## THE YACHT RACE.

The Columbia and Shamrock  
Battling on the Waves.

The Great Race Detailed by Short  
Bulletins.

It Looks Very Much as if the Shamrock  
Would Win.

### LATER NEWS SAYS NO RACE.

Highlands, N. Y., Oct. 3.—At 11:12 the  
starting gun was fired. Shamrock, ap-  
parently, crossed the line at 11:16:30.  
Columbia at 11:15:55.

At 11:30 a. m.—Columbia appears to be  
gaining slightly.

At 11:21 a. m.—Shamrock led the Col-  
umbia by about 200 yards.

12:03 p. m.—Shamrock now leads by  
half a mile.

12:15 p. m.—Columbia now gaining  
rapidly on the Shamrock.

Both boats have gained, the Columbia  
increasing her speed and has now passed  
the Shamrock.

Galilee, 12:29 p. m.—The Columbia  
has caught the Shamrock and getting  
out by her on the starboard side. She  
seems to be going like an express train.

12:43 p. m.—The Columbia still in-  
creasing her lead, which is over half  
a mile.

Long Branch, 1 p. m.—The Shamrock  
appears to be gaining slightly. Wind re-  
freshing.

Galilee, 1:01 p. m.—The Columbia  
leads the Shamrock by two minutes and  
nine seconds and evidently running away  
from her rival. As the wind picks up she  
moves faster.

Asbury Park, 1:20 p. m.—The Columbia  
is leading by a big margin, and now  
heading for the stake boat. Her lead is  
constantly increasing.

Highlands, 1:38 p. m.—Columbia  
turns the stake at 1:38 p. m. Shamrock  
1:40 p. m.

Long Branch, 1:40 p. m.—Columbia  
pulling away from Shamrock. Wind  
refreshing.

Highlands, 2:14 p. m.—Wind decreased.  
The Shamrock appeared to have over-  
taken and passed the Columbia.

2:25 p. m.—The Shamrock seems to  
have a good lead over the Columbia, as  
seen when she went about on port tack.

Galilee, 2:37 p. m.—The Columbia  
is leading by a small margin, the Sham-  
rock giving her a grand fight. Their  
positions may change any minute. Both  
are jockeying.

Galilee, 2:55 p. m.—The Columbia is  
losing ground. The Shamrock struck a  
fresher breeze. The Columbia seems al-  
most becalmed, while the Shamrock is  
going ahead.

Galilee, 3:05 p. m.—The Shamrock  
now seems to be leading the Columbia.  
The Columbia is still in a streak of  
calm.

4:45 p. m.—The time limit of five and  
one-half hours expired at 4:45. At that  
time, both boats were three miles east  
of Highlands and the same distance  
from the finish line at Sandy Hook  
lightship. The Shamrock was ahead, but  
a person could toss a biscuit from the  
Shamrock to the Columbia. At 4:47 both  
boats signalled for tugs.

SHAMROCK IN THE LEAD.

New York, Oct. 3.—The first race of the  
series for the American cup, between the  
Columbia and the Shamrock, proved the  
most remarkable of any yet sailed for  
the great trophies. Light breezes pre-  
valled and varied in spots by puff or  
two and in turn both boats enjoyed the  
benefit, and suffered the change in po-  
sition. Excursion boats of which there  
were hundreds interfered in a measure  
with the progress of the race, and in  
this respect the Columbia suffered most.  
The official start was as follows: Sham-  
rock, 11:15:55. Columbia 11:16:30.

The Shamrock gained a hundred yards  
at the start and increased her lead dur-  
ing the first hour. The Columbia's sails  
did not set properly. Suddenly, however,  
with a change of sails and a puff of  
breeze the American cup defender took  
on new life and within a few minutes  
she had overhauled her rival and was  
pushing her white nose through the  
water at a rapid rate, outstriking the  
challenger and gaining at every dip of  
her nose. They rounded the mark as  
follows:

Columbia, 1:28:45. Shamrock, 1:40:11.

Kathleen was with. On the boat back  
there was a succession of small tacks,  
the Columbia making a move for five  
with the Shamrock until about 2:45 when  
the Shamrock standing off the Columbia  
on shore for ten minutes. This un-  
fortunate move for the Columbia's skip-  
per for wind was not only lightened in  
shore, but shifted to the eastward,  
so the Shamrock, which tacked at  
2:40, was greatly benefited by the  
change. The Shamrock gained by this  
combination of circumstances the lead  
which she had lost early in the race. At  
3 o'clock the wind died down to a  
three-knot breeze and with about eight  
miles to go it hardly looked as though

the race would be sailed within five and  
a half hour's limit. At 3:55 the boats  
were off Highlands, five miles from the  
finish mark, with the Shamrock slightly  
in the lead.

### His Fire.

Des Moines, Iowa, Oct. 3.—A fire to-day  
destroyed the five-story department store  
of the Harris Emery company and was  
communicated to the Masonic Temple,  
Murphy house, Hegel cigar store and the  
Hill shoe store, the total loss amounting  
to \$500,000. The loss of the Harris Emery  
company alone is estimated at \$350,000.  
All the buildings were insured. The  
origin is unknown.

### Must Appear To-Morrow.

New York, Oct. 3.—A representative of  
the law firm of Kellogg, Rose & Smith,  
has served a writ of habeas corpus on  
Captain B. K. Roberts, commandant of the  
Governor's island, demanding that Cap-  
tain Oberlin M. Carter, be produced in  
court before Judge LaCrosse, of the United  
States circuit court, at 11 a. m. to-  
morrow.

## GOODS RECOVERED.

Robber of H. Simpson's Store Identified.

H. G. Collier, Alias Charles J. Hall, the Rough Rider.

JEWELRY SENT TO HIS PARENTS.

Postoffice Inspector A. P. Frederick is in the city with some very interesting information concerning the career of H. G. Collier, alias Charles J. Hall, who is supposed to have robbed the store of H. Simpson here last June.

It appears that Collier ran away from his home in St. Louis, Missouri, some years ago, and has been a wanderer ever since. He developed a sharp, sure turn of mind, but his talents were bent in the wrong direction, as shown by his subsequent career.

During the month of May last, two safes were broken open in Gallup, and the perpetrators could not be located. A few days later the railroad company's safe at Belen was cracked, and a mail sack was found cut open.

On May 30th, the railroad company's safe at Glorieta was tampered with, and four days later the postoffice at Las Vegas was entered, where the thief made a rich haul. He got \$451.91 in currency, gold and money orders, besides a gold watch and chain, belonging to Postmaster Salazar, and a 44-caliber semi-automatic, with a bone handle, belonging to a mail carrier and named "J. M."

The identity of the robber in all the above places still remained a mystery, when a few days afterwards the postoffice safe at Alamosa, Colorado, was robbed of \$235.82.

In the efforts of the detectives to unravel the puzzling question it was found that the work in all the above cases bore the same earmarks, indicating very clearly that they were committed by one and the same man.

On June 21st the store of H. Simpson in this city was robbed of a large quantity of jewelry and Collier being in the neighborhood was arrested on suspicion. He secured his three days' later and a merry chase began to locate him.

The first clue obtained was through a letter written him to Las Vegas by his sister from St. Louis, Missouri. She, very fortunately for the authorities, neglected to seal her letter. In the letter she thanked her brother for the beautiful watch and chain he had sent her. The letter being followed from place to place he finally was located in Colorado, where he was arrested in the following manner:

Deputy Marshal McCulloch, in whose hands a warrant had been placed, stationed himself at the postoffice window and awaited Collier's appearance. When he arrived and called for his letter McCulloch followed him to where he was living, and entering found him lying on the bed with a revolver within easy reach. McCulloch handcuffed him before he could rise. He offered no resistance but wanted to know what the charge was. He said he knew nothing of the Las Vegas crime, but that he had been there during the Rough Rider' reunion. He was taken before United States Commissioner Van Dyke, who fixed his bail at \$1,000, in default of which he was taken to jail where he now is.

Special Officer Frank Harris, of the Santa Fe, and Special Agent Reno, of the Colorado Southern, have gone to Los Angeles with the proper papers and will soon have him back in the territory.

Acting upon the information gained from his sister's letter, St. Louis, Missouri, was visited, where he was found to have a father, mother and sister living. They are plain people, fairly well to do, and were evidently surprised to know how Collier had come into possession of the articles he had sent them, for they were in possession of watches, chains and rings which had been sent them by registered mail from Ogden, Utah.
