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## FOUL MURDER AT DEMING

Sam Fong, a Popular Chinese Merchant, Found Dead In Rear of His Store.

## UGLY WOUNDS ON HEAD

Was Gagged and His Feet Tied Together—Was a Convert to Christianity.

Special to the New Mexican. Deming, Dec. 23.—One of the foulest murders in the criminal annals of Luna County, came to light here yesterday, when Sam Fong, a popular Chinese merchant was found gagged, his feet tied, and with two ugly wounds in his head, cold in death in the rear of his store. The wounds were apparently inflicted with a blunt instrument.

It is believed that he was murdered as the result of his antagonism of the methods pursued by his heathen brethren. He was a convert to Christianity, a member of the Methodist Church, and had been most active in the enforcement of the Sunday laws against his fellow Celestials.

A coroner's jury was impaneled immediately after the finding of the body. The verdict was that Fong had met death at the hands of parties unknown. Robbery is not believed to have been the motive, as nothing in the store-room was molested.

The members of the Methodist Church will give the dead Chinaman a Christian burial.

## TEAMSTERS TO STRIKE IN ST. LOUIS

Nine Thousand Will Go Out if Citizens' Industrial Association Enforce Law and Order.

St. Louis, Dec. 23.—A strike of 9,000 teamsters and carriage drivers in this city is threatened if the citizens of the Industrial Association, in its announced intention to enforce law and order, interferes with the proposed strike of the cabmen and carriage drivers set for January 1.

Teamsters declare if such an interference is made they will refuse to work and that not a pound of freight or a ton of coal will be moved by union labor until the strike is settled. The cabmen and carriage drivers demand an increase in wages of 20 or 30 per cent, which the liverymen declare they can never grant.

## MILITARY ACTIVITY.

Prevails at the Headquarters in Tokio. —Transports and Other Arrangements Are Complete.

London, Dec. 23.—A dispatch to the Reuter Telegram Company from Tokio says: "Incessant activity prevails at military headquarters. Transports and other arrangements are complete. The government is calmly waiting the Russian reply which it is hoped will be forthcoming without delay.

Press dispatches from Corea report continued disturbances at Mokpho and an outbreak of Tong Hak insurrection in the Chollato province.

Tong Haks are the party of malcontents whose activity are the immediate cause of war between China and Japan. These reports create uneasiness."

## REAR ADMIRAL WHITE STRICKEN WITH APOPLEXY.

New York, Dec. 23.—Rear Admiral White retired was stricken with apoplexy at the navy yard today and died before medical aid could be summoned. He had come from his home in Princeton to visit Rear Admiral Rogers, commandant of the navy yard. White was a native of Ohio and entered the naval service in '61. He was made rear admiral the day of his retirement in '99.

## BURGLARS CARRY OFF SALOON SAFE ON SLED.

Boulder, Mont., Dec. 23.—The sheriff here received word from Elk Horn mining camp that cracksmen had entered a saloon at that place and carried away an iron safe on a sled. A quarter of a mile from the town the robbers blew the safe open and secured \$4,000 in gold, coin and jewelry.

## TO SETTLE ON THE SPOT ALL QUESTIONS.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 23.—A telegram from Vladivostok says that Admiral Alexieff, viceroy in the far East, has been authorized "to settle on the spot all questions concerning the neighboring states and to take all measures which appear expedient."

## Report That Superintendent I. B. Hanna Has Been Relieved From Office.

Report has it that I. B. Hanna, superintendent of Forest Reserves in this Territory has been relieved from office and that he and Mrs. Hanna will not return to Santa Fe. The same report says that ex-Governor Andrew S. Burke of North Dakota who for several years has been an inspector of surveyor generals' offices and U. S. land offices under the direction of the secretary of the Interior has also been relieved from duty. The New Mexican was unable to verify these reports today, but gives the reports in circulation for the information of the people. It will be remembered that Mr. Hanna was suspended some time ago from duty and is now east.

## BELEN AS A RAILROAD CENTER

Advent of the Eastern Railway of New Mexico Will Make It Such—John Becker the Leading Spirit—Work on Railroad Bridge Resumed.

Belen as a railroad center. This enterprising and thriving town, which is the principal point of trade in Valencia County, is situated about 100 miles south of this city and is the place to which the Eastern Railway of New Mexico will be built from the Texas line.

"The town of Belen," said A. M. Bergere, Esq., today, who has just returned from a trip to that section, where he was looking after real estate holdings, "is an old, old town and the principal town in Valencia County. It is at present experiencing a new lease on life, and is flourishing as the rose in June. It will soon be one of the railroad centers of New Mexico, having been selected as the point where the Eastern Railway of New Mexico will cross the Rio Grande division of the Santa Fe Pacific.

**The Railroad Bridge.**  
"Work on the railroad bridge across the Rio Grande, which was stopped some time ago, is to be resumed at once, a force of 40 bridge builders and 100 laborers having arrived on the scene during the week to push the structure to an early completion. It will be the finest railroad bridge in New Mexico and one of the grandest in the United States. It will be built of concrete and iron, the material being already on the ground. Work on the construction of the railroad grade and tracks will be resumed about February first.

**New Railroad Depot.**  
"The Santa Fe Railway will also build a fine, large new depot, about 200 feet from the present structure and an eating house at Belen. The plans are drawn and the building will be very handsome.

The railroad line goes diagonally west of the residence of Felipe Chavez, To John Becker, wholesale merchant and banker, is due the credit for getting the railroad line via Belen, as it was the intention of the company to cut across the country about three and a half miles south of the town. It was through his influence, hard work and a liberal outlay of money, as well as donations of land, that the railroad company finally decided to build through Belen.

"Mr. Becker has erected one of the finest buildings in the Territory in which is located his general store and warehouses. His office force consists of ten people, while in his general store, warehouses and flour mill about 20 more persons are employed. Mr. Becker came to the Territory about 30 years ago, and engaged as a clerk with L. & H. Huning. Today he is one of the wealthiest and most progressive merchants and citizens in New Mexico.

## INDIGNITIES TO MOURNERS

Continue in Chicago as the Result of Livery and Cab Drivers' Strike.

Chicago, Dec. 23.—Indignities continue to fall to the lot of funeral parties as the result of the strike of livery and cab drivers. In one instance the mourners were delayed by pickets until the body they accompanying had been placed aboard the train and the train had left the station.

## FOOD SUPPLY MEN STRIKE IN PARIS

Bakers Will Not Resume Work Until Parliament Suppresses Municipal Employment Agencies.

Paris, Dec. 23.—The strike here of men employed in the various branches of food supplies began to assume serious proportions today. The bakers adopted resolutions favoring a strike throughout the baking trade to begin today and declaring in favor of a general strike of all branches of the trade. They announced their intention not to resume work until parliament suppressed the municipal employment agencies. Indications are that a considerable number of butchers, grocers and pastry cooks will participate in the strike. Anticipating demonstrations the military and police have taken elaborate precautions.

Other Marts of Trade.

"The First National Bank of Belen, of which Mr. Becker is vice president, does an exceptionally good business for a new bank. Other general stores in the town are those of Fred Scholle, Oscar Goebel, who also runs a hotel in connection with his general store and the Belen Mercantile Company, which is owned by non-residents. There are ten saloons, a blacksmith shop, a livery stable and two hotels and the newspaper plant of "The Capital" owned by William M. Berger. The first issue of this paper will appear January 2. It will be Republican in politics and devoted to the upbuilding of Valencia County.

## New Country Bridge.

The county commissioners of Valencia are building a wagon bridge across the Rio Grande at La Constantia. The bridge is about three miles east of the Belen depot. It is nearly completed, will cost about \$15,000 and is of iron.

"The new territorial orphan asylum is situated half way between the main street of Belen and the depot, facing south. The building is two stories, of red brick and with red sandstone trimmings. The architecture is very severe. The building will be completed and ready for occupancy in the early spring.

## Great Wool Center.

"A large quantity of wool is purchased by the merchants of Belen and shipped to the eastern markets. Mr. Becker being one of the heaviest purchasers. It is also one of the best alfalfa and hay producing districts in the Territory. Mr. Becker alone having on hand something like 1,000 tons of alfalfa.

"Belen and the country tributary to it are great fruit raising districts, more wine being manufactured there than in any town in the Rio Grande Valley. It is noted as a great brandy manufacturing place.

"Mr. Becker has one of the finest flour mills in the Territory and purchases most of the wheat raised from Isleta to La Joya. As a wheat, corn, hay, alfalfa, fruit and vegetable section, it cannot be excelled in the southwest.

"Considerable building is going on in the town at the present time and the outlook for it becoming one of the principal commercial centers in the Territory is the brightest. Its growth will be materially enhanced by the advent of the Eastern Railway of New Mexico which will bring much additional business to the town."

## PINZEN ENROUTE TO TITUMATI

Mayflower Reports Having Met Her With Three Hundred Men and Munitions.

## PROBABILITIES OF WAR IN EAST

German Foreign Office Engaged in Estimating—Attention Fixed on Great Britain.

Berlin, Dec. 23.—The German foreign office in estimating the probabilities of war in the far East fixes its attention at this moment on Great Britain rather than on Japan, for it is recognized that Japan is only waiting for Great Britain to give the word before beginning hostilities.

A new and even portentous element in the situation, as it is looked upon here, is the rising feeling in Great Britain that Russia must yield or Japan and Great Britain ought to fight her. It is believed that the British government looks upon war as possibly the only means of saving and re-establishing her position in the East.

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## ASSISTANT SECRETARY

Secretary George B. Cortelyou of Department of Commerce and Labor Names L. O. Murray.

Washington, Dec. 23.—Lawrence O. Murray of Chicago has been chosen assistant secretary of the department of commerce and labor. The nomination will be sent to the Senate immediately after the holiday recess.

The appointment was made on the personal recommendation of Secretary Cortelyou, who has known Murray for a number of years.

## ELECTED TO THE HOUSE OF COMMONS

Rowland Hunt, a Liberal Unionist and Supporter of Chamberlain Succeeds R. J. Moore.

London, Dec. 23.—Rowland Hunt, a liberal unionist and a supporter of Joseph Chamberlain's fiscal policy, has been elected to represent the Ludlow division of Shropshire in the House of Commons to succeed Robert J. Moore, the liberal unionist deceased, by a majority of 970 votes. At a previous contest election Moore's majority was nearly 4,000.

The issue was clear cut and the contest fought exclusively on the fiscal questions.

## CARDINALS AND HIGH PRELATES

Exchanged the Season's Greetings Today With Pope—Plus X—Function Unusually Interesting.

Rome, Dec. 23.—The Pope received all cardinals and high prelates today and they exchanged the season's greetings. The function was unusually interesting as it was the first of its kind under the present pontiff. Pope Plus X, in spotless white robes was seated on the throne, while the cardinals ranged themselves in front of him according to precedence. Behind him were the other church dignitaries in their order. The pontiff responded with usual affability and modesty to the address of Cardinal Oreglia, the dean of the sacred college and the assembly then advanced and kissed the pontiff's hand, afterwards breaking up into small groups.

## SUDDEN DEATH OF ROSS GIBSON

Passed Away This Morning After an Illness of Three Weeks—Was the Only Child.

Ross Gibson, the sixteen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Gibson, died suddenly this morning at the home of his parents in the Gallegos block, on Washington Avenue, of heart failure, resulting from an illness of tonsil abscess of three weeks duration. The deceased was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Gibson, and the nephew of Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Gibson of this city. The remains are being prepared for burial by Dudrow & Montele, the funeral directors, and will be taken to Cleveland, Ohio, tomorrow, where the funeral services will be held, with interment in the family burying ground.

Before taking the remains to the Santa Fe depot for the 9:40 a. m. train, a short prayer service will be conducted at the house by the Rev. W. Hays Moore, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church.

## INDECISIVE BATTLE.

Fought Between Chinese and Coreans Who Invaded the Empire From Kyeng Chung.

Shanghai, Dec. 23.—The tartar general at Kirin reports that an indecisive battle occurred between the four battalions of Chinese from Hung Chun, an dthe 1,500 Coreans who invaded the Chinese territory from Kyeng Chung in northeast Corea.

## PITTSBURG THREATENED WITH TYPHOID EPIDEMIC.

Pittsburg, Dec. 23.—The typhoid fever here threatens to take on the character of an epidemic. For the first 22 days in December there were 410 cases and during the last 24 hours 49 new cases were reported. The disease is virulent and a large proportion of those taken sick are dying.

## PRICES WENT SOARING ON NEW YORK EXCHANGE.

New York, Dec. 23.—There was great activity and irregularity on the cotton market today, with the prices showing wide rapid fluctuations. Tips were circulated that the big bulls intended to put the market on the fourteen cent basis before Christmas. Prices went soaring above all previous records.

## TEN JURORS QUALIFIED

Two of the Twelve Selected to Try Miners Challenged by Prosecution and Defense.

## EXAMINING TALISMEN

Another Venire of Thirty Men Returned by Sheriff—Twelve Union Miners Jailed.

Georgetown, Dec. 23.—An announcement was made last night by the defense in the Idaho Springs dynamiting case that the twelve men in the box were acceptable, was revised this morning by one man being challenged. The district attorney has not yet announced his position, but it is understood that ten of the eleven men are acceptable to the prosecution.

Work of examining talesmen was resumed, a venire of 30 having been returned by the sheriff.

## Union Miners Jailed.

Telluride, Colo., Dec. 23.—It was learned today that Sheriff Rutan had sent twelve of the union miners arrested yesterday for the alleged intimidation of non union men to the Montrose jail. He refuses to give a reason for his action.

## Secretary Miners Union Released.

Cripple Creek, Dec. 23.—Alexander G. Paul, secretary of the local miners' union who was arrested by the military along with the other union leaders about two weeks ago was released today, by order of Colonel Verdecburg. He immediately entered into consultation with the colonel. No reason was given for his release. Paul was one of the men for whom an application of habeas corpus is pending in the Supreme Court.

## Further Reduction of Military Forces.

Victor, Colo., Dec. 23.—A further reduction of the military forces in this district was made today, when a number of members of Company D, Colorado Springs, were ordered home. The unusual quietude in the camp is the only reason given for the relief of the men. The troops are being paid today.

## IN THE DISTRICT COURT

Appeal to Be Taken in Two Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company Cases.

A. M. Bergere, Esq., clerk of the First Judicial District Court, is preparing the transcripts in the appeals in the cases of John W. Cooper vs. the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company, and Ed. Hesch vs. Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company, in which the decision of the lower court was adverse to the defendant company, in money judgments. The cases will be heard at the next term of the territorial Supreme Court.

The new cases have been filed in the First Judicial District Court from Taos County, i. e., T. P. Martin vs. Thomas Martinez, for \$782 damages, resulting from selling sheep on shares, and T. P. Martin vs. Manuel Martinez y Gonzales and Thomas Martinez, for \$980 damages, resulting from selling sheep on shares. William McKean, Esq., of Taos, is attorney for the plaintiff.

A suit has been filed in the First Judicial Court from Taos County, by J. W. Scofield, receiver of the First National Bank of Asbury Park, New Jersey vs. the Fraser Mountain Copper Company, for \$10,000 on a promissory note.

A. M. Bergere, Esq., clerk of the First Judicial District Court, has appointed Frank Staplin, deputy clerk of the First Judicial District Court for Taos County for the purpose of issuing writs of attachment and writs of replevin, which will save the people of the county much inconvenience.

## OLD PIONEER DEAD.

Justo Sandoval, Eighty Years of Age Died Last Friday at Parkview.

Special to the New Mexican. Tierra Amarilla, N. M., Dec. 22.—Justo Sandoval, an old pioneer of this part of the Territory, was found dead in his shop at Parkview, at 6 o'clock on the morning of Friday last. The apparent cause of death was heart failure. Deceased was about 80 years of age, a manufacturer of filigree jewelry, a native of Santa Fe, but who has lived in this county for the last 40 years. He leaves no family. He was in the middle part of the last century the secretary of the late Francisco Martinez, one of the grantees of the Tierra Amarilla land grant, and the donations and papers made by Martinez to settlers on the grant and other grantees were in Sandoval's handwriting.

## SENATOR HOAR IN VERY BAD COMPANY.

The recent outbreak of Senator Hoar on the Panama question is much to be regretted for several reasons and first of all on his own account. After having rendered memorable services to the republic for more years than is usually allotted to man he seems to have resolved to close his career as a morose pessimist. Since he voted against the ratification of the Spanish treaty (with a few irreconcilable Democrats) he has persistently opposed the last and present administrations at every step of their foreign policy. His language against the ratification of the canal treaty with Panama is unworthy of his country, his state and himself. He said:

"I want to know, and the American people want to know, and have a right to know, whether this mighty policeman on the isthmus, seeing a man about to attack another, justified before the blow is struck in manhandling the assailed party, and whether after the assault has been made, the policeman is justified in claiming that the pocketbook which has been taken from the victim by the assailant should be turned over to him (the policeman) on the ground that he was the rightful owner?"

It must have been pleasing to Mr. Hoar that he was sustained in his attack on the administration by the Democratic leader, Mr. Gorman, who adroitly used the incident in an endeavor to make some political capital out of it for his sorely pressed party which needs it so much. Then came the Bayard of the Senate, the Chevalier sans peur et sans reproche, Senator Foraker, whose Americanism is as bright as polished steel. In part he said:

"The President has stated there was no conference, no intrigue. And yet the Senator from Massachusetts demands that the President shall submit proof to him that he was telling the truth when he made the statement that he had not connived."

"No agent was sent to the President of the United States, and no agent was sent to Panama. She had a right if she saw fit, to go into rebellion. Weeks before she declared her independence, it became known that she would take that step—not officially but to every one who studied that situation and knew what human nature would do under the circumstances."

The administration at Washington, he said, was not unmindful of the situation, "and the President took the steps indicated by the telegrams and from which the Senator from Massachusetts derives such conclusions."

No one is so hard to be convinced as he who will not be convinced. The President's word is not good enough for Senator Hoar who demanded "corroborative and documentary evidence before he could believe him." After, by hints and innuendoes (which there was no misunderstanding) charging the President with secretly bringing about the recent bloodless revolution on the isthmus, Mr. Hoar with strange inconsistency said that it was impossible to believe and he did not believe the President was capable of such intrigues and that it was for the purpose of saving him from such imputations that he wished all the information possible to be secured on the question. The venerable Senator need not trouble himself to save the President from such imputations; who has said that there was no intrigue, and no conference with Panama, that no agent was sent to him and no agent was sent by him to Panama previous to the revolution, and the people of the United States (with the possible exception of Senator Hoar and a handful of his fellow malcontents) will implicitly believe the President. Mr. Hoar has the gratification of knowing that as the Inter-Ocean's Washington correspondent says, every Central and South American legation in Washington will use the cable tonight to apprise their government that a distinguished Senator of the Republican party has likened his government to a policeman who holds the arms of a victim while he is being robbed of his pocketbook.

No doubt the importance of Mr. Hoar's opposition will be greatly exaggerated (in the usual grandiloquent style of the Central and South American statesmen) with the intention of

urging the Colombians to attack the United States marines now ashore at the Isthmus. If such an attack is made Mr. Hoar should be made to feel that he is largely responsible for it and for the consequent bloodshed. It seems inevitable that the United States must meet malignant opposition in every crisis of its history. The country had Tories during the revolution, traitors giving aid and comfort to the enemy in 1812; factions, which prayed that the gallant armies of the United States in Mexico should be "welcomed by bloody hands to hospitable graves;" copperheads during the civil war who were rebels in everything but the courage to fight, and now the people have the Hoars, the Atkinsons and their peevish little cabal who will be classed with the above, or who more likely will soon sink into well deserved oblivion.

"Let Colombia take the initiative." These are the instructions of the secretary of the navy to General George F. Elliott, who will command the battalions of U. S. marines sent to the Isthmus of Panama. If Colombia takes the initiative, then there will be vigorous and prompt action. This is what the American people by a four-fifths majority desire, regardless of what Senators Gorman and Morgan have to say about it. Despite these grave and reverend Senators the people of this country will rule. The Democratic party as far as the Republicans are concerned is welcome to all the capital its leaders and newspapers can make out of a fight against the policy of the administration in Panama matters.

There is such a thing as a man getting too much Democracy. A Rochester man in a suit for divorce charges his spouse with hitting him over the head with "The Life of Thomas Jefferson" two or three times a week. He says it is bad enough to have Thomas Jefferson thrown at him at every political meeting he attends and more than enough, says he is very tired of Thomas and wants to get rid of him as well as the wife of his bosom, who has more affection for the dead statesman than for her husband. There is much justice in this complaint.

Were strike agitators and walking delegates to be treated in the towns of this country as a few of them were recently handled in the city of Pueblo in the sovereign state of Colorado there would be less strikes and more contentment and satisfaction among laboring men and more peace and harmony between labor and capital. The Citizens' Alliance of Pueblo made up its mind to stand no foolishness from these agitators and told them to "get." They "got" much to the benefit of all concerned.

The Boston anti-imperialists are applauding the stand taken by Democratic leaders in the Senate and House of Representatives against the Republican policy in the Panama matter. This is pleasing to all concerned, but does not in a material way hurt the policy; this will go on until absolutely triumphant. It is manifest destiny and it will take a bigger, smarter and more patriotic crowd than that lead by Gorman, Morgan, Carmack et al, to beat it.

A New York Yellow Journal announces that Senators Platt and Depew are to be retired from New York politics by Governor Odell. Of course they are to be; they cannot expect to hold official positions for ever. Senator Platt is over 70 years of age and Mr. Depew is no spring chicken. A few years more and their places will be taken by younger and more active men. Such is life.

The British forces have received unexpected help in their campaign against the Mad Mullah in Somaliland. The Chicago Board of Trade has passed resolutions denouncing him and simply because he and his men are cannibals and eat the corpses of the men whom they slay in battle. The Chicago Board of Trade thinks the Mad Mullah ought to buy Chicago canned meat for his troops.

If Senator Mark A. Hanna will not again accept the position of chairman of the Republican National Committee, then in that case, Secretary of the War Elihu Root who will leave the cabinet at an early date would be the proper man for this important position. There is not a brainier man nor one possessed of better or greater executive ability than Mr. Root in the country.

Some of the grave and reverend Senators are rather effeminate. In the cost of bills of the Senate, among other articles furnished them by the United States appeared recently: wrist bags, manicure sets, ladies' belts and other articles used by women. Can it be that some of these "artful dodgers" give these things to their lady friends?

New Mexico has done remarkably well during the year 1903. Nevertheless, here is hoping that 1904 will be an improvement upon 1903. If so, the people certainly will have great cause to be satisfied and thankful to Providence.

Some labor leaders carry the union business too far. One shining light of this class of agitators in Chicago has just been used by his wife for a divorce, she alleging that he is a bigamist. Too much union and therefore she objects to it.

## MINES AND MILLS

The construction of a 60-ton smelter  
in the Burro mining district is an as-  
sured fact. Benjamin Johnson of Beau-  
mont, who recently purchased several  
of the best mining properties in that  
district, has started to work on the  
construction of the mill, and it is ex-  
pected to have it in operation by the  
first of next March. It is understood  
that Mr. Johnson, who owned the Beau-  
mont street car line with his brother,  
has disposed of all his interests there,  
and has decided to locate in Silver  
City and invest exclusively in mining  
enterprises.

C. F. & I. Changes Name.  
The fuel and steel departments of  
the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company  
have been segregated and hereafter  
will be known under separate names.  
The steel plant in Pueblo, together  
with the iron mines in New Mexico  
and Colorado will retain the old name  
of Colorado Fuel and Iron Company,  
but the coal and coke departments  
will henceforth be known under the  
name of the Rocky Mountain Coal and  
Iron Company. The management of  
the new company will be in the hands  
of John T. Kebler, who will be its  
president and general manager. The  
significance of the change will not be  
divulged by the officials of the com-  
pany.

Large Sales of Copper.  
Large sales of copper have been  
made at the low prices established re-  
cently, and manufacturers seem in-  
clined to take hold again. This is es-  
pecially the case abroad, where busi-  
ness is reviving and the manufacturers  
stocks have been very small. The  
European buyers seem to have made  
up their minds that bottom has been  
reached, and have placed a consider-  
able amount of business. The large  
sellers have, moreover, ceased to press  
metal on the market, with the conse-  
quence that prices are better.

Mining Notes.  
The cost of producing copper at the  
mines and smelters of the Green Con-  
solidated Copper Company, at Cana-  
nea, Sonora, Mexico, has increased  
from six to six and a quarter cents  
within the past year.

The American Smelting and Refin-  
ing Company has closed the deal  
whereby it absorbs its last competitor  
in the western country, the Federal  
Smelting and Refining Company, at  
Everett, Washington. This purchase  
has been expected for some time.

Agent M. E. Cory, of the Santa Fe,  
at Rincon, has wired the Santa Fe  
Railway officials at El Paso, that the  
reports concerning the salting of the  
placer gold finds at Goldorito and in  
Apache and Green Canons were false.  
He says he has made a personal in-  
vestigation, and finds them all right.

A party of Silver Citizens, composed  
of George Schaeble, Stephen Corley,  
Thomas Scott, Henry Sachs, C. A. Al-  
lington, George Burdette and Benja-  
min Laswell has returned overland  
from the gold fields north of Rincon.  
They stayed on the ground three days  
and prospected in the surrounding  
canons. They panned out a great deal  
of dirt but were unable to obtain any  
colors, and are of the opinion that the  
gold is confined to the two small can-  
ons, where the strike was originally  
made.

Dr. C. R. Luton, who is manager of  
the Michigan-New Mexico Copper Com-  
pany, owning the Dacotah-Pearl group  
near Lordsburg, says that the work on  
the Dacotah-Pearl mines has been  
temporarily suspended owing to the in-  
ability of the present pumps to handle  
the water. A larger pump has been  
ordered, and is expected to arrive  
shortly when work in the mines will  
be resumed. Dr. Luton says that work  
on the 60-ton smelter for the company  
will be commenced February 15, and  
will be pushed rapidly towards comple-  
tion. The foundation for the cyanide  
plant of the International Gold Min-  
ing and Milling Company, at Malone,  
Grant County, is under way. The re-  
taining walls are now being construct-  
ed and it is expected to have the entire  
plant completed by the middle of Feb-  
ruary. Its capacity will be 25 tons a  
day.

Active development work is being  
pushed by the Santa Rita Mining Com-  
pany at Santa Rita, Grant County. The  
principal operations at the present  
time consist of the new No. 7 shaft,  
out of which good ore is being taken,  
and also on the 300 foot level of the  
Hearst shaft, which is likewise produc-  
ing high grade ore. Altogether work  
is being prosecuted in seven drifts.  
The concentrating plant was run for 15  
days in November and the same aver-  
age will be maintained during the  
present month. About 70 men are em-  
ployed by the company.

A big strike is reported on the old  
Romero lease at Santa Rita, owned by  
Mariano Islos and W. H. Earnest. The  
find is probably the largest that has  
ever been made in the camp. About  
seven car loads of ore are being ship-  
ped from this lease every month, none  
of which, it is stated, runs less than 30  
per cent copper.

Rocky Mountain Lumber Company, of Denver, Proposes to Build One to Its Camps.

## HOTEL ACCOMMODATIONS

Accommodations at Ojo Caliente. At Ojo Caliente, the resort owned by Hon. Antonio Joseph, 50 miles north of this city, there are at present accommodations for 75 guests and it is the intention to increase the hotel accommodations to double that capacity during the coming year. The rates are \$2.50 per day, \$14 per week or \$50 per month for each person, children one-half the above rates. These rates include board, bathing and lodging and the free use of the mineral waters. The Rocky Mountain Lumber Company of Denver proposes to construct a railroad from the main line of the Denver & Rio Grande via Ojo Caliente to its extensive lumber camps next spring, which will afford more rapid communication and transportation with the outside world. The future prospects for Ojo Caliente are very good.

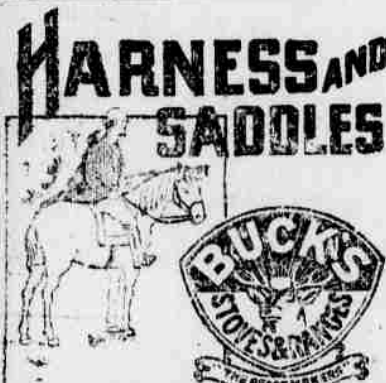
