WAR SITUATION.

Question is, Will Queen Victoria Abdicate in Case of War?

Massachusetts Republicans Meet and Make Nominations.

Admiral Dewey Accepts the Home Given by the People.

SIR THOMAS LIPTON'S VIEWS.

London, Oct. 6.—All reliable intelligence from South Africa points to a continuation of the existing situation for some time, as both sides are apparently diffident about commencing an attack. The delay gives time for further negotiations.

A well-defined conviction is prevalent that the foreign office is trying to discover a way out of the mess created by admitted mistakes and miscalculations. Advice from Pretoria describes the Transvaal organs as crying for impossible terms, and President Kruger referring to the prospective struggle as a means of settling the republic "totally free of England." It is also said that the Boer forces at Volksrust will advance today to the Natal border.

In Vienna, the Kaiserlied alleges that Queen Victoria intends to abdicate in the event of an outbreak of hostilities. The British foreign office, when shown the Vienna story as to the intention of the queen to abdicate, declared it "supremely ridiculous."

A private message from a high official at Pretoria, in reply to a friend in London, says: "We do not want any guarantee of independence. We stick to the London convention. We lost all faith in British statesman and have nothing more to say."

THE DEWEY HOME.

The Admiral Wants a Home Already Constructed.

Washington, Oct. 6.—Admiral Dewey has elected to accept a house in Washington already constructed, instead of having one built for him. In accordance with the invitation committee, which had in charge the Dewey home work, he called at the office of Acting Secretary Allen, of the navy department, to day to indicate his preference in the matter. He said he had proposed, if the home had been the gift of a few wealthy men, he should feel indisposed to accept, but he noted the fund was from over 43,000 subscribers, indicating that the home was to be really a gift of the American people and as such he would accept it with as much pleasure as he had the sword bestowed upon him by congress. He wishes the house to be located in the northwest section of the city. He wanted the house at the earliest possible moment so he might "go in and hang up his hat at once," as he put it. He asked that the house be modest enough in appointments and cost, to permit of the retention of a sufficient sum to defray the expense of furnishing. The fund at the disposal of the committee, amounting to about \$50,000, it is earnestly desired that the sum may be substantially increased during the time remaining before the purchase.
