unequal hardness is often attended with difficulty, particularly when the hardness of the several strata vary greatly. Should the drill be driven through a hard layer and suddenly penetrate a soft one, it is generally advisable to abandon the hole and drill another in the hard stratum about three-fourths of the way through it. Blasting will throw out a hard stratum, when the soft one may be removed by picking. Better headway can usually be made by drilling short holes than long ones when this condition obtains. Rock strata of this kind are not of infrequent occurrence in sedimentary formations.

The ore in sight in a mine can only be determined approximately at best. Long experience has proved that appearances in mine development are often deceptive and unreliable. No mining engineer is safe in assuming, a larger tonnage in sight than he can estimate in ore bodies cut on four sides within relatively short distance; although some are willing to base their judgment on cuttings exposing three sides of the block of ore. These suggestions contemplate the measurement of a body ore in a vein of moderate width; 20 feet or less. When the vein exceeds this width even greater caution is necessary. It is a

curious fact that ore bodies upon being extracted rarely produce a tonnage in excess of estimates previously made.

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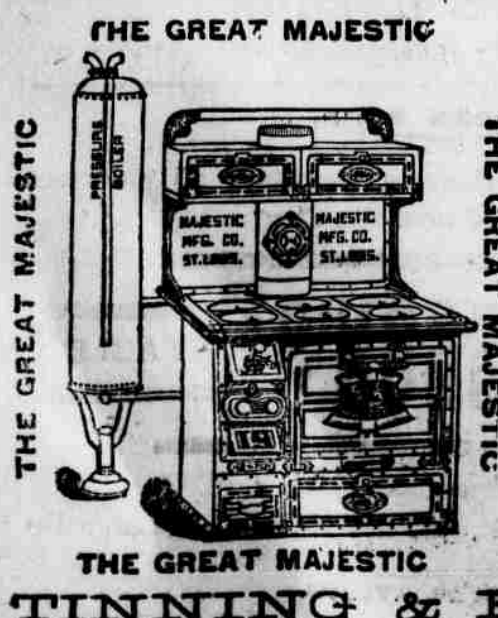

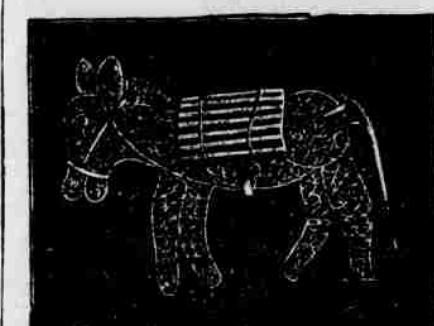

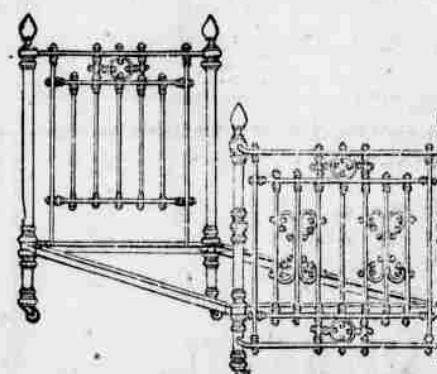

SIERRA COUNTY.

The school census of Sierra County just completed shows 1,274 persons of school age in the county, the males exceeding the females by 92. Monticello has the most of school age, 217, then comes Hillsboro with 202, Las Palomas 114, Arroyo Bonito 112, Cuchillo 109, Lake Valley 71, Kingston 70, Berenda 63, Engle 59, Fairview 57, San Albino 55, San Jose 52, Faulkner 43, Chloride 36 and Hermosa 14.

QUAY COUNTY.

Mrs. S. C. Pandolfo died at Tucuman on last Thursday of consumption. She was a native of Jamesport, Missouri, and was aged 20 years. She was married to Mr. Pandolfo two years ago. Since work on the Choctaw extension has been suspended, there have been but few newcomers to Tucuman, but Quay County people believe that when this extension is completed there will be a great influx of immigrants, for by that time all the public land in western Oklahoma will be taken up and the large number of immigrants now going into Beaver County in that territory will come to Quay and adjoining counties.

LINCOLN COUNTY.

Miss Alice McMains has been elected to teach the public school at White Oaks.

Two carloads of machinery for a new electric light plant at Fort Stanton have arrived at Captain.

Ross Coe this week shipped a carload of horses from Glencoe to Artesia, Eddy County. He went with the horses.

J. P. Perry is drilling for water near the head of Sanchez canon. He has attained a depth of 100 feet and hopes to strike water at a depth of 150 feet.

Pfingsten Brothers of Nogal, last week moved the large Meirs Hotel at Captain from Fourth Street to Lincoln Avenue near the depot. The feat was accomplished without disturbing as much as a nail in the building.

At Captain, several citizens who refused to pay their road tax were arrested and suit brought against them in the justice of the peace court. However, the defendants were acquitted and the costs were put upon the county.

The fruit crop in the vicinity of Captain was a total failure this year. Tularosa and Three Rivers are supplying Lincoln County with good fruit, however. The apple and peach crops at Tularosa having been especially fine and large this year.

T. Okey, a Japanese employe at Gibson, died last week of typhoid fever.

Today a big dance was held at the foot of Tuncha mountain by the Navahos. The dance is the Yelichai dance. The infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Tecklenburg died at Clarksburg on Sunday, of inflammation of the bowels.

John Smith, a negro, has been held at Gallup under \$500 bond for the grand jury, on the charge of attempted robbery and for resisting an officer of the law.

Jacob Tratnick, an old resident, died last week at Gallup of typhoid fever. He was a native of Austria, having been born 40 years ago. He was a Knight of Pythias and a Son of Herman.

Mrs. Eva Douglas died last week at Gallup after an illness of several weeks. A husband and five minor daughters survive her. Mrs. Chabbers and family came to Gallup only a few weeks ago from Chambers, Arizona.

A railroad velocipede run by William McVicker and H. L. Fenton was run into at Clarksburg by a freight train. The velocipede and the men were thrown from the track and both men were badly bruised and cut up but, marvelous to say, escaped fatal injuries.

A lodge of Foresters of America has been instituted at Gallup. Forty members were initiated. The following officers were installed: Chief Ranger, W. V. P. Nocca; supreme chief ranger, Peter Balocco; past chief ranger, August Visintainer; financial secretary, John Swartz; recording secretary, Paul Borra; treasurer, Charles Vidal; rector, Dominic Varnetti.

LUNA COUNTY.

The Bulletin, published at Solomonsville, Arizona, says:

Several residents of Deming on last Thursday, at 3 o'clock in the morning, observed a fine display of the aurora borealis.

Mrs. S. B. Rose of Deming, was tendered a surprise party on last Friday evening in honor of her 73d birthday anniversary.

J. E. Foster has sold a half interest in his herd of cattle in the northern part of Luna county to his son Al. Foster. J. E. Foster will make his residence at Deming this winter.

Coxe Brothers have sold their Sunny Side ranch near Deming to M. Huntington, and have bought the new place of Samuel Gregg near Hermanos, to which they will move their fine herd of cattle.

"We learn from another source that there is little doubt about the Rock Island being behind this road, in which case the line will doubtless build direct to Deming and connect with the Alamogordo-Deming cut-off, thus giving that company a direct line east and west, and Deming another trunk line."

"The surveying party who are running the line of the proposed new railroad through the Gila valley, and who

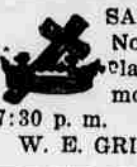

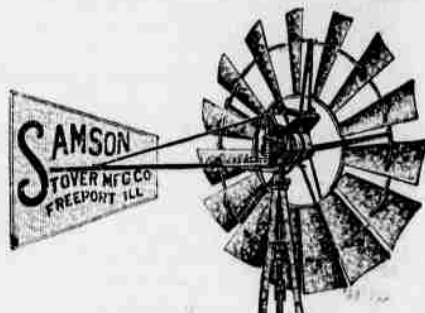

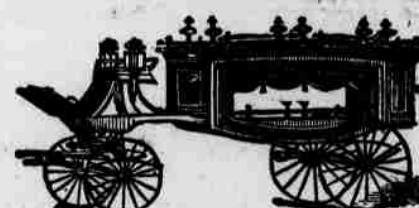
