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WAR IN SOUTH AFRICA

Unconfirmed Report of British
Victory at Ladysmith.

Kimberley Besieged by Six Thousand
Boer Troops.

Boers Capture Town of Pomeroy and Occu-
py Parts of Zululand.

LIST OF CASUALTIES AT DUNDRE.

London, Nov. 2.—Nothing is known
here of the report circulated in New
York of a great British victory at Lad-
ysmith.

BOERS OCCUPY ZULULAND.

Pietmaritzburg, Natal, Nov. 2.—It is
reported that Boers are occupying parts
of Zululand and have taken Pomeroy,
fifty miles from Greytown.

CASUALTIES AT DUNDRE.

London, Nov. 2.—Another list of casu-
alties at Dundre issued by the war of-
fice today. It gives eighty-two non-com-
missioned officers and men of the Dublin
Fusiliers missing, indicating that the
Boers have captured as many Fusiliers
as Howards.

REPORT OF VICTORY DENIED.

London, Nov. 2.—The war office offi-
cially declares that it has no informa-
tion of any further engagement at Lad-
ysmith or British victory as reported in
New York.

LIEUTENANT WOUNDED.

London, Nov. 2.—The war office this
afternoon issued the following dispatch:
"Ladysmith, Nov. 2.—Lieutenant
Kegerton, H. M. S. Powerful, was danger-
ously wounded this morning by a shell
in the left knee and right foot. His life
is not in danger at present."

BRITISH KILLED AND WOUNDED.

London, Nov. 2.—A special from Lad-
ysmith says that twenty British dead,
and 100 wounded had been counted on the
evening of Monday's disaster, while 850
prisoners were sent to Pretoria.

KIMBERLEY RESIGNED.

Hope Town, Cape Colony, Nov. 2.—
Magistrate Harmsworth has arrived from
Kimberley and reports 6,000 Boers around
Kimberley and all roads strictly con-
trolled. He says that he passed close
enough to Kimberley to see the search-
lights and was informed that the defend-
ers were satisfied that they could
hold out, but were weary with inacti-
vity and hoped that a relieving force
would soon arrive.

STORIES OF BOER VICTORIES HAVE SPREAD

AFRIKANERS REJOICE.

Paris, Nov. 2.—The Havas news agency
this evening published the following
extraordinary dispatch, which agency
says was received through a correspondent
at Brussels: "Cape Town, Nov. 2.—
News of the Boer's two victories around
Ladysmith has created considerable ex-
citement among the Afrikaners, who do
not conceal their joy. Sir Alfred Milner,
British high commissioner, is perturbed
at their attitude. Gen. White in these
two engagements, lost about
350 men killed and wounded and
prisoners. The second victory was won
by the Free States, commanded by Lucas
Meyer, who seized Colenso, thus cutting
off the retreat of White, who is wounded.
The investment of Ladysmith is complete.
The Boers are masters of the Pietmaritz-
burg and Durban railway. News has
reached General White that Mafeking is
closely beset and that the Boers have
successfully repulsed all sorties. The
surrender of Mafeking is expected. It is
also confirmed that the Free States have
seized Colenso."

MEXICAN GENERAL RETIRED.

Oaxaca, Mex., Nov. 2.—The military
authorities have been advised that Gen-
eral Lorenzo Garcia has been retired from
the position as commander at large of
the force of government troops moving
against the rebellious Maya Indians in
Yucatan. He is on the way to the City
of Mexico, where he has been summoned
by President Diaz. It is understood that
General Canion, governor of Yucatan,
will assume command of the troops.

REMARKABLE ESCAPE OF A CONVICT.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 2.—Investigation
by Governor Sayers and state peniten-
tiary officials shows that the escape of
George Isaacs, life convict from Rusk
penitentiary by means of a forged pa-
don was one of the most remarkable in
the criminal annals of the state. Isaacs
walked out of the prison gates on Sep-
tember 30, and the prison officials sup-
posed his pardon was legal until yester-
day, when by mere chance attention
Governor Sayers was called to the fact
that Isaacs was at large and claimed to
have been pardoned.

BRITISH BATTLESHIP.

Chatham, England, Nov. 2.—The launch-
ing of the British first class battleship,
Venerable, here to-day was accompan-
ied by unusual enthusiasm. The christen-
ing was performed by Mrs. Joseph Cham-
berlain (formerly Miss Knidcott), who
was accompanied by her husband, the
British secretary of state for the colonies.
They received a great ovation.

SUCCESSFUL REVOLUTION.

Caracas, Venezuela, Nov. 2.—General
Castro, leader of the revolution in Ven-
ezuela, has blockaded Porto Cabello, the
only port not occupied by Castro's forces,
with two cruisers. Commerce with that
port has been stopped. Castro has won
two victories over Hernandez and the
former's government is becoming well
established.

CITY IMPROVEMENT SOCIETY.
One of the surest ways to improve and beautify Albuquerque could be through the work of an energetic city improvement society. If 200 of the business men and property owners would get together in such an organization, wonderful results would be sure to follow. THE CITIZEN is willing to contribute \$5.00 a month to such an organization, and believes there are at least two hundred others interested in the growth of the city who would be willing to subscribe even more liberally to such an organization. The money thus received should be spent in public improvements and in the establishment of public enterprises. With an energetic set of officers, who would serve without pay, immense benefits could be derived.

THE ARMY.
General Corbin came up the military forces now in the service of the United States, as follows:
Regular army, 64,880; volunteers, 34,574; total 99,454. The regular establishment consists of ten regiments of cavalry, seven of artillery and twenty-five of infantry. The volunteer establishment consists of one regiment of cavalry, twenty-four of infantry, and the Porto Rico battalion. The distribution of these troops up to October 1 last was as follows: In the United States, 11,187; Porto Rico, 3,303; Cuba, 11,187; Philippines, 32,315; on route to the Philippines, 17,000; Alaska, 400; Hawaiian Islands, 400.

THE REASONS WHY.
This city will have remarkable growth during the next year. The reasons for making such prediction are plain to those who have studied the situation. The Santa Fe Railroad company will build early in the spring a commodious new depot building and hotel and will also largely increase its shop forces. The Low Line Irrigation canal will be in operation, and it will do much to improve the lands north of the city and increase the trade of the merchants. The mines of Cochiti, Santa Fe and Hell Canyon districts will all be worked, and the rich trade of all those districts will double the jobbing trade of Albuquerque. Taxes are being lessened and outstanding indebtedness is being reduced. On every hand evidences of prosperity for this city are abundant. Let us all pull together and encourage every enterprise that will help build up the city. There is room here for a city of at least 25,000 prosperous people, and it can build up to that number in a very short time.

SOUTH AFRICAN REPUBLIC.
It is manifest destiny that in a few decades all South Africa will be under English rule, and that the several colonies of that portion of the African continent will become united under English rule and will establish a South African Republic with a government similar to that of the great American republic. This is predicated on the past history of the English speaking colonies. A similar republic is almost sure to be established in Australia in the early part of the next century. The English are great colonists, and they love liberty and the blessings of a liberal government. The republic established in the Transvaal cannot stand. Its founders have little conception of a republican form of government, and its restrictive laws are repugnant to progressive people. When a permanent republic is established in South Africa it will be controlled by English speaking people, and it will be one of the best countries on the globe.

RAILROAD TAXES.
The railroads pay about forty per cent of the taxes in New Mexico, and it is probable that the people who derive direct living from their connection with the railroads in various capacities pay ten per cent more of the taxes collected in the territory. The railroads and the men connected with the various lines generally pay their taxes promptly. The Santa Fe and in fact all the railroads pay their taxes without delay. This is the reason why the people of New Mexico have never seriously objected to freight rates, and have never tried to hamper the railroads with detrimental legislative restrictions. Following the good example set by the Santa Fe company, none of the railroads have ever asked anything unreasonable of the people. In return the people of the territory have always tried to do everything in their power to encourage the roads already built and to help secure the building of new lines. All new roads are exempt from taxation for a number of years, and depot facilities and right of way are generally cheerfully given to all new roads.

Without railroads this territory would be almost worthless, and the people fully realize that New Mexico cannot be developed fully without many more lines of railroad.

ARMY AND NAVY EXPENSES.
The estimates of the navy department for the coming fiscal year require an appropriation of \$74,045,183.15, and those for the army are expected to reach \$125,000,000, or in all \$200,000,000 for military purposes, not including rivers and harbors. The naval appropriations for the current year were \$145,567,966.28. The estimates for the increase of the navy next year are \$23,083,101, as compared with the current appropriations of \$19,392,402. For the new naval academy \$2,021,000 will be asked. The appropriations for the army this year, including a deficiency appropriation, were \$119,221,192. The naval bureau of ordnance has asked for \$4,000,000 for armor and armament of new ships, \$500,000 for a reserve supply of ammunition, \$250,000 for smokeless powder and \$250,000 for reserve guns for auxiliary cruisers. The quartermaster department has asked for \$10,000,000 for the Philippine insurrection.

Gov. MURPHY, of Arizona, has returned from Washington, and says that the prospects for statehood for Oklahoma, Arizona and New Mexico were never so bright as at present.

In 1870 Denver had only 4,700 people. The census next year will show a population of about 150,000 in the Colorado metropolis.

The streets are needing attention. A large amount of repair work is necessary on several of the principal streets.

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LITTLE SMALLPOX.

Governor Otero Set the Wheels Moving to Refute a False Story.

NO CAUSE TO COMPLAIN.

Governor Otero is working hard to correct the impression that has gone abroad that New Mexico is a hot-bed for smallpox. A letter addressed to him by K. G. Tyler, secretary of the Colorado board of health, about this matter some time ago, asks the executive and other officials in the territory to co-operate with Colorado in preventing any epidemic this winter. As a matter of fact, there are fewer smallpox cases in New Mexico, despite its much greater area, than there have been in Colorado, Pennsylvania, Ohio, or other states during the past year. Smallpox has occurred only in the territory in isolated places or in a sporadic form, and never in epidemic form. Nevertheless, the governor will use all means in his power to stamp the disease out altogether, and will have the co-operation of the territorial board of medical examiners in this purpose. But even at present the state of health throughout New Mexico is as good and better than in any other state or territory in the United States, and there will be less danger from smallpox and typhoid fever in New Mexico this winter than anywhere else. The following official correspondence explains the situation as it exists to-day. It will be noted that, contrary to the assertion of Secretary Tyler, of the Colorado health board, there is not a single case of smallpox at Albuquerque, and at Catalina there is only one case, and as Catalina does all its trading with Colorado and faces Colorado, being far the line, it is more of a Colorado town than a New Mexico settlement. Every citizen and newspaper should do its best to counteract the impression that smallpox is epidemic in New Mexico, an impression which is hurting the territory as well as the railroad companies and every other business.

The letter of the Colorado officer to Governor Otero was as follows: "Official complaint has constantly been made during the last eleven months by the health officers throughout Colorado, that cases of smallpox have developed by reason of laxity of the health officials of New Mexico. At least 150 cases have been reported, during the last year, to your state. This fact certainly indicates that proper measures are not being taken by health officers throughout New Mexico to prevent the spread of the disease. Most of the cases have had their origin either in Albuquerque or at Catalina. The matter has been carefully considered by the Colorado state board of health, and it has seemed wise to lay the matter before your excellency, with a view to securing the attention of the health officials of New Mexico, to the fact that they are responsible for the control of the disease. I respectfully request that you make such investigation of the matter as seems to you, and that I be informed as to whether any measures to prevent like occurrences this fall and winter are being taken. We have no wish to cast aspersions upon the officials of New Mexico, but we are in duty bound to protect the interests of the Colorado citizens."

Governor Otero took the matter up with the following result: Mayor O. N. Marrero, of Albuquerque, wrote to the governor: "I took the matter up with Dr. Pearce, our city physician, and I enclose her letter addressed to you on the matter in question. I know the city officials of this city, the board of health, and the citizens generally have done everything in their power to prevent the spread of the disease. The last year expended something like \$5,000 in quarantining, maintenance of pest houses and care of patients. The charges at this city is the least of the charges in using measures to prevent the contagion or spread of it is wholly unfounded. It will be found that this city is as fully as any other city in any part of the country, and that any measure possible to prevent disease and the spread of contagion is taken. If the Colorado health officials are anything further than we should do, or how we could co-operate with them in the stamping out of smallpox, we will be glad to hear from them."

Dr. H. F. Pearce, city physician of Albuquerque, wrote to Governor Otero: "I regard to Catalina, we know nothing at all. In regard to Albuquerque, the quarantine laws have been very strict for the past six months, and there has been very severe in this city, and in all cases of recovery the houses and in all persons themselves have been strictly quarantined. The only case that came from Albuquerque was a Mrs. Matton, that came through from California and stayed a short time in Albuquerque, and went to Colorado with the truck and a small case of smallpox, and spread from that case to a number of cases in that vicinity. To the laxity of the health officials there is due the spreading of that one case, and the health officials of Albuquerque are in no ways to blame. There has been in Albuquerque and its vicinity but two cases in the last six months, and those two cases in the latter part of that month. None since."

County Clerk A. L. Hobbs, at Esaton, made this response to the governor: "No action has been taken by the board in the smallpox case; they have left it to the present authorities. There has been no epidemic at any time, and the local health officials have been deemed competent to handle such cases in their districts. There is but one case known to exist at present, and that is at Catalina, and is in the hands of the local health officials. The board of health has left it to the present authorities, as soon as possible, and advise you of it in action."

Dr. J. H. Sloan, president of the territorial board of health, made the following report to the governor: "In reference to your inquiry of recent date to the territorial board of health, we desire to inform you that there are only a few isolated cases of smallpox in the territory of New Mexico, and that they are all in isolated Mexican hamlets, off the railroads, and every precaution is being taken in the way of isolation and quarantine to stamp out the disease and prevent further spread. Radical quarantine measures are being taken."

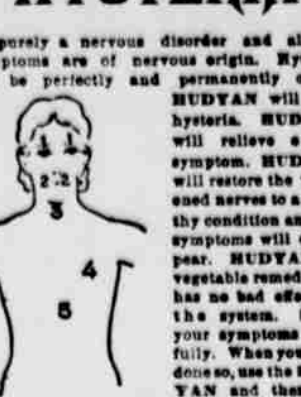
A communication from Secretary T. P. Martin, and a copy of recommendations made by the board of health to prevent the spread of smallpox and typhoid fever have also been received by the governor.

CERRILLOS COAL FIELDS.

Sanita Fe Railway Company's Lease Finally Transferred.

A meeting was held in Santa Fe Tuesday by the directors of the Cerrillos Coal Railroad company and the Cerrillos Coal and Iron company, at which news of the properties and franchises of these companies, heretofore made by the officers thereof to the Colorado Fuel and Iron company, were approved and ratified. The management of the coal mines in the southern Santa Fe county, located on the Ortiz mine grant, and on the Juana Lopez grant, is now in the hands of representatives of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company, and will be managed by them in the future. It is understood that the leases are quite valuable to the Cerrillos Coal and Iron company, and that they extend over a long period of years. This action was had in conformity with the policy of the Santa Fe railway, which is making leases of its coal properties to outside corporations in order to more strictly and better attend to its legitimate business, it being well known that the Cerrillos Coal and Iron company and the Cerrillos Coal Railroad company are sub-corporations of the Santa Fe Railway.

RAILROAD RACE.

Three Roads Are Making All Haste to Enter Cripple Creek.

The importance of the Colorado Springs and Cripple Creek air line is apparent from the opposition it has aroused. Denver and New York capitalists have organized the Florence & Cripple Creek and the Midland Terminal into a Denver road. Only fifty miles of track, beginning at Divide, are necessary to connect with a branch of the Union Pacific. This connection is being rushed through. A third road, the Cripple Creek & Canon City, twenty-five miles long, is being crowded to completion. Work on the air line is progressing. The three roads are racing to get to the camp.

The Colorado-Philadelphia reduction plant, of 250 tons daily capacity, located at Colorado City, on the latter road, is doubling its capacity. Arrangements are making to build a second mill there. From Cripple Creek to these plants the grade is rather steep.

Low freight rates are assured. The promoters of the road represent unlimited wealth.

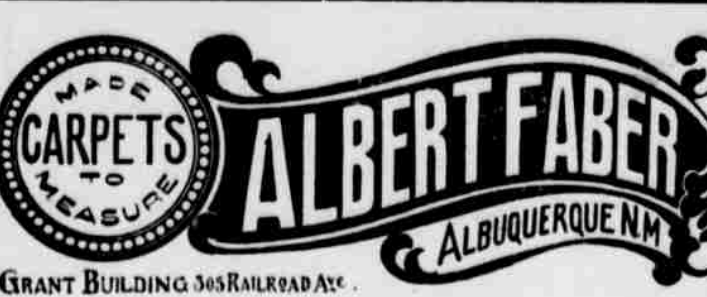
