The following articles from the New York American will show the extent of the exposure, and the fruit that is being borne as the result of the column after column of matter showing how hundreds of lives are in imminent peril, and that the babies should be saved and at once. Mr. Gibson writes that he is going to advertise Sunmount Tent City in the affected tenement house districts, and make every possible effort to get those who can afford to do so, to come to Santa Fe.

Conditions in New York.

The New York American article follows:

"The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, when it meets tomorrow will take up the proposition to raze the unhealthy tenements that cover the so-called 'Lung Block' bounded by Cherry, Market, Hamilton and Catharine Streets, and to establish in its stead a public park and playground.

"According to physicians, agents of the Board of Health, the Tenement House Commission, the Charity Organization Society and workers from the University Settlement, who have visited, inspected and lived in the 'Lung Block,' the death rate in that area of less than four acres is twice as high as it is in the rest of the city, and a majority of all deaths occurring there are from consumption.

"Almost every building in the block is infected with the germs of tuberculosis, and in the last fifteen years family after family have moved in, acquired the disease and died.

"Two hundred and sixty-eight cases of consumption have been reported to the Board of Health from the 'Lung Block' alone since 1895, and, according to the testimony of physicians and druggists who are familiar with the facts, as many more cases that were never reported have occurred there.

"Six hundred and four families, including 2,778 persons, more than half of them children, live in 'Lung Block'. Although few of the buildings in the block are as high as five stories, the population is so thickly massed as to give a density of 699 to the acre, a density exceeded by only one or two other blocks in the city, and those covered with six story and seven story buildings.

"J. G. Phelps Stokes, the young millionaire, who gave up his business affairs to live and work among the poor, is one of the prime movers in the effort to raze the 'Lung Block' and erect in its stead a breathing space for the tenement dwellers.

Ernest Poole, one of Mr. Stokes' associates lived for three months in the 'Lung Block.' His reports of the awful ravages of consumption in the 'Lung Block' are appalling.

"One of the old tenements is called 'The Ink Pot' said Mr. Poole, yesterday. 'One hundred and forty people live in its five stories. Twenty-three of these are babies. Death has laid in wait in some of these rooms for years. On the third floor is a room with two little closets behind it. In one of these a blind man slept and caught consumption in 1894. He died in the hospital. Only a few months later his little daughter died. The widow and son moved out but the germs lived on. Other people moved in and died there.

"The greatest work the 'AMERICAN' could do would be to bring its influence to bear to have the 'Lung Block' razed and a handsome, useful, life-saving park and playground established in its stead.

"Tenement House Commissioner Robert W. de Forest has called the attention of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the crying need of a park in the district which the proposed new playground will most greatly benefit, and is strongly in favor of taking the 'Lung Block' for that purpose."

## RUNNING LINES NEAR ANTHONY

Five Surveying Corps at Work in the Lower Mesilla Valley. Will Work Below El Paso.

The United States surveying corps that is running the dividing line between New Mexico and Texas, this week placed a galvanized steel monument with appropriate inscription near Anthony. Formerly, the railroad monument had guided the people but the government monument is 300 feet north of the railroad monument, the consequence being that some property which was thought to be in New Mexico is really in Texas. At the same time a party of the United States Geological Survey placed a monument at the depot at Anthony, marking its altitude as 3,721 feet. Deputy U. S. Surveyor C. G. Coleman, is at Anthony establishing the lines of the Refugio Colony and the Santa Teresa Grants which embrace the river bottom lands north of Anthony. The two Elephant Butte reservoir surveying corps are also at work in the vicinity of Anthony and will next week make surveys in the valley below El Paso.

## CALL ISSUED BY CHAIRMAN JONES

Democratic National Committee to Meet at the Shoreham Hotel Washington, January 12.

Washington, Dec. 9.—James K. Jones, chairman of the Democratic National Committee today issued a call for the committee to meet at the Shoreham Hotel in this city on Tuesday, January 12, for the purpose of deciding upon the time and place for holding the Democratic National Convention.

## RUSSIA'S REPLY.

To Japanese Proposals has Not as Yet Been Received at Tokio.

Yokohama, Dec. 9.—Advices received here today from Tokio say that Russia's reply to the Japanese proposals have not yet been received and it is not believed that it will be finally decided but probably will necessitate further negotiations of the minor details.

It is believed that unless Japan's minimum demands are virtually conceded, the cabinet at Tokio may decline the amendments. In any case a section of the Japanese diet is expected to impeach the cabinet for its apparent lack of aggressiveness but the result is doubtful as the government can dissolve the house if opposition threatens to embarrass its foreign policy.

Japan generally is calmly awaiting Russia's reply, ready to end the suspense one way or another, but resolved to yield nothing of her present moderate stand.

## DESERTER SHOT.

Private Thomas Burton of Second United States Infantry Receives a Dangerous Wound.

Cheyenne, Wyoming, Dec. 9.—While in citizen's clothes and attempting to desert Private Thomas Burton of Company E, Second Regiment Infantry, United States Army was shot by Private George Hood here today.

The wound is considered a dangerous one. Hood and Burton were warm personal friends. Burton was recruited about two months ago.

## RUSSIA'S OPPOSITION.

To the Opening of Yonhampho to the Commerce of the World.

Tokio, Dec. 9.—A strong Russian squadron, consisting of eight warships and including two battleships has arrived at Chemulpo, Corea, the port of Seoul to support Russia's opposition to the opening of Yonhampho to the commerce of the world. The Russians threaten to land 3,000 men and to march on Seoul should Corea disregard the warning.

## COLONEL EDWARD BUTLER IS NOW A FREE MAN.

Jefferson City, Mo., Dec. 9.—The Supreme Court today reversed the case of Colonel Edward Butler of St. Louis, convicted in November, 1902, of bribery, in connection with the garbage contract, and sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. The prisoner was discharged. Indictments charging bribery in the St. Louis lighting bill cases are still pending against Butler.

## TREE FELL ON WOODCHOPPER.

While David Hooson was getting a load of wood in the forest near Red River, Taos County, a tree fell on him and broke his left arm. Despite his painful injury Hooson unhitched his horse and walked home leading his horse with his right hand.

## TROOPS LANDED

1,100 Men to Open the Way Through the Darien Mountains Into Panama.

## NO ORDERS FROM REYES

Representative From the Colombian Government in Washington Denies All Knowledge of Movement.

La Guaira, Venezuela, Dec. 9.—The French steamer, Versailles, which arrived here from Savilla, reports that Colombian steamers have landed 1,100 men from Cartagena near the mouth of the Atrato River (on the Gulf of Darien) to open the way through the Darien mountains into Panama.

Other troops from the department of Cauca, Colombia, are said to be converging on Panama and from all parts, Colombian troops are reported to be marching or awaiting the result of General Reyes' mission to Washington.

No Orders Issued By Reyes.

Washington, Dec. 9.—The Colombian Charge d'Affaires Herran today authorized a statement that if troops from Cartagena had landed near the mouth of the Atrato River, as reported, it is directly in opposition to the advice of both himself and General Reyes.

Reyes declared that if such a movement has taken place, it was without orders from him. When Reyes came to Washington he temporarily relinquished the command of the Colombian Army, his duties falling upon General Castro, the second in command.

Reyes has been told that the United States is determined to maintain the independence of Panama against all comers. No Colombian troops have been allowed to cross the frontier of Panama, or if they cross, they will be ejected in due time.

## ANTI-WOLCOTTS WIN.

Poll 2,000 More Votes Than Republicans in Denver Charter Delegate Election.

Denver, Dec. 9.—With two suburban precincts missing, the returns in the election for delegates to the charter convention, held in this city and the County of Denver show that the candidate of the anti-Wolcott Republicans and Democrats receiving the lowest vote has a majority of 9,192 over the vote received by the highest candidate on the ticket supported by the regular Republicans and civics. It is estimated that the anti-Wolcotts polled 2,000 votes more than the Republicans.

The civic ticket which was supported by the regular Republicans was pledged to the municipal control of public utilities. The Honest Election League which worked for the latter ticket, charges fraud. The winning ticket carried all of the sixteen wards of the city with the exception of three.

## QUIET PREVAILS.

Large Consignment of Non-Union Men Exjected From Missouri for Colorado Coal Fields.

Denver, Dec. 9.—Exceptional quiet prevails at all points of the state where strikes are on. At Telluride a full force of men is at work in the Tom Boy mine and a large consignment of non-union men is expected from Missouri tonight and will be distributed among the different mines.

At Trinidad the center of the southern coal fields, there have been no further acts of violence and unless the rioting is renewed it is stated there will be no call for troops. At Cripple Creek the military has the situation well in hand. Orders were issued today by Adjutant General Bell to reduce the force there.

## FELL FIFTY FEET.

Robert Ward Escapes With Minor Injuries From a Lofly Tumble.

Robert Ward of Fairview, Sierra County, while at work on the Julius Wild Mine stepped from a level into the main shaft, falling 50 feet to the bottom. His right arm was broken above the elbow and his chin was cut, but he miraculously escaped other serious injury.

## INVESTORS STARTLED

News That Fraser Mountain Copper Company is in Hands of Receiver Causes Commotion.

## ASBURY PARK AFFECTED

Caused the Suspension of Two Banks There Last Winter—Action Taken as Result.

New York, Dec. 9.—The residents of Asbury Park, New Jersey, who invested \$200,000 in the Fraser Mountain Copper Company of New Mexico have been startled by the announcement that the company has gone into the hands of a receiver upon the application of W. B. Childers, United States District Attorney for New Mexico, acting for J. M. Lanning, receiver of the Monmouth Trust Company of Asbury Park.

The complainant alleges that the company owes \$107,000 and has only \$15,000 in the treasury. It was capitalized at \$7,000,000 and every share of stock disposed of. The concern was exploited last winter by A. C. Twining and caused the suspension of two banks in Asbury Park.

Lanning who makes the allegation states that the company is a legal title to the property.

The deed given by Fraser the original owner, to Twining, with a Santa Fe banking firm, awaiting the payment of the balance of the purchase money which is due December 21. The bank is directed by the court not to give the deed to Fraser.

Twining, who is under indictment in Monmouth County, and the federal courts, left Monday for the mining camp without knowledge of the receivership.

The following dispatch and warning has been sent out from the new gold fields in Sierra County: "Teams are running and rushing, the excitement in the Caballos continues, the wave of prosperity is drifting up the Rio Grande. Rumors reach here from Hillsboro that Bernado Silva, one of the discoverers of the Silva Gulch placers, has sold his claim for \$50,000, \$10,000 cash, the remainder on bond. The latest information from Pittsburgh, the new camp on the Rio Grande, is that everybody is satisfied. Many people are coming in without adequate information or the intelligence to provide against the chilly damps of the Rio Grande. Bring your heavy wardrobe and be prepared to camp as cattle and goats do, often freezing in the mountains of New Mexico.

"There is gold in Apache Canon. A well is being sunk that is not yet through the wash. A pan of clay was panned out and the net result was 40 cents.

"At present there are no accommodations, it is impossible to subsist on cactus, and the rich as well as the poor must sleep in the cold. The country is full of old-time prospectors from the Black Range, Texas, Arizona and Old Mexico.

## INCIDENTS AT ALEXANDER

Turkish Official Report on the Complaint Entered By United States Consul Davis.

Constantinople, Dec. 9.—The Turkish official report of the incidents at Alexandria complained of by the United States Consul Davis, has been telegraphed here by the Governor of Beirut, Syria.

It says that Attarian, the Armenian over whom the trouble arose, claiming the protection of the American consul, asked his assistance to enable him to embark for Egypt. The authorities insisted that the sanction of the Governor must be obtained. Davis refused to tolerate the necessary delay and attempted to embark Attarian by force.

When Attarian was arrested his military couriers attempted his rescue from the guard house breaking the doors and windows and wounding the policemen. Failing to secure Attarian's release upon demand, Davis embarked for Beirut on the same steamer that Attarian had tried to take.

Territorial Board of Public Lands.

The Territorial Board of Public Lands met yesterday in the office of Land Commissioner A. A. Keen. There were present Governor M. A. Otero, chairman, Solicitor General E. L. Bartlett, and Land Commissioner A. A. Keen, secretary. In addition to routine business, provision was made for the installation in the old Palace building of the new postoffice fixtures.

Contest Case.

The hearing in the U. S. local land office in the protest of Leonard Skinner vs. Francisco Montes, involving Montes' right to purchase under the coal law the coal land covered by the W 1-2, SW 1-4, of section 14 township 10 north, range 5 east, will be heard tomorrow. The land lies in Bernalillo County and about fifteen miles from San Pedro. Benjamin M. Read, Esq., appears for the contestee and C. F. Easley, Esq., for the contestant.

United States Land Commission.

The United States Land Commission met yesterday, there being present Governor M. A. Otero, chairman; Solicitor General E. L. Bartlett, and Surveyor General M. O. Llewellyn, secretary. A selection of 58,000 acres of timber land in Rio Arriba County was ordered pursuant to the request of the Irrigation Commission, the land to be sold for the benefit of reservoir sites and the improvement of the Rio Grande River. No other business of importance was transacted.

## MR. RODEY GETS THERE

Speaker Cannon by Unanimous Consent Places Him on the Committee on Territories.

## AN ADDITIONAL MEMBER

Senate Takes Up Cuban Bill Giving It Right of Way Over Postal Scandals.

Washington, Dec. 9.—After the suggestion that the Penrose resolution for the investigation of the postoffice department be considered and the statement by Cullom that the Cuban bill should have the right of way, the Senate took up the Cuban bill today. Teller continued his speech. He again took up the question of the activity of General Wood while Governor of Cuba, in behalf of Cuban reciprocity with the United States. He said that there are official records to show that the Cuban government had paid to exceed \$15,000 for that interest during Wood's administration. He declared that the press of both the United States and Cuba had been utilized in supporting the policy of reciprocity and quoted figures showing the amounts paid for newspapers advocating this policy.

In conclusion Teller said that the five years' clause could have no weight because no legislative body can bond itself to act for a future body. That clause was put in as a sop. Teller was followed by Senator Morgan who is also opposed to the bill.

In the Lower House.

Washington, Dec. 9.—Payne, chairman of the committee on ways and means reported, when the House convened today, a resolution providing for the reference of the President's message to the committee and the House went on the committee as a whole with Burkett of Nebraska, in the chair for its consideration.

The speaker by unanimous consent placed Rodey, delegate from New Mexico on the committee on territories as an additional member. De Armond, Democrat from Missouri, amid applause from the minority side, asked if it would be in order to request that an additional member of the minority be added to each of the sixteen big committees. The speaker said that the stream would be crossed when reached.

De Armond said in order to relieve the speaker of embarrassment, he would ask the unanimous consent for an additional minority representation on those committees. Payne objected. The House adjourned.

## BREAK IN CYLINDER.

Has Caused an Unavoidable Interruption in the Electric Light Service Since Sunday.

"Owing to a break in the cylinder there has been an unavoidable interruption in the electric light service since Sunday," said General Manager W. H. Fritchman of the Santa Fe Water and Light Company today. "The inability of those engaged to repair the break to locate the same will in all probability result in a continuance of the poor service for several evenings and nights.

"I have sent for a machinist from Albuquerque, and he is expected to arrive this evening. Pending his arrival we will probably not be able to locate and repair the break, but every possible effort is being made in that direction, a series of tests being made throughout the day today."

## UPON WHAT DO THEY BASE THEIR HOPES FOR 1904.

Democratic statesmen and newspapers look with optimism upon next year's campaign. This is all right from their standpoint and makes them feel good, but what is this optimism based upon? There is but one thing in its favor and that is what is called by statisticians the law of averages. They seem to think that as the Democracy has been defeated in Congressional and national elections in 1894, 1896, 1898, 1900, 1902 and also in state elections in northern states this year, the pendulum should swing back and Democracy should be triumphant in 1904. This is very good as far as it goes, but unfortunately for our Democratic friends it does not go far enough. The Boston Transcript, an independent Republican paper, puts the case fairly when it wants to know where Democratic statesmen and newspapers gain their information upon which to base their hopes for 1904 and would like to know where the careful observer of political conditions finds enough facts to agree with them. The Transcript adds that this observer could readily understand where this ground is if he discovered for himself the change in public opinion which the Democrats claim that they see. Such a change would naturally be expressed in the elections; in fact, could not be expressed in any other way.

"The elections, however, did not register any change. Ohio gave the Republican state ticket a plurality of landslide proportions, exceeded in recent years only by that in 1894. In Iowa, where the Democrats had high hopes of Republican division over 'tariff revision,' the Republicans re-elected Governor Cummins by a plurality that was simply overwhelming. Tammany carried New York City, but the state returned Republican legislative gains. Massachusetts gave Governor Bates nearly 36,000 plurality, and the pluralities for some of his associates ran above 60,000. In Pennsylvania the Democrats were snowed under. Governor Garvin was re-elected in Rhode Island and remains alone in his glory as a New England Democratic state executive; but the Republicans had their own way with the legislature. Where in these figures can be found the indications of a change that is going to bring the Democrats back into power next year? Can any independent ear hear the preliminary rumble of such a political earthquake?"

## PARDONS AND DISCIPLINE.

In practice, the New Mexico custom of pardoning well-behaved convicts on holidays or upon proper recommendations and after thorough investigation, works very well. It is an incentive to prisoners to behave, to observe the necessary discipline and to better themselves in every way that is open to them. It is well for the commonwealth that it is not written upon the penitentiary gates: "Every one who enters here leaves all hope behind." If it were not for the hope of a pardon or a good time allowance, the matter of handling over 200 desperate characters by a handful of guards would become a problem exceedingly difficult of solution. It would not be possible, as is done now, to employ life-prisoners or long term men upon such work as the building of the Scenic Route or other public works. The knowledge, too, that prisoners who have served their time and made a good record can be restored to citizenship by executive action, is also an aid to discipline and the fact that the territorial penitentiary is being administered in such excellent manner, that such perfect discipline is being maintained is undoubtedly due, in addition to the well known executive ability, great good sense and firmness tempered with mercy of Superintendent H. O. Bursum, to the fact that every well behaved prisoner has a right to look forward if not to a pardon or commutation of sentence yet to a good time allowance and restoration to all the privileges of citizenship. It is but just to say right here that Assistant Superintendent W. E. Martin is also entitled to a share of the credit for the very satisfactory condition existing in the New Mexican

penitentiary, as during Mr. Bursum's absence, he is the executive head and carries out the plans, instructions and discipline established by his superior officer in a highly commendable manner.

## "STATES' RIGHTS" GOING GLIMMERING.

What has become of the good old Democratic doctrine of "States' rights?" On Monday of this week two Democratic United States Senators, Teller and Patterson of Colorado, called upon the President and urged him to use the power of the United States and to interfere with the Governor of that state in the performance of his duties, in the execution of the laws of the state and in carrying out the prerogatives of his office. The action of these Senators was based upon petitions, from some of their constituents requesting them to see the President and induce him to take steps to undo the degradation of martial law in the Cripple Creek mining district in Teller County, Colorado. The President informed the two Senators that he could not act in the premises in any manner, he not possessing the legal power so to do. Certainly times have changed when two Democratic United States Senators urgently demand from the President acts of glaring interference with the powers of a Governor of a state and with the rights, powers and laws of his commonwealth. Had Republican Senators called upon a Republican President for such action, a great, prolonged, vociferous and loud howling would have been the result and such Senators as Tillman, Carmack, Gorman, Money, Stone, and Blackburn, state executives as Governor Wardman of Mississippi, Democratic Senators, Congressmen, Governors, politicians and papers in every section of the country generally would have made the country ring with fiery tirades and vehement denunciations. It is certainly a curious commentary upon the status and policies of the Democratic party at this time and proves conclusively that its leaders are drifting away constantly from the doctrines and platforms of the old "States' rights" Democracy.

## SIERRA COUNTY'S GOLCONDA.

A new comedy humaine is being enacted in Sierra County. Remarkable placer gold discoveries in the foothills of the Caballo Mountains on the eastern side of the Rio Grande have led to a stampede from every direction to this new Golconda. One correspondent writes that 60 small camps have been established in Apache and Green Canons, the largest of which has 500 inhabitants, and that in the course of only two weeks. The romance of the early days of the Klondyke is being repeated on a small scale and those who want to get the real western mining flavor such as depicted by Bret Harte and his school of realists, should go to the new camp of Goldorita. Men walk around armed to the teeth, prospectors come flocking in with exciting tales of new gold discoveries; tenderfeet and grizzled prospectors mingle in the free and easy intercourse of the frontier, prices of daily necessities are sky-high, speak easies flourish, there is an absence of home life and woman's refinement, and there are mutterings that presage bloody encounters at any time. There are daily disappointments too, as well as the excitement of new gold discoveries, together with all the hardships, and all the picturesqueness of a typical mining camp, thirty miles from the nearest railroad station and many more miles from the centers of civilization. It is to be hoped that the Sierra County authorities have taken every precaution to maintain peace and to enforce the law in these new gold fields so that New Mexico may be spared the disgrace of wanton bloodshed and unpunished defiance of the law.

Judge Frank W. Parker, in charging grand jurors in his district to look carefully after violations of the law prohibiting the carrying of deadly weapons; the law compelling the attendance of persons of school age at the public or private schools; the Sunday observance law and the statute requiring the justices of the peace to make prompt and correct reports of all fines and fees collected by them, is acting for the best interests of the Territory. Judge Parker's action in calling attention to these statutes meets with the approval of the good people and is sustained and upheld by public opinion.

The Duke of Roxburghe, who married Miss May Goelet and \$20,000,000 of American money does not express himself in very favorable terms about this country and states that he will never visit New York again. Of course not; he has the money and the girl, the second to be sure, and after consideration, why should he return here?

It is an anomalous spectacle, the Solid South prospering as it has never prospered before and at the same time railing at the present administration and not only sighing but actually working for a repetition of the Cleveland hard times.

London newspapers assert that the Duke of Roxburghe is not a fortune hunter. Of course not; those twenty millions of Goelet dollars are his and why should he hunt for any more?

## MINES AND MILLS.

According to the San Marcial Bee the Rosedale mine and mill in Socorro County are running with a full force. Since the placing of new mortars and additional machinery the mill is doing splendid work and more of it. Judging from appearances this mine can be classed among the rich and lasting producers.

Walter Edwards, manager of the Baking Powder mine in the Rosedale district, will soon put a force of men to work on that property. Whited Brothers are at work completing a contract on the White Cap. Lee Fallon, John Eastley and Joseph McKinney are also at work upon prospects near Rosedale.

James McVey and Joseph Pallar have sold their interests in several claims in Wicks Gulch, Sierra County, to the Black Peak Gold Mining Company. This company is about to resume work on these properties. The claims are six in number. The present shaft, which will be the main working shaft, is now down between 40 and 50 feet and contains a fine showing of ore that will average \$30 to the ton. When a depth of 150 feet has been reached a steam hoist will be installed.

Says the Sierra County Advocate: "Professor Fayette A. Jones and J. H. O'Brien, a representative of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company, arrived last Wednesday night at Hillsboro to examine certain mines in this district. They left yesterday afternoon for the Caballo Mountain gold fields."

At the Boston Mine Exchange last week 260 shares of Santa Fe Gold and Copper Company's stock were sold at from \$1.50 to \$1.75 a share.

The Engineering and Mining Journal reviews trade conditions as follows: "The metal markets generally have shown a degree of dullness which reminds us that the close of the year is approaching and that people generally are disinclined to enter into new arrangements until their stock taking is completed, and their balance sheets made up for 1903. Copper has been dull and weak. The largest seller has shown willingness to make a low quotation, which has helped to discourage buying for the present. Foreign consumers, however, have taken hold at the lower prices, and considerable business has been done for export. Some holders, however, are not pressing metal on the market at the present quotations and actual sales here have been light. In lead, about the usual business is doing at unchanged prices. Spot lead is temporarily scarce and it is possible that a few carloads may have been sold above the market, but the quantity must be quite small. Silver has shown little change during the week. In speaking of the copper situation, the Journal says editorially: 'The depression in speculative circles, and the decline in business, more apparent than real, together with a concurrent, if not concerted action of large purchasers, have combined to depress the price of copper. After a considerable period of higher quotations, we have now come close to twelve cent copper, and it may possibly go below that point. There are influences in the market tending in that direction, and there seems to be a lack of confidence in the future, which, we think is not warranted by the facts. It is extremely unfortunate, in the case of a staple like copper, that it is very difficult to obtain reliable statistics. This is due to the action of the largest producer in withholding information, for reasons which can be generally understood. This action leaves the trade in the dark, to a large extent, and makes an opening for speculative operations which benefit a few parties, but are decidedly detrimental to the trade at large. The production of copper this year has doubtless increased over that of last year, the gain being not far from ten per cent as nearly as can be estimated. The stoppage of the Amalgamated mines in Montana did not last long enough to cause any great deficit in the output, and the loss there was more than made up by the metal from the newer mines in the Lake Superior country, in Arizona and in Utah. The output in the United States is not far from 55,000,000 pounds per month, of which the Amalgamated properties in Montana were producing 20,000,000 pounds per month just before the shutdown and they are now turning out about the same. The imports of copper have increased somewhat over last year the gain coming both from Mexico and Canada. This increase, however, has not been sufficient to cause any alarm. Consumption, which was very large during the earlier part of the year, is said to have fallen off lately. At least, manufacturers complain that new orders are few. But we do not hear of any plants which have been obliged to shut down or to diminish their working forces largely. Moreover, there never has been a time when there were so many great enterprises on foot, in which electrical power is to be used; and these will require a very large quantity of metal. Thus, in New York alone, we find the Pennsylvania tunnel work, the change to be made in the New York Central's suburban lines, the Subway equipment, and the Atlantic Avenue improvements on the Long Island Road; all of these will absorb a great deal of copper. The list might be extended to many other places. All this does not point to a drop in consumption, not for a year or two to come. The weakest point in the situation is to be found in the smaller exports this year. Europe has not been as heavy a buyer as was expected,

though recent months have shown some improvement. Whether the lower prices will bring about increased foreign trade is settled, as buying has increased. In spite of the falling off in exports, there are no evidences of any considerable accumulation of stocks in sellers' hands, probably there is now some surplus, but it cannot compare with the large unsold stocks which weighed upon the market two years ago. It is well understood that consumers are carrying very little copper. Both here and in Europe, manufacturers have little or no metal ahead; and they are constantly buying for immediate delivery. Upon the whole, the situation is far from being a weak one; and the present prices are the result of a temporary want of confidence, which keeps buyers back, rather than of the actual position of the metal. It is quite possible, however, that we may see little change before the close of the year."
